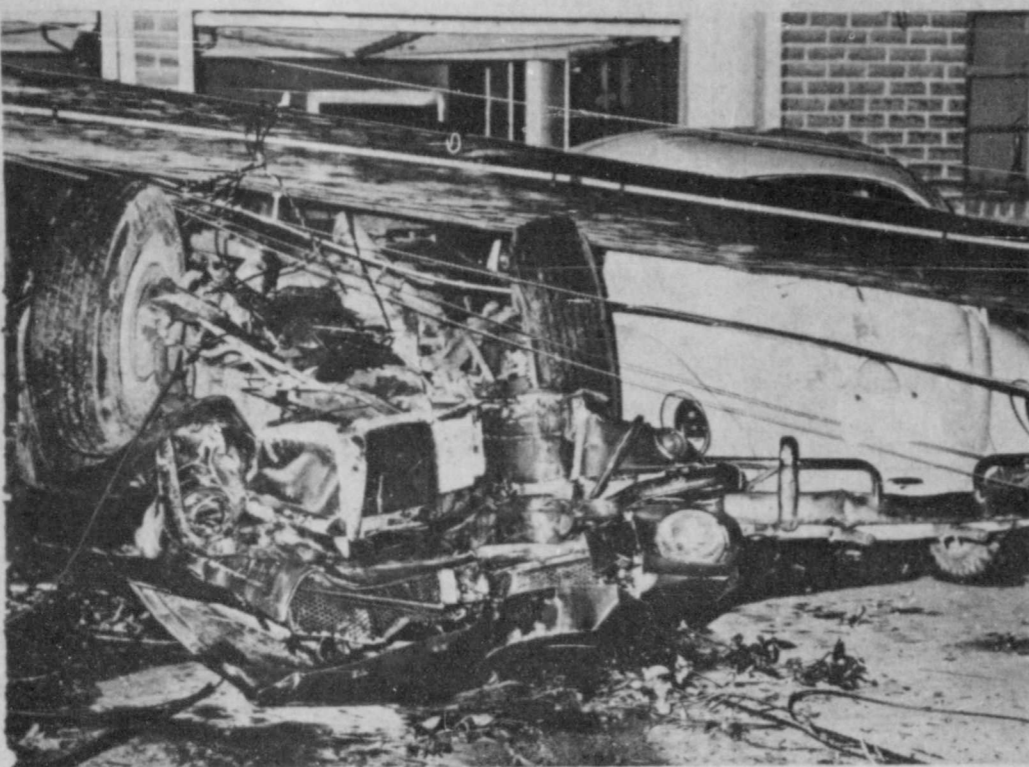

**STATE Capital NEWS**

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Legislators have a lot more left to do than they have done so far in almost four months.

Of the nearly 1,700 House bills and almost 1,000 Senate bills introduced, fewer than 100 actually have reached the Governor's desk.

If the 63rd Legislature accomplished as much as the 62nd did numerically (more than 1,000 bills passed), about 99 per cent of the floor action must be captured in the brief period before the May 28 adjournment deadline.

Slow-moving debate in the House — where more than 200 amendments were offered — on the \$9.7 billion appropriation bill fanned some speculation that a special session may be necessary to complete mandatory work.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who holds the key to calling such a session, has made clear he doesn't want one.

Senators banged through their \$9.5 billion version of the state budget in an hour and 21 minutes. In spite of the two weeks spent on the House spending bill, Speaker Price Daniel Jr. maintained "plenty of time" remains to consider other "must" legislation.

Daniel predicted House passage of these measures before May 28:

- + Mass transit.
- + Drug law reform.
- + Bills to improve fiscal responsibility in government appropriations.
- + Restoral of capital punishment.
- + Penal code revision.
- + Water district reform.
- + Public school finance.
- + Competitive insurance rating.

While the work load appears staggering, Texas legislators are used to concentrating most of their floor action in the last month of their sessions.

**CONSTITUTIONAL HEARINGS BEGIN** — The Constitutional Revision Commission began the first of its three-month series of hearings in the Panhandle and Far West Texas.

Initial hearings were held in Amarillo, Lubbock, El Paso, Midland-Odessa and San Angelo before moving South to San Antonio. A total of 18 hearings will hear citizens' views on how the constitution should be revised.

Witnesses offered suggestions on everything from dipping cattle in cold weather to legislative pay and the rights of individual citizens. Some told the Commission it should move cautiously in changing the constitution.

Further hearings are slated at Arlington, Texarkana, Tyler, Lurkin-Nacogdoches, Houston, Laredo, Corpus Christi, McAllen, Beaumont-E. Arthur-Orange, Abilene, Wichita Falls, Waco and Austin between now and

the end of June.

**FEE, JURY BILLS PASSED**— Higher hunting and fishing license fees and lower age limits for jury service are virtually assured.

The Senate passed amended bills authorizing both and returned them to the House where they originated.

The hunting license will cost \$5.25 instead of \$3.35 and the fishing license \$4.35 instead of \$2.15. A combination license is available for \$8.75. Out-of-state hunters visiting Texas may pay \$37.50 for their licenses. A special, three-day, non-resident salt fishing license can be obtained for \$1.25.

Under the new juror age legislation, 18-20 year-olds can serve on any Texas state court trial jury.

A bill to provide full maturity rights to the 18-20 year olds finally passed the Senate and went to the House.

**COURTS SPEAK** — A Midland murder conviction was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals because portions of a

confession referring to another crime was introduced at the trial.

A Dallas case involving obscene calls and acts was reversed by the same court because a police "beef sheet," including matters not connected with the charge, was permitted in evidence.

A Corpus Christi lawyer convicted of professional misconduct won a new trial through a Supreme Court order, which upheld a 13th Court of Civil Appeals earlier finding.

In an Amarillo case, the Supreme Court held a public utility not exempt from municipal zoning ordinances.

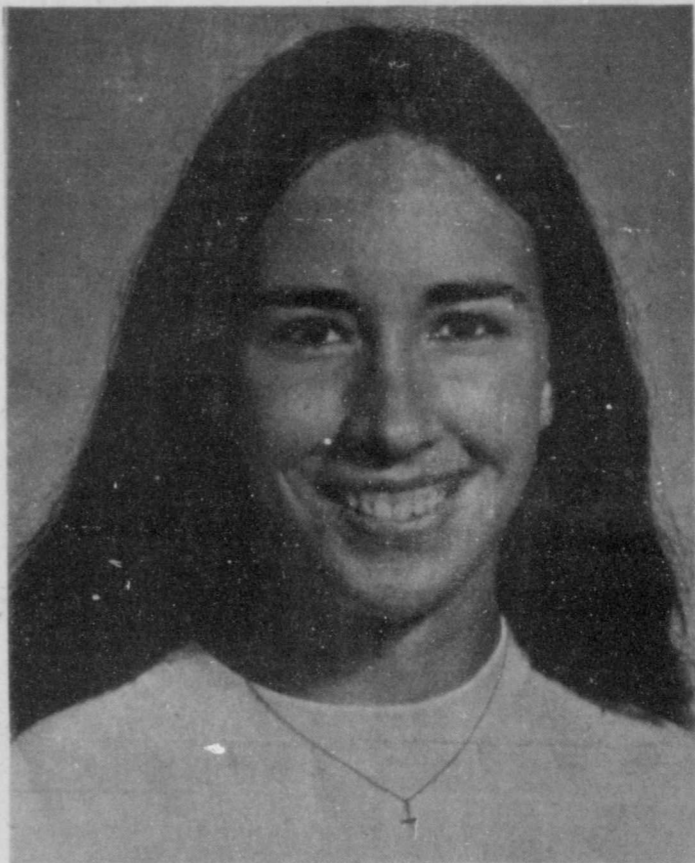

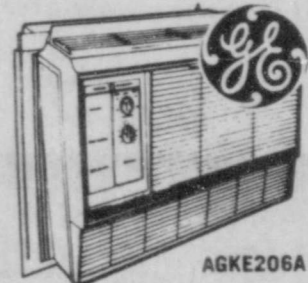

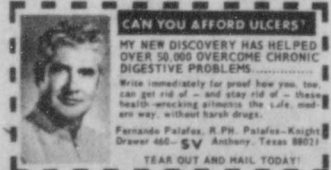

The Texas Angora Goat Raisers Association will hold its third quarterly meeting in the Springs Saturday, May 5.

The meeting is for the purpose of preparing plans for the goat sale to be held the weekend in August.

David Watters of Goldthwaite is the secretary of the organization.

**HUNTING AND FISHING PERMITS**

Legislation passed by the Legislature and fishing licenses sharply is now near final passage.

The Senate approved minor amendments to the House raising hunting licenses from \$3.25 to \$5.25 a year and fishing licenses from \$2.15 to \$4.15.

A combination license could be obtained under the bill for \$6.50. The nonresident hunting license would go up from \$25 to \$35.

**CONSUMER PROTECTION ADVANCED**—A comprehensive consumer protection, anti-deceptive practices bill passed by the Senate and a tougher version earlier cleared the House.

The act would authorize private and class actions for damages resulting from 20 different deceptive trade practices. Enforcement would be in the hands of the attorney general and local district attorneys.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby termed the bill (SB 70) the most progressive consumer protection measure ever adopted by the Senate.

**COURT OVERHAUL AMENDMENT MOVES**—An amendment of a proposed constitutional change to overhaul the court system found Senate approval but still faces a House test.

The amendment, if approved by voters, would combine the supreme court and Court of Criminal Appeals. It would also set up a single-district court system for metropolitan areas, with many judges as needed assigned to each court. Courts of Civil Appeals would be granted jurisdiction to hear criminal appeals.

All efforts to change constitutional provisions dealing with county courts, justices of the peace, county and district attorneys, county clerks and district clerks were abandoned.

**SHORT SNORTS**—A Senate resolution directing state agencies with jurisdiction over public lands to assure containing current fair market value for all gas produced from the property. The sponsor estimates that would mean another \$20 million a year state income at present rates.

Atlantic Mutual Insurance and Miller's Mutual were the first two firms to file for fire-extended coverage rate reductions under new policy.

### Dateline — Washington

U. S. Congressman

The House took two big steps this week. First, we noted not to roll back the price of either meat or other products. I think this was a sound decision. You cannot maintain needed production if you roll the price of the finished product back after production costs have been incurred. What you do achieve is simply to break those producers who cannot make adjustments. The result is then you have less of the needed commodity and ultimately you have higher prices even though these prices may be reflected only in the black market. If we are going to control the price of commodities, we must at the same time control wages and all costs entering into the production. We, therefore, did vote to continue the President's power to control (not to roll back) prices, wages and profits. Details have not been agreed upon by the Conference Committee and it will probably be the 30th of this month before they are. But I think that Congress has established a sound principle.

Second, the House voted to continue the present Highway Program without any impairment of the Highway Trust Fund. Again I think this was a sound decision. The Highway Trust Fund is made up of money collected from the Federal gasoline tax for the sole and specific purpose of building Interstate highways. We have not completed the highway program although we have made great progress. I think we should do so before we talk of using this highway money for rapid transit systems or any other purpose. I think to use this money for purposes other than for which it was collected would be to jeopardize every governmental trust fund including social security and other retirement reserves. If Congress can take money held in trust for a specific purpose and then, before that purpose is achieved, can transfer it to some other use — no matter how desirable — it can, of course, do the same thing with the monies now in the various retirement funds and thus jeopardize the retirement of all our elderly people.

The Senate recessed Wednesday night, the House recessed Thursday night to reconvene on the 30th. During this recess I and seven other Members of the
