For those who are superstitious Friday 13th will always be in the first month in each quarter; no other month. 9. Each holiday will always fall on the same day of the week. 10. Each person's birthday will always fall on the same day of the week. 11. Thanksgiving Day will always fall on Thursday, November 22nd. 12. Christmas Day will always fall on Sunday, December 25th which gives Saturday night for Christmas shopping and an extra holiday Monday for most working people. 13. Every year ends on Saturday, December 31st.

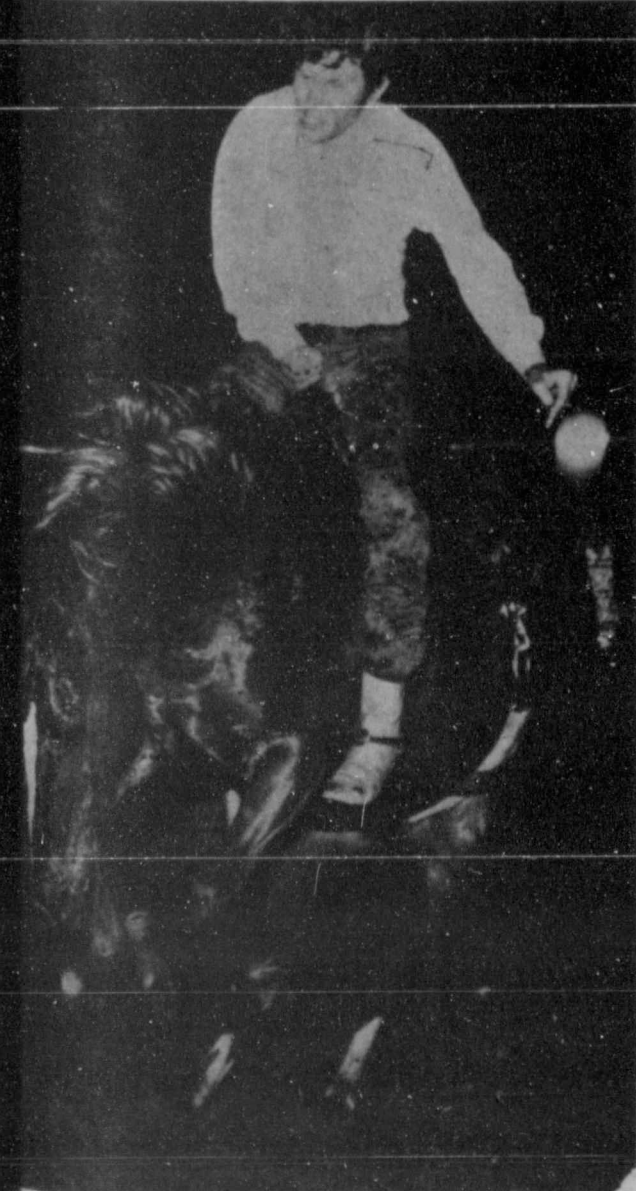

A Senior Citizen's Fair is scheduled for Goldthwaite May 5th. Following are the rules and regulations for the fair.

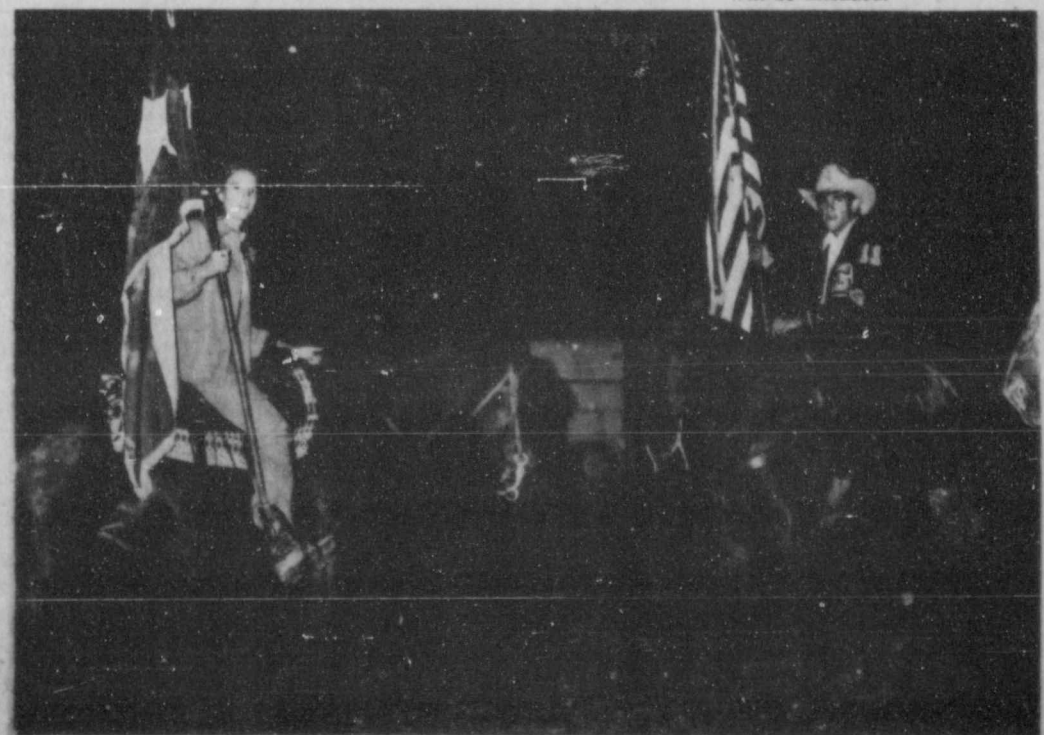
1. Age limit of Exhibitors 55 years or older and a resident of Mills County.

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Governor Briscoe announced his full support for legislation to establish four to six cultural basins for combined efforts at economic problem solving. The bill has passed the Senate.

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FROM THE STATE CAPITOL

Governor Dolph Briscoe, in his first address before a joint session of this Legislature, expressed an idea which I would like to share with you. He said, "We share a very great responsibility and can perform our duties best in an atmosphere of open minds and open doors."

I hope that this letter will serve as an open door between us, and that information will flow not only from my direction to yours, but also vice versa.

STATE REFORM

There seems to be a different atmosphere surrounding this session. The word reform is heard often. I have worked for the passage of several bills aimed at solving many of the problems which have existed in our State government.

H. B. 6, which I co-authored, passed unanimously in the House. The purpose of this bill is to simplify access to public information in the custody of designated governmental bodies. Those of us who sponsored the bill felt it to be an important measure for several reasons.

It has been a common complaint among citizens that they were unable to obtain public records from certain governmental agencies. At the same time, there has been confusion among public employees as to what information they could or should release. Hopefully, this bill will clarify this matter.

Other bills of the 9-bill reform packet which have passed the House include:

H. B. 7 — which makes it difficult for a Speaker of the House to serve a second term of office, but does not prevent a genuine draft.

H. B. 8 — which requires the reporting of campaign expenditures and contributions by candidates for Speaker.

H. B. 9 — relating to bribery with intent to influence votes for Speaker of the House.

H. B. 1, better known as the Ethics Bill, has also passed the House. I feel that the impact of the bill was greatly reduced by an amendment which would render virtually ineffectual the financial disclosure provision of the Act. The bill as it passed, calls for the recording of financial statements by certain State officials, and designates that these statements be in the possession of the Ethics Commission created by the Act.

However, the problem with the amendment lies in the fact that these statements are to be sealed and can be opened only if the Commission independently establishes that a violation has probably occurred. Because of my dissatisfaction with the existing situation, I have co-authored H.B. 1522, which will make information in question readily available to the public and will use channels of State Government already in existence, rather than a newly organized Commission system. This will save substantial sums to the State in comparison with H.B. 1.

LOCAL INTEREST

In addition to the State concerns, there are several matters of interest to my particular district which have also engaged my attention. Sen. Jones, Rep. Donaldson, and myself have been working with the people of Lampasas to find a solution to the problems which exist in Lampasas due to their inadequate water supply.

We will shortly be introducing a bill to allow Lampasas and Copperas Cove to hold an election to create the Upper Lampasas River Municipal Water District. This bill will facilitate transportation of water from Stillhouse Hollow to these two cities. This is an important measure and I hope that the people of this area will inform themselves of this issue before the election.

COMMITTEES

Committee work is a major part of the Legislature and I am extremely pleased with the appointments that I have received. I am a member of three Major Committees: the Business and Industry, the State Affairs, and the Calendar Committees. I am chairman of the Sub-committee on Industrial Development and welcome the opportunity of working in this area of such importance to the progress of our State.

AUSTIN STAFF

I feel very fortunate in having the staff which I have here at the Capitol. Debbie Langford, in charge of the office, is from Goldthwaite and has a degree from the University of Texas in history and government. Paul Herrmann, of Lampasas handles much of the research necessary in consideration of each bill. He graduated from A&M University

and is now in his second year of Law School. Lujet McCullough (Burnet) and Gary Goodnight (Salado) are now attending the University of Texas.

Lujet handles all news releases and newsletters and Gary is everyone's second pair of legs. Should they be able to help you at any time, they will be pleased to do so.

A beautiful landscape enhances the splendor of a home and increases the value of the property. A homeowner should be able to successfully move trees and shrub at any season of the year if eight simple steps are followed:

1. Select plants adapted to your soil and climatic conditions.
2. Dig holes large enough to contain all roots in natural position.
- Don't twist or crowd roots. For balled and burlaped or container grown plants the hole should be the same depth as the soil ball and at least 1 1/2 times the diameter of the ball. Set plant at same depth or slightly higher than it was in the nursery.
3. Water thoroughly. Using extra soil, form a mound around the planting area to hold water. Water thoroughly every 12 days to 2 weeks during dry weather. May require more frequent irrigation during periods of high wind and low humidity.
4. Prune back top growth at planting time. Remove at least one third to one half of the top to compensate for roots lost or damaged in digging.
5. Usually best not to fertilize the first year unless soil is extremely infertile.
6. Use a mulch to conserve moisture, reduce soil temperature, prevent compaction and reduce growth of weed and grass.
7. Stake all large shrubs and trees over 5 feet in height to prevent wind damage.
8. Wrap trunks of newly planted trees. Use strips of burlap, special trewrap paper, or aluminum foil to reduce drying out, prevent sun scald, and to reduce possibility of borer damage.

A variety of good literature is available at my office on trees, shrubs and etc. A publication on varieties of trees, shrubs and fruits that are adapted to Mills County is available at my office.

Producers should be on the alert for possible cases of screwworms. Many non-screwworm cases are being reported and possibility of screwworms is very high.

Any cases of worms should be collected as a sample and mailed in for conformation to screwworms. The fight against screwworms must be kept up.

Anyone desiring help in filling out property loss forms for the FHA may come to my office for assistance at any time.

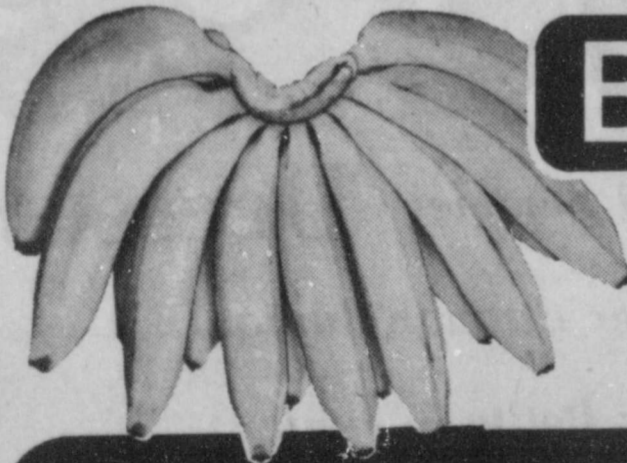

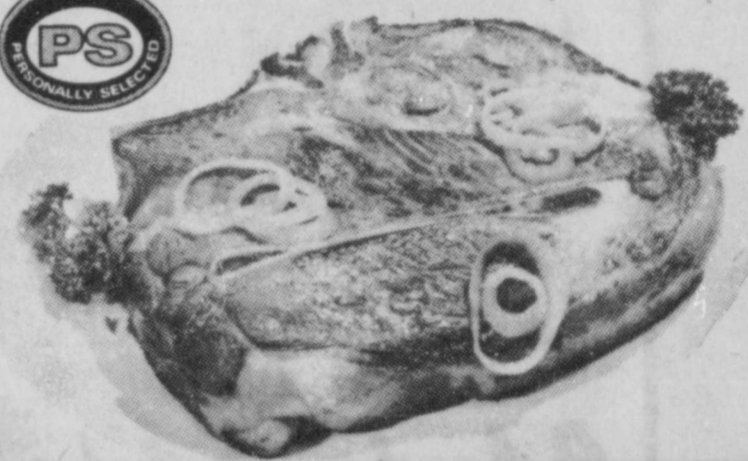
