City Loan Approved

... City of Goldthwaite got a state clean-water loan approved November 28, to help pay an estimated \$275,000 sewer-treatment plant and pipeline. The project is eligible for a 90 percent federal grant. The balance of the project will come from local funds.

... addition to the sewage treatment plant, a line will be built to treat the water from the plant for agricultural irrigation. A report to the Texas Water Development Board said that the project will stop the overflowing of sewage on public right-of-ways. City Council Splits On General Telephone Rate Increase

General Telephone Co. asked for a rate increase to the customers in Goldthwaite at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council Monday night. The Company's request was stalled by a tie vote of the council.

Councilman Lester Geeslin was absent from the meeting, therefore, leaving four councilmen to vote on the proposition. Mayor Ray Duren abstained from voting to break the tie.

Councilmen Hollis Wiggins and Jimmy Smith voted to reject the rate increase on the grounds that the hike was unfair because the bulk of the increase will be shouldered by the business phone customers.

Councilmen Donald Padgett and Ancel Morgan voted for the Telephone Company's rate increase. Jimmy Bennett of Brownwood

gave the council a comparison of rates in other towns and said the company needs a 1.56 per cent increase for its net return on its investment here. That would allow the telephone company a 6.93 per cent return. The Federal Communication Commission authorizes an 8 per cent maximum rate on return.

Bennett told the Council that General Telephone could possibly take the matter of the increase to court and over-ride any unfavorable decision the Council might make.

Second reading of the rate increase document will take place at the next meeting of the Council in January.

Representatives of the Library Board of Goldthwaite were present at the meeting to explain pitfalls in the present Library organiza-

tion and requested the Council to give the authority to try to seek sources for financial assistance to satisfy the needs of the Jennie Trent Dew Library.

No state or federal funds are available because of the Library is financed through an endowment fund.

Representing the Library were Mrs. Roy Wilkins and Mrs. Gerald Head, Mrs. Wendell Tucker and County Judge Cecil Egger.

The City has purchased a tract of land west of Goldthwaite for a sanitary land fill. It will replace the unsightly dump ground being used by area citizens. The san-

itary land fill is the most acceptable method of disposing of garbage and is approved by government pollution and road agencies.

Goldthwaite's sanitary land fill will be a Type III fill. This means it can be no closer than 900 feet to any public road.

The present dump ground will be cleaned off in the near future and will be sold by sealed bids after the sanitary land fill is in operation.

This was the first meeting for the new city manager, Don Petty. He began work Monday.

Careful Consideration Stressed When Toy Shopping

COLLEGE STATION — If St. Nicholas, or Kris Kringle, was as good as legend supposes, his success surely was based on care and common sense.

Today's shoppers could take a hint from him, one authority observed.

Jane Fleischer, specialist in family life education with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University, stressed the need for careful consideration in shopping for Christmas toys.

"Selecting play materials for children requires the same selectivity as any other Christmas item."

"Safety is of utmost importance. Toys should be built so that nothing can be pulled off and swallowed or be broken off, leaving sharp edges."

The specialist advised choosing well-constructed play materials. "For example, toy hammers and mallets should have securely fastened handles, and the wheels on wooden toys should be fastened well, preferably with screws."

For cords and strings, non-conducting material such as cotton should be utilized; however, any string can carry electricity when wet.

Toys having keys should be made so the key won't revolve when the toy is working.

Another consideration is the child's use of the toy, Miss Fleischer continued. The child needs to be able to manage it by himself.

"A toy for any age should give the child a feeling of adequacy and set the appropriate standard for physical and mental development. Most mechanical toys are too intricate for children under four years of age."

Nor should toys be too restrictive.

Instead, they should stimulate imagination and make-believe, encourage quiet play or vigorous body activity, and allow for playing alone and in group activity.

"Pets and toy gardening equipment fit this category," she added.

The toy also need to fit the child's stage of development, the specialist continued. Although toys are usually marked with an age range,

this can vary with the individual child's development.

"Pre-schoolers, for example, need activities to develop large muscles. Thus, their toys should stimulate imaginative play and require use of their hands."

"Young elementary children also need play materials which develop large muscles. In addition, they require activities and

toys that help encourage social development—such as stories. Arts and crafts also can help the child coordinate fine muscles."

Team sports offer group development for older elementary children. Also, through hobbies, painting and musical toys, these youngsters may acquire other skills.

Toys are instrumental in role playing—an important part of the child's development which helps him identify with his parents. Because of this, puppets, dolls, dress-up clothes and housekeeping kits are popular.

"Role playing is especially important for boys—who need to identify with men and their occupations."

Often the son is unaware of just what his father's job is, Miss Fleischer pointed out. Therefore, it's sometimes difficult for him to identify with his father except through role-playing toys, such as fireman, policeman, engineer, pharmacist and doctor.

A reminder to shoppers—keep in mind where a particular toy gift will be used and stored. If the family lives in a small apartment, chances are there is not enough room to set up a big play house or store a hundred-piece farm set, she concluded.

New SS Laws Discussed

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the 1st in a series of articles on the new law that have been prepared by Glen McNatt, social security manager at Brownwood.)

The increase in widow's benefits has attracted much of the earlier publicity, and is not as wide-reaching as earlier reports implied. The widow who does not become entitled to such benefits until age 65 will get 100 percent of the retirement benefit the husband was receiving, or would have been receiving had he been retired. If the widow's benefits start at age 62, she gets 82.9 percent of the husband's rate. If she starts her checks at age 60, she gets 71.5 percent of the husband's rate. Widow's benefits that start at ages between 60 and 65 get rising percentages of the 100 percent amount. First checks showing these changes will be received in February 1973, for January 1973.

The retirement test for beneficiaries has attracted much interest also. The new test starts with taxable years ending after 1972. Earnings of up to \$2100

in a year will cause no deduction from benefits. For every \$2 of earnings past \$2100 in a year, \$1 will be recovered or withheld from monthly benefits. This is a greater liberalization than a casual reading would indicate. Under present law, a person receiving a \$150 per month check and earning over \$140 every month of the year, could get some benefits up to \$4080 in earnings; the new law sends him some checks up until he has earned over \$5700 in the year and has earned over \$175 in each month of the year. If a man gets \$150 and his wife \$75 in benefits, then he can earn up to \$7498 and they will still get at least \$1 from social security. An easy way to tell how much a beneficiary can earn before giving up all of his monthly benefits goes like this: multiply the benefit rate by 12 for an annual total; double it, add \$2100 for the top limit before all social security checks are returnable. Remember, though, that the benefit is still due, no matter how high the annual earnings for any month in which the earnings are \$175 or less.

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Outdoor Advertising Controls To Be Effective December 31

AUSTIN — Owners of advertising signs along Interstate, US and major State-numbered highways have until December 31 to apply for permits required under the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The act controls all outdoor advertising signs from the largest signboard to the smallest sign hanging from a fence along the right of way line.

The Texas Highway Commission established the deadline under the legislation which became effective on June 29. The act requires that no person may erect or maintain a sign within 660 feet of an Interstate or federal-aid primary highway in Texas without a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

In addition to the license, the sign owner must have a permit for each sign he has now or which he plans to erect.

On-premise signs — those advertising activities conducted on the premises and those offering the property for sale — are exempt.

The act will be implemented in stages. The first stage requires the owner of the sign to obtain a State license and post a bond. The license fee is \$25 and the license is valid for an indefinite period.

The license application must be accompanied by a bond in the amount of \$2,500 for each county in which signs are located, or a maximum bond of \$10,000 for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond form applications may be obtained by writing the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas 78763.

After obtaining a license, the owner is required to obtain a separate permit for each existing and new off-premise sign on the affected highways. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the Right of Way Sections of the Highway Department district offices.

For each sign permit required, the owner should submit an application accompanied by a check or money order for \$5 to the Highway Department district office for the county in which the sign is located. If the permit application is for an existing sign, the Highway Department will check to see if the sign conforms with the Beautification Act.

Permits now will be issued for signs in place prior to June 29 even if they do not conform to the law. They will be permitted to stay in place until programmed for acquisition or removal.

Permits for new signs will not

be issued unless they conform to the law.

Anyone planning to put up a new sign on the controlled highways should check with the Highway Department district office in his area before doing anything, to determine if the proposed sign location conforms to the law.

The Highway Department also has begun removal of abandoned and illegal signs on controlled highways. An abandoned sign is one in which the owner no longer cl-

aims any interest. An illegal sign is one which is located on private property without permission of the property owner. Property owners on the affected highways with such illegal signs should contact the Highway Department district office.

If you prefer a real tree there are several considerations involved. Remember that evergreen tree is highly combustible when it is dry. Here are some guidelines on how to select and care for a natural Christmas tree.

1. Run your finger down a branch. The needles should adhere to each twig if the tree is fresh. Also, needles should spring back into place. Freshness is an important consideration for 2 reasons: (1) appearance and (2) safety—fresh trees are less of a fire hazard than dry trees.

2. Shake or bounce the tree on the ground lightly to see that the needles are firmly attached. If only a few drop off, you have another sign of the tree's freshness.

3. Sniff for another sign of freshness—a strong "woody" fragrance.

4. Check the limbs. They should be strong enough to hold ornaments and strings of electric lights. If the tree is very fresh, the trunk butt will be sticky with resin.

5. To get your money's worth, you should do more than be a smart shopper. You should give your tree proper care so that it will be healthy and appear fresh during the holiday season.

Here are guidelines for Christmas tree care:

1. If you buy your tree several days before it is to be set up and

decorated, store it outside. Make a diagonal cut across the trunk butt to open the pores. Place the trunk butt in a container of water so the tree can absorb water through the open pores.

2. When you are ready to bring the tree into the house, saw the trunk butt again to square off the diagonal so that you can easily place the tree in a stand.

3. Use a stand that holds water. Keep the tree trunk butt in the stand of the entire time it is in the house. Refill the stand daily. Sprinkle water on the needles and branches before you decorate to give the tree a little bit more help in staying fresh.

4. Be sure the base of the tree is well supported and be sure the tree is radiated away from fireplaces, radiators, electric heaters, televisions or any other source of heat.

5. Never leave your house or apartment with the Christmas tree lights still on. Never use lighted candles—or any other form of flame on or near your tree.

6. Check electric light cords for fraying and worn spots that could cause fires.

Remember: The longer the tree is indoors, the drier it gets—even with daily watering and the more likely it is to catch on fire.

OUR ENVIRONMENT — A Modern Day Crusade

A joint effort between the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service to prevent pollution has been in existence since the early 1950's in the two Central Texas counties.

These conservationists have three objectives:

1. To improve the quality in the natural resources for continued use.

2. To improve the quality of the environment in order to provide an attractive, convenient and satisfying place to live, work and play.

3. To improve the quality of the standard of living based upon community improvement.

It has been said that "it is not wise to fool Mother Nature." SWCD with assistance of SCS Conservationists are doing all within their power to cooperate with Nature. This cooperation comes in the form of encouraging and assisting land users to plan and apply conservation measures that will protect our natural resources for the present as well as for future use.

Most land users in the Brown-Mills SWCD are proving that they realize their responsibility for conserving our natural resources by applying good conservation measures.

Due to the price-cost squeeze encountered by many small land users, the infirmities of age, and the present labor situation, approximately 20,000 acres of improved pasture grasses have been established (in Mills County) during the past three years. Most of this acreage was old cropland fields. These old fields were planted to small grain forage and grain sorghums for many years.

A good small grain crop has been realized only about one out of four years. After converting this old cropland to improved pasture grasses and investing the money he formerly put into seedbed preparation, into fertilizer, he has stabilized his operations. With improved grasses, there are less hazards from climatic conditions, pests and labor shortages.

An important benefit from this change in land-use has been the reduction of soil erosion. Fields that were once bare a part of the year, now have a grass cover year around providing protection for the soil. This reduces erosion, causing soil to stay in place rather than going down the Colorado or Brazos River and depositing this good Mills County Soil on our neighbors to the south and southeast.

Assistance by SCS to land users that have feedlot operations is another activity to improve quality of the environment. This assistance is normally in the form of a pollution abatement plan developed by the feedlot operator with assistance of SCS and approved by the Texas Water Quality Board. Basin terraces and holding ponds are just two of the measures de-

signed to hold pollution out of our streams and rivers.

Another conservation measure which is being taken to protect and improve our environment are the Upstream Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Projects. These flood control dams which have been and are being constructed, are playing a big part in keeping the natural resources, such as soil and water, in this area. They hold up flooding waters allowing the sediments (mud) to settle out, and release this flooding water at a controlled rate. This water that is released is purer for downstream users.

To help meet the goals of the Brown-Mills SWCD's second objective which is to provide a pleasant environment in which to live, work and play, the local SCS conservationists have provided assistance to land users in design, layout, stocking and managing farm ponds. These ponds are constructed in such a manner as to leave the site as close to its natural setting as possible, providing a pleasant and relaxing atmosphere for the fisherman.

Along this same line the SCS conservationists are providing help to local land users in controlling brush in patterns beneficial to wildlife. In other words a plan is made on a certain land users pasture whereby strips or blocks of heavy brush are cleared leaving a cover of grass. The clearing of heavy brush and trees allows the grass to produce well providing needed grazing for livestock as well as wildlife. On the other hand, the strips or mts of brush and trees which are left provide a place for protection and nesting for wildlife. With this kind of plan, the pasture is able to accommodate more livestock, but will also accommodate more deer, turkey and quail which is pleasing to the hunter. Also the strips of cleared areas allow the hunter to spot his game from a farther distance. Even in the cleared areas, the larger trees of liveoak, elm and pecan are usually left by most land users for beauty and shade.

At this season of the year with the creeks running clear, the elms, sumac and hackberry trees are turning red, the native grasses blowing in the breeze, and the dew that give a glistening look provide a beauty to the countryside in the small rural community that is refreshing and would lift the spirit of any soul.

As a result of applied conservation the land user has become more prosperous, buying needed materials with which to build improvements on his land, buying more luxuries of life. Generally the more prosperous a community the higher the standard of living which benefits each one who lives in that community.

Join in the crusade, support your local Soil and Water Conservation District and Directors in their fight to develop a better place to live, work and play.

Also eligible for educational benefits are wives and children of servicemen missing in action (MIA) or prisoners of war (POW) for more than 90 days. VA guaranteed home loans are available to wives of POW's and MIA's also and to unmarried widows of veterans and servicemen's deaths were service-connected.

Widows and minor children may receive two types of monthly payments also, Coker pointed out. Dependency and indemnity (DIC) is paid if the veteran's death was service connected. Pension is paid if death was non-service-connected. In certain cases parents may be eligible for DIC checks.

Still another benefit, monthly aid and attendance payments of \$55, is paid to eligible wives, widows and parents who are patients in nursing homes, helpless or blind, or so nearly helpless or blind as to require regular assistance of another person.

Wives and children, or whoever is designated as beneficiary, are entitled to the veteran's or serviceman's life insurance proceeds upon his death.

Most VA benefits for dependents and survivors of veterans and servicemen are based on at least 90 days of military service. For Post Korean and Vietnam Era veterans and servicemen the service requirement for GI home loans and educational benefits is at least 181 days.

Full details on these and other benefits for dependents and survivors of veterans and servicemen are available from any VA office, local veterans service organization representative, or veterans county service officer.

The winter months can be very hard on cattle in many ways. Many factors can affect the health of an animal during winter, but two external parasites that can cause much trouble are ticks and lice.

These two external parasites should be controlled because of the weak and unthrifty condition that results from these parasites. Cattle that harbor lice and ticks usually do not respond to feed properly and are more subject to diseases because of their weakened condition. Anemia may result from blood losses to the pests. Young animals may be stunted and, until infestations diminish in late spring or summer, may fail to respond fully to increased spring grazing and more milk production from cows.

Many insecticides are available for these parasites. Some are Lindane, Malathion, Toxaphene, Merhoxchlor, Korlan and others.

The Mills County Livestock Show is just around the corner. All 4-Hers, FFA and FHA members entering the show should pick up entry blanks and premium list from their Ag Teacher or county agent. Entry deadline is December 15.

Small grains are up and making good growth in Mills County as soil moisture has been good. However, for maximum production certain management practices should be followed.

First of all, it's a must to withhold grazing until plants are completely established and well rooted. Grazing pastures before plants are 6-8 inches high can reduce total forage production by as much as 50 percent.

Since small grains do not grow much during cold weather prevalent during December, January and February, care must be used in grazing. Stocking rates should be adjusted to the amount of accumulated growth of small grain pastures.

Small grains should be grazed with livestock of high market value such as stocker calves and dairy animals. Cow-calf operations can also benefit from their use to meet protein and energy requirements of the animals. These requirements can be met by grazing for limited periods each day or by grazing every third or fourth day.

A few other guidelines for increasing benefits from small pastures are as follows:

1. Remove livestock during periods of wet weather.
 2. Keep a supply of dry roughage available.
 3. Don't overgraze during dry or cold periods as stem terminakns may be destroyed.
 4. Remove cattle around March 1 on acreage where grain is to be harvested.
- If grain is to be harvested next spring, additional nitrogen is usually needed as a topdress application. Such applications should be made in late January or February.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Most homeowners are expected to get a big break on insurance rates next year. Exceptions will be those who live in the 27-county Gulf Coast area.

The industry-oriented Texas Insurance Advisory Association recommended the State Board of Insurance reduce by 17.7 per cent extended coverage (hail, windstorm, vandalism, etc.) rates and by 16.2 percent homeowners' rates in the North-Northwest area. That includes most of the Panhandle and South Plains.

Association recommendations for the big Central Inland territory (Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, El Paso, Austin areas) included a 12.1 per cent decrease in extended coverage and 10.9 per cent reduction in homeowners' premiums.

The Seacoast territory (Beaumont-Port Arthur, Houston, Galveston, Brownsville and Corpus Christi areas) would get a 17.5 per cent hike in extended coverage premiums and an 8.3 per cent increase in homeowners' policy rates.

All territories would benefit from an Association proposal to reduce fire insurance rates statewide by 7.7 per cent.

An Association spokesman estimated total savings of \$6 million for extended coverage and \$9.8 million for homeowners' insurance in the Central Inland territory. He calculated increases of \$8 million for extended coverage and \$5.9 million for homeowners' rates in the Seacoast territory.

About 500 insurance agents who attended the Board hearing on the proposals expressed approval but loudly protested another recommendation by the Association to standardize their commissions.

The Board staff is awaiting directions as to whether to calculate new rates on its own formula or the new recommendations.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court agreed a re-trial is in order for a lawsuit against Union Carbide Company as a result of an explosion which killed two and injured two.

The Court of Criminal Appeals held a San Antonio man cannot complain about exclusion of blacks from his murder trial jury since he agreed to the exclusion himself.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals held property owners in Wylie County School District should have the right to join the Abilene School District.

The Supreme Court threw out a district court injunction preventing a State Bar grievance com-

mittee investigation of complaints against a former Hill County district attorney.

A Houston Court of Civil Appeals decision that heirs of a man who died in a Waller County hospital after an auto accident should get a full trial of a malpractice suit against a doctor who treated the wreck victim was upheld by the State Supreme Court.

AG OPINIONS — Deputy constables are authorized to carry guns only after they have completed a minimum amount of training, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

Martin's opinion, requested by Brazos County Attorney W. T. McDonald Jr., also stated that reserve deputy constables serve without pay at pleasure of the constable within the period of time authorized by the county commissioner's court.

Martin reached these conclusions in other new opinions: Harris County can operate a mental health center for the state but cannot change it into a county department by commissioners court resolution.

Parks and Wildlife Department can spend other money for park expansion than that set out in Item 10B of the appropriations bill.

A Beauty operator may offer cosmetology services in a barber shop and may operate a barber shop under general supervision of a Class A barber, but a barber may not operate a beauty shop without a cosmetology license.

A district attorney who applies for retirement on a certain date fixes the date his office is vacated.

GAS PROBLEMS TOLD — Natural gas supplies are dwindling and producers are not meeting agreements, the Railroad Commission was told in a hearing last week.

The Commission is studying the possibility of setting priorities for gas distribution when there is short supply.

One pipeline company claimed a chief supplier delivered little more than half the gas it agreed to provide. A company spokesman suggested homes and schools get first priority on the gas supply available, with second priority allocated to generation of electricity for domestic consumers.

HORSE RACING — A Senate committee is conducting a survey, results of which admittedly may be used to bolster a new drive for pari-mutuel horse race betting.

The Senate Horse Racing Committee sent out 5,000 questionnaires to assess the horse industry and its economic impact on Texas.

Among questions asked of the horse owners and riding equipment suppliers is whether pari-mutuel wagering would expand their operations and how local lawmakers would vote on the issue.

The Committee vice-chairman said results of the survey "could be used to build an economic case" for wagering on horse races. A meeting of the panel is slated here December 14 to hear opponents of racing and pari-mutuel gambling and to receive a report on potential state revenue from legalized wagering. Committee heads said a constitutional amendment would be necessary to revive pari-mutuel betting on the races.

HOW TO PICK UP \$5 MILLION — Texas could gain \$5 million a year

in delinquent sales taxes by changing collection procedures in the comptroller's office, a Senate interim study committee has been told.

Actually, an Illinois tax expert estimated, the state could collect \$8 million more each year, but hiring of an additional 200 state sales tax auditors would take about \$3 million of the gain.

An attorney general's representative said Attorney General Martin wants to require Texas businesses to post bond to insure payment of the sales taxes they collect.

POLLUTION MONEY MAY BE LOST — Texas may get only half the federal funds it counted on to help build new sewage treatment plants, State Water Quality Board Chairman Gordon Fulcher stated.

A new federal act, said Fulcher, would cut Texas' allocation to \$55.4 million for fiscal 1973 for treatment plant aid, as compared with \$106.3 million for fiscal 1972.

Fulcher said the loss would "hurt a whole lot of cities and towns in the state," particularly smaller communities which depended on federal help (up to 75 per cent) to finance the plants.

SHORT SNORTS

Atty. Gen.-elect John Hill has pledged to head up a "strike force" of lawyers to fight organized crime in Texas.

The State Bar came up with a plan for prepaid legal services.

A seven-months' survey has been initiated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to detect citrus blackfly infestations in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Parks and Wildlife Department has ordered an exhaustive study of Mustang Island in preparation for developing the site as a new state park.

A consumer protection study committee of the state Senate heard a plea for new laws to protect tenants from unscrupulous landlords who refuse to refund security deposits or make needed repairs.

Morris Webb of Waco has been named to the state advisory council for technical-vocational education.

Gov. Preston Smith plans to make about 50 appointments to offices before his term expires.

An El Paso representative-elect will introduce a bill to protect the confidential nature of newsmen's sources.

Attorney General Martin underwent cataract surgery at John Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Md., last week.

18 Year Old Must Register Military Service

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Colonel N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, again reminded young men of their obligation to register with the Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday.

Glantz stressed that the requirement to register will be in full effect whether the military military force becomes reality or not. Every native and resident-alien young man required to present himself for registration from 30 days before to 30 days after his 18th birthday, for any reason, a young man has failed to register he shall do so immediately to escape penalty of Federal Law.

Failure to register may result in a fine, imprisonment, or under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

Young men may register at the office of the local board, at home or place of residence, or may be registered by volunteer registrars who are located in high schools or other similar convenient locations. Registration in the Mills County area is Ira Egger, Registrar, at the County Courthouse, Goldthwaite, Texas.

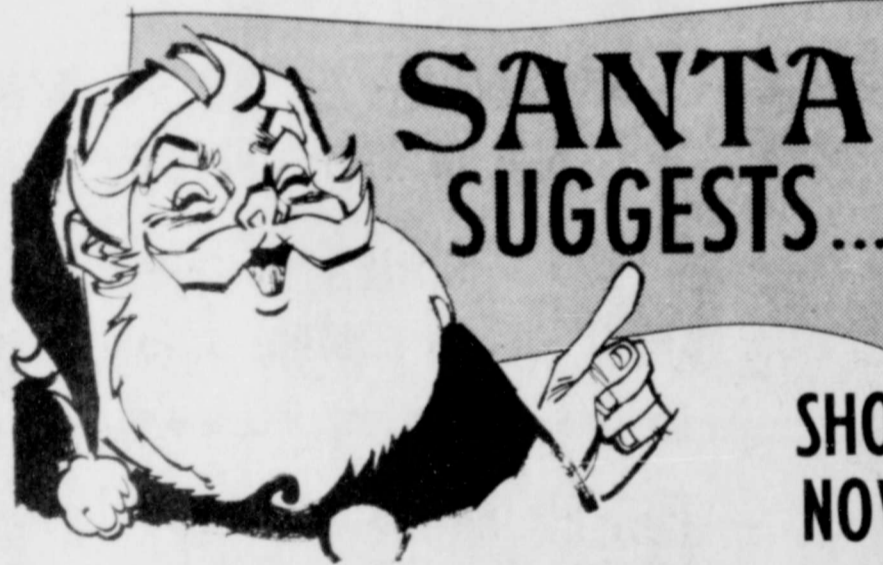
