





Late summer and early fall is a good time for applying limestome to established permanent pastures.

Liming is especially important on extremely acid soils as it increases the effectiveness of applied fertilizers. Liming these soils also reduces the level of harmful elements present in the soil that reduce plant growth. The overall effect is increased forage quality and quantity for livestock grazing.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service recommends 11/2 to 2 tons of limestone per acre on extablished pastures having a pH of 5.8 or below. Liming is especially important if a legume is growing in pastures.

A soil test will indicate the

need for liming and will provide current pasture fertilizer recommendations. It's just sound economics to apply lime and fertilizer as indicated by a soil test.

Generally, late summer and early fall is a slack period for lime dealers and their equipment, so agricultural limestone can usually be applied upon short

Too much moisture in refrigerators during warm months can cost money.

Frost-free and automatically defrosting models have to work harder to rid themselves of the

moisture.

Frost should not build a more than one-fourth inch thick on the than one-fourth because it prevents cold from circulating in manual

cold from circulating in manual defrosting models.

A frosted-up appliance has to work longer hours at a high cold setting to keep foods chilled.

Also, heavy coats of ice can lead to expensive repairs.

To keep a refrigerator from overworking, there are several steps homemakers can take:

steps homemakers can take:
1. Cover all food,
2. Place a container of food in cold water to force be

Trim crusts from bread; cut each piece length wise into quarters. Mix together nuts and coconut. Dip bread sticks in sweet-ened condensed milk, then roll in coconut mixture.
