

Missing Man **Found Dead** Wednesday

Bovina Police Chief Leon Saddler and Sheriff Gary Blair organized search teams on Tuesday, September 5, to look for Warren Scott Paterson who was reported by family members as missing since Sunday night.

The missing person report was filed on Tuesday morning. Paterson, 35, was said to have left his residence Sunday night on foot dressed in shorts and a T-shirt.

Law enforcement officers from the Sheriff's department, Friona and Farwell police departments, Texas Highway Patrol, Sheriff's Posse and other individual volunteers gathered at the Bovina police station to organize the search of Bovina's abandoned buildings, alleys, under bridges, etc.

The group divided into teams and conducted a foot search of Bovina for several hours with no results.

On Wednesday afternoon, September 6, Bovina city employee Zeferino Villarreal was checking on some equipment on the east side of the sewer lake when he discovered Paterson's body near a tree in the area.

Sheriff's deputies and Bovina firemen were called to the scene. Justice of the Peace Pam Haseloff ruled the death a suicide and no autopsy was ordered. Burial arrangements for Mr. Paterson were pending at press time.

An internet friend recently sent me a Paul Harvey piece entitled 'Dirt Roads." I think you'll like this one: What's mainly wrong with society today is that too many

Dirt Roads have been paved. There's not a problem in America today, crime, drugs, education, divorce, delinquency, that wouldn't be remedied if we just had more Dirt Roads, because Dirt Roads give

character. People who live at the end of Dirt Roads learn early on that life is a bumpy ride. It can jar you right down to your teeth sometimes, but it's worth it, if at the end is home --- a loving spouse, happy kids, and a dog.

We wouldn't have near the trouble with our educational system if our kids got their exercise walking a Dirt Road with other kids, from whom they learn how to get along. There was less crime in our streets before they were paved. Criminals didn't walk two dusty miles to rob or rape, if they knew they'd be welcomed by five barking dogs and a double barrel shotgun.

And there wre no drive by shootings. Our values were better when our roads were worse! People did not worship their cars more than their kids, and motorists were more courteous. They didn't tailgate by riding the bumper or the guy in front would choke you with dust and bust your winshield with rocks.

Dirt Roads taught patience. Dirst Roads were environmentally friendly. You didn't hop in your car for a quart of milk, you walked to the barn for your milk. For your mail, you walked to the mail box.

What if it rained and the Dirt Road got washed out? That was the best part. Then you stayed home and had some family time, roasted marshmallows and popped popcorn and had pony rides on Daddy's shoulders --- and you learned how

to make prettier quilts than anybody. At the end of Dirt Roads, you soon learned that bad words

tasted like soap. Most paved roads just lead to trouble. Dirt Roads more likely lead to a fishing creek or a swimming hole. At the end of a Dirt Road, the only time we ever locked our car was in August, because if we didn't, some neighbor would fill it with

too much zucchini. At the end of a Dirt Road, there was always extra springtime income, from when city dudes would get stuck and you'd have to hitch up a team (or a tractor) and pull them out. Usually you got a dollar --- always you got a new friend --down at the end of a Dirt Road. --- Paul Harvey

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Tx. Boll Weevil Program Is Hard At Work In Co.

BY BECKY LONDON Have you driven by a cotton field lately and wondered what those green Dixie cup-like objects are up on those sticks? Or how about those little orange tents? You wonder who those

folks are driving around in those white Dodge and Chevrolet pickups are? Well, it all has to do with suspected pink boll worms

at this point. Eradiation Zone, as we are referred to by officials at the main headquarters in Abilene, has 58 seasonal workers and nine full-time employees.

There are five field unit supervisors and a district supervisor who have offices in Friona which oversees operations in Parmer, Deaf Smith, Castro and Randall counties. They are Leane Hardage, Jack Mims, James Novak, Brenda Clark, Mary Paterson and Wade Wilson, all from Parmer County and

Bailey County. The seasonal employees have a position starting at planting time until there is a killing frost or until all the cotton has been stripped for the year. They drive around in TBWEF pickups and count boll weevils in the green traps located on the various farms.

Anywhere from zero to about fifty weevils can be found in a trap during the weekly checks. That data is entered into a hand-held computer by the workers and is downloaded at the Friona

main office. The data is used to determine if the field should be sprayed.

Rhodes Crop Care of Bovina, B & W Aerial Spraying of Dimmitt and Day Spraying of Levelland, working from Dimmitt, are contracted to spray the various cotton fields to rid them of boll weevils.

The pink boll worm traps

are placed every 640 acres; whereas the boll weevil traps are placed every 10th of a mile or every 20th of a mile in places that the boll weevil can "over-winter" or hibernate. So far no pink boll worms have been detected in this area.

TBWEF plans to stay in Parmer County for at least three more years, if all goes according to plans.

"They have been a big boost to the work force in Friona and have benefitted area businesses as well, where there's workers, there's money to be spent," said one Friona businessman.

Helping secure the TBWEF office for Friona and Parmer County was the offer by the Friona Economic Development Committee to find an office and pay for

some remodelling.

The Parmer County headquarters for TBWEF is the old Malouf building just off Highway 60 in Friona.
