Seven Die As Airplane Crashes In Mills County

The usually quiet communities of Goldthwaite and San Saba were shocked last Friday afternoon when seven members of a San Saba family were killed instantly when their light plane crashed into the rugged terrain of the Big Bend River Ranch. The mishap took place on the Weatherby ranch southeast of Goldthwaite near the Colorado River. The cause of the crash was believed to be a wing malfunction. Although the weather was a blanket of fog and precipitation creating zero visibility, a section of the wing snapped off the plane prior to the crash.

Fred L. McCall, 34, a San Saba school trustee and son of Mrs. Oscar King of San Angelo; his wife, Margaret, 32; their children, twelve year old Lee Ann, ten year old, Troy, and six year old Melissa. Also, Mrs. C. T. Carpenter and Christi Carpenter, mother and sister of Mrs. McCall.

Services were held for the seven family members Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the San Saba High School Gymnasium.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred McCall and their three children were buried in the City Cemetery in San Saba. Mrs. Carpenter and Christi Carpenter were taken to Winters for burial.

Santos Salazar, foreman of the ranch owned by Joe Weatherby of Brownwood, stated, "I heard the plane for about twenty minutes. It was like a rumbling sound. I guess it was trying to land. All of a sudden I did not hear anything . . . like the engine went out. I looked and saw something fall over the tree," he said.

Salazar's wife, another witness of the crash, said, "We went to look for the plane. It was completely disintegrated. All we found was bodies mangled up, arms and legs separated from the bodies. It was horrible."

Mills County Sheriff Horace Brooks, was one of the first law officers at the scene to identify the passengers, that was aboard the single-engine Piper PA24.

The remains were taken to Wilkins Funeral Home in Goldthwaite and later transferred to Howell-Doran Funeral Home in San Saba.

Fred McCall, pilot of the aircraft, radioed to Abilene before take-off from San Saba for flight clearance and was en route to Lafayette, Louisiana. The dead were identified as,

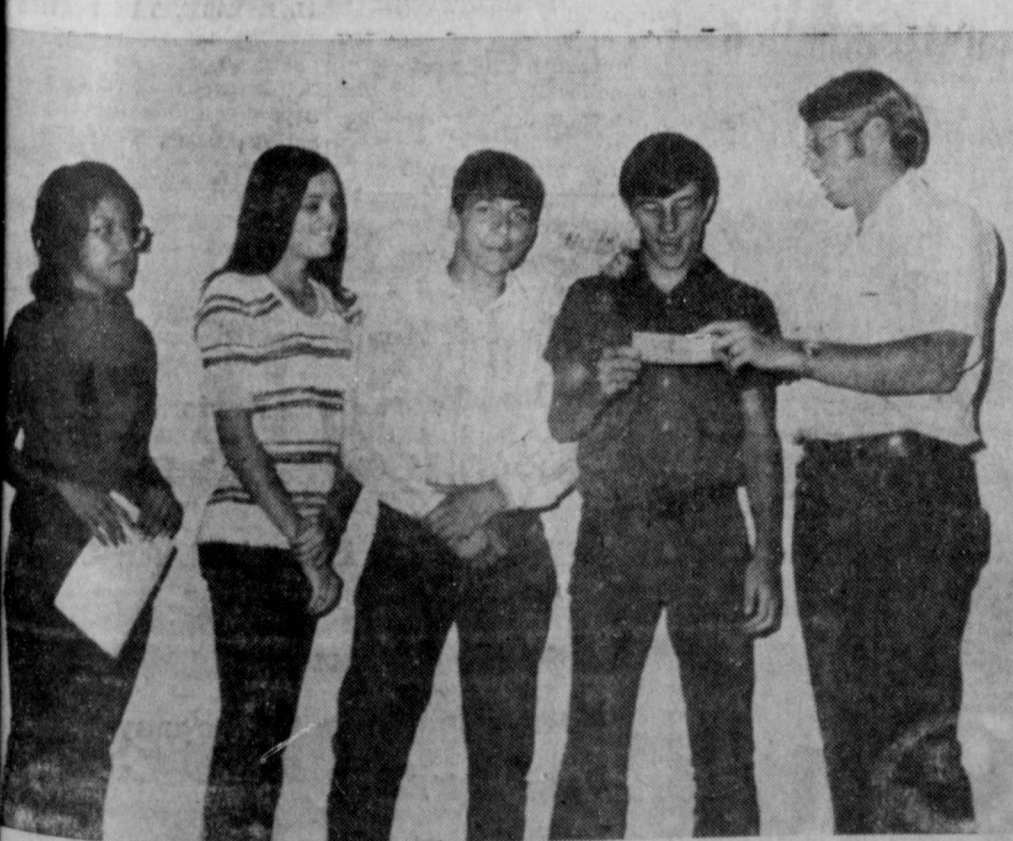

 It's pumpkin time again and the familiar golden orange ones are appearing on the scene. With Halloween just around the corner, they have come to market in full force.
 Pumpkins are famous through legend and fiction—from Thanksgiving pies and Halloween's jack-o-lanterns to Cinderella's coach and Peter Pumpkin Eater's famous place.
 When purchasing a pumpkin, the consumer should choose one that is blemish-free and has a hard rind. Look for one that is heavy for its size.
 Extra large pumpkins may have a stringy, coarse flesh with less flavor than that of small to medium ones.
 Handle pumpkins with care and store in a moderately cool, dry, well ventilated place at about 50 to 60 degrees F. Stored this way, they will keep from two to six months.
 For long periods of storage, select pumpkins that are not bruised or otherwise injured. Even left-over Halloween pumpkins don't have to be wasted. If used within two or three days after cutting, jack-o-lantern pumpkins can be cooked, cooled and frozen into quantities suitable for one meal.
 One pound of pumpkin will yield one cup when cooked. One pint of cooked pumpkin usually makes three to four servings, while one and one-half to two cups of it will make a nine-inch pie.
 Store cooked pumpkin in the refrigerator in a covered container. For best flavor, plan to use it within two or three days.
 To cook this fun squash, first wash and peel it, then cut into pieces. Boil in a small amount of water in a covered container until tender. Either mash the cooked pumpkin or put it thru a sieve or blender, and season, if desired.
 Baking is another way of preparing pumpkin. First cut the pumpkin in half or into quarters and remove the seeds. Place the desired section, cut side down, in a shallow pan and bake at 350 degrees F. until tender.
 A second method of baking involves sealing the pumpkin in foil and baking it in a 350 degree oven.
 Once done, scoop the flesh from the shell, mash or put it thru a sieve or blender. At this point, the cooked pumpkin is ready for use in a favorite recipe.
 Steaming is still another way of preparing the versatile product. To steam, place the pumpkin on a wire rack over boiling water in a covered container. Steam until it is tender.
 For use as a vegetable, cook and mash the pumpkin, then season with butter, salt and pepper.
 On the other hand, pumpkin can be used as a dessert when mashed and used in pies, tarts, cakes, cookies or breads.
 In addition the seeds—when roasted or toasted and salted—an excellent crunchy snack food.
 An often overlooked bonus is pumpkin's supply of vitamin A, a serving of one-half cup will furnish the vitamin A requirement for one day. It also provides small amounts of other vitamins and some minerals.

**Criminal Justice
Projects Need
Funding Support**

Central Texas Council of Governments, Belton, foresees a need for \$1,755,000 in state and federal funding to support criminal justice projects in the 7-county area it serves, says its new regional plan.

The document, "Criminal Justice Action Plan, 1973-1977," has just been received by Governor Preston Smith's Criminal Justice Council. It projects a need for CJC funding during the next year for 47 action projects, all with the regional council as grantee.

Many of the projects it plans are regionwide in scope, designed to serve Mills, San Saba, Bell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Coryell, and Milam counties.

Local funding must supplement the grant in each case by at least 15 per cent of the project cost.

Assigned primary emphasis in the highest-priority list is updating the region's existing law enforcement radio communications. CJC funding need is pegged at \$297,000.

CJC expects to receive a block action grant of \$29,161,000 from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, Department of Justice, for fiscal 1973.

In addition, it will have some three million dollars from the state's criminal justice planning fund, which comes from a court-cost levy in criminal cases imposed by the 62nd Legislature.

These funds must be apportioned among local governments in all the state's 24 planning regions. The amount to be available for the region served by Central Texas COC depends on the urgency and validity of applications.

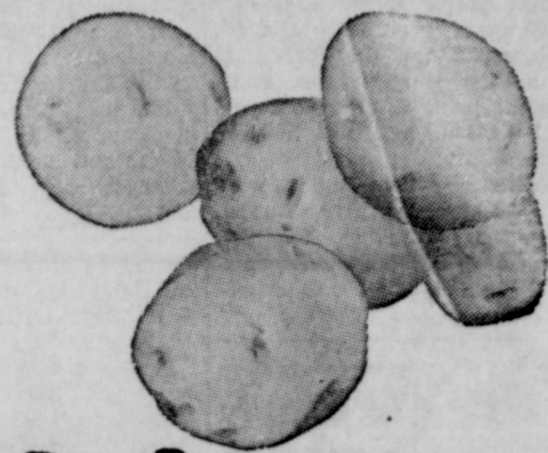
