Mayors Oppose Higher Electric Rates

Mayors representing a number of Texas cities placed themselves on record Wednesday as opposing two matters which would result in higher electric rates for many Texas electric consumers.

Goldthwaite, Mills County, Texas 76844

The mayors of 21 cities unanimously adopted the position at meeting in Austin Wednesday of the association of "30 Mayors for Economical Electric Rates." The effect of a bill before the Texas House of Representatives and a hearing before the Railroad Commission would be to void agreements and contracts with public utility natural gas suppliers.

Lo-Vaca Gathering Co., a subsidiary of Coastal States Gas Producing Co., has applied to the Railroad Commission to set aside contracts the gas supplier now has which are proving to be unprofitable.

The mayors are protesting that this application is not in the public interest and that the Railroad Commission does not have the authority nor jurisdiction to act on such a matter.

H. B. 1530 would enable the Texas Railroad Commission to set aside natural gas contracts between suppliers and buyers if the gas company feels it is not making enough money.

A state district court has ruled in the past that the Railroad Commission could revise prices after it determined that a modification of the contract is required by the public interest. H. B. 1530 would put the court opinion in the state statutes and remove the doubt about jurisdiction that now exists. Coastal States Gas Producing

Mills County Butane Shortage Apparent

LP Gas users in Mills County can expect a curtailment of butane supply effective May 15 according Virgil Geeslin local LP (liquid petroleum) gas supplier. Geeslin stated that his supplier of butane gas will no longer be able to furnish the fuel to him, however propane will be available in good quantities.

Geeslin emphasized that the problem was beyond his control and the situation is completely out of his hands.

Butane users in Mills County who are customers of Geeslin Gas can convert butane gas to propane systems by installing an above ground tank.

Butane systems operate at about 100 pounds pressure and propane operates at about 200 pounds pressure so tanks are not compatable.

The shortage is blamed on a terrific winter and rationing to suppliers by refineries, Geeslin commented that is is a very serious situation and cut customers are urged to contact him, personally, for questions about the

"At least we have the warmest part of the year ahead of us to make our decisions," Geeslin stated.

AUSTIN, TEXAS - Legislators have a lot more left to do than they have done so far in almost four months. Of the nearly 1,700 House bills and almost 1,000 Senate bills introduced, fewer than 100 actually have reached the Governor's

If the 63rd Legislature accon plished as much as the 62nd did numerically (more than 1,000 bills passed), about 99 per cent of the floor action must be capsuled in the brief period before the May 28 adjournment dead-

Slow-moving debate in the House - where more than 200 endments were offered - on the \$9.7 billion appropriation bill fanned some speculation that a special session may be necessary to complete mandatory work. Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who holds the key to calling such a session,

has made clear he doesn't want Senators banged through their \$9.5 billion version of the state

budget in an hour and 21 minutes. In spite of the two weeks spent on the House spending bill, Speak-er Price Daniel Jr. maintained "plenty of time" remains to con-sider other "must" legislation. Daniel predicted House passage of these measures before May 28:

+ Mass transit.

+ Drug law reform. + Bills to improve fiscal responsibility in government appropriations + Restoral of capital punish-

ment. + Penal code revision.

+ Water district reform. + Public school finance. + Competitive insurance rat-

ing. While the work load appears staggering, Texas legislators are concentrating most of their floor action in the last month of their sessions.

CONSTITUTIONAL HEARINGS BEGIN - The Constitutional Revision Commission began the first of its three-months' series of hearings in the Panhandle and Far West Texas.

Initial hearings were held in Amarillo, Lubbock, El Paso, Midland-Odessa and San Angelo before moving South to San Antonio. A total of 18 hearings will hear citizens' views on how the con-stitution should be revised. Witnesses offered suggestions

on everything from dipping cattle in cold weather to legislative pay and the rights of individual citizens. Some told the Commission it should move cautiously in changing the constitution.

Further hearings are slated at Arlington, Texarkana, Tyler, Lurkin-Nacogdoches, Houston, Laredo, Corpus Christi, Mc-Allen, Beaumont-F t Arthur-Orange, Abilene, Wic. da Falls, the end of June. The House took two big steps this week. First, we noted not to roll back the price of either meat or other products. I think this was a sound decision. You cannot maintain needed production if you roll the price of the finished product back after production costs have been incur-What you do achieve is red. simply to break those producers who cannot make adjustments. The result is then you have less of the needed commodity and ultimately you have higher prices even though these prices may be reflected only in the black market. If we are going to con-trol the price of commodities, we must at the same time control wages and all costs entering into the production. We, therefore, did vote to continue the President's power to control (not to roll back) prices, wages and profits. Details have not been agreed upon by the Conference Committee and it will probably be the 30th of this month before they are. But I think that Congress has established a sound principle.






