City Sales Tax Begins Jan. 1

Beginning January 1, 1973, the one per cent city sales and use tax will become effective. All items that are state taxable will also be city taxable. Goldthwaite Merchants will receive a combined state and city quarterly report that they will complete and return to the Comptroller of Public Accounts in Austin. The Comptroller will return the 1 per cent City Sales Tax money to the City. The 1 per cent City Sales Tax proposition was passed by local voters in an election held in July of this year.

athletic director succeeding the late Milton Jowers. Miller will also continue to serve as head football coach. Miller, 41, becomes only the third AD in SWT's history. In eight years as Bobcat football coach, Miller has posted a record of 53-25-3 (.654), the second best among active Lone Star Conference coaches. He has won more football games at SWT than any coach other than Oscar Strahan, a past director of the athletic program. Miller's 1971 team won a LSC Co-Championship, and his Bobcat teams have been second four times. Miller said Thursday, "I will do my best to run the type of program

that Coach Jowers had. We will continue to be competitive in the five Lone Star Conference sports in which we compete (football, basketball, track, tennis and golf). A strong overall program will continue to be our goal. Miller concluded, "I won't make any changes, we have a program to be proud of and we hope to make all our actions a credit to the university." A native of Goldthwaite, Miller graduated from SWTSU in 1957 after lettering two years as a fullback. He coached at Alice Sundeen and Corpus Christi Carroll and returned to his alma mater in 1961 to serve as backfield coach under Jowers. Miller received a masters from SWT in 1959.

'73 Vehicle Registration Begins Soon

AUSTIN — Do you hate waiting in long lines? Do you shudder to think of the upcoming license plate renewal season? Does the thought of nearly eight million vehicles being registered in Texas this year scare you? Well, you can cheer up. The Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department will be mailing out renewal applications for 1973 license plates shortly after Christmas. Vehicle owners who wish to avoid the long lines can simply return the entire application by mail to the tax assessor-collector in their home counties with the registration fee and \$1 per vehicle for handling and mailing. There are three things to remember: 1. Leave the handy three-part form intact. Don't separate the three parts. 2. Mail it to the county tax office in your home county. (Mailing to the Highway Department will only delay your getting your 1973 plates.) 3. Be sure to include your registration fee plus an additional \$1 for each automobile to be registered by mail. You may apply for your license plates by mail after January 1. However, county tax offices won't be sending the license plates until after February 1. You should allow at least 30 days from the time you apply for the license plates to be returned. The 1973 plates must be displayed on your vehicle by April 1. In-person registration will begin at county tax offices and, in some counties, special substations on February 1. Even though the automated registration application has speeded up the registration process, the waiting lines will grow progressively longer by the March 31 cutoff date.

Tire Inspection New Requirement For Motor Vehicles

WACO — Captain E. C. Smith Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced that effective January 1, 1973, the inspection of tires will become a requirement as part of the required annual inspection of motor vehicles in Texas.

Tires with tread depth of less than one sixteenth of an inch or which have visible damage such as fabric breaks, lumps, bulges, or knots indicating sidewall or tread separation will not pass inspection. Tires temporarily repaired by use of blowout patches or boots may also be rejected. Tires which are marked "Not for Highway Use", "Farm Use Only", "For Racing Purposes Only" or any other marking that would indicate the tire is not meant for normal highway use will also fail inspection.

Other items to be inspected along with the new requirements on tires include brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts, steering wheels and rims, exhaust system and emission control systems. Captain Smith urged vehicle

owners to save time, expense, and possibly a traffic accident by insuring that tires and all vehicle equipment are in good condition at all times.

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Bond Sales In County Total \$1,920 For Nov.

Sales of Series E and H United States Bonds for the eleven-month period totaled \$45,463 in Mills County. Of this amount, \$1,920 were purchased during the month of November, according to W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee.

During November, Texans purchased \$17,169,531 in Savings Bonds. The year-to-date sales amounted to \$194,211,487 for 98 per cent of the state's goal of \$197.5 million.

National sales during the month totaled \$545 million, a 19.2 per cent increase over 1971 sales of \$457 million. January-November sales were \$5.7 billion for 109 per cent of the national sales goal of \$5.3 billion. Exchanges of Series E and Savings Notes for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$308 million were reported for the first eleven months of 1972, 33 per cent above the \$231 million exchanged in 1971.

Texas Board On Insurance Uniform Rates-Coverages

The Texas State Board of Insurance is charged by law with the promulgation of uniform rates and uniform coverages in the major property casualty lines of insurance. The three member board has direct supervision over the rate-making functions.

The rates for fire, windstorm, hurricane and hail insurance on every insured home, commercial and public building in the State of Texas are set by the Board. It also determines liability, fire, theft, and collision rates on every insured automobile and truck in the State as well as setting workmen's compensation and liability rates for virtually every Texas employer. Every twelve months the Insurance Board reexamines these rates measuring each for reasonableness, fairness, and adequacy.

The rates must be adequate to enable the companies to operate and make a reasonable profit. On the other hand, insurance rates must not be so high as to be unfair to the policyholders.

If an insured purchases fire and windstorm insurance on his home or its furnishings, the form or language of the policy and the rules under which the form must be written will be prescribed by the Insurance Board. If an insured elects to buy workman's compensation insurance on his employees, the rates per \$100 of payroll will be published by the State Board of Insurance, as will be the rules and the form of the policy. If an insured buys a title insurance policy on his home or property, the form as well as the rate must be uniform and prescribed by the Board. Automobile insurance companies must charge the rates prescribed by the Board, but they may reduce the premium by payment of a dividend. This dividend allowance also applies to insurance companies which write fire and windstorm insurance on your home.

Finally, in addition to its rate-making authority, the State Board of Insurance determines policy rules and methods of appeals from decisions of the Commissioner of Insurance. It also licenses insurance agents, and supervises the administration and enforcement of the Insurance Code.

In the area of insurance, the State Board of Insurance is an agency which is charged with protection of the Texas consumer.



Leave Love

And even in the most properly executed, legally correct will, people are constantly finding fresh ways to express plain and simple affection.

A few months ago the following will, only 18 words long, was admitted to probate in a New York courtroom:

"Dearest George, All I have is what you gave me. So everything I have is yours. Lovingly, Helen."

Screwworm Reports Needed For Winter Eradication

Complete reporting of all suspected screwworm cases is most important in the Southwest right now and throughout this winter to assure the eradication of the livestock pest in the overwintering areas along the U.S.-Mexican border and to help prevent a build-up in the spring, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reports.

"Earlier this year we simply did not have enough sterile flies to overcome the massive invasion of screwworms from Mexico and counteract the ideal weather conditions," said Dr. M. E. "Cotton" Meadows, veterinarian-in-charge for USDA's Animal and Plant Inspection Service screwworm eradication office at Mission, Texas.

"But now that screwworm incidence is down, we must make the best possible use of our sterile flies, dropping them wherever screwworm populations remain—and worm samples from ranchers are our only solid source of information," he added.

Meadows urged livestock owners in southern Texas, Arizona and California to watch for screwworms and send in samples of larvae found in wounds—even though cold weather and sterile screwworm fly releases have sharply reduced the number of infestations.

Officials are concerned that inadequate reporting from farmers and ranchers could mean that sterile flies would not be released where they are needed most.

All sterile flies available are needed in infested areas, such as

northern Mexico, where large buildups occur and spread northward in the spring.

Records of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program show that laboratory-confirmed screwworm cases dropped from over 3,000 cases per week in October to less than 200 reported for the week ending Dec. 15.

The sterile screwworm production plant at Mission, Texas, has maintained maximum production at about 200 million flies per week, and is now dropping them in regular patterns over areas where screwworms can survive the winter. In addition "hot-spotting" has been resumed around all confirmed cases in the overwintering area.

Officials are concerned that all screwworms in the United States be eradicated before extending their efforts south of the border. They are however dropping flies deeper in Mexico, when temperatures in southern Texas, Arizona or California drop below 55 degrees Fahrenheit because flies become almost completely inactive below that temperature, and thus sterile flies would be wasted.

APHIS officials have also expanded the screwworm barrier zone in southern Texas to assure stronger USDA support of the screwworm eradication program in an additional 67 counties not previously included.

The counties concerned lie south of a line from Loving Co. on the west to Brown County on the east and then southeast to Brazoria County on the Gulf of Mexico.

(Note: USDA funds are used to defray the costs of the screwworm eradication program in the barrier zone. Costs of the program in counties north of the barrier zone are shared on a 50-50 basis between USDA and the Texas Animal Health Commission.)

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights
by Bill Boykin
TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, TEXAS - Governor-elect Dolph Briscoe is moving to assemble his new gubernatorial staff and organize his initial recommendations to the legislature.

Three top aides to Briscoe were announced recently. They are administrative assistants George Lowrance of San Antonio and Ken Clapp of Killeen and legislative liaison man Roy Coffee Jr. of Dallas.

Briscoe also is working on his "position papers" with aid of advisors.

High on the list of recommendations to the legislature after Briscoe takes office Jan. 16 will be these:

Programs to curb crime, aid constitutional revision, control drug abuse, promote water conservation, set up a mass transit system and improve and expand vocational education.

Briscoe indicated earlier his "new team" would be selected by mid-December.

While the incoming governor made no early promises to keep any staff members of Gov. Preston Smith on the job, indications are that he will retain the bulk of clerical and secretarial employees and technical personnel who want to stay.

Coffee announced Briscoe will begin early meeting with legislators.

Lowrance has been Briscoe's man-in-residence at the governor's office, gathering information for the next governor on staff organization and functions.

John Brunson, Houston attorney who has been close to Briscoe, has figured in speculation on who will be the next Texas Secretary of State.

NEW LICENSE PLATE TIME
Renewal applications for 1973 auto license plates will be in the mail soon from the Texas Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division.

The entire application may be returned by mail to the tax assessor-collector in counties of registration with an added \$1 fee for handling and mailing.

Highway Department representatives caution:

+ Leave the three-part form intact.... Don't separate the three cards.

+ Mail it to the resident county office.

+ Include money for the amount of the registration fee, plus the mail-handling fee.

Applications may be put in the mail any time after January 1, but no license plates will be sent out before February 1. About 30 days should be allowed for return of the plates after the application is received.

April 1 is deadline for displaying the 1973 plates. In-person registration starts at county tax offices and special substations February 1.

COURTS SPEAK - Third Court of Civil Appeals here held 500 Texas reform school inmates who had no attorneys when they were committed must be released.

The same Court also handed down these recent decisions:

+ City of Austin could not validly sell park land to the Austin school district without voter approval.

+ A district court ruling banning a cookware promotion in which Florida dealer Glenn Turner was involved should be upheld.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed and remanded for reconsideration a San Antonio court revocation of probation for a woman who had been convicted for possession of heroin.

APPOINTMENTS - Mrs. Anne Armstrong of Armstrong, co-chairman of the Republican National Committee, has been selected as a counsellor to President Nixon with cabinet rank.

Governor Smith named F. Ray McCormick of El Paso to the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, succeeding Jack Balagia of Austin.

Smith's selection for a new appointee to the State Board of Pharmacy was Eugene E. Wilson of Dallas, who replaces the late Robert C. Keppler of Dallas.

Joe Bill Watkins of Houston will be new Atty. Gen. John Hill's administrative assistant, Philip Kent Maxwell of Corpus Christi assistant chief of Hill's environmental protection division.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock announced he will open an Austin law office and will work in the real estate and investment business with Ken S. Windler of Austin, a construction company head and Travis County Democratic chairman.

BILLBOARD DEADLINE - License and permit deadline for signboards along interstate and primary highways has been extended by the Texas Highway Commission from December 31 to June 30, 1973.

The extension was granted on request of advertising industry and individual sign owners because the previous time was insufficient to comply with the Highway Beautification Act.

The law requires a permit for each sign, and those putting up signs within 660 feet of the major highways must get a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

No further extension of the deadline is contemplated, the Highway Department said. The license fee is \$25. Sign owners must post \$2,500 bond in each county where they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

COMMITTEE DISAGREES - A House of Representatives committee disagreed on specific recommendations for a new method of financing public school education in the wake of court decisions.

The interim School Finance Committee adopted a proposal urging support of a new panel to study findings of 10 separate groups studying the same problem and offer suggestions to a special legislative session.

A federal court a year ago held the present system of financing public school education is unconstitutional because it creates inequality of opportunity among rich and poor districts.

Are you thinking about using fertilizer and limestone for your crops? If so, soil tests can be a valuable source of information and a profitable investment. A soil test indicates the level of available soil nutrients. Common tests are for PH, calcium and magnesium, and levels of nitrogen, phosphorus and pot-

assium. Levels of micronutrients such as zinc, iron and manganese can be obtained upon request. "Two important requirements are needed for getting valid information from soil tests." "The first is reliable laboratory procedures which indicate the availability of nutrients correlated

with field date. The second requirement for reliable soil test results is a good sample. Samples should be carefully collected and be representative of the field on which information is desired." Two aspects of sampling need emphasis. First, divide the field into uniform sampling units. The unit should be uniform with respect to color and texture as well as past cropping, fertilization and liming. The second important factor is the number of cores or slices of soil included. A good sample should have soil from 10 to 15 spots in each designated sampling unit. Each slice of core from the plow layer should be put in a clean plastic bucket and thoroughly mixed. About a pint should be sent to the laboratory. Information on profitable fertilization and liming practices

can be obtained from soil tests, provided laboratory procedures are calibrated for Texas soils and samples are carefully collected. Additional details on soil testing is available at my office.

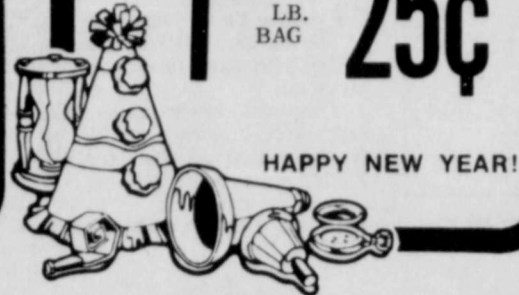
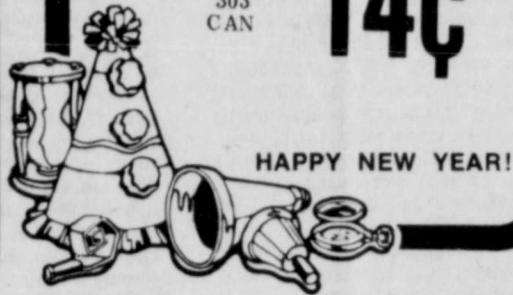

Disability Insurance Changes Made

(Editor's Note: This is the 3rd in a series of articles on the new law that have been prepared by Glen McNatt, manager of the Brownwood Social Security Office.)

Several changes were made in the disability insurance part of social security. One reduces the "waiting period" from six months to five, letting benefits start with the sixth full month of disability instead of the seventh such month as in 1972 and earlier years. Blind persons will not be insured for disability benefits if they are fully insured whether or not they meet the usual recency of employment provisions.

Childhood disability benefits will now be payable if a son or daughter becomes totally disabled be-

fore age 22 rather than before age 18 as in past law. Also, if the disability ends, benefits can be reinstated if the son or daughter again becomes disabled within seven years of the recovery.

A change is made in the manner in which receipt of workmen's compensation benefits affect social security's disability benefits, and this will often enable social security payments to be increased.

If a disabled person dies before getting a disability application filed, his widow may now do so on his behalf if she takes such action within 3 months after her husband's death. Any back payments due him could be paid to her.

The alert shopper can pick up some real bargains in clothing and basic items at end-of-year sales. But she must pay attention to what she buys—before she buys. There's a reason why every item is on sale.

"Before purchasing one, consider its style, condition, color, size, quality and your personal need."

First check the style. Consider whether it's on the way out and how it will look next winter. Knowing fashion trends will help the shopper pass by fads, although an item may be of value if it can give a great deal of wear immediately.

Examine the garment carefully to determine if it's shopworn, soiled, damaged or poorly constructed.

If stained, check stains carefully—certain ones can't be removed. Also consider the risk if the stain doesn't come out.

can you afford to discard the item?

On the other hand, certain things can be corrected and still be an excellent buy—such as doing simple repairs, restitching a ripped seam and replacing a zipper or button.

If the item is an irregular second, its flaws may or may not show or affect wear. Examine the garment carefully before purchase.

Color is another reason why an item is on sale. Some colors or styles are not becoming to a majority of people, so they're left at the season's end. If it's becoming to you, it may be a bargain.

Usually, very small and large sizes most often remain on the rack. If one of these less common sizes is yours, you usually can find some real bargains.

Some items are purchased by the store especially for a sale. These special purchase items may or may not be as good as the store's regular line. A regular shopper there should be able to identify such merchandise. If it meets a need, it may well be a bargain.

"If you need the garment, if it goes with other items in your wardrobe, if it fits well and is becoming—then buy it."

Hormones and IQ . . . Recent research suggests a relationship between an excess of androgen, a male hormone, before birth and unusually high IQ's in later life. Dr. John Money, a Johns Hopkins University researcher, found that in a group of 53 females and 17 males who had experienced abnormally high levels of the hormone in their bodies before birth, IQ's over 110 were measured in 60 percent of them, compared to the national average of 25 percent; and nearly 13 percent of them scored over 130, compared to the 2.2 percent normally expected. The higher IQ's were found even though all the subjects had had their normal hormonal balance restored with cortisone therapy.

More extensive studies should now be carried out. Dr. Money says. For example, if it is shown that androgen in some way directly influences intelligence, the hormone might be used to prevent suspected mental deficiencies in the unborn.

Weather can hurt your heart . . . Sudden changes in temperature, and temperature extremes generally, increase the incidence of myocardial infarctions, a common form of heart attack. Studies show sharply increased incidence on the coldest days of the winter months and the warmest days of summer. In New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Chicago and Detroit, more attacks occur in

the winter. Peak incidence in Southern cities—New Orleans and Dallas—are in the summer. The practical consequences of the findings are not yet entirely clear, but some heart specialists suggest that extreme changes in climate may well be inad-

visable for cardiac patients the elderly.

Smoker's wrinkles . . . More news for cigarette smokers, men and women with long histories of smoking have faces that more severely wrinkled than those of nonsmokers, according to a recent study. Dr. Harry W. Dainoff, an internist in Redding, California, photographed and measured the "crow's feet" of 1,104

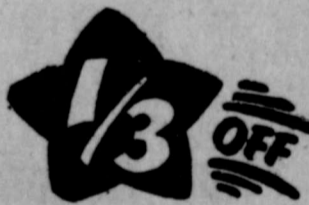

Small Grain Figures Released . . . Wheat Pasture Grazing Limited . . . Milk Production Declines . . . Cotton Production Estimate Declines . . . Screwworm Reports Needed.

Complete reports on 1972 small grain plantings for Texas have been released by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Oats, barley, wheat, rye, and flaxseed plantings and yields per acre for the state are included. For example, more oats were seeded in Central Texas than in any other area of the state. Texas is 13th in the nation in oat production, 20th in barley, 10th in rye and fourth in flaxseed production.

Top counties in oat production in Texas are Denton, Cooke, Grayson, Collin, Coleman, Hamilton, Hunt, Kaufman, Brown, and Limestone. Top counties in winter wheat production are Ochiltree, Carson, Hansford, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Sherman, Lipscomb, Randall, Wilbarger, and Moore.

GRAZING of Texas wheat pastures on the High Plains and Rolling Plains has been delayed due to extensive snow and rain. Cold weather hindered wheat growth but prospects continue good with the additional moisture.

About 60 percent of the fall-seeded wheat acreage had sufficient growth for pasture compared with only 40 percent a year ago. The number of cattle on wheat pasture is about 300,000 head under last year.

COTTON production for the state is now estimated at 3,900,000 bales. This compared to only 2,579,000 bales last year. The present estimate is about 300,000 bales under the November projection.

Yield is expected to average 359 pounds per acre compared with only 263 pounds last year. Harvested acres this year are expected to total 5,220,000 compared with 4,700,000 in 1971.

Harvest on the High Plains continues to lag due to bad weather.

Production of American-Pima cotton is expected to total 31,000 bales compared with 35,300 bales in 1971. Yield is expected to average 431 pounds of lint per acre compared with almost a bale per acre last year.

MILK production in Texas declined the past month by about three percent. Milk production per cow averaged 715 pounds. This is slightly under the nationwide average of 742 pounds per cow.

Nationwide, total milk production during the first 11 months of 1972 was two percent more than the same period last year. Milk cow numbers were down one percent.

LIVESTOCK producers in South Texas as well as Arizona and California are urged to continue to send in samples of suspected screwworm cases to the fly laboratory at Mission.
