The proposal was set forth to over 200 representatives of cities and co-ops Friday morning by Sim Gideon, General Manager of LCRA. In an attempt to gain immediate approval of the new terms, Gideon said: When your house is on fire you don't stand around discussing ways the fire could have been prevented or why it started, you get the fire put out as quickly as possible in order to limit the damage.' The 'fire, in this case, was a telegram received by LCRA from Coastal States Gas Producing Company on May 15 stating that gas curtailments in the future would be more frequent, lengthier and broader than in the past eight

According to LCRA Legal Consultant Clint Small, this notification was the first provable breech of contract by Coastal, although it followed eight months of curtailments which the producers claimed were caused by mechanical failures or 'acts of God.' In the May 15 telegram, no such claims were made, the reasons given as a shortage in reserve supply. As a result of this breech, LCRA intends to file suit for damages against Coastal, but Small indicated that such a suit could be years in litigation, and even when settled would not


aid the power shortage.
Immediately upon receiving the May 15 telegram, LCRA appealed to the Texas Railroad Commis-sion for a higher priority rating during this critical period. LCRA servicing power plants for pri-marily domestic use, had held a 'D' priority, which meant that its customers received gas only after A. B and C priority companies had been served. Friday night, the Railroad Commission raised the LCRA's rating to 'B' priority pending the Commis-sion's scheduled meeting with Coastal States and the power com-panies on June 13. It is not clear at this time what effect the new priority rating will have

on available gas supplies. What has caused this sudden gas shortage? Is it really so sudden? And is there really a

shortage? According to Clint Small, Coastal States stated in its yearreport in June, 1971, that it had had its best year in history and had ample gas reserves. In June, 1972, Coastal reported a new high in dedicated gas reserves - a record eleven billion, 600 million cubic feet. Yet just four months later - in Oct. curtailments commenced which lasted through the winter, culminating in the May 15 declaration that reserves were depleted to the point that a 50 percent curtailment would probably continue through the summer

Where did those record reserves go in four short months? Coastal claims - and other customers confirm - that gas supply to all of their customers has been equally curtailed. Mayor Campbell of Lampasas, spokesman for the thirty Central Texas Cities, asked LCRA if they had personally checked to see if

AUSTIN, TEXAS - The 63rd Legislature wound down at midnight Monday (May 28) with opinions sharply divided as to how much or how little it accomp-

While new reform rules slowed down consideration of bills, much major legislation was passed, of which had failed previously.

Both houses completed work on a record \$9.7 billion, taxfree budget four days before adjournment, then with money left over, began to fashion an emergency aid bill for "poor" school

The big job of revising school finance formulas, as anticipated was left for a future session following additional studies and careful weighing of property

Legislative redistricting was another job left for the future possibly under court direction. Lawmakers did manage to agree on a competitive auto insurance rate bill - something they couldn't do in a special session devoted to that purpose

alone last September-October. They also came to terms on far-reaching revision of the penal code - first in 117 years - although the House bogged down on a court reform consitutional

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. managed to get some of his reform measures, including open eetings law strengthening and better access to public records, finally passed. Agreement on a tough code of ethics was difficult.

While they were at it, legislators asked again for a pay raise - to \$15,000 a year - and a constitutional amendment permitting them to meet in annual sessions to better handle an ever-

increasing work load. Whether or not they are called into special session this year, they will be back next January to have a try at revising the state

constitution.
NEWSMEN'S MEASURE DIES IN CONFERENCE - The "free flow of information" measure called the newsmen's privilege bill - died in a conference committee. Compromise language that might have been acceptable both the House and would have made it a "qualified" privilege for newsmen - and it ooked for a time that the conference committee was going to

vote it out. Publishers, editors and broadcasters told their legislators that they preferred "no privilege at if it could not be "unqualified" - and the conference com mittee members let it "R.I.P."

Representatives of the Texas Joint Media Committee - memexpressed disappointment that the Senate would not accept the original House bill - which included no qualification except in cases of "libel or right of pri-

vacy" law suits. Some felt the Watergate case had taken the "heat off the press" and fewer subpeonas would be issued in the future to obtain information from newsman.

GAS RATE SUIT FILED -Atty. Gen. John Hill filed the first big test case - against Exxon Corporation - to recover full market value of royalty gas produced on state lands for the school fund and University of Texas.

The suit alleges the state's price is not limited to amounts agreed to in contracts, nor to the low ceiling price set by Fed-

eral Power Commission. Hill has estimated many millions of dollars rest on outcome of the litigation. Current FPC ceiling price is in some cases less than 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet of gas, while actual market value is estimated at 45 cents per 1,000 cubic feet in recent

The suit seeks to compel Exxon to pay the current market value alternatively, to allow the state to take its royalty gas for use or resale. The state claims it is due not less than \$500.00 from Exxon. and many other producers are expected to be made defendants



There are literally thousands of builders who can be de-

Too often, homeowners have been fast-talked into unwanted, unneeded and unsatisfactory "im provements," only to find that the so-called contractor has flown the coop, leaving the homeowner with expensive, long-term installment note which had been sold

to a financing company.

In the legitimate construction trade, these home improvements fly-by-nights are known as the "hit-and-run variety." Both the Texas Association of Home Builders and the National Home Improvement Council provide adrice telling you what to expect in dealing with a reputable builder, and how to avoid involvements with the type who offices

only out of the trunk of his car. Through complaints handled by nembers of the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division staff, we have learned that he "hit-and-run" operators prefer to zero in on low-income neighborhoods, but may turn up anywhere.

They know that the folks who find money hard to come by have great pride in home ownership. And they play on the pride.

The typical gambit is to show the man or lady of the house a photograph of a pretty cottage finished with fancy siding. If he protests that he doesn't have the funds to remodel, the salesman counters with an "easy-payment" installment proposal. If the customer still resists, saying that he already is overloaded with payments, he may be tempted with plan to "consolidate" his bills and the improvement cost under one installment note.

One easy way to tell the unscrupulous home improvements salesman from the contractor you can count on is his insistence on getting you to sign on the dotted line right away.

A fast signing with one of the hit-and-run fellows usually leads to heartbreak and heavy expenses. In one case, a home-owner realized several months after accepting a "siding" job that the material used was so thin, it bent on touch. He re-

fused to pay any more installments on the \$4,000-plus note, only to learn that a holder-indue-course defense against his complaints. Since the papers he had signed included a mortgage on his house, his refusal to pay any more resulted in his home being sold out from under By then, the fly-by-night

The best advise for avoiding

that type of problem is:

1) Make a double check on anybody who is selling "home improvements" door to door. Re member that auto or pickup truck has four wheels. Look to see if it has Texas license plates.

2) If the salesman asks you to go with him to a notary, or pulls out a notary seal, he probably is asking you to mortgage your property to him as security on the note. Are you sure that is what you want to do?

3) Under the Federal Truthin-Lending law, anyone planning to take a second mortgage as security has to disclose to the buyer in writing that he has the right to change his mind within 72 hours after signing. If the purchaser is not given that notice, he may rescind the contract at

4) Under the Texas Consumer Credit Code, the contractor must obtain from the consumer who signs a retail installment transaction a certificate of completion, imprinted with these words: WARNING TO BUYER - Do not sign this certificate until all services have been satisfactorily performed and materials supplied or goods received and found

satisfactory.' And, the financial institution who buys the note must give the consumer written warning that he has purchased the note, and the buyer has 30 days in which to file a complaint about the goods or service.







LCRA, Cities, Co-ops Still At Odds

Authority last Wednesday refused 30 cities and 11 cooperatives it served for a period of 90 days of financial assistance during the peak-load summer months

of this year. Representatives from Goldthwaite, City Manager Don Petty and Mayor Ray Duren, were among many others who are negotiating with the power company following announced natural gas cutbacks.

The offer of the cities and co-ops was rejected by the board of LCRA and then the board adopted a resolution approving the "excess fuel and power cost adjustment schedule" which had been proposed at an earlier meet-

This move set aside existing contracts with the 30 municipalities and 11 cooperatives currently purchasing wholesale electric power from LCRA and clears the

way for higher monthly rates. In addition, the LCRA board appealed to its customers to voluntarily curtail power consump-

tion by 30 percent in order to relieve the load on the system. If consumption can be reduced, LCRA officials hope to be able to store more fuel oil reserves. Otherwise, LCRA may be faced with a deficiency of fuel oil before June 13. Increased gas supply from Coastal States Gas Producing Co., has been promised to LCRA through June 13:

Instead, LCRA is proposing a separate adjustment, in the form of an additional charge or credit per kilowatt hour delivered should be made each month to all of its customers. This charge would be based on a calculation of excess fuel and power costs prepared by the Authority for the

Additional costs would include obtaining, storing, handling and using alternate fuels of any nature required for producing power during the fuel shortage period. Should LCRA recover any of

its "excess fuel and power costs" it would allow each customer a pro rata share.

LCRA had estimated that it would cost about \$8,000,000 to purchase the additional fuel and electricity it would need to furnish its customer demands during June, July, August and September.

short of fuel this season, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (US DA) is asking farmers to:

+ Report any shortages to local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Offices, and + Use fuel conserving methods

with wacters, trucks and other machine driven equipment.
The Department since Febru-

ary has been monitoring the farm fuel supply situation through its more than 2,800 ASCS County Offices. Any shortages are reported immediately through State ASCS Offices to Washington. In addition, a regular farm fuel situation report is prepared for Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz every Wednesday.

Any problems that arise are forwarded immediately to the Office of Oil and Gas (OOG), U. S. Department of the Interior, for solution under the voluntary allocation program. William E. Simon, Chairman of the President's Oil Policy Committee and Deputy Secretary of the Treasury, has pointed out that farmers and the food industry have priority in getting petroleum products. To assure continuous co-ordination with the OOG, ASCS

has loaned it a professional em-ASCS said some suppliers have not been able to meet farm customers' needs fully. Officials said this is partly because indebeen able to obtain enough sup-

The current planting period is critical to farm production. Of-ficials involved do follow ups on shortage reports to make certain that corrective action is being taken.

USDA has been working with the Departments of Treasury and the Interior to encourage farm fuel conservation practices. Farmers can conserve fuel use by keeping tractors tuned and using minimum tillage practices, for

USDA officials also urged farmers not to buy more fuel Officials stressed that equitable distribution is necessary if all

farmers are to have enough fuel. Public hearing will be held June 11-13 in Washington by the Treasury Department to see how the voluntary crude oil and product allocation program is working. Persons wishing to supply written testimony should contact Kenneth L. Dupuy, U. S. Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C. 20240, on or before 5 p.m.

Speaker Price Daniel Jr. joined in the chorus, calling on the House Education Committee to 'prepare, polish and refine" a school finance bill "for legislative action no later than Sept.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who holds the key to whether or not there going to be a special session on anything, made clear — twice in writing — that he doesn't plan

Daniel said his instructions to the Education Committee were offered just in case Briscoe reconsiders his position.

The Committee will begin a series of hearings on school finance here June 18. More than 700 of the 1,149 school districts in financial trouble, according to Committee chairman Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale.

Briscoe set in motion new studies to develop information for specific legislative proposals in 1975 to equalize educational finances and opportunities. A speical session at this time would "premature," said the Governor, since necessary data cannot be assembled for another two

Daniel and others claim the problem of financial inequities among the school districts already has been "studied to death," and that the House had the answer in H.B. 946 last month.

But Briscoe feels proposals before the Legislature this year would "have only added to the present system of programs and budget with no review of current nding or effectiveness." said he hopes the new study can produce an "educational ap-proach that we can afford (without new taxes), as well as one that will meet the needs of the




