


Sweet Victory

AUSTIN, TEX, -- Some 230,000 tate aid are being notified they will get final welfare checks from he State Welfare Department in

The federal government assumes responsibility for their assistance January 1, under the new Supplemental Security Inome (SSI) program administered the Social Security Administration.

Medical and social services and food stamps for eligible persons will remain the responsibility of the state welfare

The elderly who get Social Security checks will continue to receive them along with a second check from SSI if they qualify under the federal program.

Most recipients will get higher assistance payments under SSI. some, however, will receive less. Residents of nursing homes or institutions will remain eligible for medical assistance.

The State Welfare Department will continue to furnish the needy with glasses, dentures, hearing aids, prescribed drugs, medical services and food stamps if they qualify. Eighty-four per cent will re-

ceive more money; two per cent will lose assistance altogether; reductions can be expected by nine per cent and five per cent will get about the same amount. In most cases of loss or re-

duction, benefits will be compensated through state-administrated social services programs foster care for the aged and homemaker and chore services enabling people to remain in their own homes rather than enter nursing homes.

SSI recipients can get food stamps if their amount of benefits is not greater than the amount of welfare grants added to the amount of the food stamp bonus coupons they are eligible for in December.

We do not know how to adequately explain the causes for the confrontation although we recognise the situation is complex with economic, political and religious over and under tones. It is the principle: "I am right, therefore you are This belief is deeply held by both sides in the Middle East war. This principle does not come cheaply to those who hold it. It exacts a rigid price from those who would adhere to it. For a man to hold to this principle he must relinquish reason. He must also be blind to truth and justice. Objectivity can no longer


