Postal Rate Increase Goes Into Effect Saturday

The long awaited postal rate increase is almost upon us, according to Postmaster Norman Duren. Effective at 12:01 a. m. on Saturday, March 2, 1974, most postal rates will go up 2 cents. The rate for an ordinary letter goes from 8 cents to 10 cents; air mail letters increase from 11 to 13 cents; ordinary postal cards go up from 6 to 8 cents, and postal cards sent by air mail will be increased from 9 to 11 cents.

Any letter bearing the old postage rate will be delivered at that rate provided it was deposited in a collection box before the 12:10 Saturday deadline. After that deadline, letters bearing insufficient postage will be delivered but will bear a "postage due" notice and the addressee will be requested to pay the additional 2 cents. If he refuses, the letter will be returned to the sender who must pay the extra postage.

Payroll during the year totals \$265,000 which is paid to 44 members of the faculty and employees.

Annual budget for the Goldthwaite school system this year is \$352,264. This does not include lunchroom operations.

There are 26 teachers and administrators in the school system.

The school system operates seven buses, driving approximately 102,000 miles per year.

Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$750,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Agriculture Building, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom, and approximately 80 acres of land.

Total enrollment for the 1973-74 year has now reached 426 pupils for both high school, junior high and elementary school.

Goldthwaite Schools operate two modern lunchrooms serving an average of 320 meals daily and total expected for the year of 62,000.
