## Jr. Eagles Sweep By Santa Anna 22-0

The Goldthwaite Junior High Eagles defeated the Santa Anna Mountaineers last Tuesday night by a score of 22-0. An outstanding defensive game was performed by Randy White, Chotzy Davis, Mike Lee, Arturo Siller, Buddy Williams, Dean Humphries, James Green, Jimmy Mullings, Steven Coronado and Sammy Padillo according to their coach, Danny Spradley.

Eleven first downs were recorded for the Eagle team against Santa Anna's three. The Eagles tallied a total of 233 yards rushing to their opponents' 71. Out of five passes the Eagles completed one for ten yards. Santa Anna ended the game with minus six yards passing. Siller's three punts during the game averaged 29 yards. Goldthwaite lost the ball twice to Santa Anna and held only one fifteen yard penalty during the game. Lee carried the ball 10 times for a total of 37 yards; Siller, 7 for 33; Tommy Collier, 7 for 10; Jett Johnson, 3 for 38; and Owen Hall, 2 for 1. Touchdowns for the Eagles were made by Collier and Johnson while Siller and Lee made the extra points.

NIP'N TUCK was the name of the game Saturday night as the Golden Eagles edged by the Glen Rose Tigers 28-26 in their second district game of the '73 season. Goldthwaite Eagle Ray Frazier passed to Dale Page for the first touchdown of the game. Try for extra point failed. Goldthwaite was leading 6-0, but only for a short time as Glen Rose scored on a long pass and booted a good extra point. Score was 7-6. Larry Elliott carried the pigskin across the line for the second Eagle touchdown of the night. Ray Frazier passed to Terry McLean for two extra points. Eagles were again leaders of the game 14-7.

The Tigers disliked the seven point lead held over them by the Eagles and lit up the scoreboard with another TD. However, their try for the extra point failed. Goldthwaite was holding the lead by only a thin line - one point. Guenaro Siller buckled down and carried the pigskin 81 yards on a reverse play for an Eagle touchdown. Extra point try failed. Before halftime Glen Rose tallied again, still falling short of the lead held by the Eagles, 20-19. On the first play after halftime that the Eagles had possession of the ball, Siller raced 62 yards for a six pointer. Attempt for extra point failed. Glen Rose made the tension and suspense of the game unbelievable when they scored a TD in the third quarter to tie the teams 26-26.

With only three minutes left in the fourth quarter and Glen Rose in control of the ball, Tommy Standley, Lee Browning and Richard Covington downed the Tiger ball carrier for a safety on the one-yard line. The tension of the game was over, as the Eagles proudly brought home a 28-26 victory.

Siller had a fantastic night Saturday as he racked up 260 yards rushing plus 75 yards on returns. His total yards rushing for the two district games now stands at a total of 422. His total for the seven games is 700 yards. Siller probably has the best average on yards rushing in the district so far this season.

"Our boys played a heavy game Saturday night against Glen Rose," commented head coach Gene Aldridge. "On the defensive line Steve Gist had an outstanding night with 15 tackles. Lee Browning was also in on a number of tackles and Dale Page made a good

showing with two pass interceptions. "Our offensive team moved the ball real good and exhibited their biggest output of the year. "I am extremely proud of the team. We are faced with a very strong contender Friday night - China Springs. They are 2-0 in district play and have one real big fullback (about 240 pounds) who is next to impossible to stop. They also have a very strong backfield working for them. "If we try hard during workouts, keep up our team spirit, with members of the school and town letting us know they are supporting our efforts, we have a strong chance of coming out on top Friday night." Game time will be 7:30 p. m. on Eagle Field.

## Mullin Drops Pottsville

The Mullin Bulldogs won their second district game last Thursday night as they downed Pottsville 48-36.

Running touchdowns for the Bulldogs were Tony King, 4; Ricky Shelton, 2; and Craig Smith, 1.

Mullin completed 17 of the 25 passes attempted. Their passing game was in extremely good condition during the Pottsville game.

This Thursday (tonight) Mullin will be up against Cherokee at 7 p. m. on Bulldog Field. This is the biggest game and probably will be toughest for the Bulldogs this season.

## Constitutional Amendment Election Tuesday, Nov. 6

Texas voters will have an opportunity to go to the polls Tuesday, November 6, 1973 to vote for or against nine proposed constitutional amendments. Mills County voters will cast their ballots in the ten (10) voting boxes. This includes the absentee

voting box. Polls will be open at 8 a. m. and will remain open until 7 p. m.

Voting boxes are located at the following places: 2 at the courthouse in Goldthwaite; one at Star, Mullin, Caradan, Center City, Priddy, Big Valley and Ridge,

plus the absentee box.

The proposed constitutional amendments are listed below:

- No. 1 The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975.
- No. 2 The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.
- No. 3 The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.
- No. 4 The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and

reclamation districts.

- No. 5 The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property taxpayers.
- No. 6 The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as

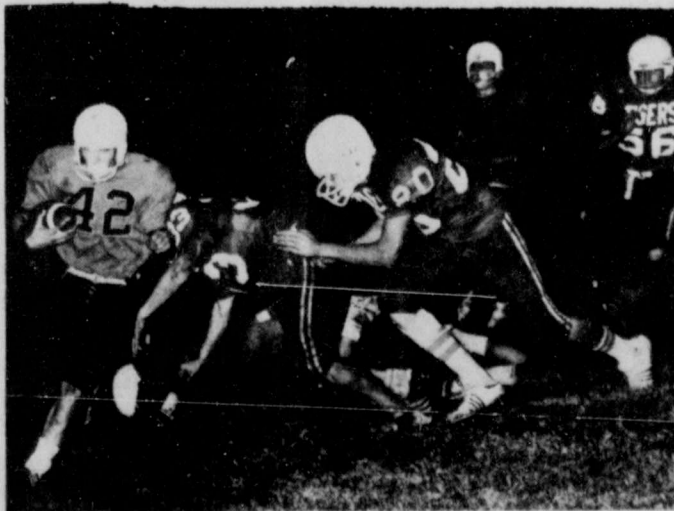
with respect to probate matters, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals.

- No. 7 The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund.
- No. 8 The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law.
- No. 9 The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a nonprofit water supply corporation or a nonprofit supply cooperative.

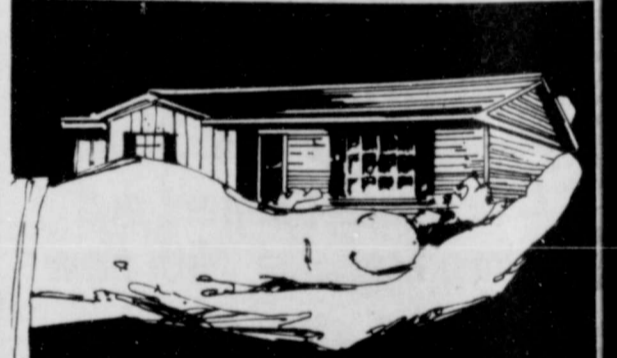

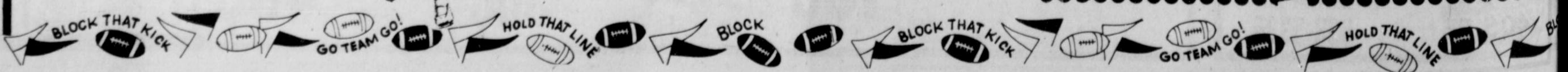

The world is saddened by the war in the Middle East. We do not know how to adequately explain the causes for the confrontation although we recognize the situation is complex with economic, political and religious over and under tones. There is growing apprehension among many people as the major powers become slowly but surely embroiled in this pernicious conflict.

But whatever the specifics of this particular conflict happen to be, the noxious principle behind the conflict is as old as mankind itself. It is the principle: "I am right, therefore you are wrong." This belief is deeply held by both sides in the Middle East war. As long as they hold to this principle and tenaciously refuse to abandon it there can be no real hope for mediation or compromise.

This principle does not come cheaply to those who hold it. It exacts a rigid price from those who would adhere to it. For a man to hold to this principle he must relinquish reason. He must also be blind to truth and justice. Objectivity can no longer

be his. To hold to this principle a person must be willing to inflict unnecessary pain and sorrow on others. And finally, in the moral economics of the universe, it becomes logically unavoidable that he too must suffer.

We can see the sadness of the situation when this principle is applied to the Middle East or to Southeast Asia, or to Northern Ireland but the principle of "I am right, therefore you are wrong" can be found much closer to home.

It can be seen in the struggle between our political parties when it becomes morally acceptable to smother and befoul the good name of political opponents through "dirty tricks."

In our homes we see examples when parents are dismissed by their children as being hopelessly old-fashioned or when parents refuse to listen to their children because "that long hair doesn't let good common sense come through. It can tragically be seen in the case of a family that is split asunder because husband and wife refuse to listen to the other.

It is particularly sad when this principle is operative in our churches so that instead of Christians making a united witness to the one Lord of us all, there is division and strife.

How best can we be rid of this pestiferous principle? We can destroy it by being vigilant to

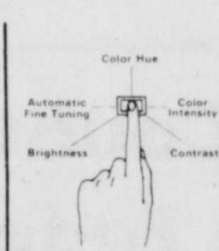

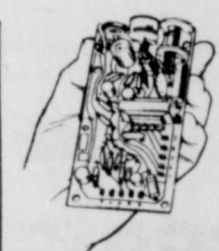

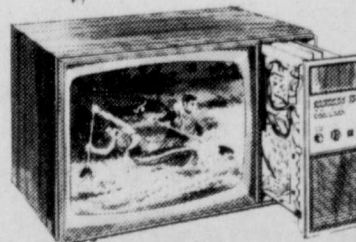
