

# Predator Problem Nears Emergency Stage In Texas

City Council Continues Work On Electorical Crisis With LCRA

The Goldthwaite City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night, again appealed to electrical users of the city to do everything possible to conserve

Mayor Ray Duren, having attended some 12 meetings in Austin the past few months, told the council of the plight of LCRA (Lower Colorado River Authority) in recent meetings with the Railroad Commission of Texas and with gas producing compan-

LCRA has been using diesel fuel daily during the summer weeks in order to produce enough electricity to meet demands of the city to pass an addition to the contract that the city has to purchase electricity from LCRA.

The addition, called a fuel clause, allows LCRA to tack on additional amounts to wholesale customers' bills when the power company has to burn the more expensive fuel oil instead of natural gas, that it normally

In other council business, the ew law passed by the Texas Legislature on August 28 was discussed. The law, House Bill 106, states that right hand turns after stopping will be allowed at all intersections in the state of Texas where standard traffic lights are in use. The council un-animously adopted this legislation locally for the traffic light in Goldthwaite.

The new sanitary land fill operation of the city was discussed at some length by the council. The caretaker of the land fill, m Watson, will be asked to enforce time restrictions and dumping restrictions and will be instructed by the city to charge out of city residents set fees for dumping, according to the size of vehicle which is being used for carrying trash to the land

The land fill is expected to be in operation in a few weeks, and more concerning its operation

will be published as it develops. In final action, the council appointed Mrs. Mamie Palmer to the Jennie Trent Dew Library Board, representing the Mills County Association of Retired

The Wildlife Sub-committee heard representatives of five agricultural groups testify as to the enormous amount of predation their members are experiencing. Those testifying were Mort L. Mertz, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association; Bill Sims, TS&GRA executive secretary; Pat Smith, State Affairs director for the Texas Farm Bureau; Bill Po wers, executive director of the Texas Poultry Federation; and Ed Stanfield, administrative assistant for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Assoc-

Mr. Mertz pointed out that because of the nature of sheep and goats it is virtually impos sible to raise them in the same pasture with the coyote. Someimes no matter how much other food is available there are times during the year when the coyote will take the baby lambs and kids and possibly even eventually kill the adult sheep or goats. The TS&GRA executive further pointed out that because of the ban on the use of poisons by the President of the United State: and the Environmental Protection Agency the loss of livestock has greatly increased. In a recent survey a total of 35,-940 producers were contacted and of this number 13,686 producers responded. Over 6,000 of these producers were experiencing some predator loss. Over 66,778 sheep and goats and over 6,179 calves were reported lost just to coyotes. Other predators were

sheep, goats and cattle.
Bill Sims, executive secretary of the TS&GRA, stated that this is not only a loss to the pro-ducer but also to the consumer because these animals would have eventually produced over ten million pounds of red meat for the sumers of the United States not counting what their offspring

ON THE BALLOT

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legisla.

ture not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular

session or special session;
Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial

estimates.

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property and to the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxtown or village as are neces-sary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations here-inafter issued by the city, town, or village. The lature is empowered to by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal respect to the total principa amount of bonds which may be issued by independ-ent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and vil-

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C

by general law, to exempt all real and personal prop-erty used by non-profit erty used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.
