Three Injuries, One Death Scar Mills Co. Highways



FRED CHAPMAN, 23, of Fort Worth was fatally injured when his 1967 Pontiac overturned a number of times about 3:45 a.m. Sunday 1.6 miles northwest of Goldthwaite on US 84. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace E.H. Thorne. Services for Chapman were held Wednesday at the Shannon Funeral Home, North, in Fort Worth. — Robert Roberson Photo

Three serious accidents resulting in one death and three injuries occurred in Mills County over the weekend.

Presley Fred Chapman, 23, of Fort Worth, was fatally injured in a one car accident on U. S. Highway 84 north of Goldthwaite early Sunday morning. His 1967 Pontiac, headed north, apparently left the road in front of Harper Implement Co., ramed two private driveway culverts and then flipped over about three times, coming to rest on its wheels.

Chapman was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace, E. H. Thorne. His body was found about twenty-five feet from the wreckage.

His death marks the third traffic fatality for Mills County for 1972.

DOWNTOWN COLLISIONS HEAVILY DAMAGES CARS

A Saturday afternoon collision resulted in extensive damage to two automobiles, however, no one was injured.

Marie Hamilton of Goldthwaite, traveling west on Fourth Street was ramed by a 1964 Plymouth, driven by Donna Joyce Hilleges, a Goldthwaite High School student, who was going south on Parker Street. The front portion of Hamilton's car and the left front of Hilleges' car suffered extensive damage. There were no injuries reported.

The intersection of Little Street and Fisher Street in Goldthwaite was the scene of a two car collision which resulted in three injured persons Sunday at 8:30 p.m.

A San Saba man, Joe Campos Jr., driving a 1964 Chevrolet and traveling north on Fisher, was attempting to make a left turn onto Little Street from Fisher when a 1970 Chevrolet pickup, driven by Edith Bishop of Atascosa, Texas, attempted to pass the Campos vehicle as it was

attempting the turn.

After the collision the Campos vehicle ramed into and broke a General Telephone pole. Mrs. Bishop suffered head lacerations and her daughter received

a laceration on her right knee. Campos received a cut on the back of his head.

Both vehicles suffered extensive damage and had to be towed from the scene.

Annual Meet Of Cen-Tex Telephone Cooperative Scheduled Here Oct. 2

The 19th annual meeting for members of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative Inc., will be held here next Monday, October 2, 1972. The meeting is scheduled to be held in the American Legion Hall.

Construction On Sites 1 And 2 To Begin Soon

Last Monday, September 18, at the Soil Conservation Service State Office in Temple, bids were open and a contract for construction of Sites 1 and 2 Bennett Creek was awarded to Mack Adams of Athens, Texas. Adams was the low bidder out of eleven bids that were submitted.

The contractor has twenty days to start construction once word is given to proceed, states Charles Studer, District Conservationist at Goldthwaite.

Site 2 is located on the Bob Kerby Farm, four miles east of Kerby Farm, four miles east of Goldthwaite and Site 1 is located on the Jimmy Welch Farm seven miles east of Goldthwaite.

The low bid was just under \$440,000 for construction of the two sites.

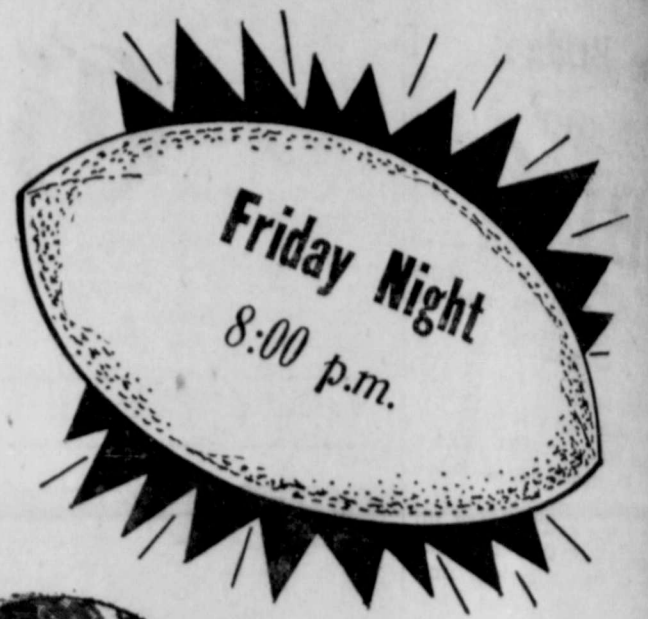

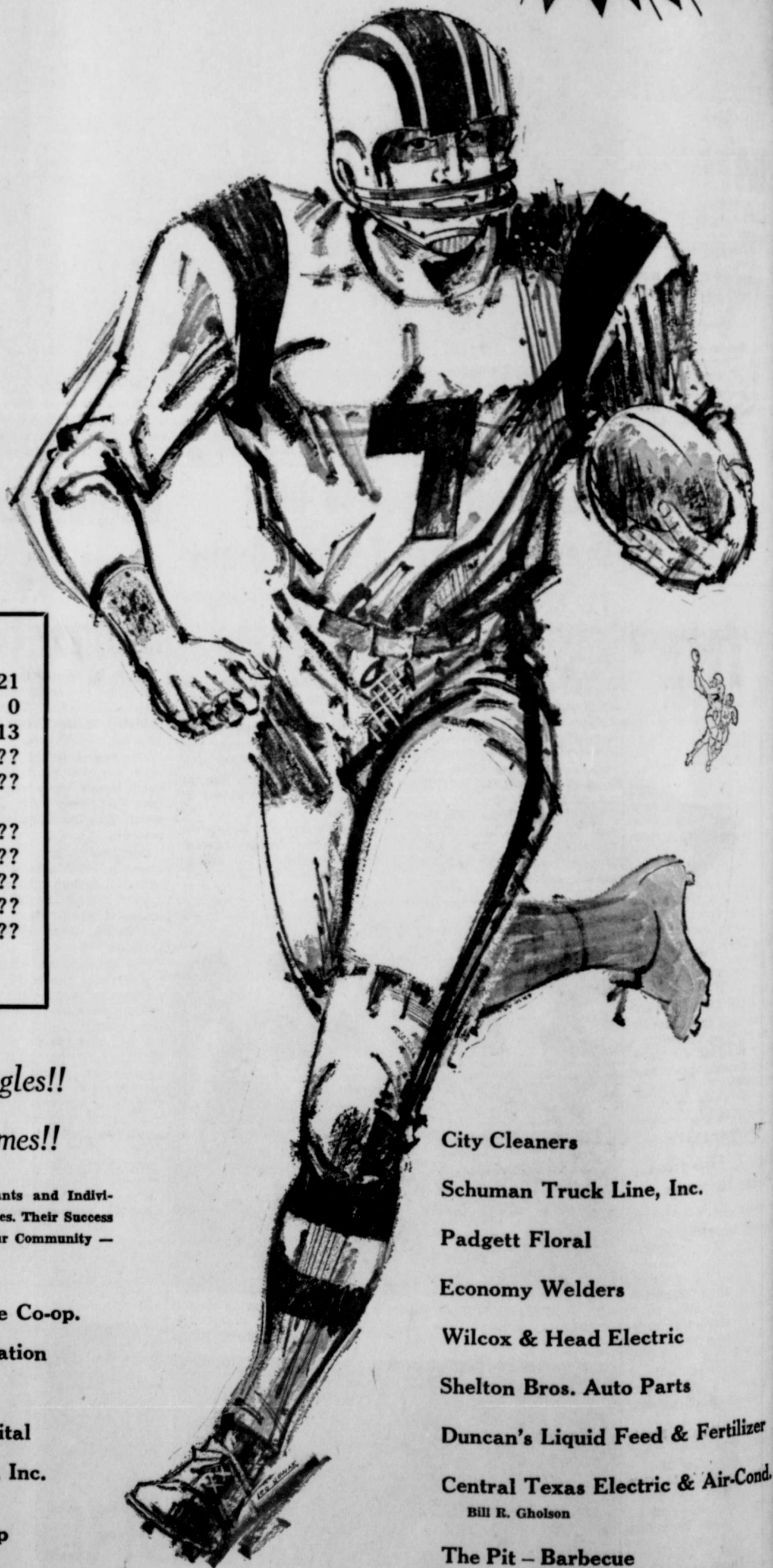

On the alert for armyworms in pastures, coastal, and all grain. Several producers in the county are busy fighting armyworms. These pests can wipe out what grass or grain that we do have in many counties. Armyworms can be effectively controlled by the use of Sevin pesticide. All producers should check their pastures closely for presence of armyworms.

Peanut production in the county looks to be the best in many years. The pecans are opening a month earlier than normal this year which means that harvesting on a full scale will be very soon.

Many landowners and home-owners overlook, many times, the value of pecans on their property. This year the price of pecans looks very good. With pecans loaded as well as they are this year, it doesn't take many acres to increase net worth of a section of land. This is one of the main reasons pecan trees should be regarded as a source of high income.

There are many markets for pecans available in our area. Pecans received for pecans should be the highest possible.

Brucellosis is still very much a problem with many beef producers in the county. This is a very contagious disease which is spread from animal to animal through contaminated

water and feed and through direct contact with infected animals with discharge from their reproductive tract.

Cows which abort for an unknown reason should be tested for Brucellosis. This can be done by a veterinarian or Animal Health Commission Agent.

Brucellosis is also the most common cause of fistula of the withers in horses. Man also becomes infected by handling diseased animals when assisting animals during birth or removing a retained placenta. Swine are also susceptible to the disease. Brucellosis causes much loss in profits in the animal industry.

THE MILLS MINISTER

By E. C. Young, Pastor, Star and Center City United Methodist Churches

In the short time and space allotted to the Mills Ministers, I want to speak in behalf of all who hope and expect to become something more of themselves in the Kingdom of Heaven, than we probably think of ourselves in the here and now. How great are you? Or is it necessary for us to actually be great? It may be that we are sometimes over-estimated, and sometimes under-estimated as to our greatness. In thinking of the great ones I want us to think for a while about the Apostle Peter.

It was Peter who took the initiative at different times under the training of our Lord. He was aggressive, active, forceful. In that critical moment - the crisis of the Christ - when he asked, "Will ye also go away?" It was Peter who said, "To whom shall we go?" It was Peter who declared he would never leave his Lord. It was Peter who preached the first christian sermon and became the chief personage in the early days of the Church.

It was Peter who made the great confession, "Thou art the Christ the Son of the Living God." In reply Christ declared, "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church." This passage has been misinterpreted by those who fail to distinguish between Petros, Peter, a single stone, and Petra, a mass of rock. It is upon the Petra that Christ declared He would build his Church. Based upon this passage largely, there are those who have mistakenly invested Peter with an Apostolic importance which is entirely unwarranted and has no scriptural support. There is nothing in any of the Epistles to intimate that any such pre-eminence attached to Peter. Nowhere in Peter's Epistle do we find anything to authorize or justify this erroneous notion of

primacy conferred upon him, but on the contrary, his Epistles are against such a supposition.

When a discussion arose among the disciples as to which of them should be greatest in the Kingdom, Jesus never settled those disputes by declaring that to Peter had been assigned such distinction, and if such had been assigned him Jesus could never have answered the disciples in the way that He did.

The great Apostle, who served His Divine Master so zealously, for His sake died a martyr's death. According to tradition, he suffered crucifixion with his head downwards as an expression of sorrow and humility for having denied his Lord just before His death. With his brother Apostle, St. Paul, he finished his course, and passed on from earthly to heavenly things to be with his Lord.

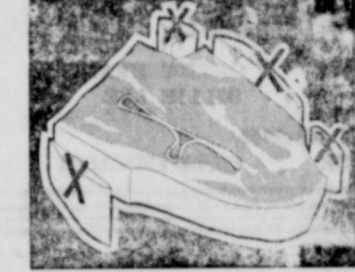

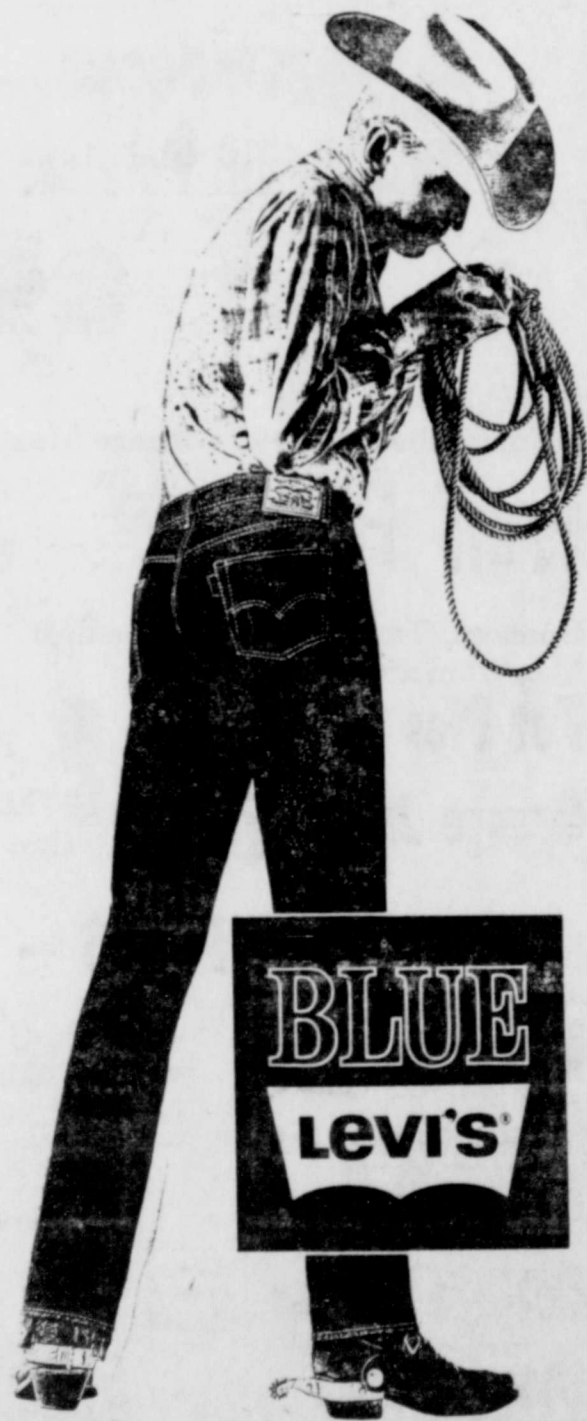
