## Remaining Bennett Creek Flood Control Structures Being Advertised For Bids

Two remaining flood control structures to be built in Bennett Creek are being advertised for bids and the contract for construction will be awarded on February 28, 1974, at the office of the Soil Conservation Service in Temple, stated Owens, Secretary of the Bennett Creek Water Control and Flood Control District. The two structures will be located eight miles east of Goldthwaite on the Kerby and Aubrey Muses.

The construction of these two dams will culminate some 20 years of work by the sponsors. Many people worked long and hard for the Bennett Creek Project giving their time and money, but no one worked longer or harder than Sherwood Owens Studer stated. "When things bogged down we always called on Sherwood to get things rolling. He grabbed his hat, crawled into

his car, and drove many miles at his own expense to discuss this project. I really appreciate his dedication to the wise use of our soil and water resources," said Studer.

Studer also stated in addition to the Bennett Creek WCID and the Mills County Commissioners Court, both past and present, the Directors of the Brown-Mills SWCD, both past and present, gave many hours of their time to the planning, organizing and application of the Flood Control Program. Tremendous cooperation was realized from the local people. Most of the landowners involved donated easements to the District for construction of these dams, even when they were not benefited. It takes a special kind of people to cooperate and put a project of this nature over Studer stated.

The Brown-Mills SWCD has the responsibility of operating the dams and the Commissioners Court has the responsibility of maintaining them. Bill Bishop and Hubert Meyer, present Directors of the Brown-Mills SWCD ask that the landowners involved help them to maintain a good turf of grass on these dams in Mills County. Experience has shown that this is the best way to keep maintenance cost down, Bishop stated.

## Election Scheduled April 6

Goldthwaite City Council met in a regular session Monday afternoon for bids and the contract for construction will be awarded on February 28, 1974, at the office of the Soil Conservation Service in Temple, stated Owens, Secretary of the Bennett Creek Water Control and Flood Control District. The two structures will be located eight miles east of Goldthwaite on the Kerby and Aubrey Muses.

During the last three months there have been approximately five cases of infectious hepatitis in this county. The main symptom of hepatitis is jaundice, a yellowish color of the skin. This is usually accompanied by nausea, vomiting, and low-grade fever. The patient is usually considered contagious a few days before he develops the jaundice and approximately one week after the onset of the jaundice.

## Five Cases Of Hepatitis Recorded Here During Last Three Months

The following methods of control are recommended by the Texas State Department of Health:

1. The most important method of control is directed toward good sanitation of personal hygiene. All restrooms should have plenty of soap and clean or disposable towels available. Small children should be trained how to wash properly after using restrooms.

2. The patient should stay at home away from other individuals for at least 7 days after jaundice appears. Even though he may still show some degree of jaundice after 7 to 10 days, he is probably no longer contagious.

3. The remaining members of the family do not need to be quarantined. They may continue with school or work but should maintain proper sanitation as directed above.

4. An injection of immune serum globulin may prevent or modify the disease for those who have been or may be exposed. It is recommended to be given to the members of the same family and may be given to anyone who has been closely associated with the person who has infectious hepatitis. There are no known drawbacks to the injections and others may take the injection if desired. It is not recommended to be given as a routine procedure except in conditions such as in dormitory or some type of institutions where several cases are present.

W. R. Lindsey, Don Petty and Charles Studer attended the Central Texas Resource Conservation and Development Area Executive Council meeting in Killen.

The Central Texas RC&D area is an area improvement program authorized by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962, was organized in Bell, Coryell, Mills, Hamilton, Milam and San Saba counties in 1972. It is designed to help communities identify and solve pollution problems, develop land and water resources, improve and expand recreation facilities and initiate a wide variety of other projects dealing with natural resources.

The Mills County Commissioners Court and the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District along with the Central Texas Council of Governments sponsor the proposed project.

New officers were elected to include G. E. Kretzschmar, Chairman, George Jageler, Vice Chairman and B. G. Welch, Secretary-Treasurer.

Included on the agenda was progress reports from the six counties involved. They all reported progress in organizing and most were ready to begin inventorying possible needs and opportunities within each county. Next on the agenda was a general discussion on what actions needed to be taken to receive authorization for planning from the Department of Agriculture. The group agreed to develop an information plan to inform not only the public but to help in writing letters to their congressmen and senators.

Charles Cass of the Central Texas Council of Governments requested assistance from the County RC&D Committees to study housing problems.

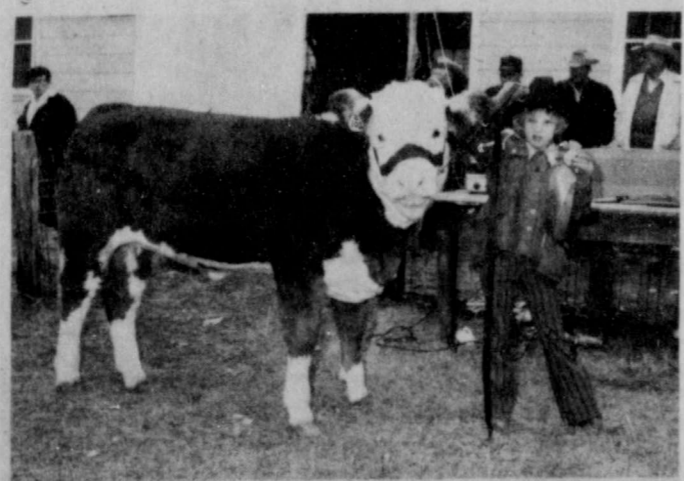

# From the County Agent

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Livestock producers in Mills County are urged to inspect their stock for increasing infestations of spinose ear ticks. Recent checks of cattle have indicated ear tick populations increasing in many areas. Extension Entomologist, Clifford Hoelscher, reports these soft ticks attach deep in the ears of livestock and cause intense irritation. Accumulation of wax and excretion can cause frequent infections. Tick infestations result in a general loss in thrift and vigor in the animals. Animals are stressed during winter conditions because of poor grazing and low nutrition, which creates an extra burden on the animal's defense to ticks.

Dr. Hoelscher reports ticks to be blood-sucking parasites that can cause losses to cattle through loss of blood, weakened conditions, nutritional disorders, reduced feed conversion efficiency and increased susceptibility to disease. When inspecting the ear, the producer will often times notice the large females present in the ear after they have consumed several blood meals. These ticks can also infest horses, dogs, sheep and other farm animals. This tick may live in the ear from one to seven months. The ears may be almost filled with the ticks during certain times which range in size up to one-third of an inch in length.

After the feeding period in the animal's ear, the full-fed nymph which have the skin covered with short heavy peg-like hairs, leave the host, crawl into cracks in the stable or fence and shed their skin. Following the nymphal molt, the adult stage is present. The adult stage does not feed and is not found on the animal but after mating, the female lays eggs in dry places, usually up off the ground. The eggs hatch and the "seed ticks" then attach to the animals to feed and complete another life cycle.

Effective tick control can be economically accomplished with sprays, dips or individual ear treatments. Materials for ear tick control include Co-Ral, Lindane, Malathion, Ronnel and Toxaphene. Dr. Hoelscher emphasizes that the producer should carefully read the label and direct particular attention to cautions and restrictions given on the label before applying a treatment. Note the application-slaughter interval as clearly stated on the label or restrictions given for applying these treatments to dairy animals.
