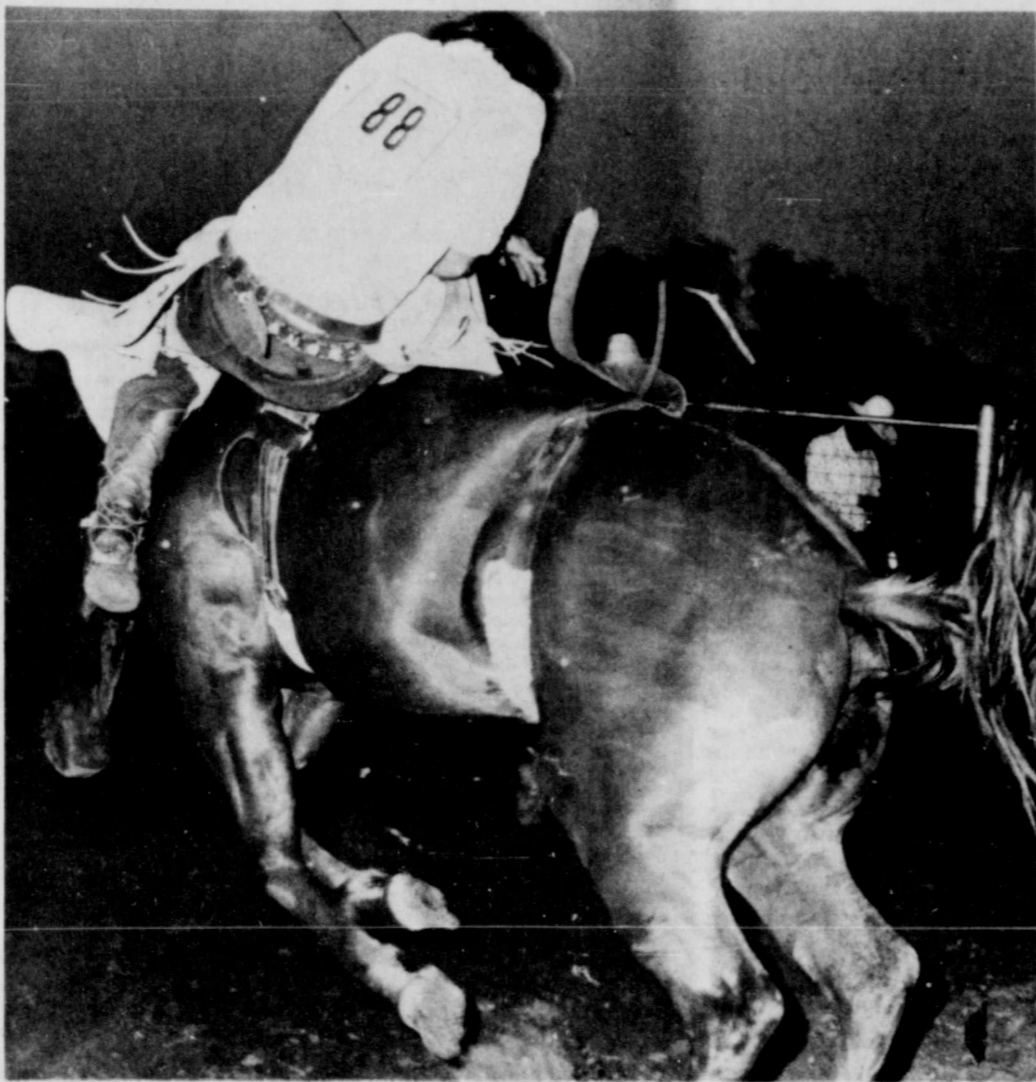
Turkey will be given to the

## 730 Students Enrolled In County

Superintendent Gilbert Davis and newly assigned principal Ray Standley announced that a total of 427 students are enrolled in the Goldthwaite Schools for the new fall school term. Classes started this past Monday.

Of the number, 207 are enrolled in elementary school and 220 are enrolled in the seventh through twelfth grades.

During the 1972-73 school year Goldthwaite enrolled 450 students compared to the new enrollment this year of only 427.

83 students enrolled. Forty-six registered at the High School and 37 in the elementary grades.

Priddy school enrollment is the same for both school years, 83.

**MULLIN**

Sixty-nine elementary students between the grades of first and sixth and 41 students between the grades of seventh and twelfth enrolled in the Mullin Schools for

the fall term according to A. R. Whisenant, superintendent.

Mullin has a decrease this year in student enrollment, since the preceding total was 117.

Enrollment for the 1973-74 school term is the same as that of last year's, 730 students.

## Livestock Owners Urged To Watch For Screwworm Cases

MISSISSIPPI, August 15 — With the season of the year for screwworm infestation in Texas livestock fast approaching, officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program urge extreme caution on the part of all livestock owners.

This is particularly true in the Brazos, Edwards Plateau, Hill Country areas where the shearing season for sheep is reaching its annual peak, says Dr. J. E. Novy, acting veterinarian-in-charge of the screwworm program.

"We had an increase in the number of cases from this region during the past week," reports Novy. Owners of newly shorn animals are urged to spray their animals with either KORLAN, or DDT, both approved by USDA, to protect against the possibility of screwworm infestations in the areas and scratches which are a side-effect of the shearing operation.

Novy, Irion, Menard and San Antonio counties each recorded a first case of screwworm infestation in 1973 during the week ending August 11. These counties reported for four of the 140 counties recorded in 24 Texas counties during the week. This compares to a like number of counties totaling 136 cases the preceding week.

Due to the high incidence of cases in one six-county region, officials have changed methods of treating infected premises in that area. All of Kenedy, Jim Hogg and Brooks counties, as well as the northeast corner of Garza County, and the northern part of both Willacy and Hidalgo counties are being treated as one "hot-spot."

Usual procedure, when samples submitted to the Screwworm Eradication Program are determined to be screwworm infestations, is to "hot-spot" the infested premise. "Hot-spotting" involves dropping 100,000 sterile flies per week on the premise and in the immediate vicinity over a period of at least three weeks.

To help monitor effect of this treatment, it is important for livestock owners in the area to continue to submit samples of all larvae found in wounds so incidence of cases can be recorded.

"We will continue to contact ranchers in the area, and the free service of spraying their animals with Coral provided by the Texas Animal Health Commission will also continue," says Novy. He encourages all owners of animals with confirmed screwworm cases to have their animals sprayed.

A check of sites of screwworm infestations in cattle reported during the past week indicates 29 per cent were in the navels of newborn calves. Dr. Novy says it is worth noting that the other 71 per cent were in external wounds, most of which would have been prevented by a regular spraying program.

He further cautions: This is the time of year when ear ticks are most active. Novy warns livestock owners to be particularly watchful for screwworm infestation in tick-caused wounds in the ear. In the unending effort to help livestock owners meet the threat posed by the screwworm fly, either a state or federal animal health official will contact each owner of livestock known to be infested with screwworms.

## Fourteen Year Old Youth Dies In One-Car Accident

Ronnie Wayne Hill, 14, of Mullin was fatally injured in a one-car accident one mile west of Mullin at 12:50 a. m. Sunday.

The boy was a passenger in a 1969 Camero driven by Michael Stamps, 18, of Mullin, stationed at Fort Hood. The car, traveling east when Stamps lost control, skidded off on the left side of the road, throwing Hill out of the car and then the car rolled over onto its top and onto the boy.

According to investigating patrolman Ronnie Rush, Stamps and Roger Atkins, a back seat passenger in the car, were uninjured.

Hill was taken by Wilkins ambulance to Childress Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Services for Hill were conducted Tuesday, August 21, 1973 at 10:00 a. m. in the Wil-

kins Funeral Chapel with burial in the Oakview Cemetery. Rev. Richard Beckham officiated. Wilkins Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include his father and step-mother Mr. and Mrs. Marvin A. Hill, Mullin; his mother and step-father Mr. and Mrs. Harold N. **STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights*

AUSTIN, Tex. — Dozens of log-jammed major highway projects will move forward now that President Nixon has signed the three-year \$20 billion federal highway act.

In addition to funds for mass transit, the act also provides \$2 billion for safety projects. State Highway Engineer Luther DeBerry said replacement of narrow bridges is high on the priority list. Hazardous intersections and rail crossings will also be eliminated as facilities are designed with modern built-in safety features.

'This act does not solve all our money problems, but even though it is not everything we need here in Texas, it is a good act,' said DeBerry.

Highway trust revenues will remain as they have been in the past during fiscal 1974. Up to \$200 million in urban funds can be used either for roads or purchase of buses in fiscal 1975. By 1976, all or part of the urban funds may be used for highway buses or fixed rail transit with State Highway Department concurrence.

July highway bid lettings were cancelled due to shortage of federal funds. Although the federal act's passage will allow the state to proceed with vital projects, DeBerry warned a backlog will remain. Texas has been financing some work with leftover money from previous acts of Congress and with state funds. Texas is among states which sends the federal government more tax revenue from gasoline and vehicle accessory sales taxes than is returned.

Interstate highway construction is financed with 90 per cent highway trust fund money and other federal construction gets 70 per cent aid. The new act provides money for bicycle trails and metropolitan transportation studies. It also permits building the San Antonio North Expressway with state funds (if lawsuits don't stop it again).

**AG RULES** — Youthful offenders must be released from correctional institutions for delinquent acts when they reach 18, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other opinions concerning the new 18-year-old majority rights law, Hill concluded:

+ Persons 18 years of age can no longer collect survivor's benefits as a result of death of fathers who are law enforcement officers or firemen.

+ Parents of retarded youths 18 and over are no longer obligated to pay cost of their care in state institutions.

+ Eligibility to run for office is extended to 18 year olds, along with the obligation to serve on juries.

+ Parental consent is no longer necessary for boys of 18 to obtain marriage licenses.

+ Students whose parents live out of state can qualify for resident tuition rates at Texas colleges and universities at age 18 if they meet the year's residency and gainful employment requirements.

+ Persons who are married, regardless of age, have the status of adults.

+ The late President Lyndon Johnson's birthday August 27 definitively replaces Jefferson Davis' birthday June 3 as an official state holiday.

+ State contributions to employees' insurance coverage can not exceed \$12.50 per month.

+ A new constitutional amendment providing tax exemptions for disabled veterans and their widows and surviving children is not effective without enabling legislation, and the legislation enacted in anticipation of the amendment's adoption is invalid.

**OIL ALLOWABLE HELD AT 100 PER CENT** — For the 18th

straight month, the Railroad Commission set the oil production allowable for September at 100 per cent.

Meanwhile, Commission Chairman Jim Langdon warned the nation it is facing a 'very critical situation'.

The Federal Power Commission, said Langdon, is predicting this winter as compared with 1972. FPC asked all states to survey winter requirements, supplies available and possible substitute fuels which will be needed to cope with shortages.

Texas' production rate has dropped 26,000 barrels a day, in spite of the 100 per cent production allowable, Langdon said.

Exceptions to the 100 per cent allowable are East Texas Field (86 per cent); Kelly-Snyder (84 per cent) and Tom O'Connor Field (70 per cent).

**CREDIT INSURANCE HEARING SET** — The State Board of Insurance has scheduled a September 13 hearing on credit insurance rates.

A survey indicates the rates may be 20 per cent too high, according to Board Chairman Joe Christie.

If this is true, said Christie, they must come down.

Credit insurance is designed to insure payment of loans for installment plan purchases in event the borrower dies, becomes disabled or is otherwise unable to meet his payments.

It is not supposed to be a profit-making proposition for the seller or creditor, said Christie, but to provide protection. Consumers in three-fifths of the other states pay lower premiums for the protection than Texans do, according to the regulatory agency head. Texans pay 75 cents per \$100 indebtedness per year for credit insurance.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Bill Ward of Weatherford, Joe Ned Dean of Groveton and Charles Griggs of Sweetwater were named to the Texas Civil Judicial Council by Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

Rep. Bill Healy of Paducah and Rep. Fred Head of Troup were appointed by Speaker Price Daniel Jr. to the Legislative Budget Board. At the same time, Daniel designated Reps. Ed Harris of Galveston, Hilary Doran of Del Rio, Mickey Leland of Houston, Dean Cobb of Dumas, Matt Garcia of San Antonio, Joe Spurlock of Fort Worth, Carl Parker of Port Arthur, Walt Parker of Denton, Bob Maloney of Dallas and Jim Vecchio of Grand Prairie to the Texas Legislative Council which supervises legislative research and bill drafting.

Briscoe picked E. S. Emerson of San Antonio to serve on Texas Commission on Alcoholism and John Artero of Victoria on the State Board of Morticians.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby created four regional Citizens' Advisory Councils on Water Resources, and Texas Water Rights Commission added Kenneth Charles Quinn of Conroe to its Houston staff to monitor Houston area water districts.

**CHILD CARE INVESTIGATION URGED** — Texas and Illinois attorneys general formed a task force to investigate conditions and allegations of child abuse at eight child-care institutions in the state.

Also a three-man Illinois investigating team is checking the placement of hundreds of children from that state in Texas private institutions. Illinois Atty. Gen. William Scott said he is concerned as to why Illinois with a wealth of first class educational facilities sent 800 children to Texas for institutionalization.

Scott said he wants to find out if Illinois state child care officials were 'wined and dined' to encourage them to send youngsters to Texas.

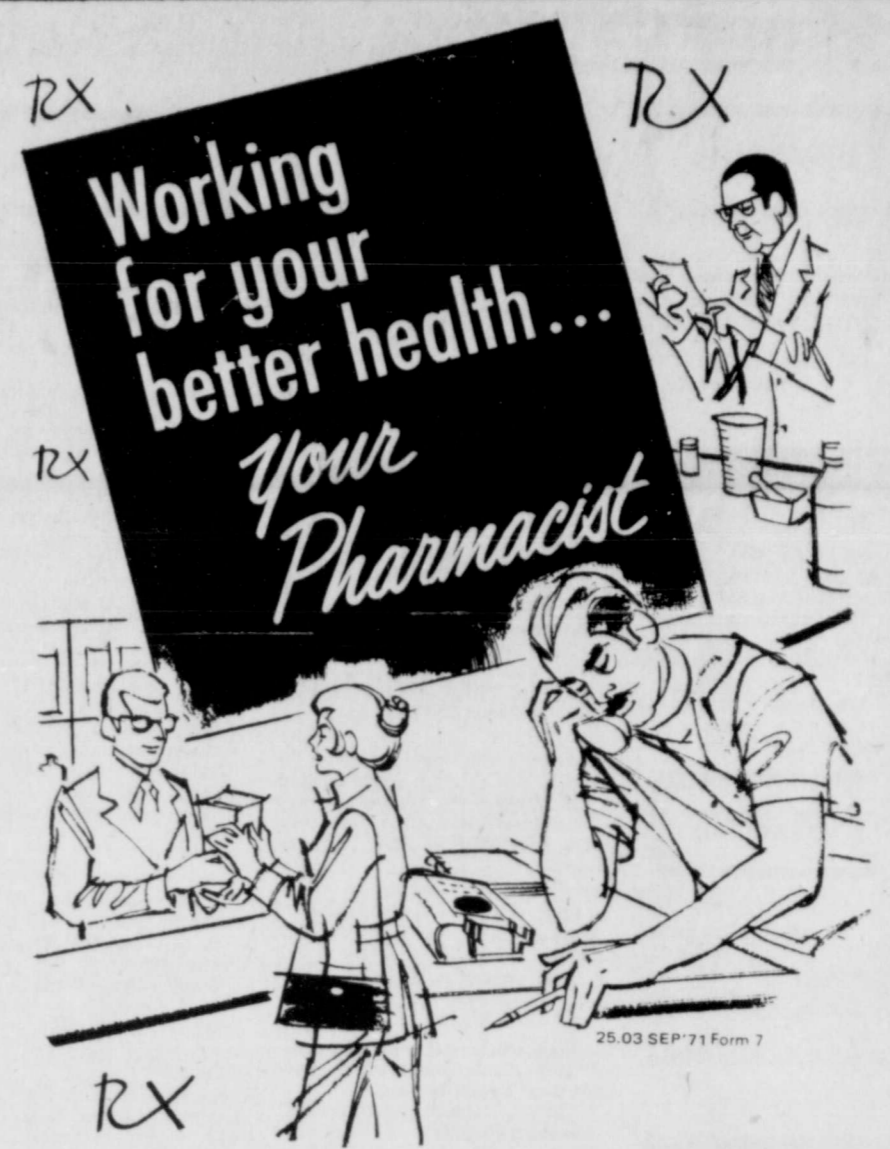

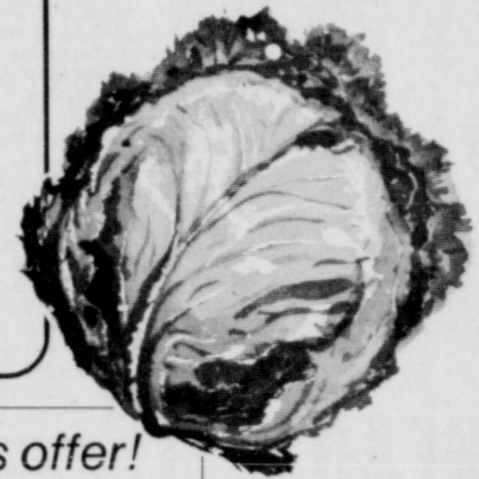

AN OLD MAN WRITES TO HIS YOUNG FRIEND — NO AGE GAP
