Outbreak Of Burglaries In County

Last Wednesday night two Priddy businesses were burglarized. A small amount of cash was taken from the Roy Stegmaier Store and \$1125.00 in cash, checks and merchandise was taken from the Bosse Grocery. A break down of the items taken from the Bosse Store revealed \$475.00 in cash and checks to be missing along with 20 cartons of cigarettes, a green stamp machine containing a large amount of green stamps, 14 wrist watches, and \$70.00 in ammunition.

Entry was made into both stores by breaking into the front door of each according to investigating officers H. G. Brooks, Sheriff and Randal Ratliff, deputy.

Saturday night 27 cassette tapes, tape deck, 3 sets stereo speakers and \$25 in cash were taken from Shelton Auto Store in Goldthwaite.

Entry into the business was made by breaking into the door on the south side.

Brooks believes the burglaries Wednesday night have no connection with the Saturday night break-in. All three cases are now under investigation.

Mills County Livestock Boosters paid a total of \$20,910.68 for the sale of animals at the auction of livestock following the 36th Annual Livestock Show.

The auction held last Saturday evening following the 2-day livestock show gave Mills County 4-H and FFA boys and girls a chance to sell their animals.

Stock show boosters were present for the auction from all around Goldthwaite -- Lampasas, Priddy, Mullin, Lometa, San Saba Hamilton and Brownwood.

The 1973 sales total was \$14,049.40.

According to Layton Black chairman of the committee, it was a very good sale with overwhelming response from the buyers.

The auction sale was held at Mills County Commission Barn facilities. This afforded many boosters an opportunity to attend who in previous years were unable to take part in the bidding on stock in person.

Other members of the sales committee were Sig Jernigan, Don Geeslin, Joe S. Langford, Y. B. Johnson, John Smith, Thurman Johnson, Glen Love, June Clifton and Thomas Earl Winters.

According to announcement, turkeys originally belonging to Pat Wells were bought and re-donated for sell again and again until the total amount donated to Mills County 4-H and FFA Association totaled \$780 on just those animals.

A total of \$618.00 in prize money was received by exhibitors during the Mills County Livestock Show.

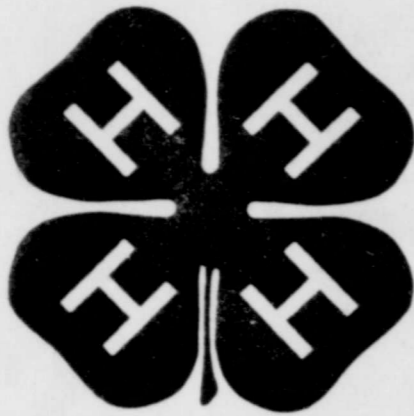
