## Eagles First Scrimmage Hard Hitting, Enthusiastic

The Goldthwaite Eagle Varsity team racked up some hard hitting and displayed a great deal of enthusiasm in the scrimmage against the AA Burnet Bulldogs last Friday night on Eagle field, according to statement by assigned head coach Gene Auldridge.

However, the hard hitting and enthusiasm fell short of the two touchdowns scored by the Bulldogs as the Eagles remained scoreless throughout the game.

A number of mistakes were made by the Goldthwaite squad which Coach Auldridge attributes to the fact the boys are experiencing playing in new positions under a totally new coaching environment.

"Assessing of the ball and blocking in the line were the main weak points on the Eagle team during the scrimmage. The offensive line showed signs of weakness while the defensive line made a good showing at the Friday night game.

This Friday the varsity and B squads will scrimmage Ranger there at 7 p. m.

"The scrimmage against Ranger should be more of an evenly matched game since they are a Class A school and the boys are more our size," commented Coach Auldridge.

Fans of the Eagles are urged to attend the scrimmage at 7 p. m. Friday and let the Eagles know they are being backed by the community.

The Eagles are preparing for the season opener which will be played against their 'ole rival' San Saba at San Saba September 7.

Other coaches working with Auldridge are Danny Spradley and Fred Fisher.

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## Labor Day Holiday Threatens Forty-two Texans' Lives

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today warned that 42 persons may lose their lives in Texas traffic during the long Labor Day weekend.

The holiday officially begins at 8 p. m. Friday, August 31 and continues through midnight Monday, September 3.

Speir said the DPS is making preparations to cope with increased holiday travel. "Every available Department of Public Safety patrolman will be on duty during this three day weekend, utilizing all resources we can put to hands on to prevent accidents," he added.

The DPS director noted that special attention will be paid to hazardous traffic violations normally associated with a high holiday death toll. Patrolmen will be especially watchful for such offenses as speeding, driving while drinking, improper passing and driving on the wrong side of the road.

In addition to stepped-up enforcement activities, the DPS will also work with local law enforcement agencies and the news media of Texas to conduct an accident prevention program called "Operation Motorcade."

"Operation Motorcade," a series of seminars and pertinent facts will be compiled three times daily and released to the news media. Notation will be made as to where and why accidents are happening.

Speir called the holiday program "a life and death struggle for the lives of our citizens," and he urged every motorist to cooperate in the effort.

Mills County State Bank will be closed for the day also.

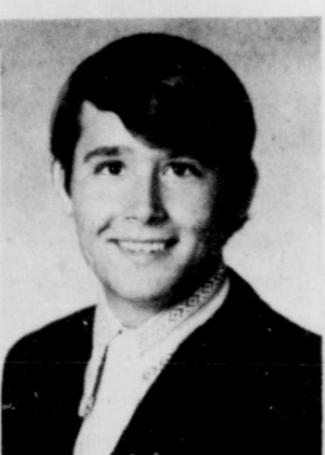
Eagle Copy Needed Early

Enjoying the special barbecue dinner held at Mills County Park this past Saturday night was approximately one hundred Goldthwaite High School football players and coaches and their families and fans.

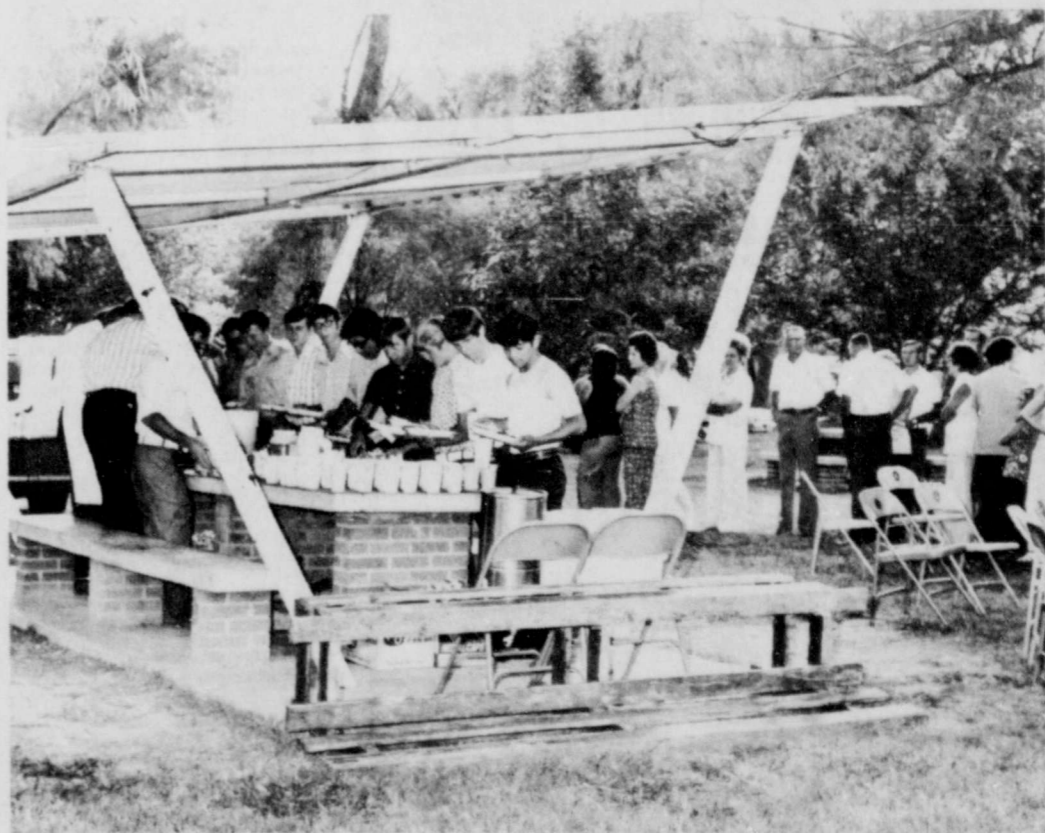
The affair is sponsored annually by the Quarterback Club and er and Danny Spradley introduced the Eagle players.

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## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

**AUSTIN, Tex.** — The Texas Constitutional Revision Commission made key decisions last week on finance and legislative sections of the state's basic laws.

It will formulate recommendations September 6-8 on judiciary and education provisions. Sections on local government and general provisions will be reviewed September 13-15.

Final action of the 37-member body, which is studying changes needed in the state's basic laws, is scheduled September 27-29.

Meanwhile, a legislative planning committee for the January-May 1974 constitutional convention of lawmakers is moving ahead with preparations for the historic gathering.

The planners have voted to spend \$33,938 on new chairs and desks to place in the House of Representatives chamber during the convention. Chairs, costing \$165 apiece, will be replicas of those used by delegates to the 1876 constitutional convention. The desks, considerably more economical, will be made by state prison inmates at a cost of \$22.50 each.

The revision commission practiced some economies (of language) in shortening the recommended general legislative tax power section of the constitution from the present lengthy statement of limits and exemptions to the following:

"Taxes shall be levied and collected by general law for public purposes only, and shall be equal and uniform."

The 181 legislators who will be delegates to the convention will convene here December 6-8 for a briefing on details of the commission's recommendations. The convention will open January 8.

**CHILD CARE RULES TIGHTENED** — The State Board of Public Welfare is toughening requirements for licensing child-care institutions and has named former State Rep. Randy Pendleton of Andrews as temporary head of a licensing division.

Pendleton said the new division will shift role of the Welfare Department from urging facilities to comply with the law to active enforcement of the law and policing of facilities.

The Board also named a new six-member advisory council (with three alternate members) on child care administration to assist in checking credentials of personnel at child care facilities.

The legislature this year required administrators to be licensed by January 1.

**FARM PRODUCTION HIGHS SET** — Texas farmers and livestock raisers are setting new production levels this year, Agriculture Commissioner John White reported.

Records, according to White, are being tied or broken for wheat, cotton, grain sorghum, corn, peanuts, soybeans, oats, barley, rye and rice. Texas is first in the nation in cotton and grain sorghum and fourth in wheat production.

Texas cattle on feed total 2.3 million, said White, about 700,000 more than the second-ranking state, Iowa, and an increase of nine per cent over last year. White said cattle producers marketed more cattle during June and July than they did a year ago, proving that they are not holding back because of the price freeze on beef.

White predicted that removal of the beef price ceiling will not cause skyrocketing of meat prices and may even help bring them down.

He said there are warning signs consumer resistance to the rising prices of food products is stiffening.

said some non-rate-regulated companies, including Lloyds and reciprocals, offer unrealistically low rates to prime risks with the intention of having ultimate liability assumed by a rate-regulated company.

Christie said the 'brother-in-law' deals can result only in higher rates for the majority of policyholders.

'A farce has slowly but surely been perpetrated when a large company either forms a Lloyds, or even rents one by one scheme or another, for the purpose of evading this state's regulatory laws,' Christie said.

**TOURISM GAINS** — Tourism gained modestly through July with attendance at attractions up one per cent and highway tourist bureau services up nearly five per cent for the first seven months of 1973.

Forty-seven attractions reported 29.7 million visitors, a gain of 300,000 over January-July, 1972.

**DOCUMENTS DEMANDED** — House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. called on the Department of Public Safety to release to him and the public documents on a House committee vending machine industry probe, held confidential for six years.

Daniel directed Department of Public Safety Director Wilson E. Speir to deliver the tapes and other records Monday (August 27) and called a news conference at the same time.

He said the open meetings law, House rules and the new public access to information act require free public access to government documents except in most-extraordinary circumstances.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Gov. Dolph Briscoe appointed Amarillo District Judge Mary Lou Robinson associate justice of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals.

Gilbert J. Pena has been named assistant chief of the law enforcement division in Atty. Gen. John Hill's office.

Jane Hickie of Austin is new chairperson of the Texas Women's Political Caucus.

Governor Briscoe appointed John Artero of Victoria to the State Board of Morticians, succeeding Charles L. Villasenor of Austin.

The Governor appointed William P. Ratliff of Haskell 39th district judge.

**SHORT SNORTS**

The Texas Democratic party will put on a show of its own during the September 15 national party fund-raising telethon (NHC) and expects to get about \$150,000 in operating money for the effort.

Texas Public Interest Research Group (TexPirg) charged 'sexual discrimination' in hiring practices of three government agencies.

The State Highway Department has moved for dismissal of an Austin federal district court injunction blocking the San Antonio North Expressway.

DPS predicts 42 will lose their lives during the Labor Day weekend in traffic accidents.

The cotton stalk destruction deadline in the Lower Rio Grande Valley has been extended until midnight September 30 from August 31.

The constitutional convention planning committee met with Louisiana convention delegates for advice on preparations for the historic January 1974 revision effort.

A 19-and-a-half per cent increase in workmen's compensation insurance rates has been ordered, effective September 1.

**GUARD STRENGTHENED** — Texas for the first time in six years will field a full Army National Guard division November 1.

New Guard troop allocations will raise the state's authorized Army Guard strength to 17,700 from the present level of 16,000 (with 17,377 now authorized).

Reactivation of the 49th Armored Division of the Texas ANG was announced at Camp Mabry headquarters here recently. The "Lone Star" armored division will have three brigades strategically located over the state — the First in Dallas, the Second in Fort Worth and the Third in San Antonio. In addition, the 36th Airborne Brigade at Houston will become a part of an active Army airborne division in event of mobilization.

The 49th Division will contain 21 battalions. Summer training will be at Fort Hood, largest armor training camp.

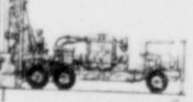

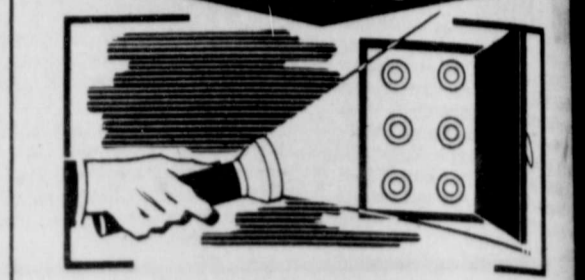

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**  
Obstructing an Officer

Without any doubt, punching a policeman in the nose would amount to the crime of "obstructing an officer." But what about the assorted lesser confrontations that arise daily between citizen and constable? Where does the law draw the line?

Generally speaking, you may be guilty of this offense even if you do not resort to any force at all. Take the case of a youthful demonstrator who "went limp" when the police ordered him to climb into a patrol wagon. Charged later with obstructing an officer, he argued that he could not be punished for simply doing nothing.

In another case, while a man was being placed under arrest at a tavern, his wife informed the police—with vigor—that they had no right to take him away. She did not interfere physically with the arrest. Nor did she use threatening language.

Haled into court for obstructing an officer, the woman was found not guilty of any offense. The court said:  
"Policemen are no more exempt from criticism than cabinet ministers."

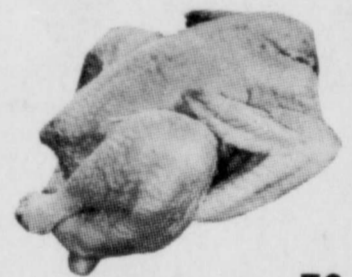

## Extension Highlights

Aren't knits great? But, for them to last longer they need a little special care. Here are some quick tips on the care of knits: When washing knits use a delicate setting if your washer is so equipped. Use warm to medium water for only six to ten minutes at low agitation.

Use lowest spin speed to avoid wrinkles when loading the dryer. Try to keep light weight fabrics separate from heavier; mixing causes over-drying and shrinkage of synthetics.

Keep them apart from things that have metal hooks, clips, etc. that might snag and damage knits.

Be sure all zippers are zipped and hooks are hooked before putting in the dryer.

Turn knits inside out to prevent damage. Dyeing

washable knits - they should be drycleaned every 5th or 6th cleaning for best shape retention. For those who want to do as much of their own garment care as possible at home, here's the most important step of all: FOLLOW THE LABEL! When a knit fabric is snagged, don't cut off the snag! Pull it through to the other side of the fabric. This repair is very simple with a needle threader which often comes with a package of needles. Push the wiry end of the threader through the knit fabric from the wrong side at exactly the point where the snag is on the right side. Catch the snag in the wiry portion of the threader and slip it back through to the wrong side of the fabric.

## MOURNING DOVE - WHITE-WINGED DOVE Hunting Regulations 1973-74

OPEN SEASONS

**MOURNING DOVES: North Zone**—September 1 thru October 14, 1973, and January 5 thru January 20, 1974, except in the Trans-Pecos Regulatory District where the winter season is January 5 thru January 15, 1974.

**MOURNING DOVES: South Zone**—September 22 thru November 4, 1973, and January 5 thru January 20, 1974, except in those counties having a white-winged dove season where it is September 1 and 2, September 8 and 9 and September 22 thru October 31, 1973, and January 5 thru January 20, 1974.

**WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Shaded Zone**—September 1 and 2 and September 8 and 9, 1973.

**DAILY BAG LIMITS**

**MOURNING DOVES**  
Daily Bag Limit-10. Possession Limit-20

**WHITE-WINGED DOVES**  
Daily Bag Limit-10. Possession Limit-20

**NOTE:** Bag limits of both white-winged and mourning doves may be taken during the open white-winged season.

**SHOOTING HOURS:**  
Mourning and White-winged Doves:  
12 noon to sunset.

**SPECIAL NOTES:**

- No hunting permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, within corporate city limits or from public roads or road rights of way.
- The retention of one fully-feathered wing on dressed doves is required in those counties having a white-winged dove season when both mourning and white-winged doves may be taken. This requirement also applies when doves are imported from Mexico or any foreign country.
- Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

Persons leasing land for hunting must obtain license from the Parks and Wildlife Department in Brownwood or make application for license from Game Warden locally, before any compensation for hunting rights may be received.

## From the County Agent

Webworms are becoming a greater problem each day. Several field trips showed the presence of webworms in an increasing number during the past few days. Webs produced by the worm are familiar to most homeowners.

The adult of the webworm is a white moth which may have black to dark brown spots on the forewings. It has a wingspan of about 1 inch.

The larvae are pale yellow and spotted with black. They normally attain a length of 1 inch when full grown and are covered with long black and white hairs.

The insect overwinters as a pupa in a lightly woven cocoon in debris on soil or under bark. In spring, adults emerge and lay masses of greenish-white eggs on leaves. Caterpillars hatching from the eggs feed on leaves in colonies under webs they construct. After feeding for a month to 6 weeks, larvae crawl down the tree and pupate in loose cocoons in debris, under loose bark or in loose soil. Adults appear during summer and deposit eggs for the second generation. Larvae of this generation feed extensively until fall, crawl down the tree and pupate for winter.

Pecan trees are most often and most seriously attacked by webworms. The control recommendations for these pests on pecan trees include trimming branches of light infestation and burning them. Under heavy infestations in pecans, spray application is recommended. The two chemical sprays recommended are: Endosulfan (1 lb. of 50 per cent mixed

with 100 gallons of water) and Toxaphene (5 lb. of 40 per cent mixed with 100 gallons of water). There are grazing restrictions on both these chemicals and precaution should be taken not to use toxaphene near rivers, streams or lakes due to the likelihood of fish kill. Do not graze livestock in areas treated with endosulfan and do not apply it after shuck split. Do not allow dairy animals or animals within 6 weeks of slaughter to graze in areas treated with toxaphene. The chemicals should be applied as foliar application to prevent excessive leaf loss.

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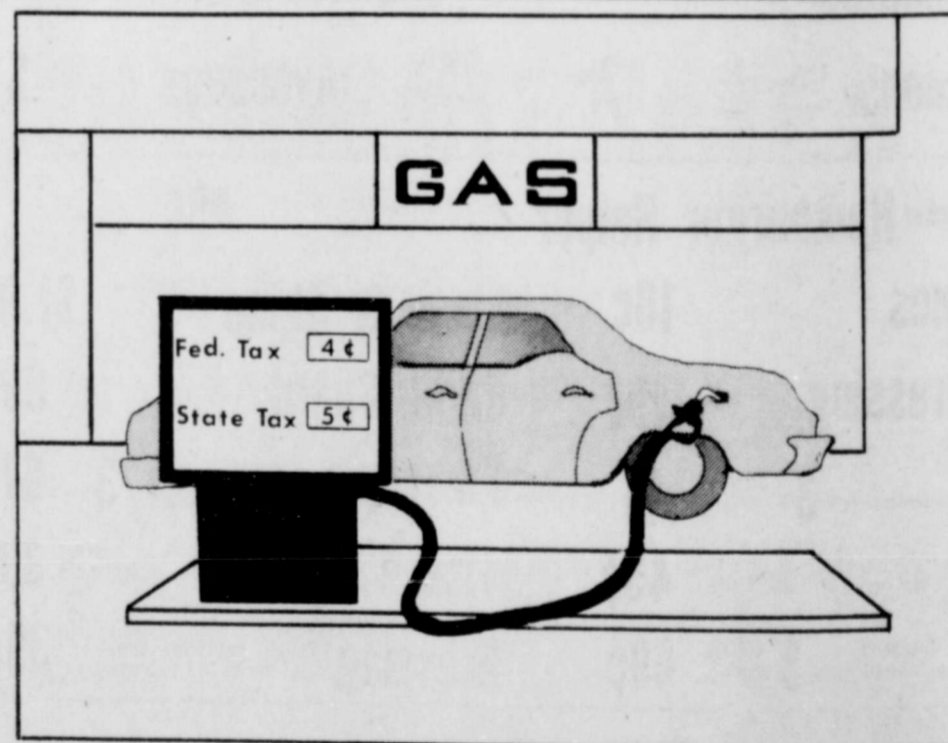

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## HIGHWAYS FOR NICKELS?

"Fill 'er up with regular."
