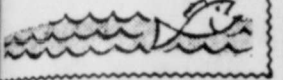

## Water Under The Bridge

Every time we think we've seen all the clever posters found in the various cafes in the hunting and fishing areas of the Lone Star State, we come across another. You'll get a chuckle out of the following:

### INSTRUCTIONS YOU MUST HAVE FOR YOUR HUNTING TRIP:

First you need a fast car— you can beat the other hunters to the best spots. That will give you a chance of being killed before you get out in the woods. You'll save some other hunter some ammo and the mess of shooting him.

Be sure to shoot at anything that moves. If it's not a deer there's always a chance it might be your mother-in-law.

Now, when you bag a deer, be sure and shoot all the shells you have left into it. This will be sure to splinter all the bones and bust all the entrails.

## Hunters Numerous, Deer Plentiful As Season Opens Saturday, November 17

The whitetail deer season opens in Mills County Saturday morning, Nov. 17th at sunup. An either-sex deer season is again in effect for Mills County for the second year in a row. The limit here is two deer, either sex and antlerless deer by special tag only.

"Mills County landowners can expect to see the most deer

hunters this season than in previous years due to the above average range conditions which prevail here in the county and, of course, the high cost of meat factor," Bennie Schriver, local game management officer, reported.

Turkey season in Mills County comes concurrently with deer season. Limit is two turkey gobblers or bearded hens, which have beards protruding through the feathers. Quail season opens on December 1st.

Land owners who lease their land for hunting are required to buy a license to lease and maintain a record of hunter's turkey, quail, deer and dove kills. Deer season ends at sundown January 1, 1974.

Schriver reminds all hunters to be safety conscious and wear bright clothing when hunting to prevent any unnecessary accidents.

Goldthwaite was downed by the Hico Tigers last Friday in their fourth district game of the '73 season by a score of 21-8.

Hico lit up the scoreboard in the first quarter to get the game rolling. The Eagles scored a TD in the first quarter also but the six pointer was called back due to a penalty.

In the second quarter the Eagles scored another TD on an 80-yard pass from Ray Frazier to Terry McLean. Larry Elliott ran the ball over for two extra points. At halftime Goldthwaite was two points in the lead, 8-6.

Goldthwaite had a good drive going in the third period when they fumbled the ball on their 40-yard line. Hico recovered the fumble and scored on it. The Eagles had several good drives going during the game. Once they fumbled the ball on the 14-yard line and once on the 25-yard line.

Hico scored their final TD in the last 40 seconds of the game. "It was a close game up until the last minute of the game," commented Head Coach Gene Auldrige. "Our boys played a real good game. Our fumbling the ball was the factor that hurt our scoring efforts the most."

Guerrero Siller played another outstanding game Friday. His total rushing yardage for the

season is 1017. Seven hundred forty of that was accumulated during the four district games. Steve Gist also had a very good night Friday as he was in on 21 tackles. Frazier made a good showing as he completed four of the four passes he attempted.

## November is special time for food, fiber

November - a month steeped in tradition, a time of harvesting! And what better time than to pay tribute to the great agricultural industry in Texas for the high quality food and fiber products that are available to consumers.

That's why November has been designated as "Food and Fiber Appreciation Month," points out Dr. William Vastine, economist in marketing and food distribution for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Farmers and ranchers and those engaged in processing and distributing food and fiber products deserve a great deal of credit for the everyday miracle of feeding and clothing the people of this state and nation," contends Vastine. "And, with Texas being a leading state in exporting agricultural products, we are now providing food and fiber for many other countries as well."

According to the Texas A&M University System specialist, consumers in the United States spent more than \$125 billion for food in 1972, making food retailing the nation's largest retail industry. In Texas the amount totaled about \$6.4 billion.

Vastine attributes this continued growth in the food industry to increased per capita disposable income for a growing population and the increased demand for services associated with food. Unemployment is down and with more than 40 per cent of all wives now working, eating out and convenience foods are also adding to the boom in the food industry.

"With present-day technology and expertise, agricultural producers now account for only about five per cent of the nation's population. Yet, they do an efficient job; in fact, they produce enough food and fiber for themselves and more than 50 other people," notes the economist.

"Yet, as more and more generations of families become further removed from farm and ranch life, agricultural producers are sometimes forgotten and their role in our society and economy is overshadowed by other 'more contemporary' events and happenings.

"But they along with the people engaged in the overall agribusiness industry continue to be the backbone of this country, providing what is so often taken for granted - high quality food and fiber products," Vastine points out.

### Privacy in Public Places

Fire engines roar up to a house across the street, and you hurry over to watch the excitement. If a newspaper photographer snaps your picture and you wind up on the front page of a local newspaper, has your "right of privacy" been violated?

The law's answer is no. Even though the right of privacy has expanded in recent years, it does not override the freedom of the press to report legitimate news. As a spectator at a public event, you were part of the news. All the photographer did was to record what anyone who was there could have seen anyhow.

Some people are born newsworthy, some achieve newsworthiness thrust upon them. But, one and all, they are subject to the constitutional right of the press to report what goes on in the community.



Even if a person specifically forbids publicity, he does not thereby become immune.

In one case, the irate father in a custody fight ordered reporters to "lay off" the story. But the story appeared anyhow—with pictures. The man claimed invasion of his privacy, but a court decided that he had no legal kick coming.

"There are times," said the court, "when one, willingly or not, becomes an actor in an occurrence of public interest. When this takes place, he emerges from his seclusion, and it is not an invasion of privacy to publish his photograph with an account of such occurrence."

On the other hand, an item of information does not automatically become newsworthy just because a newspaper sees fit to print it. For example:

A newspaper published a notice by a hardware dealer, complaining about a certain customer's unpaid bill. This time, when the customer sued the newspaper for invasion of his privacy, he won a judgment. The court said that in any fair sense, this private debt was simply none of the public's business.



## THE MILLS MINISTER

The Mills Minister space this week is devoted to the article, "Communist Rules for Revolution," first printed in the Bartlesville Examiner-Enterprise in 1946 in The New World News, after the Florida attorney general secured it from a known member of the communist party, who acknowledged that it was then still a part of the communist program.

In May of 1919, at Dusseldorf, Germany, the Allied Forces obtained a copy of some of the "Communist Rules for Revolution." Nearly 50 years later, the Reds were still following them.

A. Corrupt the young; get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial; destroy their ruggedness.

B. Get control of all means of publicity, thereby:

1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays and other trivialities.
2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.
3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule and disgrace.
4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible.
5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its

credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

6. Incite unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders.

7. By specious argument, cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues - honesty, sobriety, self-restraint, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness.

C. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to confiscating them and leaving the population helpless.

That is quite a list, isn't it? Now, stop to think - how many of these rules are being carried out in this nation today?

The United States Army has just announced a new two-year enlistment option.

The option offers either training in a skill of the applicant's choosing, or assignment to Europe following successful completion of required training in a skill selected by the Army. The option includes training in over 120 occupational areas and is open to male and female applicants.

Major General John Q. Hester, Commander of the U. S. Army Recruiting Command said the option "reflects an excellent opportunity for young men and women to experience a valuable addition to their lives and at the same time render an important national service."

## New Law Automatically Enrolls Persons For Medicare

People who first become eligible from now on for medical insurance under Medicare (often called 'doctor bill insurance under Medicare') do not have to sign up in order to have the protection. Under a change in social security procedures, the eligible person is automatically enrolled for medical insurance unless he specifically turns it down in writing. When he receives a health insurance card in the mail showing he is entitled to medical insurance, he should just keep the card and do nothing more if he wants this Medicare medical insurance protection. But if he does not want

it, he should say so by filling out the information called for on the back side of the card, including checking the block showing 'I do not want medical insurance,' and by mailing the entire card in the addressed envelope provided. Glen McNatt, manager of the Brownwood Social Security Office says people who receive Medicare health insurance cards should read the instructions carefully that are printed with it, and should not fill out and mail anything unless they do not want the medical insurance protection. He emphasizes that if they want the protection, just keep the card and do nothing more.

## Extension Highlights

Turkey time is here and turkeys are produced in consumer sizes ranging from 8 to 22 pounds so you can select the size to meet your needs. Better yet, for singles, couples, or the budget-conscious who want a traditional dinner, but something smaller or more convenient, there are turkey parts or boneless roasts to fit every need.

Here are some hints on buying and cooking turkeys. Allow 1 1/2 pounds per person. This amount will yield generous servings and enough left for

snacks and next-day dishes. The best way to thaw a turkey is in the refrigerator on a tray in the refrigerator for two to three days. For faster thawing, the wrapped bird may be placed in a pan of cold water. Change water frequently. For best results, skin and meat should remain at cool temperatures (below 50 degrees F.)

Approximate roasting times are as follows: 4-8 lbs., 3-3 1/2 hrs. uncovered or 2 1/2-3 hrs. covered; 8-12 lbs., 3 1/2-4 hrs. uncovered or 3-3 1/2 hrs. covered; 12-16 lbs., 4-4 1/2 hrs. uncovered or 3 1/2-4 hrs. covered; 16-20 lbs., 4 1/2-5 hrs. uncovered or 4-4 1/2 hrs. covered; 20-24 lbs., 5-6 hrs. uncovered or 4 1/2-5 hrs. covered.

About 3/4 cup stuffing per lb. of turkey or about 9 cups of stuffing for a 12 lb. bird. An unstuffed turkey takes about 1 hour less time to cook.

Tucked legs eliminate the need for skewers and sewing. Check for doneness during the last hour of cooking.

1. Check to be sure meat thermometer is in center of thigh next to body, not touching bone. Thigh temperature should be 185 degrees F.

2. Press thigh drumstick. Meat should feel soft.

3. Prick skin at thigh, juices should not be pink. Tenderness is according to age of the live bird. Young turkeys are usually tender whether toms or hens.

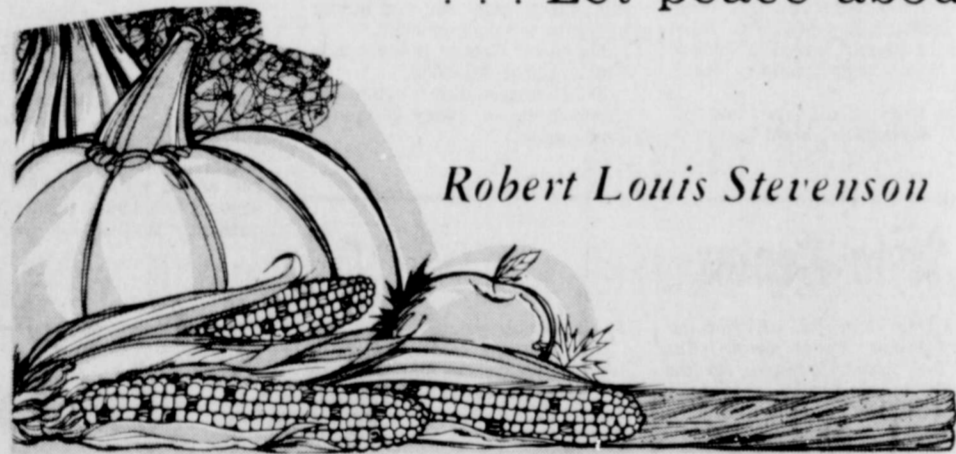

## From the County Agent

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

The problems of predator animal control are growing by leaps and bounds and Mills County is certainly no exception to the rule. The government trapper program which was initiated in Mills County a year ago has proven to be a success and plans are being made to continue the effectiveness of the trapper program in 1974.

Farmers and ranchers were asked to contribute to the trapper program during 1973 at the rate of 2 cents per acre. Funds secured were used to support the program. It will soon be time to send questionnaires to all producers in Mills County if we are to continue the program in 1974. All producers are welcome to participate in the program and are encouraged to support the effort to this coming year. It will be necessary to increase contributions to 3 cents per acre in order to cover increased expenses under the program.

Letters and questionnaires will be mailed to all producers who participated in the program last year. The questionnaires will be concerned with reporting the effectiveness of the program and to measure future needs.

It is our intention to contact every producer in the county. Anyone who wishes to know more about the program may contact the County Extension Agent's office for information and details.

A series of workshops have been planned during the 1973-74 fiscal year.

All producers and interested persons are welcome to attend any and all of the workshops. The dates and workshops are as follows:

January 31 - Workshop on income tax and record keeping.

March 7 - Clinic on pasture and forage management.

March 26 - Workshop on budding and grafting pecan trees.

April 16 - Clinic on landscaping.

April (date to be announced) - Workshop on cattle palpation.

May 7 - Clinic on raising catfish.

The dates of each workshop will be confirmed and publicized prior to each event.

Food, clothing and shelter are basic to man's survival. Modern agriculture encompasses agricultural production to be sure, but it also includes supply and service industries who aid producers with fertilizers, seed, machinery, and information. Marketing and distribution are also included. Thus, modern agriculture refers to the entire complex required to move goods from producers to consumers.

Consumer spending for food reached \$125 billion for 1972, making food retailing the nation's largest retail industry. In Texas alone, consumers spent about \$6.4 billion at food stores and

STIN - How "used" is a car? A prospective buyer is stated accurately in the working parts are in good condition, and the price is the fair market value of the specific vehicle involved, and is entirely up to the consumer to decide if a certain used car is a good buy.

least, permit you - to drive the car to your own mechanic for an even closer check. You are always free, of course, to talk to the previous owner. If he can't be identified easily, you can write the motor vehicle registration division of the Texas Highway Department - enclosing \$1 and the vehicle identification number, and get a history of the title.

If a consumer suspects that mileage has been misrepresented he can file a complaint under federal law, which prescribes penalties for violation of three times actual damages, a maximum of \$1,500. Or, a private suit could be filed under the new Texas law, and if the court determined that there was a violation, the judge could award three times actual damages. If you have a complaint, contact your county or district attorney or the Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's office.

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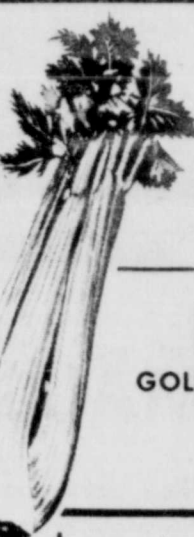

AUSTIN, Tex. - Outlook for a bleak winter grew steadily worse as the energy crisis continued.

Speed limit reductions and year-around daylight savings time, recommended by President Richard Nixon, may be some of the milder results.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, assessing the president's proposals and reaction of other states before announcing his own program, said gasoline rationing is an "eventuality that will have to be considered."

Grimmest of all was Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Langdon's forecast: "Some people in Texas are going to be cold this winter." Those who use butane, propane or electricity for their heating are the ones most likely to get the shivers, said Langdon.

Middle distillate fuels, used primarily to generate electricity, and of increasing importance due to the shortage of natural gas, may also be in short supply as much as 400,000 barrels daily, according to Langdon's estimate.

Meanwhile, the Nixon administration altered previously announced allocation policies to allow middle distillate suppliers to provide Texas customers diesel fuel, fuel oil and kerosene without limit through November.

Even in the reprieve of mandatory allocations, there was an implied warning to Texas electric utility companies: come December they may be running short of fuel oil, since allocation formulas are based on 1972 purchases. Most Texas utilities, used to plenty of natural gas, didn't use much fuel oil to fire their boilers in 1972.

Things apparently are going to get a lot worse before they get better on the energy front.

PAY AMENDMENT DEFEAT ASSESSED - For the fifth time in eight years Texans voted down a pay raise for legislators, and assessments of the reason why varied widely.

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. and others concluded that the vote on the \$15,000-annual-pay-annual-sessions amendment was due to "tragic events at the national level that have crushed public confidence in our political and governmental systems."

Not so, said Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Granberry who maintained lawmakers asked too much salary and made an error in coupling the pay raise issue with that of annual sessions.

Granberry suggested voters will approve \$8,000 to \$10,000 salaries and limited annual sessions with proper leadership support and a clear presentation.

At any rate, Texans undoubtedly will get to ballot on the issue again in some form after next year's constitutional convention.

Most-likely proposal will be creation of a commission of citizens, as recommended by the Constitutional Revision Commission, to set salaries of lawmakers and other state officials.

Prospects for the kind of unlimited annual legislative sessions recommended by the Revision Commission dimmed with results of the November 6 election.

COMMUNITY AFFAIRS CHIEF SWORN IN - In swearing-in ceremonies for Ben McDonald as executive director of the Texas Department of Community Affairs Governor Briscoe promised that the department will stand ready with aid to local communities.

He said McDonald will have a team of experts ready at all times to go on-the-scene help in community emergencies. A special long-distance telephone will be available for calls to the department. The Community Affairs department encompasses the significant drug abuse program, as well as such divisions as housing, child development, youth services, public employment, model cities, local government personnel and a number of others.

In naming attorney McDonald, the Governor said the former Corpus Christi mayor represented the dynamic leadership the Community Affairs Department needs.

NEW INSURANCE HEARING SET - Life insurance policy price disclosure and cost comparisons will be considered at a public hearing here November 27.

The State Insurance Board is then expected to review a model rule covering "life insurance interest-adjusted cost comparison indexes."

While the Insurance Board does not set prices of life insurance policies, it does place misleading and deceptive sales practices. Board Chairman Joe Christie said calculation of life insurance costs through the cash-surrender value doesn't always show true cost to purchasers.

### Rev. Connally Elected To Texas Executive Board

Corpus Christi -- Dan Connally pastor of First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, was elected here Thursday to a major position on a Texas Baptist board during the annual meeting of the 2-million-member Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Rev. Connally was elected to the 192-member Executive Board which is comprised of laymen and ordained church leaders from across Texas and conducts the business of the BGCT between annual sessions.
