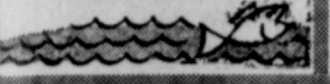

The horse competition in particular has stimulated a lot of interest among the horse enthusiasts of Mills County and promises to be one of the highlights of the show. Over 40 horses are entered in the different classes in the horse judging.

Business people and individuals are especially reminded of the sale at the Mills Co. Commission Co. Saturday night. This annual event is the end result of the show and is what all the entrants have worked so hard to achieve. President Horton urges all who can to support the sale.

A total of 290 entries have been received for the show.

## Phone Rate Hike Passes First Reading

The Goldthwaite City Council, in a unanimous vote, approved the first reading of an ordinance granting General Telephone Co. a rate increase for Goldthwaite phone users.

The council did, however, change the ordinance to make the rate change more equitable to all the citizens of Goldthwaite.

As the phone company initially proposed, most of the increase would be borne by the business phone customer, with very little of the hike passed on to individual customers, or residential phone users.

The council, deduced that the general rate increase was to be 13.26 per cent and that is the figure that the council applied to everyone's phone service minimum billing, to equalize the rate hike.

The phone utility asked for a raise in its net profit from the Goldthwaite system of 1.56 per cent. This would mean a rate of return of 6.93 per cent.

The way the council figured the rate, it was pointed out, should give the phone company its desired return and still be a fair and equitable method of raising the rate.

Jimmy Bennett, a representative of the phone company, was present at the meeting to help the council with questions as they arose.

He pointed out that the changes on the ordinance would not be final until the management of the company reviewed it and passed judgment on the changes.

It is possible that the company will reject the city's proposal. If all three readings of the ordinance pass the council's voting, the new rates would become effective about April 1st.

Fire department officers Charles Conradt and Roger Horton

were present at the regular monthly meeting to discuss the possibility of getting a better system of notifying firemen of fires in the area. A phone hookup system was given the go-ahead by the council. The details of the system would be left up to the discretion of the fire department. The council expressed the need for greater protection and that the savings in property would easily pay for the new phone system.

In other business, the council appointed Harmon Frazier of Goldthwaite to a term on the City of Goldthwaite Housing Authority.

Nee City Manager Don Petty reported on the money that the city had received through the federal revenue sharing program. He said that \$5,119.00 had been received to date by the city. The money can be used for anything except to match other federal funds for projects, it cannot be used in any discriminatory manner, and it has to be used on high priority projects.

Councilman Jim Smith was named a voting delegate to the Central Texas Council of Governments.

AUSTIN, TEXAS—The State Board of Insurance had good news for homeowners as the new year turned.

Insurance rate cuts which will total an estimated \$25 million a year in savings for coverage on dwellings were ordered effective January 1.

Gov. Preston Smith commended the Board and claimed that debate on insurance rating issues during the special legislative session he called last fall figured in the reductions.

Board members first announced these reductions for extended coverage and homeowners' package policies:

North-northwest territory—30 per cent for extended coverage and 20 per cent homeowners' policies.

Central inland area—eight per cent and seven per cent.

Seacoast "first tier" counties on the Gulf—four per cent reduction for extended coverage but a four per cent hike for homeowners' policies.

Seacoast "second tier" counties—18 per cent and 10 per cent less.

Announcement of the first reductions were followed three days later by fire rate cuts for dwellings.

The statewide fire rate slashes amount to 12 per cent for brick veneer, asbestos and stucco houses and nine per cent for frame dwellings. A three per cent increase was directed for all brick dwellings, but the Board noted this category accounts for only two per cent of Texas housing.

BUDGET REFORMURGED—Legislators returning to work in regular session Tuesday found five budget reform proposals designed to save at least \$50 million a year.

Texas Manufacturers Association unveiled the recommendations and announced a statewide campaign to win support for them.

These proposals are expected to be introduced by prominent legislators, TMA said: + Authority for the governor, as chief state executive officer, to review state spending on a quarterly basis.

+ Authority for the legislative budget board to conduct biennial performance audits of agency and program operational efficiency.

+ Limiting compromise powers of free conference committees on appropriations to adjusting reasonable differences between House and Senate spending recommendations, rather than permitting addition of new items or deletion of others previously agreed on by both houses.

+ Establishing a "pricetagging" system, under which the legislative budget board must project cost estimates for a five-year period on all spending legislation before committee hearings.

+ Creating a two-year study by a 15-member gubernatorial commission of the practice of earmarking 80 per cent of total state revenues, free of direct legislative control.

PENAL CODE REWRITE TRIED AGAIN—Lawmakers also found the 1973 version of Texas penal code revision as proposed by the State Bar on their desks at the capitol.

The new code, first proposed overall revision since 1857, was rejected by the legislature in 1971, but sponsors feel it may pass this year. Changes have been made in controversial sections, and provisions on drug laws and abortion left out.

The new code would retain the death penalty for eight classifications of murder.

Sixteen hundred sections of the old penal code have been boiled down to 246. It contains four felony punishment classifications and three classes of misdemeanors, with penalties specified for each.

AG OPINIONS—A San Antonio school teacher is ineligible to serve as a member of the State Board of Education, the attorney general's office held.

In other recent opinions, the attorney general concluded:

+ County commissioners must be petitioned by one per cent of county voters before they can call a countywide road bond election.

+ An advertising scheme whereby merchants award prizes by drawings and punchcards is a lottery in violation of the law.

+ A requirement of persons applying for a marriage license appearing together or separately before the county clerk may be waived, and ceremonial marriages may be performed by proxy where there is a valid marriage license issued.

+ Refinery units constructed on land owned by gas companies

are determined to be real property.

+ A vehicle designed primarily for application of fertilizer and herbicides is an "implement of husbandry" (used for agricultural purposes) and is not required to be registered for regular usage.

APPOINTMENTS—Governor Smith designated V. Larry Teaver Jr. of Austin, a long-time friend and aide, as secretary of state to serve until January 16 when Gov. Dolph Briscoe takes office. Teaver succeeds Bob Bullock who resigned after January 1.

Other Smith appointments include: Judge Edward D. Coulson of Houston as associate justice of the 14th court of civil appeals; Sam Lane of Austin to Tex. Employment Commission; Bob Lilly of San Antonio as chairman of Texas Animal Health Commission; David McAngus of Austin as 201st district judge; Judge Jackson B. Smith Jr. of Houston as 189th district judge; Mrs. Ruby Kless Sondock of Houston to domestic relations court no. 5 in Harris County; Murray L. McWhorter (reappointment) to the Veterans Land Board; and Bill Tippen of Abilene and Richard C. Ingram of Dallas to the Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

Brad O'Leary of Austin was designated executive director of the Texas Republican Party and Harrison Vickers of Houston executive director of the State Democratic Party.

SHORT SNORTS—The new Homer Garrison Jr. Law Enforcement Academy of the Texas Department of Public Safety, named for the late DPS director from 1938-1968, was officially dedicated here January 4 and hailed among the best equipped in the United States.

Gross agricultural income for Texas during 1972 may exceed \$4 billion, according to John White, Agriculture Commissioner.

Court of Criminal Appeals declared unconstitutional a law (since amended) providing that 17 year old males could be tried for felonies, while females must be 18 to face trial.

Revenue from cigarette taxes dropped \$2.5 million—to \$17.4 million from December 1971 to last month.

Animal Health Commission announced quarantines in portions of Nueces and Webb counties for fever tick infestation and exposure.

Governor Smith said state government will have a \$300 million "nestegg" of unexpended fund balances when he leaves office.

Texas Education Agency received a national leadership award for developing performance-based teacher education programs.

Rep. Frances (Sissy) Farentold, unsuccessful candidate for governor last year, announced she will maintain a permanent Austin office and monitor the legislature.

**1040 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return  
Taxpayers Ask IRS**

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) Are there lower tax rates for widows or widowers?

A) Yes, a widow or widower who can qualify may use the lower tax rates to compute his or her tax. You are entitled to the benefit for certain widows or widowers if your husband (or wife) died within the two years preceding the year for which the tax is being computed and you meet the following requirements:

1) You must have been entitled to file a joint return with your husband (or wife) for the year of death—whether or not you actually filed jointly;

2) You have not remarried;

3) You have a child or step-child who qualifies as your dependent; and

4) You furnish over half the cost of maintaining your home, which is the principal residence of your dependent child or stepchild except for temporary absences.

Q) I spent over \$800 for an operation on my 22-year-old

son. I can't claim him as a dependent because he earns over \$750 and is not a student. Can I still deduct his medical expenses on my return?

A) Yes. You may deduct medical expenses paid for a person you could claim as a dependent except for the fact that he or she had income of \$750 or more, or filed a joint return with his or her husband (or wife). This means that all other dependency tests must be met, including your furnishing over one-half of the person's total support for the year.

Q) I received a \$2,000 Federal loan to repair damage caused to my business by tropical storm Agnes. The loan was cancelled and the debt forgiven. Does this have any effect on my taking a casualty loss deduction?

A) Yes. You must reduce your casualty loss deduction by the amount of the cancelled loan. If you have already taken the casualty loss deduc-

tion by amending your 1971 return without taking into account the cancelled loan, you must include the cancelled amount in your 1972 income to the extent the deduction reduced your 1971 tax liability.

In case the cancelled amount of the loan, plus any insurance reimbursements, exceed your adjusted basis in the property, you have a gain from an involuntary conversion. For more information, see IRS Publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses, and Thefts." It's available free by writing your Internal Revenue district office.

Q) Which of my home expenses can I deduct?

A) Homeowners who itemize their deductions may deduct the real estate taxes paid on their property and the interest portion of their mortgage payments. Utility costs, repair and maintenance expenses are not deductible.

Improvements to a home or property are considered capital expenditures and are added to the property's basis.

## Rep. Poage Denounces REAP Cancellation

WASHINGTON - The Administration's plans to terminate the soil conservation program known as REAP (Rural Environmental Assistance Program) drew scathing denunciation here today from Chairman W. R. (Bob) Poage, D-Tex., of the House Committee on Agriculture.

Since the Department of Agriculture announcement December 26th that it would abolish the program, recognizing only commitments made on or before Dec. 22nd, Poage has received numerous calls and telegrams from widespread parts of the nation expressing shock and dismay.

In a statement concerned specifically with termination by the President of a conservation program authorized and funded by Congress, Chairman Poage touched on the basic issue as to whether the Executive Branch of government has the constitutional authority to take action negating the wishes of the Legislative Branch. His statement follows:

"The Conservation Program, more recently called REAP, has done a tremendous amount of good for people of the whole United States over the years. It has had really few critics. It is, as I see it, one of the best of our cost-sharing programs. Every dollar has been matched by farmer funds. In many cases there have been several of the farmer's dollars for each dollar the government spent. The program has been one which has been used by the so-called 'small farmer.' (No one can receive more than \$2,500 per year under this program, and in most counties far less than that.)

"The program has provided more recreation in the tens of thousands of ponds built over all this country than has any recreation program sponsored by the federal government. It has done more to clean up our streams than all of our pollution programs.

"It is outright hypocrisy for the Administration to deny all government assistance to this group of farmers which has contributed so much to our general conservation program and at the same time approve federal participation for urban-oriented programs on an ever-increasing percentage of government payments.

"I supported assistance for our municipalities in meeting their pollution problems, but I object strenuously to showing this kind of favoritism.

"There were three million acre-feet of silt poured into

our streams last year - practically all of it from our rural areas. There were only 104 thousand acre-feet of sewage - virtually all from metropolitan areas. Yet the President is now taking away all help from the rural areas. But even with the limitations he has imposed he is approving an increase in the percent of federal help in handling city waste.

"I have no fault to find with the President's efforts to keep our expenditures within reasonable limits. Indeed I think that the Congress has gone much too far and I have personally repeatedly voted to reduce money in appropriation bills. However, I am not going to stand by and give tacit approval while the Administration tries to require our rural residents to carry all of the burden of soil and water conservation, of stream protection, of reforestation, and a large part of our open-air recreation, while at the same time approving the acceptance by the federal government of an ever-increasing share of the cost of these same activities in metropolitan areas (where there are, of course, a great many more votes)."

## Latest From Social Security Office

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a series of articles on the new social security law that has been prepared by Glen McNatt, manager of the Brownwood office).

Nondisabled widowers may be paid as early as age 60, as has been the case for widows. Widowers must have been dependent on their wives at the time the wife died.

Heretofore, an amount equal to 1 per cent of all disability benefits paid in a year could be spent for the rehabilitation of the beneficiaries. The amount is being increased to 1 1/2 per cent for fiscal year ending June 30, 1973, and to 1 1/2 per cent for following years. It might be mentioned that rehabilitation has been so successful that the costs of the service have been considerably less than the savings from termination of rehabilitated beneficiaries.

A child who is adopted by either a retirement or a disability beneficiary may be due social security benefits if: (1) the adoption was in a court of competent jurisdiction in the U. S.; (2) the child was living with and receiving at least one-half support from the beneficiary for at least one year before entitlement to retirement or disability benefits; and (3) the child was under 18 when he began to live with the adopting parent.

# TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

by Vern Sanford

**It Takes Trailer Care To Get You There  
... And Back Home Again ... Safely!**

Pulling a boat and trailer behind the family automobile can be a pleasure. But only if (1) the trailer is hitched securely to the car; (2) the boat is resting evenly on the runners and the rollers; and (3) the boat is tied down properly to the trailer.

There are numerous types of hitch connections to fit the trailer ball and all seem to work well. If there is a weakness at this point it must be with the installer.

### Double-Check Hitch Ball

Usually his fault is in failure to double-check. He should make certain that the ball is well seated in the cap, that the grippers are beneath the ball, and that the lock nut is secure . . . screwed down as far as it will go. The nut should be tightened to the point where threads are visible above the nut.

On the snap-down type the clamp should be pushed down until it is horizontal. The safety catch should be inserted to prevent sudden lurching or bouncing of the trailer from snapping open the safety arm.

### Use Proper Length Chain

For added security a sturdy clamp-on chain should be attached on each side of the hitch from trailer to hitch and long enough only to allow the maximum turning space needed. If the chains are too long they may

catch on ground objects, stumps, etc. over which the trailer rolls, or worse yet whip-snap and break.

**Don't use a hitch that merely clamps onto the bumper. One loose bolt and away goes your boat and trailer. Use a hitch that bolts firmly to the steel frame of the car at several points.**

Also don't try to pull a heavy boat and trailer with a small, light-weight automobile . . . for your car could be flipped over by a sudden gust of wind.

### Steel Cable A Must

Once the trailer is safely attached to the car, the boat should be tied down tightly on the trailer.

A good winch and a strong cable are essential. Many use quarter-inch or larger nylon rope on the winch. But nylon will rot, and you can't tell it by looking at it.

We strongly recommend using either 1/8 or 1/4 inch steel cable. Braided 1/8 inch aeroplane type cable is great if you want considerable length. It tends to bind in the winch more than the larger size, but is easier to handle and you can get considerably more cable on the winch . . . in case you need it.

So use steel cable on your winch and save the nylon rope for tie-downs at the dock, rescue purposes, and anchors.

"Save those important 'papers' in the box with a small electrical appliance. Consumers should read every word before using the appliance.

"Read and heed registration cards first. Complete them and mail to the manufacturer.

These cards let him know where the appliance was purchased and where the product is in case a safety defect makes it necessary for him to notify the owner. Sending the registration card also may speed servicing.

"Guarantee or warranty papers are second on the reading list, and they mean about the same thing."

Learn what they promise in writing on product performance, such as "guaranteed not to tarnish" or "guaranteed to be free of defects in material or workmanship." Some promise specific action, such as repair, refund or replacement if the product fails to meet standards of quality of performance stated in the guarantee.

Read until you find the following six points:

- 1) What it guarantees—it should list parts covered.
- 2) How long it's guaranteed—the entire appliance or different parts may be guaranteed for different time lengths.
- 3) Manufacture or seller promises—if product is defective, they may furnish parts and labor

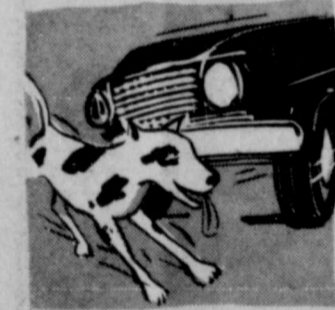


### Dog-Caused Collision

Motorists kill dogs at an alarming rate. But dogs can be deadly to motorists, too. One year's study of a single thruway revealed that more than 200 accidents had been caused by dogs dashing in front of cars.

What are the legal consequences of such an accident? If a dog causes injury to a motorist, may the owner of the dog be held liable in court?

Consider this case: A motorist, suddenly confronted by a dog in the street, swerved to the right, struck the dog, lost control of his car, and crashed into a fire hydrant.



Injured, he claimed damages from the owner of the dog under the state's "strict liability" law. And the court held that, since the dog had indeed caused the accident, the owner would have to foot the bill—even with no proof of his negligence.

Strict liability laws, although not yet universal, are already on the books in many states. And even without such a law, a dog owner may be held liable if shown to be negligent.

In another case, a terrier had the habit of assaulting passing vehicles of all kinds. One day he rushed ferociously at a youthful motorcyclist, causing him to lose his balance and crash.

Even with no strict liability law in effect, a court ruled that the dog's owner would have to pay damages. The court said he was guilty of negligence for failing to keep such a troublesome dog under restraint.

On the other hand, there is no liability if the dog—although involved in the accident—was not really its cause. Thus:

A motorist, after barely touching a dog, ran his car into the ditch. But when he sought damages from the dog's owner, the quality of his own driving came under scrutiny. Considering all the circumstances of the encounter, the jury concluded that a reasonably careful driver would have had no trouble staying on the road.

Result: case dismissed.

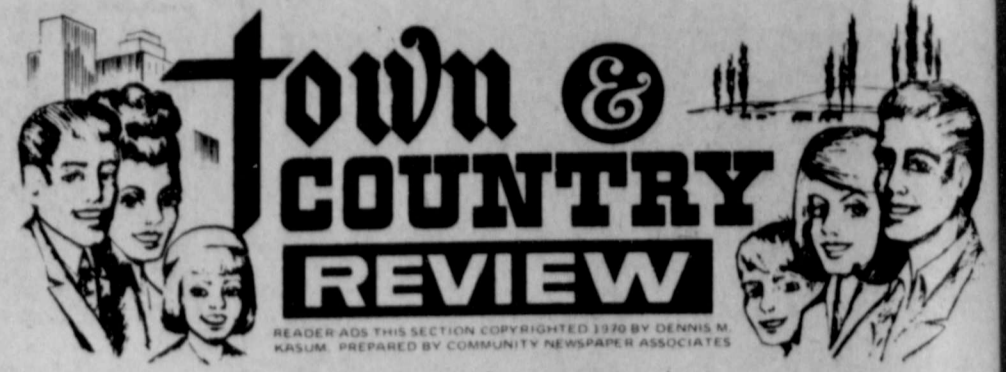

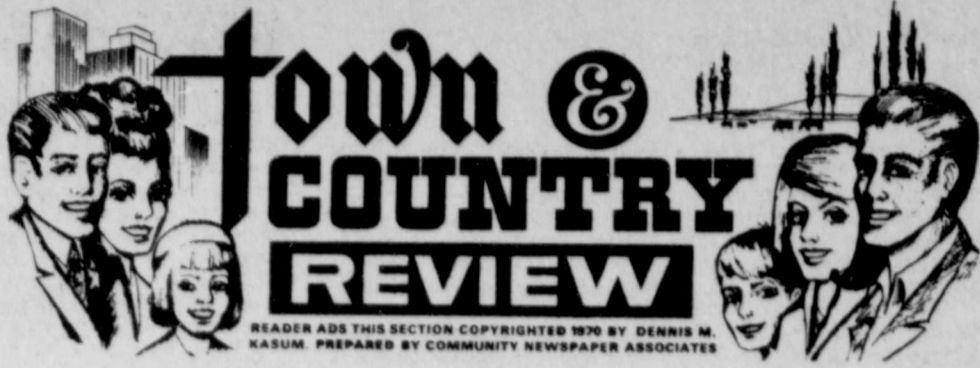

## Hog Numbers Decline... Wheat Seeding Increases... Citrus Blackfly Survey Continues...

Fewer hogs and pigs are reported in Texas compared to a year ago, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

In Texas, the number of hogs and pigs total 1,264,000. This is a decrease of 10 percent from a year earlier.

Reports based on farmers' intentions indicate that during the period now through May, 124,000 sows will farrow in Texas, four percent above a year earlier. The average value of all hogs in Texas is \$35 per head, giving a total inventory of \$44,240,000.

Nationwide, hogs and pigs total 61,500,000, two percent less than a year ago. Hogs and pigs kept for breeding are estimated at 9,000,000, an increase of six percent.

WINTER wheat seeding for harvest is estimated at 4,400,000 acres which is a nine percent increase over a year ago and is a fourth larger than 1971.

A crop of 70,400,000 bushels is now expected in Texas. This compared with 44,000,000 bushels produced in 1972.

Wheat seeding for all practical purposes is completed with bad weather causing some delays.

Nationwide, the 1973 prospective winter wheat crop is a record 1,278,000,000 bushels. This would be eight percent more than the 1972 crop and 12 percent more than in 1971.

Generally, condition of the crop is mostly good to excellent. Estimated yield is 29.9 bushels per acre, just slightly below the 1971 record yield per acre.

Indications are now that 88 percent of the seeded acreage will be harvested for grain. If realized, this would be the highest percentage since 1966 when 90.3 percent was harvested.

SURVEYS of the citrus blackfly continue in the Rio Grande Valley. A new infestation has been found in the San Benito and Harlingen areas. The blackfly can cause great economic damage in commercial citrus. Even infestations of short duration may reduce crop yields by as much as 50 percent.

Personnel of the Texas Department of Agriculture are cooperating with U.S. Department of Agriculture specialists in combating the fly. The survey will provide a specific picture of the extent of the problem.

Federal-state crews will survey the Valley once each month for six months, examining more than 100,000 points. Entomologists said the survey is sensitive enough to detect infestations as low as one infested tree in 33,000.

After the survey is complete, federal and state officials will decide on appropriate courses of action.

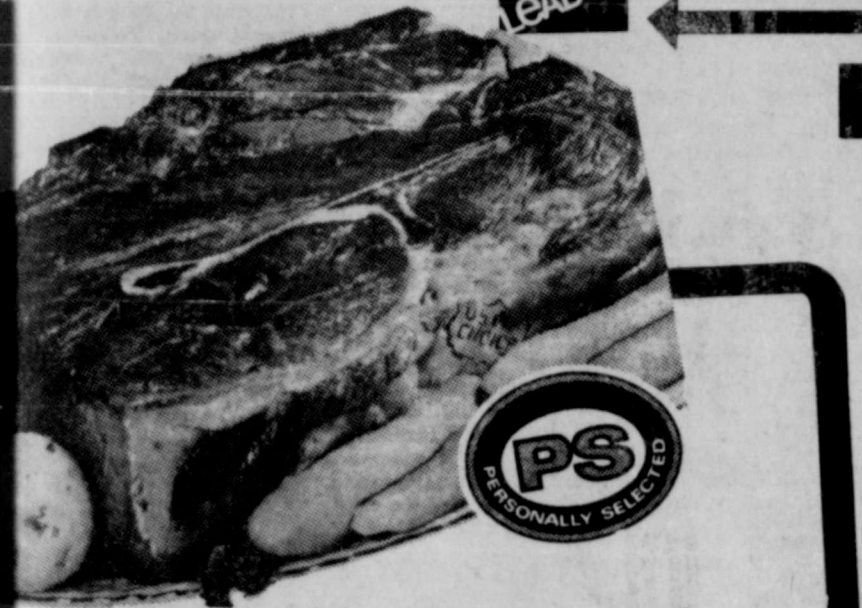
