Mills County Schools Add New Program

With this year the Mills County Schools are offering a new program for all children who have communication problems. This is the first of a series of programs called "Plan A".

The program has been set up in its effort to provide possible instruction for the special needs of children. By next year, as soon as possible, a resource teacher to work with children with academic problems will be hired. Mrs. Floyd Manuel will be assigned to work in the Mills County Schools. She is in the process of "screening" (identifying pupils who need her help)

and will have classes set up soon in each school. Mrs. Manuel, a graduate of Goldthwaite High School, attended Southwestern and North Texas State Universities and has a degree from Howard Payne College. She took her training in speech, hearing and language therapy at Texas Christian University. She is a member of the Texas Speech and Hearing Association and the public schools division of the American Speech and Hearing Association. She worked as a speech therapist in the Texas State Hospital for the Deaf and Blind in Dallas. Six were at Copperas Cove and two at San Saba.

Youth Confined To Jail Following High Speed Chase

A nineteen year old Fort Hood soldier is now confined to the Mills County Jail following a cross-country chase last Friday night. Donald Gene Masten was sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$300 by County Judge Cecil Egger. Mills County Sheriff Horace Brooks attempted to stop Masten four miles south of Star for a routine investigation, however Masten failed to answer Brooks' red light and continued at a high rate of speed through Goldthwaite then through Lometa. He was stopped nine miles southwest of Lometa just inside the Mills County line. He was also fined in Justice of the Peace E. H. Thorpe's court

for speeding - \$50, running a red light in Goldthwaite - \$25 and driving on the wrong side of the highway - \$25. Masten was driving a 1965 Chevrolet and was alone in the vehicle.

Blood Plan To Be Sponsored By Lions Club

The Goldthwaite Lions Club has taken on a project of meeting our blood replacement demands. A blood drive committee has been selected to work with other organizations in sponsoring a community blood replacement program. Charles Studer was selected as Chairman. Studer explained that a community replacement plan works as follows: "Should someone in this area need blood, it is taken from a blood bank and at a selected time during the year, that blood bank will send a mobile unit to this area at which time the blood may be replaced by a relative or a friend," he said. The Committee agreed to work with the non-profit organizations of Blood Services of San Angelo and Scott and White Blood Bank of Temple. Presently, the ratio of blood used by Mills Counties is about 2 to 1. Blood Services provides two pints and Scott and White provides one pint of every three pints used. The Lions will sponsor two blood drives per year with the Scott and White mobile unit coming every third time, or once every eighteen months. Blood Services will send their mobile unit the other two times, or once every eighteen months. The Lions in this area have always been ready to meet the needs on any blood demand and Studer hopes that everyone will become interested in this plan and take an active part. He also stated that when a drive is made for Mills County, the details will be given in this paper.

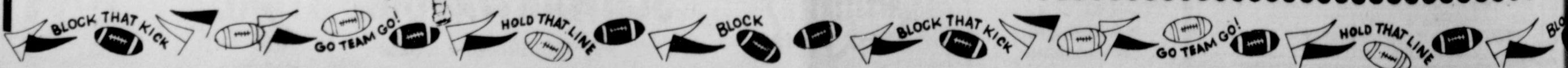
