





More Cows, More Milk ... Fertilizer Use Increases... Broiler Prices Advance ... Citrus Harvest Active

Texas cows produced almost five tons of milk each during 1972. Total milk production in Texas this past year was up four per cent from a year ago. Total milk production was 3,381,000,000 pounds.

The milk cow population also increased slightly, from 355,000 in 1971 to 358,000 in 1972. Average prduction per cow in herd, including dry cows, was 9,444 pounds in 1972, up 320 pounds from 1970.

But the nationwide average per cow production was 10,271 pounds. Total milk production throughout the nation during 1972 amounted to 120 billion pounds; this is 1.5 per cent higher than the previous year.

FERTILIZER use in Texas continues to climb. Total amount of fertilizers applied on Texas farmlands during 1972 was up almost 200,000 tons over 1971.

Types of fertilizer are divided into three categories: mixed fertilitzer, primary nutrient fertilizer, and secondary and micronutrient fertilizer.

Mixed fertilizer utilized in Texas totaled 1,312,535 tons; this is up 11 per cent from 1971. Primary nutrient ted to 1,200,733 tons, which is six per cent ertilizer an above the 1971 use. Secondary and micronutrient fertilizer applied amounted to 1,100 tons which was down slightly from the 1971 level.

With spring drawing near, many homeowners will be test-ing their "green thumb" and pitting in gardens. However, before taking that initial step, consider a control program for soil pests that may attack plants. Soil insects can give home gardeners a lot of trouble. Most common are wireworms, white grubs, rootworms, cutworms, mole crickets and stalk borers. Applying an insecticide two to

garden will eliminate most soil nsect problems. Recommended insecticides include chlordane and diazinon. Chlordane should be applied at three to six pounds of actual material per acre while diazinon should be applied at two two-and-a-half pounds of actural material per acre (Broadcast). 

"This law is unconstitutional. True, the state does have the power to protect consumers. But here they are not trying to protect consumers. They are trying to protect alligators. That is beyond the scope of legislative authority." However, a court ruled that the

measure was indeed within the "police power" of the state.



"Protection of animals," said the court, "is necessary not only for their natural beauty and for biological study but (also) for the key role they play in the main-tenance of the life cycle." Not long afterward, a shoe

dealer tried another line of attack on the same law. 'It hurts our chances of making a living," said the dealer. "It de-

stroys our property rights without due process of law." But again the court upheld the legislation. The court said the shoe dealer simply had no "prop-erty right" to begin with in the

wildlife of a foreign country. These cases illustrate the legal issues that have arisen out of efforts to preserve "endangered species." As a rule, courts have looked with favor upon such efforts.

Nevertheless, if the state may act on behalf of animals, it may also act on behalf of hunters. In another case, lawmakers decided to introduce a special breed of deer into remote sections of the state-for the benefit of sports-

Some residents opposed the plan, partly because of the harm the deer might inflict upon the flora and fauna of the region. But after a court test, their objections were overruled. The court said the state's police power included the fight to make the state more appealing and more profinable as a recreational area.

How Jesus healed people we do not know. That He did something, and that it seemed like work, is obvious from the fact that His critics were opposed to healing on the Sabbath, for it was work to which they objected. Often He said words that were helpful, but, in the case of the woman with an issue of blood, there were no words at all. The very proximity to Christ seems have given the poor woman to what she needed.

We get some idea of how numberous the acts of healing were when we see that one story. that of the poor woman, comes in the midst of another. Christ healed one while He was on his way to relieve a second sorrowful situation. We may be sure that the gospels tell only a few of the human stories, just as they include only a few of the parables. Because life can go wrong at so many points, there is no end to human tragedy and the needy cases will always press upon one another. Christwas gay with the publicans and sinners. He feasted more than he fasted; but He was also in constant touch with all kinds of pain and disappointment.

The woman who was healed so suddenly is representative of the many of this world who have ample reason for discouragement. Her physical disability had continued unabated for twelve long years, years in which she had gone to many physicans, but each succeeding hope with blasted. The consequences of much fruitless medical care was that she impoverished as well as ill. She was only one out of a great throng about Jesus, but He, recognizing that a genuine contact had been made, sought the woman out, and treated her as an individual rather than an merely part of the faceless crowd.

Christ did not consciously helpher, because she was healed before He was aware of her presence, but she was healed because her own faith was so great. Payroll during the year totals \$261,272 which is paid to 48 members of the faculty and employees.

Annual budget for the Goldthwaite school system this year is \$328,699. This does not include lunchroom operations.

There are 26 teachers and administrators in the school system.

The school system operates seven buses and one private carrier driving approximately 102,000 miles per year.

Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$750,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Agriculture Building, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom, and approximately 80 acres of land.


Total enrollment for the 1972-73 year has now reached 443 pupils for both high school, junior high and elementary





TRAFFIC DEATH RECORD "IMPROVES"

Automobiles kill more Texans every year. In 1971 the death count was 3,594. Yet the death RATE in relation to miles driven went down a tenth of a per cent-to 5.1 for each 100 million miles on the road.

The gain-from 5.2 to 5.1-was not enough. For one thing, the "gain" was actually a loss of 34 lives; deaths in 1970 were "only" 3,560. Only a 4% increase in miles traveled saved the Texas scorecard from a brutal beating. The estimated economic loss was the greatest ever: \$1,045,000,000.

Traffic safety experts haven't given up. They still have hope of achieving the Department of Transportation's goal: Reduce the death rate by one-third by 1980. Priority safety programs are hopefully

plugging away at the deaths-per-100million-vehicle-miles figure. It will have to drop to 3.6 to achieve that one-third reduction.

- These priority programs are pretty basic: -Safer cars.
- -Safer roads.
- -Safer drivers.

Safer driving means, among other things, more sober driving. Seven per cent, rated as "problem drinkers-drivers," cause an estimated one-third of highway deaths.

Clearly, we must keep these problem drivers off the road. And the best way to do that is to keep them out of automobiles. Research is being directed to that end. It should be supported.
