Lunches

The State of Texas has new guidelines for schools to follow for free or reduced price of their lunches.

The Goldthwaite Independent School District will give each student the first day of school a lunch and an application blank for application of free or reduced lunches.

If a family meets the income requirements, they should apply for a lunch. Everyone will be notified if they are accepted. The application must have a list of the number of people in the family, family income and a few other items besides the signed application. They will be kept on file for adult purposes at the office of the Superintendent.

Dr. Gilbert Davis reminds all parents that the best meals possible will be served at the high school and elementary school cafeterias.

Davis encourages parents to take their children to eat at the school lunchrooms or go home for lunch since well balanced meals are so important to each child. Davis invites all parents to come by and eat in the school cafeteria anytime.

School Registration Announced

Goldthwaite Public Schools will open their doors August 13th for the 1973-74 school year. The first week August 13th through August 17th will be in-service week for teachers and student registration.

On Monday teachers will have general workday; Tuesday, at Hamilton workshop; Wednesday a program will be presented to the teachers by the Central Texas Council of Governments Thursday and Friday will be workdays for the teachers.

Registration for students will be in the following order: August 15, 9:00 to 11:00 seniors; August 16, 9:00 to 3:00 juniors; August 17, 9:00 to 11:00 sophomores; August 18, 9:00 to 3:00 freshmen. All elementary students and students in grades seven and eight

will continue Friday and Saturday night at the same time. Jim Wells, FFA Advisor and Jim McCoy, president of the Rodeo Association, have announced that the top cowboy and top cowgirl performers from the FFA Invitational Rodeos held in the Central Texas area during the 1973 season will be competing in the Gold-Tex finals.

Events scheduled for the three nights performances include bareback bronc riding, tiedown calf roping, ribbon roping, calf riding, girls barrel race, and bull riding, and wild horse race. A Rodeo Queens Contest will be held in conjunction with the rodeo. FFA Sweethearts from the area schools will participate in the contest. The Rodeo Association offers a \$100.00 scholarship to the young lady chosen queen. These young ladies will be honored at a tea on Saturday afternoon and compete in a horsemanship demonstration at the arena prior to Saturday's performance.

Members of the Goldthwaite FFA Chapter will operate the concession stand at the Arena and have drinks, chips, candy and sandwiches for everyone's enjoyment.

City Council Okays Rate Increase, Discusses Dump

The Goldthwaite City Council set in gear a rate increase for electrical customers here that will take effect with the next meter reading, about August 20th.

The increase, a unanimous decision of the council, comes as a result of 'sharp increases in materials and particularly lab-

or', City Manager Don Petty explained.

Also the city faces an 'inevitable' increase from the Lower Colorado River Authority, the source of the city's electrical supply, Petty added.

LCRA has been relieved slightly recently by Railroad Commission rulings, giving the non-profit organization more natural gas to use to generate electricity and eliminate usage of the higher priced diesel fuel.

The rate increase to local customers, averaging some 30 per cent, is the first increase the city has ever pushed across to customers since the city began in the utility business in the 1940's.

The Council also issued another plea to customers to try to conserve electricity. The city has been turning off street lights in an effort to set the pace in the conservation effort.

Prices of the lunches were raised due to the increase in prices of groceries. The lunchrooms are non-profit organizations and all money received for lunches is spent for and in lunchrooms.

The board also hired Mrs. David Smith as aid for elementary school and Mrs. Jesse Hammond as aid for the high school.

"Most important of all," Bridget said, "was learning ways to put citizenship action in our own community."

The Citizenship Short Course is conducted by the National 4-H Foundation in support of the program of the Cooperative Extension Service. You can learn more about 4-H by calling 648-2650.

Cattle producers in Mills County are urged to attend a meeting in Brownwood on August 20th regarding upcoming new regulations on brucellosis testing.

The meeting will be in the ASU's Office Conference Room located on 510 East Lee Street and will begin at 8 p.m.

A veterinarian with the Texas Animal Health Commission will be on to inform producers of pending changes in the previous brucellosis regulations. Comments and feedback are being invited from producers and statewide hearing on the new regulations will be held in Austin on September 18th.

The brucellosis testing program is expected to begin October and is designed to eliminate cattle disease from Texas, allowing the state to be declared Certified Brucellosis Free.

For all cattle producers to benefit from the new testing program, it is important that they become familiar with the regulations. Thus the upcoming meeting on August 20th will provide an opportunity for producers to learn about the new plans for brucellosis testing.

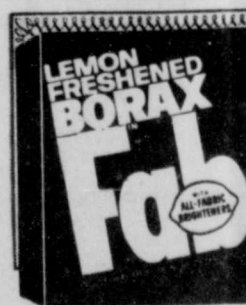

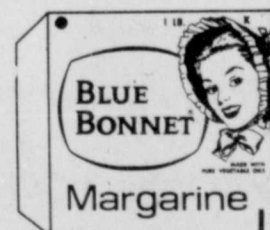

AUSTIN, TEX. — Rewriting the nearly-century-old Texas constitution is turning out to be a stickier job than many figured. The Constitutional Revision Commission went into overtime at a recent three-day meeting near here, but still failed to complete its agenda and slated another August 10-11 cleanup meeting.

Meanwhile, legislative planners for the 1974 Constitutional Convention, at which lawmakers will actually propose a revised constitution, disagree on routine stage-setting.

House members suggested a new voting machine (which was later ordered) and new desks for delegates. Senate planning committee spokesmen indicated they would be satisfied to bring their own desks over from across the capitol rotunda and set them up in the House middle aisle.

The revision panel agreed:

- + To keep the provision for real property taxation in the constitution for state purposes, but leave it to the legislature to write separate laws governing personal property taxation.
- + To retain the state highway users gasoline tax, with three-fourths of the revenue earmarked for highway building and one-fourth for public schools. A provision was made for abolishing the highway fund levy on state-wide referendum with support of two-thirds of the legislature.
- + To keep the Permanent University Fund and Permanent School funds in the constitution. The university fund would be altered somewhat to include present and future branches of the University of Texas and Texas A & M University.
- + To add to the constitution a guarantee of "equitable" financial support for all schools and districts rich and poor.
- + To retain as constitutional elected members of the executive branch only the governor, lieutenant governor and attorney general, with the legislature empowered to decide if the comptroller, treasurer, secretary of state, land commissioner and railroad commission should be elected or appointed by the governor.

cover cost of litigation and award of damages growing out of official acts.

- + The Amusement Machine Commission has power to promulgate regulations to cover the number of machines owned by the holder of a permit to sell alcoholic beverages for on-premises consumption.
- + Qualifications for Texas Air Control Board membership are set by Article 4477-5, Vernon's Civil Statutes. Conduct in office will be governed in part after January 1 by provisions of the 1973 ethics law, and members could be removed from office for violations.
- + The State Commission for the Blind is not authorized to require employees to deposit with it salary warrants issued to them or to charge a fee to employees for making the advances.
- + A district attorney can be removed only under special statutes and not by an ex parte order of district courts. A county attorney (in some counties) will serve during temporary disqualification or absence.
- + A court reporter who prepares the narration of the facts from a hearing on a writ of habeas corpus is entitled to be compensated for preparation by the state or county.

Halbouny, Houston; Dr. J. R. Maxfield Jr., Dallas; Dr. John J. McKetta Jr., Austin; Sam Naifeh, Orange; and P. H. Robinson, Houston.

G. R. Stanford of Houston is deputy executive director of the Texas Offshore Terminal Commission.

Sens. W. E. Snelson of Midland and Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells were appointed to the Legislative Budget Board. Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston was appointed by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby to succeed former Sen. Charles Herring of Austin as chairman of the Senate Jurisprudence Committee.

Hol H. Hood of Austin was appointed state Firemen's Pension Commissioner, succeeding Mrs. Marie Winters of Austin who resigned.

William Lyons of Lufkin has joined Lieutenant Governor Hobby's staff.

Thomas Black of Austin is a new assistant attorney general.

'HOUSES' CLOSED — Two land mark bawdy houses — in La Grange and Sealy — were closed by local officials on request of state officials.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, Atty. Gen. John Hill and Department of Public Safety Director Wilson E. Speir sought action after reports aired by a Houston television station.

Briscoe acknowledged he had received calls from La Grange area citizens both supporting and opposing the action. He said he had been told he would be petitioned by a group who want the famed 'Chicken Ranch' reopened.

Hill and Speir said they found no link with organized crime in operation of the houses, but Attorney General Hill added: "It is an illegal operation. The local officials were requested to take action. They took it."

RATE RAISE EXPECTED — An increase in some workmen's compensation insurance rates is due under a new law increasing benefits for those injured or killed in job accidents.

An average 19.5 per cent hike in the rates employers must pay for the coverage is anticipated under a State Insurance Board staff proposal, which would become effective if approved between September 1 and September 15.

Rates would have gone up 22.8 per cent in the absence of the federal anti-inflation program, a Board actuary indicated.

Under a new law effective September, an injured worker can get up to a maximum of \$63 a week in benefits, an increase from the present \$49 top.

AG OPINIONS — A national bank does not come under definition of governmental bodies or institutions which are required to comply with the new open records act, Attorney General Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

- + A Laredo fireman injured in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, while on duty is entitled to benefits under the state Firemen's Relief and Retirement Law.
- + State government branches and their services (excepting political subdivisions but including hospitals and colleges) are covered under the Texas Unemployment Act.
- + Subordinated capital notes of the Harlingen National Bank are part of its indebtedness and are not to be considered capital in determining value of shares for taxation.
- + School trustees are authorized to purchase insurance to

**\$246,424 Grant
Approved For
CTCOG Region**

AUSTIN — Governor Dolph Briscoe today approved two grants totaling \$246,424 for improving law enforcement and crime prevention in the region served by Central Texas Council of Governments, Belton.

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act.

One award, \$237,290, will be used by Central Texas COG to implement the regional law enforcement radio network in the seven-county area. The new system will use all high-band equipment geared for the special problems of the locality.

It is expected to help reduce police response time and minimize maintenance problems.

Counties served by CTCOG are Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills and San Saba.

Coryell County was awarded a \$9,134 grant for improvement of juvenile probation services in the 52nd Judicial District, comprising Coryell, Bosque, Hamilton and Comanche counties. The project will be under the direction of the district judge.

The Central Texas applications were among 52, for funding of more than four million dollars, considered by the CJJC Executive Committee July 13.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN — For a long time now, we have grown used to taking for granted many of the supplies and services which have been considered luxuries in other parts of the world. We Texans have tried to conquer our climate and our geography, and invest most of our incomes to ward achievement of the American dream — the good life. We travel long distances on our fine highways in vehicles powered by fuel which costs about one-third of what a European has to spend for gasoline. When the temperature drops to near freezing, we light up our fires and furnaces and settle into what we call "room temperature," while in some other parts of the world, families close off sections of their houses to conserve on fuel. When summer comes, and its heat gets oppressive, we flick a switch on a fan or an air conditioner, and keep up a working pace most other residents of near-tropical climates would never dream of attempting. We have looked upon power, especially electrical power, as our "servant." Because it has been cheap and plentiful, we have had some help in the form of toasters, vacuum cleaners, washers, driers, dishwashers, refrigerators and many other work-saving appliances. And, we have become used to the awesome experience of watching historical events as they happen via our televisions. The "horn of plenty" isn't as plentiful as we thought. We are having to face a national fact that there is an energy shortage that oil and gas are in short supply, in Texas and elsewhere, and that even electrical power is threatened when the fossil fuels which are used to generate it run low.

If you're among those tens of thousands who've visited the State Capitol already this summer, you're aware that the very real effects of a fuel shortage are apparent in Austin. The sculptured dome of the Capitol isn't visible after dark, because the State of Texas, like other Austin consumers, is trying to trim its energy use down to prevent a "brown-out" or "black-out" in the capital city.

When you come to the Attorney General's office or other state buildings, you will notice that hall lights have been turned off, and office lights are out, as long as daylight will do. This is true also in department stores. And throughout the city, air conditioners are running at 78 degrees instead of the usual 72, because it has been shown that there is a 40-percent savings of fuel in that six-degree difference. Many filling station operators here as in other parts of the state will tell you that they are out of certain grades of gasoline, so you take what you can get. You start thinking twice before taking a car trip — even to the shopping center. And there is talk of "car pools" coming back in vogue.

This is just one city. San Antonio, south of here, has the same condition, as do others. A solution to the energy crisis may be a long time in coming. Some scientists estimate that it may take two decades or more to develop and bring into use a dependable and adequate source of fuel to replace what we have had. While we are certain there are ways to increase exploration and production of oil and gas and to employ energy potentials which have not been tested beyond the laboratories of men's minds, today's consumer is facing a crucial challenge in conserving what is at hand. Here are a few suggestions for energy savings:

- Do not take unnecessary trips in your fuel-burning vehicle. A wise consumer can see that that not only will help to save energy, but conserve money as fuel prices rise.
- When you do take to the highway, watch the gas tank indicator, and get the tank filled at the half-way mark, so you won't take a chance of running out.
- Turn off the television, radio

and reading lights when you leave a room.

- Avoid running heavy appliances (dishwashers, dryers, and so on) during peak power demand periods — about 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Check refrigerator and freezer doors for air tightness, and remind the children (again) not to leave them open often.
- Remember that lights, ovens and hot water heaters create heat, making extra work for your cooling system.
- Use your cooling system efficiently.

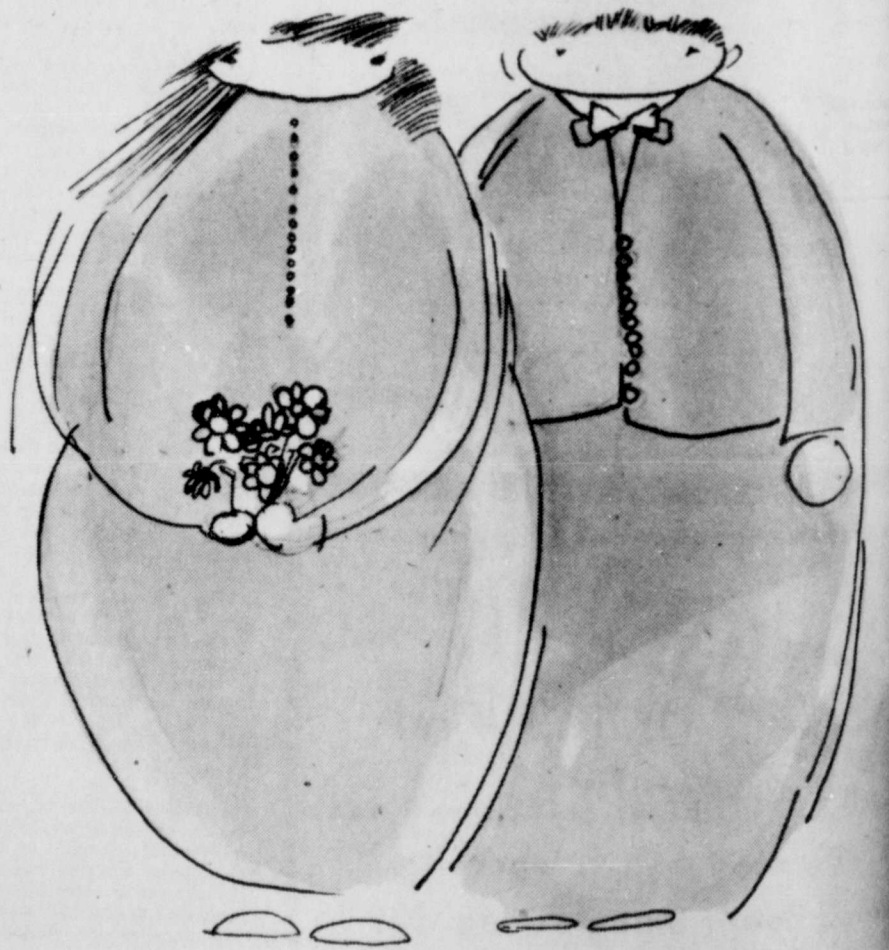
