LCRA Customers Reject Increase In Proposed Electric Power Price

Customers of the Lower Colorado River Authority have rejected an Excess Fuel and Power Cost Adjustment proposal offered by LCRA at a meeting in Austin Friday morning. In a joint statement issued by the thirty cities and eleven co-ops served by LASL, the customers refused to set aside contracts which extend through 1983. The statement, issued locally by Mayor Ray Duren, is as follows: 'Representatives of thirty towns and eleven co-ops are unanimous in their view that their contracts with LCRA should not be set aside or changed. In answer, the group did agree that it would consider emergency temporary assistance for a 90 day period if necessary for LCRA to continue to purchase fuel oil during this critical period.' LCRA had sought to put the new cost adjustment schedule into effect immediately. The board defined 'excess fuel and power costs' as: the difference between two mills per kilowatt hour (the present contractual cost of gas-generated power) and the actual cost per kilowatt hour of all fuel used in all of the Authority's steam electric generating plants; plus this same difference in purchasing emergency power from other power companies; extraordinary costs of operating the Authority's Comal Plant when necessary; and the costs of storing alternate fuels for emergency purposes.

Mayor Requests Power Conservation

Mayor Ray Duren issued the following statement over the weekend concerning the current energy crisis: 'The energy crisis is not artificial. This, in part, is due to Coastal States having over-sold their supply. If we do not cooperate, we are all going to be faced with a mandatory electrical curtailment. As Mayor, I would like to issue this plea to our citizens: to conserve electricity in every way they know how. We would like to see at least a 25 percent reduction in consumption.' The Mayor went on to list the ways in which the city has or intends to cut back on its consumption of electric power: the thermostats in all municipal buildings have been set up to 80 degrees; lights in all municipal buildings have been reduced to a minimum; cutting off of street lights is being considered. In addition, Mayor Duren makes the following suggestions as ways Goldthwaite citizens can help the city get through this crisis: Run washing machines and dryers after peak hours, preferably between midnight and 6 a.m.; accumulate ironing until there is a quantity instead of ironing one article at a time when needed; turn on all lights not in use or absolutely needed; operate dishwasher once a day; filter swimming pools from midnight to 6 a.m. only; water lawns as little as possible; run washers and dryers at separate times to avoid excess demand of electricity; raise temperatures in homes to 78 degrees; use T.V. for special programs only; and put fans on automatic instead of continuous. For merchants in the area, the Mayor has the following suggestions: maintain temperature in your stores at 80 degrees; turn off all electric signs; burn a minimum of night lights. If all of these suggestions are followed by citizens and merchants, the Mayor feels that the projected 25 percent reduction in electric power needed by the city of Goldthwaite can be achieved.

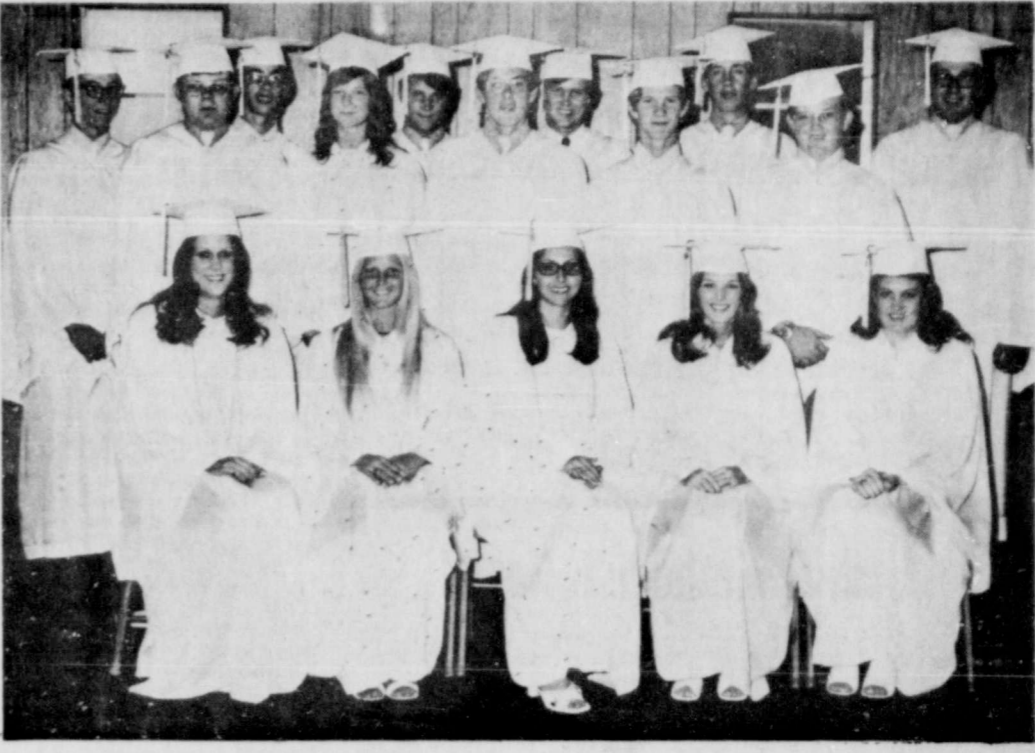

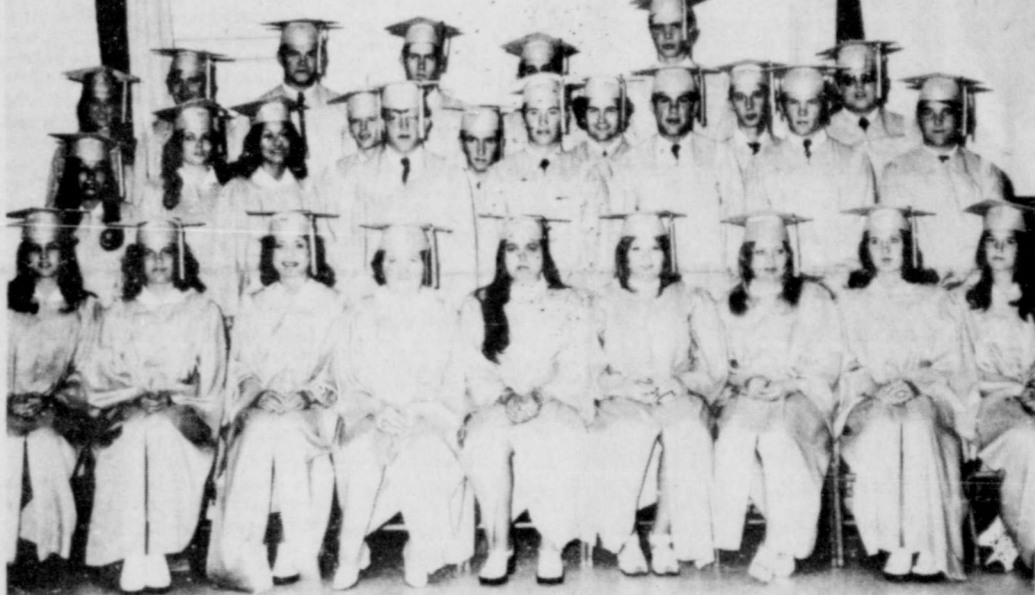

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United Methodist News

SAN ANTONIO — The chairman of the United Methodist Commission that formulated the denomination's new social Principles will be the preacher for the Southwest Texas Annual Conference meeting here May 28-31. Bishop James S. Thomas, Des Moines, one of the church's black bishops, steered the commission through four years of discussion prior to the debate of the General Conference in Atlanta last year. The statement speaks to abortion, homosexuality, private property, conscientious objection, and civil

disobedience. He will speak four different times to the conference delegates and visitors.

Worship services will be conducted in the Travis Park United Methodist Church and most business sessions during the day will be held in the Villita Assembly Building.

Key issues to be decided include the proposed sale of Mt. Wesley Assembly at Kerrville, establishing a new position of Retreat Master and the consideration of a \$1,690,700 budget.

The proposed sale of the Kerrville camp carries with it a request for \$1,000 to continue study of the annual conference's camping program needs. No sale price has been revealed.

The Retreat Master position has a \$50,000 grant that would help fund the staff position for its first two years. Opposition has stated that the work could better be done by the existing conference personnel.

The conference budget includes \$4,300 new money which is reported to be less than one-half of one percent increase over 1973 budget.

Other items of business include:
+ Proposal for periodic evaluation of pastor's parish ministry.
+ Plan to equalize lay-clergy membership in the Annual Conference.
+ Presentation of four innovative ministries.
+ Perfection of Council on Ministries Consultation.

+ Vote on eight amendments to the denomination's Constitution referred by the 1972 General Conference.
The business session opens the conference at 2 p.m., Monday, May 28th at Travis Park United Methodist Church.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — The 63rd Legislature wound down at midnight Monday (May 28) with opinions sharply divided as to how much or how little it accomplished.

While new reform rules slowed down consideration of bills, much major legislation was passed, some of which had failed previously.

Both houses completed work on a record \$9.7 billion, tax-free budget four days before adjournment, then with money left over, began to fashion an emergency aid bill for "poor" school districts.

The big job of revising school finance formulas, as anticipated was left for a future session following additional studies and careful weighing of property values.

Legislative redistricting was another job left for the future possibly under court direction.

Lawmakers did manage to agree on a competitive auto insurance rate bill — something they couldn't do in a special session devoted to that purpose alone last September-October.

They also came to terms on far-reaching revision of the penal code — first in 117 years — although the House bogged down on a court reform constitutional amendment.

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. managed to get some of his reform measures, including open meetings law strengthening and better access to public records, finally passed. Agreement on a tough code of ethics was difficult.

While they were at it, legislators asked again for a pay raise — to \$15,000 a year — and a constitutional amendment permitting them to meet in annual sessions to better handle an ever-increasing work load.

Whether or not they are called into special session this year, they will be back next January — to have a try at revising the state constitution.

NEWSMEN'S MEASURE DIES IN CONFERENCE — The "free flow of information" measure — called the newsmen's privilege bill — died in a conference committee. Compromise language that might have been acceptable to both the House and Senate would have made it a "qualified" privilege for newsmen — and it looked for a time that the conference committee was going to vote it out.

Publishers, editors and broadcasters told their legislators that they preferred "no privilege at all" if it could not be "unqualified" — and the conference committee members let it "R.I.P."

Representatives of the Texas Joint Media Committee — members of professional press groups expressed disappointment that the Senate would not accept the original House bill — which included no qualification except in cases of "libel or right of privacy" law suits.

Some felt the Watergate case had taken the "heat off the press" and fewer subpoenas would be issued in the future to obtain information from newsmen.

Unless Texas newsmen have problems with grand juries and

the courts in future years, it will be difficult to get press support for a "newsmen's privilege" measure in this state, said Don Coppedge, president of the Texas Press Association.

GAS RATE SUIT FILED — Atty. Gen. John Hill filed the first big test case — against Exxon Corporation — to recover full market value of royalty gas produced on state lands for the school fund and University of Texas.

The suit alleges the state's price is not limited to amounts agreed to in contracts, nor to the low ceiling price set by Federal Power Commission.

Hill has estimated many millions of dollars rest on outcome of the litigation. Current FPC ceiling price is in some cases less than 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet of gas, while actual market value is estimated at 45 cents per 1,000 cubic feet in recent sales.

The suit seeks to compel Exxon to pay the current market value or, alternatively, to allow the state to take its royalty gas "in kind" for use or resale. The state claims it is due not less than \$500,000 from Exxon, and many other producers are expected to be made defendants soon.

LAND PROGRAM EXTENSION ASKED — One of the proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 6 would extend the veterans land loan program, pumping another \$100 million (for a total of \$500 million) into it.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong applauded submission of the new amendment to continue the low-interest, long-term loans for veterans to buy land.

About 43,000 veterans have acquired more than three million acres of land under the program since 1946 when it was launched.

COURTS SPEAK — A state law providing damage penalties for corporations that make illegal campaign contributions is constitutional, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court agreed to rehear a controversy between the City of Austin and the local Humane Society over division of an estate over land left for a park. Two Mineral Wells men were granted new trials in drug cases by the Court of Criminal Appeals because they were not permitted to testify on beatings by narcotics agents.

AG OPINIONS — Attorney Gen. held a compulsory oil and gas utilization bill was constitutional, but the measure (HB 311) was killed in the Senate.

Hill found some questionable provisions in the senate's version of ethics legislation, but urged leaders to correct them and pass a constitutional bill.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:
+ Legislation to restrict distribution and sale of a brand of beer to exclusive territories and distributors is unconstitutional.
+ Drug control legislation does not unconstitutionally delegate legislative authority to the commissioner of health to designate additional controlled substances.

+ The assistant executive director of a state agency may also serve as a river authority member.
+ The Taylor County constable's salary minimum is set at the figure of January 1, 1972, and county commissioners can't cut it below that.

Robert G. Schleiter of Kilgore, Neal E. Velvin of Athens and Jack Morgan of Kaufman to the board of directors of Tyler State College.

Mrs. Travis McNair of Big Lake (reappointed) to the state Board of Tuberculosis Nurse Examiners.

REDFISH DECLINING — Parks and Wildlife Department marine biologists fear the redfish population may be declining along the Texas coast.

First sign is said to be reduction in the number of large redfish. PWD officials say that if

further evidence gathered by staff biologists confirms a decline, remedial measures may be ordered that could affect activities of both sport and commercial fishermen.

SHORT SNORTS
Thirteen new district courts were created by the Legislature to be located in Ft. Worth, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Galveston, Denton, Corpus Christi, Hidalgo County and Comal, Hays and Caldwell counties (combined).

Compulsory oil and gas utilization legislation failed in the Senate, although proponents predicted it will pass in a future session due to the energy crisis.

Bilingual education and state-supported adult education programs were finally approved and funded by the Legislature.

Governor Briscoe has urged all state offices to cooperate with local officials to curtail use of electric power.

A \$43,708 regional planning assistance grant has been approved for the South Plains Association of Governments.

A \$336,800 development project for the City of Terrell has been approved under the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation land and water conservation fund.

Parks and Wildlife Commission scheduled a May 31 meeting here to consider a policy for naming parks and other matters.

Governor Briscoe signed into law major consumer protection legislation.

The governor also signed a new state securities act to prohibit fraud in buying as well as selling of stocks and bonds.

New state bank charters were approved for Dallas, Carrollton, White Settlement, Bellaire, Houston, Fort Worth and Friona.

A bill giving state government additional power to deal with hurricanes and other disasters passed the Legislature.

Grants totaling \$1.7 million were awarded the governor's Office for Comprehensive Community Planning Assistance.

Texas' first adult education law has been signed by Governor Briscoe.

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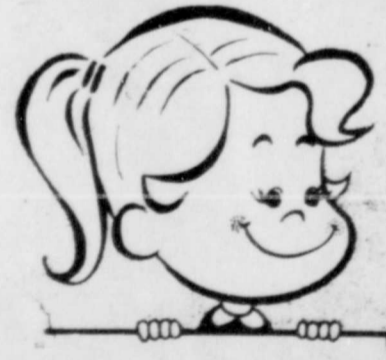

April Savings Bond Sales Total \$5,672

During April there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$5,672 according to W. P. Duren, chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales for the first four months totaled \$26,576 for 44 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$60,000.

April sales in Texas totaled \$19,525,843 exceeding last year's \$17,331,291 by \$2,194,552. Year to date sales amounted to \$83,791,839, an increase of \$9,533,410 over 1972 sales of \$74,258,429.

Nationwide, monthly sales were \$562 million, 11.8 percent above 1972 sales of \$502 million. Exchanges of Series E and Savings Notes for Series H Bonds amounting to \$30 million were reported for April, 13 percent above the \$27 million exchanged last year.

Coastal was holding out gas reserves. He used the allegory: 'If I contract to buy a man's calves, I check to make sure he has the calves to sell.' Small replied: 'You can see calves — you can't see gas.'

Coastal appeared before the Railroad Commission May 1 and 2 to ask that its contract rates increase be allowed with cost of gas adjustment clauses. Before, Coastal had stated that it had adequate gas reserves to meet all of its contract obligations. At the meeting, the collecting company pleaded near gas bankruptcy. As if to contradict suggestions that the claimed shortage of reserves is contrived to bring about price increases, Coastal has refused to guarantee adequate supply to individual companies which have offered to pay any price for a guaranteed adequate supply. The opinion was voiced, however, that this refusal might be an effort to maintain the illusion of a short supply in order to gain the increase from all customers. Coastal has promised more gas to those companies or authorities which will pay higher prices, but the additional amount promised would be, in LCRA terms, 'a mere drop in the bucket' to actual needs.

In an attempt to ascertain the precise status of Coastal's reserves, LCRA has employed an expert consultant from Washington, D.C., to examine Coastal's books. Texas Railroad Commission has ordered Coastal to open their books to this investigator.

The Friday morning meeting of LCRA and the representatives of the thirty Cities and eleven co-ops was recessed at 1 p.m. in order that the customers might consult and decide what to do about the new proposal. The meeting will reconvene Wednesday morning, May 30, at 9:30 a.m.

City Manager Don Petty and Mayor Ray Duren attended the meeting last Friday, but were uncertain whether they would attend the upcoming meeting Wednesday. At this meeting, the customer group will set forth the specifics of the 'temporary assistance' clause in the released statement. LCRA has stated that, should its customers fail to grant the increase, power would probably be curtailed up to 50 percent starting immediately, as the Authority has no other means of obtaining funds other than from its customers. Additional funds will be required to purchase oil to augment the expected shortage in natural gas supply from Coastal States.

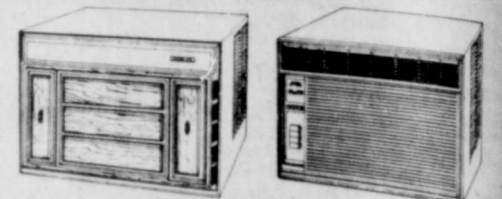

LCRA, Cities, Co-ops Still At Odds

The Lower Colorado River Authority last Wednesday refused to accept a proposal from the 30 cities and 11 cooperatives it served for a period of 90 days of financial assistance during the peak-load summer months of this year.

Representatives from Goldthwaite, City Manager Don Petty and Mayor Ray Duren, were among many others who are negotiating with the power company following announced natural gas cutbacks.

The offer of the cities and co-ops was rejected by the board of LCRA and then the board adopted a resolution approving the "excess fuel and power cost adjustment schedule" which had been proposed at an earlier meeting.

This move set aside existing contracts with the 30 municipalities and 11 cooperatives currently purchasing wholesale electric power from LCRA and clears the way for higher monthly rates.

In addition, the LCRA board appealed to its customers to voluntarily curtail power consumption by 30 percent in order to relieve the load on the system.

If consumption can be reduced, LCRA officials hope to be able to store more fuel oil reserves. Otherwise, LCRA may be faced with a deficiency of fuel oil before June 13. Increased gas supply from Coastal States Gas Producing Co., has been promised to LCRA through June 13; it is also the day the Texas Rail-

road Commission will meet for a hearing to determine natural gas priorities.

Most users will cooperate with LCRA in their appeal for conservation of electrical power. Every angle to conserve the use of electricity will be pursued.

Prior to the Wednesday board meeting, representatives of the 30 municipalities and 11 co-ops had drafted a seven point assistance plan which was designed to preserve the present contracts and temporarily aid LCRA until a long range plan could be formulated.

LCRA customers had sought unification with LCRA in light of the present financial difficulties being encountered by the power supplier.

The assistance plan rejected by LCRA called for a study to determine the amount of emergency fuel oil costs that LCRA can absorb from current revenues with anything over this amount being pro rated on a kilowatt hour basis to LCRA customers.

After August 25, LCRA would be required to present detailed financial reports so that the customers could determine a course of action following the 90 day period.

Many of the LCRA customers present at the meeting Wednesday are disturbed that LCRA board members ignored their assistance proposal and gave no explanation for its rejection. The LCRA action came de-

spite the fact that it had been informed last Wednesday morning that it will be getting some relief from its fuel shortage in the delivery of additional gas under the Texas Railroad Commission's ruling of last Friday, which raised priority of boiler fuel generating plants from the lowest place to the second highest.

Under the LCRA "excess fuel and power cost adjustment schedule" the ceiling rate provision in all existing contracts would be recinded as would be the fuel clause provision.

Instead, LCRA is proposing a separate adjustment, in the form of an additional charge or credit per kilowatt hour delivered should be made each month to all of its customers. This charge would be based on a calculation of excess fuel and power costs prepared by the Authority for the month.

Additional costs would include obtaining, storing, handling and using alternate fuels of any nature required for producing power during the fuel shortage period.

Should LCRA recover any of its "excess fuel and power costs" it would allow each customer a pro rata share.

LCRA had estimated that it would cost about \$8,000,000 to purchase the additional fuel and electricity it would need to furnish its customer demands during June, July, August and September.

Farmers Ask To Report Fuel Shortages To ASCS Offices

WASHINGTON — To help assure that farmers don't run short of fuel this season, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is asking farmers to:

+ Report any shortages to local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Offices, and

+ Use fuel conserving methods with tractors, trucks and other machine driven equipment.

The Department since February has been monitoring the farm fuel supply situation through its more than 2,800 ASCS County Offices. Any shortages are reported immediately through State ASCS Offices to Washington. In addition, a regular farm fuel situation report is prepared for Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz every Wednesday.

Any problems that arise are forwarded immediately to the Office of Oil and Gas (OOG), U. S. Department of the Interior, for solution under the voluntary allocation program. William E. Simon, Chairman of the President's Oil Policy Committee and Deputy Secretary of the Treasury, has pointed out that farmers and the food industry have priority in getting petroleum products. To assure continuous coordination with the OOG, ASCS has loaned it a professional employee.

ASCS said some suppliers have not been able to meet farm customers' needs fully. Officials said this is partly because inde-

pendent and cooperative fuel producers and marketers have not been able to obtain enough supplies.

The current planting period is critical to farm production. Officials involved do follow up on shortage reports to make certain that corrective action is being taken.

USDA has been working with the Departments of Treasury and the Interior to encourage farm fuel conservation practices. Farmers can conserve fuel use by keeping tractors tuned and using minimum tillage practices, for example.

USDA officials also urged farmers not to buy more fuel than they need in the near future. Officials stressed that equitable distribution is necessary if all farmers are to have enough fuel.

Public hearing will be held June 11-13 in Washington by the Treasury Department to see how the voluntary crude oil and product allocation program is working. Persons wishing to supply written testimony should contact Kenneth L. Dupuy, U. S. Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C. 20240, on or before 5 p.m. June 7.

Roadside Park Dedication Scheduled

The Texas State Highway Department will dedicate a roadside park honoring the memory of John George Berry Thursday, June 14, 1973 at 11 o'clock in the morning.

From 1924 to 1939 Mr. Berry was connected with the Texas Highway Department when that part of the State Government was acquiring land for the Texas system of highways and organizing the districts. He served first as supervisor of Mills County road construction and also supervised building and maintenance of road projects in Mills, Brown, Lampasas, Coryell and McClellan Counties.

He was active in Highway Beautification programs and took special interest in the planning and development of the Patterson Park on Prescott Creek in Mills County and the small park in the city limits of Goldthwaite at the junction of the Lampasas and San Saba Highways.

City Council Considers Energy Crisis

The Goldthwaite City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night, discussed the upcoming price increases as inevitable.

At several recent meetings in Austin, City Manager Don Petty and Mayor Ray Duren, listened to the plight of the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) and how the shortage of natural gas will necessitate the burning of fuel oil and therefore bring about a necessary increase in

the price the City pays LCRA for electricity, since fuel oil costs more to purchase, store and burn than does the natural gas.

LCRA, in early predictions, said that the wholesale price may rise as much as 60 percent. The power company serves 30 cities and 11 electric cooperatives in the state of Texas.

The city recently removed the 9 mills per kilowatt hour of elec-

tricity so that the power company could raise its rates.

Mayor Duren and the members of the Council did not know at the present time how much the customers of Goldthwaite would have to be increased in order for the City to stay in business. Even LCRA will not know for sure until meters are read at the end of the month. The City will then know how much of an increase is needed and it will be

noted on the next city electric billing.

The council voiced its concern for its customers, but also pointed out that its hands were tied, concerning the increase. Petty and Duren have been very much aware of the situation as it occurred in Austin.

Low Electric Rates

It was illustrated with a comparison chart that other cities have much higher electric rates than does the City of Goldthwaite. Brownwood, for example, would charge a residential customer over twice as much for a 1,000 KWH load of electricity in a month, than would the City. Goldthwaite customers have not had an increase in electrical rates since 1949.

In other council matters, John Mauney, operator of the Mauney Motel of Goldthwaite, asked the City for permission to install a radio transmission antenna atop the city water tower. He said he, along with several others in town, wanted to use the antenna to improve transmission and reception in Mills County. Wilkins Ambulance service of Goldthwaite will also be a user of the better facility. The council unanimously granted Mauney permission to construct the antenna. Kellis Landrum was present

at the meeting and asked the council to serve him with water at his proposed new building site at the North "Y" area of Goldthwaite. He cited some of the law concerning water districts and it appeared to him that the water district could serve water to people outside the boundaries of the water district if it saw fit. The council, however, said that the funds of the City of Goldthwaite could not be spent outside the city limits, which is where the building is to be constructed, sometime later this summer. The question is one of legality, pointed out Mayor Duren, and other sources would have to be consulted before an absolute ruling could be made. The city limits and the water district boundaries are not the same in all cases, with the Water District being the larger.

Civic Beautification

The council was in receipt of a letter from the Civic Beautification Committee of the Goldthwaite Garden Club asking the council for some action on the removal of junk cars from several residential locations in the city. The council said that proper pressures would be applied to try to get these areas cleaned up

Through the years he had participated in many projects for the development of Mills County. He was chairman of the building committee for the present Baptist Church

in Goldthwaite, which was rebuilt after the old church was destroyed by fire in 1948.

Until recently, he was an active member of the Texas Bar Association and in 1965 he and Mrs. Gilliam attended the International Bar Association meeting in London, England.


Mr. Gilliam is survived by two sons, Dr. James Neil Gilliam of Dallas and John A. Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, TEXAS — The 63rd Legislature's failure to agree on even a stopgap aid to education revision set off repeated demands from House members for a special session.

Speaker Price Daniel Jr. joined in the chorus, calling on the House Education Committee to "prepare, polish and refine" a school finance bill "for legislative action no later than Sept. 15."

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who holds the key to whether or not there is going to be a special session on anything, made clear — twice in writing — that he doesn't plan to call one.

Daniel said his instructions to the Education Committee were offered just in case Briscoe reconsiders his position.

The Committee will begin a series of hearings on school finance here June 18. More than 700 of the 1,149 school districts are in financial trouble, according to Committee chairman Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale.

Briscoe set in motion new studies to develop information for specific legislative proposals in 1975 to equalize educational finances and opportunities. A special session at this time would be "premature," said the Governor, since necessary data cannot be assembled for another two years.

Daniel and others claim the problem of financial inequities among the school districts already has been "studied to death," and that the House had the answer in H.B. 946 last month.

But Briscoe feels proposals before the Legislature this year would "have only added to the present system of programs and budget with no review of current spending or effectiveness." He said he hopes the new study can produce an "educational approach that we can afford (without new taxes), as well as one that will meet the needs of the future."

PETRY HONORED — The Governor, four former governors, legislators, office holders — who's who in Texas — honored Herbert C. Petry Jr., Carjizo Springs, last week for serving 18½ years as a State Highway Commissioner.

Petry, who goes off the Highway Commission at the end of this term, has served longer than any other Texan on that important governmental body.

While he was lauded for his public service, speakers encouraged his neighbor at Uvalde, Gov. Dolph Briscoe, to make a place for him in Texas public service — and a "balloon went up" for Petry as Director of Transportation for the United States.

Petry said "thousands of people had better jobs and better incomes in Texas as a result of the state's efforts to build an adequate highway system to attract new industries and encourage expansion of industries."

The 63rd Legislature came to grips with more monumental problems than the last.

A total of 688 bills was passed by the 63rd, compared with 1,067 by the 62nd in their 140-day regular session.

A total of 2,746 bills was introduced, together with 97 proposed constitutional amendments.

Three hundred Senate bills and 388 House bills were passed, as were two proposed amendments to the constitution introduced in the House and seven introduced in the Senate.

COURTS SPEAK — The State Supreme Court refused to back Gulf Oil Corporation's claim that its 45,771-acre lease in Crane County of the Permian Basin should be extended 4,661 days due to lost production resulting from Railroad Commission proration orders. The lease will expire July 14, 1975.

In other recent action, the Court held:

- A common law wife can't collect insurance benefits when she isn't using a man's name.
- An intermediate court was correct in concluding a car cannot be confiscated by the state for drug transportation unless the state can prove the charge beyond a reasonable doubt.
- An Air Force Village retirement home for officers and their dependents is not entitled to a property tax exemption since tenants were not taken in as charity cases exclusively.
- An off-duty cafeteria worker who broke her arm while welcoming other workers on pay day is eligible for job injury benefits.
- The owner of a \$65,000 home in Denton must spend \$1,500 to add brick, stone or stucco to conform with neighborhood requirements.
- The Court of Criminal Appeals held requiring movie patrons to have membership cards is no defense for showing obscene films.
- A district court hearing here ended in an oil company's agreeing to give priority to local consumers of liquefied petroleum gas products.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. John Hill declined to term state tuition equalization grants to private colleges unconstitutional, but advised caution in view of cases before the U. S. Supreme Court.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

- Non-protein sources of nitrogen may be included in the total percentage of crude protein in the guaranteed analysis of feeds required by Commercial Feed Control Act of 1957.
- An attempt by the legislature to appropriate funds for a longer term than two years is inoperative.

APPOINTMENTS — R. J. (Dick) Lindley Jr. of Houston was named to the board of directors of Texas Turnpike Authority, succeeding Cyril J. Smith of Houston.

Carroll Sullivant of Gainesville was reappointed to the North Texas State University Board of Regents.

Garland F. Smith of Weslaco was appointed to the board of directors of Rio Grande Valley Pollution Control Authority.

Justo L. Cisneros of Brownsville and Richard Martinez Jr. of McAllen were reappointed to the same authority board.

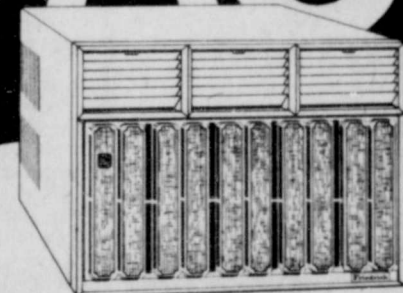

the consumer alert

STIN — One of the achievements about which our Legislature could boast at the end of its 1973 session was the passage of a really meaningful Consumer Protection Act. Attorney General's staff is very proud of that achievement, too, because we worked side by side with the Texas Consumer Association and the Texas Federation for four long months to help the sponsors pass the bill.

Believe that the consumer protection office had had to enforce the bill became effective on May 21 (when Governor Dolph signed it into law), was really inadequate. I felt that the state was giving only lip service to consumer protection until the new law, with penalties strong enough for a violator to feel substituted for the old law.

people are asking me, "Does the new law help the consumer?" Well, we take the position — which is reflected in this law — that everybody is a consumer. Businesses are consumers, and sales and service contracts made should be as free of fraud as the consumer agrees to you and I make.

The new law gives extra help to a consumer who complains of fraud or misrepresentation which occurred after May 20, 1973. It expands and clarifies the "dirty laundry list" of deceptive practices punishable by law.

It authorizes the trial court to order restitution to the consumer for the money he lost. It allows the State to obtain an injunction against anyone found liable under the consumer law, instead of delaying possibility of damages until an injunction has been violated. Obviously, that should be an added deterrent to fraud.

It gives the consumer not only the legal right, but the incentive, to file an individual suit, because he now will have an opportunity to recover triple damages, as well as court costs and attorney's fees, if he wins his case.

It gives a group of consumers the right to file a class action suit — if each has suffered damages amounting to \$10 or more. And if they win, they can recover actual damages, as well as court costs and attorney's fees.

It encourages the establishment of consumer protection offices by individual cities. And it gives the consumer the right to sue for a "close-to-home" help, because he can turn to his county district attorney, who now has enforcement jurisdiction concurrent with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division.

Under another law, the Legislature also guaranteed the maintenance of Attorney General's regional offices in El Paso, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas and Lubbock, and consumer protection assistance is available at each of these, as well as at my Austin office.

Your new consumer protection law offers all of that, and more, and at the same time, offers safeguards to assure that a well-meaning businessman is not the target of harassment suits, by awarding him court costs and attorney's fees if that is found to be the case. It also provides methods for dismissal of a suit, if the business wants to make an adjustment on the complaint.

If you have a complaint about consumer abuse which occurred prior to May 21, my Consumer Protection staff will help all they can, but they will be confined to enforcement under the old law.

If you have a problem which arises to May 21 or since, my first suggestion would be to contact the person with whom you made the contract, to see if it can't be settled amicably. Most merchants and service people do want to satisfy their customers. If that doesn't work, contact your county or district attorney, or the Attorney General's office in Austin, Dallas, Houston, Lubbock, El Paso or San Antonio.

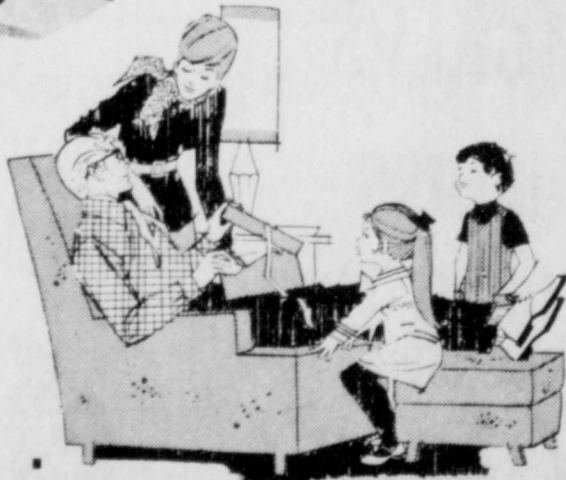
