Priddy and Saylor both chalked up wins in last Thurs-day's night double header.


Priddy defeated Bank 12 to 10 and Saylor out scored Boykin 9 to 1.

Governor Dolph Briscoe Friday announced his approval of an Office of Child Development grant of \$2 8.0 in supplemental funds to Hill Country Community Action Association (CAA) in San Saba for operation of the agency's Part Day Head State program. Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, the grant is effective for the program year Jan. 1, 1973, through Dec. 31,1973, and supplements a \$50grant the agency received 600 effective Jan. 1, 1973. Governor Briscoe said the grant will assist Hill Country CAA to operate one Part Day class for 20 children in the Llano General Services Center. Classes for some 60 children are currently operated by the San Saba Goldthwaite Independent and

School Districts. The program provides educational, psychological, nutritional. social, medical and dental services to preschool children from economically disadvantaged families.

AUSTIN, TEXAS - The last of 19 public hearings by the Tex. Constitution Revision Commission were held in Waco and Austin last week

It was the largest meeting with 34 out of 37 commissioners attending. Witnesses in Austin before the full commission and committees recommendations for made changes in the 98-year-old docu-

ment. Speakers, legislators and commission members agreed that it is going to be a tough job to write a new constitution that will be approved by the voters of Tex. 'You must write an intelligent document that can be understood by the man on the street," one

speaker said. Representative Bill Clayton, Spring Lake, reviewed his constitutional revision plan that was introduced in the last legislature. Clayton said that we need a short, concise document similar to the federal constitution that would also leave the present constitution intact until changed by twothirds vote of the legislature. "There's going to be some knockdown, drag-out battles over sacred cows in the present constitution." Right-to-work, dedicated funds, the judicial article state government financing, public school financing are some of the controversial topics which must be considered by the commission and then the legislature. Bill Gray, Texas Manu-facturers Association, spoke for

Other speakers during the final two days of public hearings in Austin and Waco spoke for: re-moval of sections that are statutory in nature, continuation of pay-as-you-go plan, stronger county government, fewer elected officials and more appointed officials, more power for the governor, life appointment for all judges, and many other major changes in the existing constitu-



Because there just isn't enough gas to go around, the Texas Railroad Commission has set priorities to determine how the available natural gas is to be divided among various classes of users. However, these priorities do not increase the amount of gas for homes and stores and industry and power plantsthey only designate the users who will get first call on the available gas.

On June 21 the Commission temporarily raised LCRA's thermal power plants to a higher priority. They will take another look at the situation at hearings starting July 9.

The Commission stated in the June 21 Order that "Power plant customers will remain in this category only so long as they solicit efforts of their individual customers to conserve electricity, and during the time as they are actively developing the use of alternative fuels."

To keep the priority rating in effect, the Commission insists that we con-

about the 30% reduction curtailing the use of electricity in homes, stores, schools, churches, factories, and on farms in the LCRA's service area-that means you and your neighbors!

So far, with everyone's cooperation, LCRA has been able to meet your demands for electricity without any "brownouts" or "blackouts." But the summer so far has been relatively cool. Curtailments of gas deliveries are expected to begin as the temperature rises.

And the upper and middle Colorado River has not received the rains that the rest of the State has. As a result, the water used for hydroelectric generation is dwindling rapidly!

Again, we strongly urge all persons using electricity from LCRA to eliminate all unnecessary uses. Below are some ways you can reduce your air conditioning use and still stay cool.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN - If you ask the average family physician to help you solve the problem of overweight, he's likely to respond with enthusiastic encouragement and a diet program tailored to your individual health needs. But he won't guarantee any specific weight loss, because he mows that each body type has

its own way of metabolizing. That doesn't satisfy the crav-ing some people have for "instant beauty," so they are quickly at-tracted to the advertisements which claim, "Lose 20 pounds in 20 days.'

Many become disillusioned when they don't shed the pounds like the "before" and "after" model whose photographs were shown in the ad.

But wait a minute: Were those "before" and "after" pictures really of the same person? Or, was one photo taken in poor lighting while the subject slumped to increase the girth of abdomen, and the other photo taken under glamor conditions-with tummy sucked in, chin up, and chest out?

The Attorney General's Con-sumer Protection Division has received many complaints about operations of some "health studios" which specialize in claims of an almost-instant metamorphosis for the overweight person.

Through our own investiga-tions, we have found that sometimes the photographs are misleading. And other deceptive trade

practices by some health spa operators are being uncovered in state and federal complaint follow-ups.

Owners of legitimately operated health salons are cooperating in the investigations. And there are many of these establishments which do serve a useful and healthful purpose. After all, the average per-

son-especially, the average overweight person-lacks the in-tense discipline required to monitor his or her eating habits, and stick to an exacting program of exercise. Any they can use a little "group therapy" to keep them inspired in the war against unwanted pounds.

Unfortunately, they are some-times prey to the type of operator who would promise them anything, and too often, the result is a flattened wallet, instead of a trim figure.
