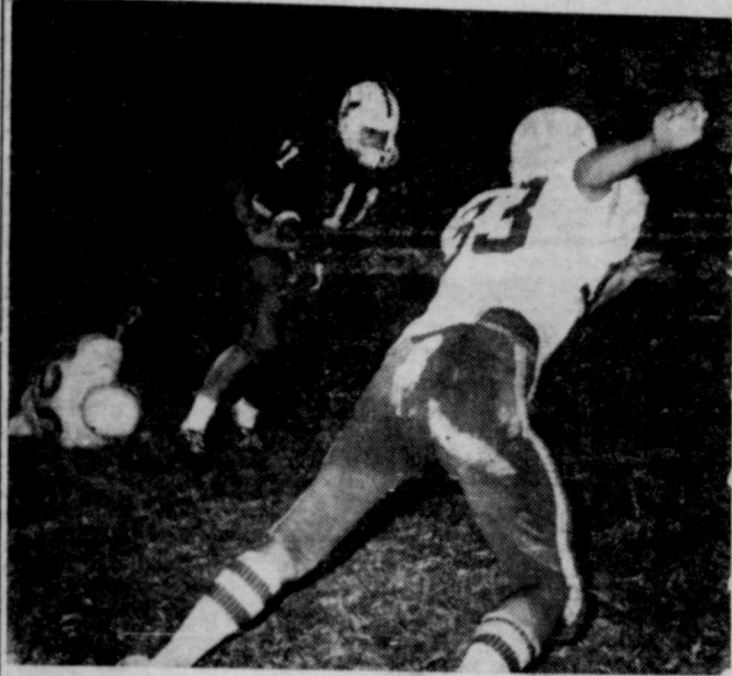

Goldthwaite 'B' Team Soars Past Gatesville Freshman Team 37-6

Goldthwaite High School football team were the victors Thursday night when they downed the Gatesville freshman team 37-6. The game was played on Eagle Field. The Eagles started the game with a slow start but in the final 40 seconds of the first quarter for three touchdowns which may be some kind of record. Dick Shaw, halfback, started going when he carried the ball over the line from 18 yards out. This was the first TD. The extra point failed. In the second quarter the "B" team scored again on a halfback run to Gatesville. The

Gas Rate Hike Gets Final Okay

Goldthwaite City Council unambiguously passed an ordinance granting the Lone Star Gas Co. an increase in rate to residences and commercial customers in Goldthwaite. The increase will go into effect in about 30 days and will reflect about a 3 percent increase over all. The City Council regulates

the rate by the gas company and before the rate increase could be passed it had to be approved on three readings by the council.

Clyde Cockrum Sr., chairman of the Goldthwaite Housing Authority reported the necessity of paving around the housing project in the southwest part of town, stating that dust from the street could be hazardous to the health and property of residents in the project. The Council unanimously approved paving six blocks of streets around the projects to remedy the problem.

A large oak tree located in the middle of the street near the swimming pool in the park will be removed by the City following a request by Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks. He stated that the tree is a hazard to safe driving. Several accidents have occurred at that point with several hundred dollars of property damage resulting.

Wendell Tucker, local home builder, appealed to the City to furnish water to a sub-division he is constructing in the north part of town. He agreed to dig the ditches and lay the pipe if the City would furnish the pipe. See CITY COUNCIL, Back Page

Eagles Stymied By San Saba In '72 Season Opener Here

The Goldthwaite Eagles and the AA San Saba Armadillos matched scores in the first, third and fourth quarters of the game played on Eagle Field Friday night. The 'Dillos went ahead of the Eagles in the second quarter when they racked up fifteen points on the scoreboard. The score was 21-6 for the 'Dillos.

The Eagles scored their first TD of the season and the only TD in the game during the final stages of the contest when QB Bill Bishop connected with halfback, Randy Wright, on a 15 yard pass.

San Saba scores were made by tailback Billy Smith on a five yard run, a 20-yard field goal kicked by Smith, and two TD's made by Tony Galindo on 23 and 30 yard runs.

When commenting on the game, Head Coach Leslie Johnson said, "The boys made too many mistakes Friday night. They have a winning attitude, but must overcome those mistakes in order to improve their playing ability as a team."

Along with this walk-through tour, the all new trailer which depicts Texas Agricultural Products in a five to six minute show, will be set up in the same proximity of the new building.

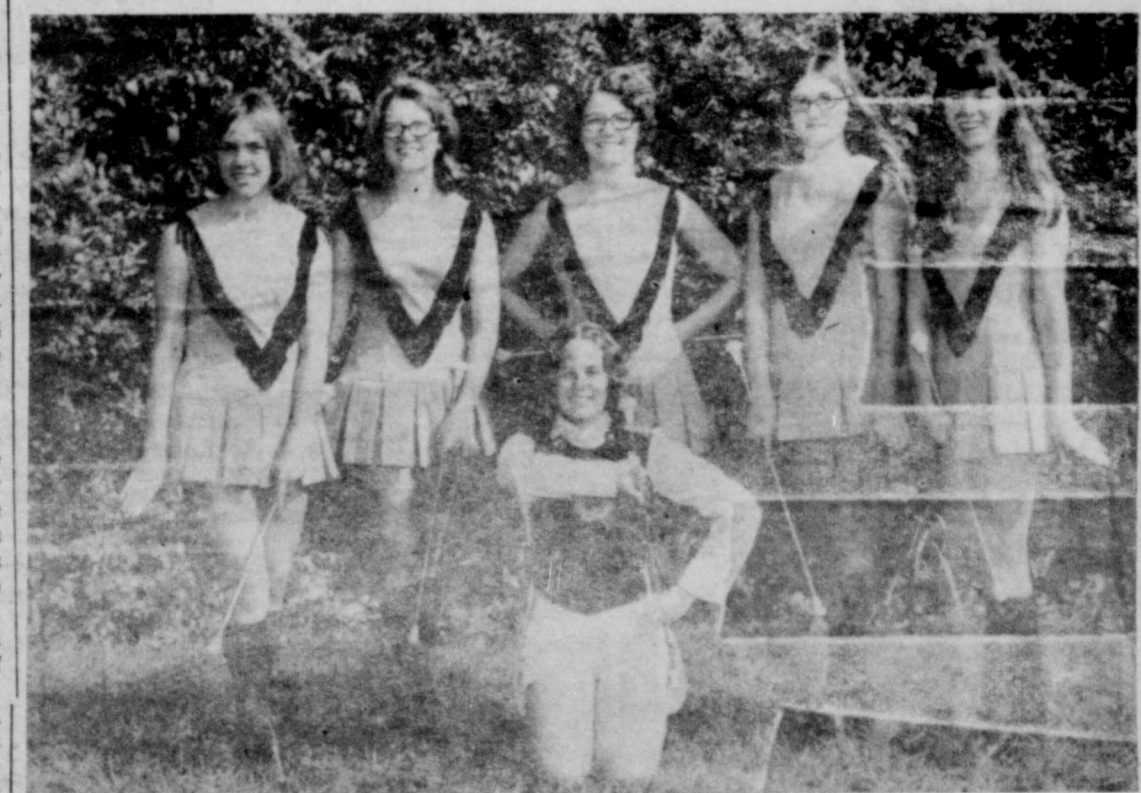
New TAP Trailer To Be On Display September 16-17

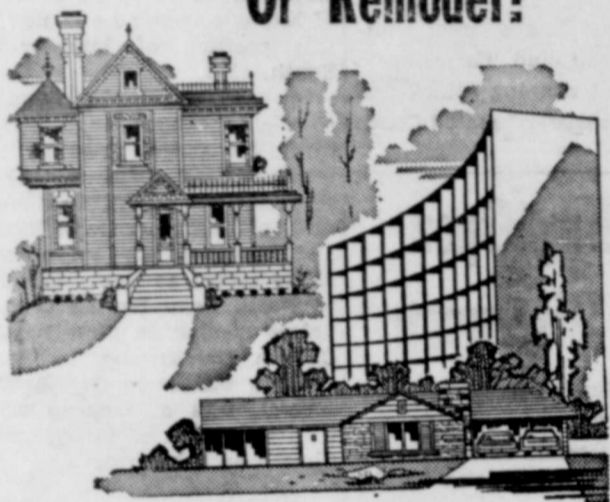
Baptismal Service with Russell Crosby in charge will be at 4:15 followed by recreation and supper at 5:30.

Monday and Tuesday of next week, September 18 and 19, the members of the Program Building organization in Mills County will be attending a Program Building Leader Workshop at Lampasas. Attending this workshop will help building leaders conduct an educational program designed to solve major county economic and social problems and take advantage of opportunities available in the county.

4-H members are urged to contact their organizational leaders to enroll in 4-H Foods and Nutrition projects. New groups are organizing now. Anyone between the age of 9 and 19 is eligible to join 4-H. There are many fine projects that are worthwhile.

Remember the advertising campaign "We Try Harder"?

Mrs. Virginia Knauer, Special Assistant to the President on Consumer Affairs, has asked food trade associations to assist in gaining the cooperation of their members in the consumer's "Shop Harder" campaign.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture through its Plentiful Foods Program is also "trying harder" to alert shoppers to food items in abundance with the "Shop Harder" campaign.

"By letting their shoppers know what food items are in abundance, food retailers can help consumers in their fight against high food prices" said J. R. Vestal, Southwest Regional

Director of USDA's Plentiful Foods Office, Dallas.

Vestal announced that fresh apples, apple products, wheat products, rice, dry beans, broiler-fryers, turkeys, and eggs are included on USDA's Plentiful Foods List for October.

"Through the 'Shop Harder' promotion and industry cooperation we hope to keep consumers informed about food items in abundance to help stretch their food dollar," Vestal said.

Vestal also called attention to an industry-government promotion of the International Day of Bread, Oct. 3, and Harvest Festival Week, Oct 1 thru Oct. 7. Consumer interest will be focused by retailers, food trade associations, state Departments of Agriculture, and related government agencies on the good buys offered by bread and by wheat products.

"The 'Shop Harder' campaign and special promotions will benefit the consumer by keeping them informed about plentiful foods," Vestal said. "You see - retailers, trade associations, USDA and related government agencies are 'trying harder' to help consumers 'Shop Harder'."

One way to "Shop Harder" and to make the most of your food budget money is to read & compare newspaper ads. Stores spend time and money on advertisements. Why do this? The grocery business is very competitive - each store wants you for a customer.

Competition among stores brings the consumer several benefits. An observant shopper

can compare not only prices, but often brands, cuts, quality, size and grades. This can aid in reducing the amount spent on food items and affect future purchases.

Advertising also brings new products. Many families are willing to try new foods once informed about them.

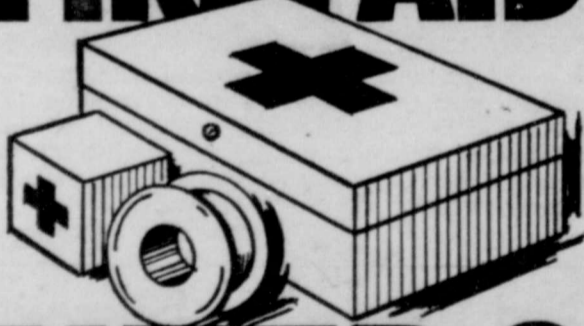

Series E & H Savings Bonds Total \$1,600 For Month Of July

Mr. W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Mills County totaled \$1,600 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$33,754 for 56% of the 1972 goal of \$60,000.

July sales in Texas were \$16,989,269 compared to \$16,810,210 during the same period last year. Year-to-date sales amounted to \$125,013,794, while 1971 sales totaled \$118,726,731 - a 5.2% increase.

Nationwide sales during July totaled \$493 million. For the January-July period sales were \$3.7 billion - 15% above sales last year. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$27 million were reported for July, 13% above the \$24 million exchanged last year.

The Mills County 4-H Organization is steadily increasing in membership and enthusiasm among the youth and adults in the county. Several new 4-H activities and events have been initiated and more are planned.

One of the most impressive and dignified events of a 4-H year is the 4-H Awards Banquet. For the first time in Mills County, a 4-H Awards Banquet will be held on Saturday, September 23 at 7:00 p.m. in the American Legion Hall in Goldthwaite. The banquet is being held to honor some 50 4-Hers and adult leaders and guests are invited to attend this banquet. The banquet is for the purpose of bettering the 4-H organization in the county. The banquet will cost a certain amount for each person attending and will be a semi-formal affair. All persons interested in attending the banquet should contact my office on or before September 19th.

The horse population in Texas has increased to an astounding figure and has become a big factor on the economy. Keeping the horse population healthy is a part of the overall investment in horses. The control of internal parasites is no small part of the horse health program.

The four most common internal parasites of the horse are Pinworms, Bats, Strongyles (large and small), and Ascarids (or large roundworms). Strongyles are considered to be the most damaging. Some of the various drugs recommended for these internal parasites are: Pinworms - Dizan Suspension, Equizole, Durex, Anthon, Parvex, and Equigard. Strongyles - Parvex, Various, Dyrex, Equizole, Equigard, and Dizan, Suspension. Ascarids - Parvex, Various, Equizole, Dizan Suspension, Dy-

rex, Anthon, and Equigard. There are other drugs besides the above mentioned. A good sanitation program and periodic treatment program varying the number of treatments from twice a year to six times a year, and alternating among the various drugs and combination of drugs, may be used, depending upon the degree of parasitism.

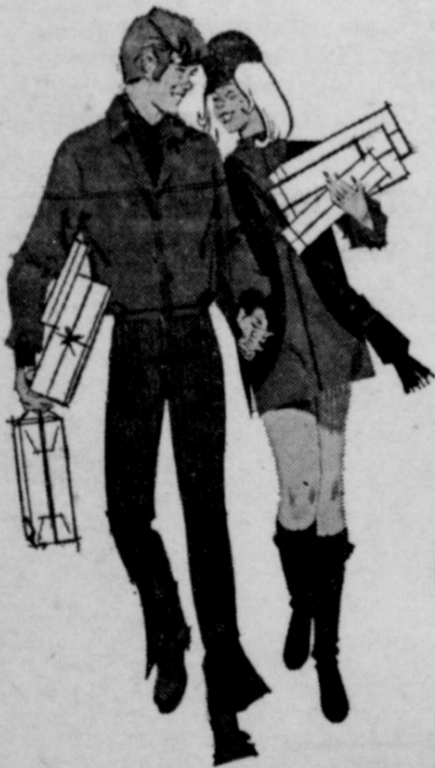

**Immunization Clinic Slated Here
September 26 For Pre-Schoolers**

An immunization clinic will be conducted Tuesday, September 26, at Goldthwaite Elementary School at 3 p.m. for all pre-schoolers. There will be no fee charged for the immunizations. Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis formerly known as (DPT) and polio immunizations should be started about two months of age, and resume at three and four months. A third polio immunization should be given at six months. At twelve and thirteen months of age measles and rubella are suggested. Between the fifteenth and the eighteenth months DPT and polio immunizations should be given again to the child. DPT and polio booster doses should be given to children from four to six years of age. A TD dose should be given to youngsters between the ages of fourteen and sixteen and continued every ten years thereafter. Everyone should remember to keep a personal immunization record of their children showing the dates and kinds of immunizations received and these records must be validated by a doctor or health clinic personnel.

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF GOLDTHWAITE, MILLS COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Goldthwaite by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$2.444 Gross; \$2.20 Net.
Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.222 per Mcf Gross; \$1.10 per Mcf Net.
Next 6,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.100 per Mcf Gross; \$.99 per Mcf Net.
Next 15,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.011 per Mcf. Gross \$.91 per Mcf Net.
Next 75,000 cu. ft. @ \$.956 per Mcf Gross; \$.88 per Mcf Net.
All Over 100,000 cu. ft. @ \$.922 per Mcf Gross; \$.83 per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each

gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the month bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter. The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rule and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders or regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed is open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, and that this rate ordinance is in compliance with the applicable general criteria issued by the Price Commission under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended.
