County Coyote Experimental Program Initiated Again

The 44 County experimental program to control coyotes using the M-44 spring-loaded ejector and sodium cyanide capsules has once again been initiated. Charles R. Ramsey, Wildlife Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has rescheduled training in Mills County for April 10, 1974. The training meeting will be held in the High School Auditorium in Goldthwaite beginning at 3:00 p.m. All farmers and ranchers holding land in Mills County and/or their designated agents are invited to participate in the training. Applications will be approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture upon successful completion of the approved training program.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station is responsible for the data collected during the program. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is responsible for training applicants on the safe use of the sodium cyanide. Additional details relating to

the program will be presented by the Wildlife Specialist giving the training.

William Horton Found Dead From Gunshot

William (Bill) Elvis Horton of Priddy Star Route, Goldthwaite, was found dead at his residence at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday, March 26, 1974, from a gunshot wound in the head.

Justice of the Peace E. H. Thorne ruled the case as suicide.

Services for Mr. Horton were conducted Thursday, March 28, 1974, at 2 p. m. in the Wilkins Funeral Chapel with Rev. Dan Connolly officiating. Interment was in the Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery. Arrangements were under the direction of Wilkins Funeral Home.

Mr. Horton, born October 18, 1912, in Caradan, was the son of Lon E. Horton and Alma Belle Casbeer Horton.

On December 15, 1934, he was married to Lula Mae Huffman in Mills County.

Mr. Horton, a member of the First Baptist Church, is survived by his wife; one daughter, Valda Mae Grumbles, Ft. Worth; one son, Bobby Elvis Horton, Weatherford; five grandchildren; four brothers, Elton and Elam Horton, both of Goldthwaite; D. D. Horton of Corpus Christi; Byron Horton, Ft. Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Ophelia Allison, Kingsville; and Mrs. Valda Davis, Corpus Christi.

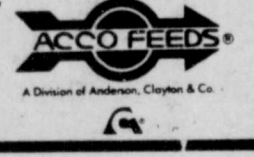

Question Of Local Law Enforcement —

Feeling that the City Council of Goldthwaite did not give the citizens a fair and impartial estimate of establishing and maintaining a city law enforcement official as compared with other cities, this individual survey was conducted and the results are being made public. It is not being sought that a 2 or 3 man dept. be created, but in the beginning, ONE officer to serve as city marshal or policeman. Below is a survey of five area cities and how they conduct local law enforcement. This is not to be construed as to be official or

exact but only a basic survey to determine other cities approximate police financing. This survey is divided into two groups. The cities in Group 1 (Lometa and Hico) pay their only officer a monthly salary PLUS a monthly expense account to cover car expenses, uniforms, insurance and benefits. Each individual officer owns and maintains the car he works in. The cities in Group 2 (San Saba, Gorman, and Early) pay their officer or officers a monthly salary. The city owns the vehicle and equipment and pays all upkeep and expenses on vehicle.

GROUP NO. 1

CITY OF HICO (Not County Seat of Hamilton Co.)

1 - City Officer - Salary \$500.00 per month or \$7200 yearly and expense account \$100 per month (upkeep of his car, insurance, and necessary equipment)
2 - Night Watchmen who rotate 2 week shifts. Each is paid \$170 for 2 weeks work or \$4420 yearly for both men.
Fines collected each month vary from \$50 to \$400, but average about \$300 monthly or \$3600 yearly.

City taxes not raised to have local law enforcement.

CITY OF LOMETA (Not County Seat of Lampasas Co.)

1 - City Officer - Salary \$350 per month and expense acct. \$100 per month (upkeep of his car, insurance, and necessary equipment) or \$5400 yearly. At present, they have no city police, but in the past fines collected ranged from \$150 to \$200 monthly or approximately \$2100 yearly. A certain percentage of revenue sharing money is used to finance law enforcement. It is proposed if city sales tax passes, a percentage of this money will be used for law enforcement benefits. City taxes not raised to have local law enforcement.

Why should taxes have to be raised 70% when other cities with local law enforcement officials did not?

GROUP NO. 2

CITY OF SAN SABA (County Seat of San Saba Co.)

City Officers include chief, patrolman, night watchman, and parking meter attendant.
Salaries - Chief \$672 monthly, Patrolman \$550 monthly. Each is furnished city patrol car and equipment.
Night Watchman - Salary \$310 monthly and expense acct. \$100 for use of personal car.
Fines collected monthly range from \$500 to \$1200. Patrolman is hired under a 10 month grant from the Criminal Justice Council of the Central Texas Council of Governments which pays his entire salary and the city's part of his insurance and retirement benefits. City Taxes not raised to have local law enforcement.

CITY OF GORMAN (Not County Seat of Eastland Co.)

1 - Officer - Salary - \$390 monthly plus water and electricity furnished. City furnishes vehicle and equipment and pays expenses. Fines collected monthly average less than \$100. City taxes not raised to have local law enforcement. Some businessmen contribute to city law enforcement protection.
New officer to be paid only \$375 monthly but he is also constable of Eastland Co. and receives payment from that agency.

CITY OF EARLY (Not County Seat of Brown Co.)

2 - Officers - Chief Salary - \$200 monthly Asst. Chief Salary \$40 monthly or \$2880 yearly total. City furnishes 1 police vehicle and pays upkeep and expenses. Fines collected average \$27.50 to \$170 monthly. City taxes not raised to have local law enforcement.

CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE (County Seat of Mills Co.)

1 - Night Watchman - Salary \$330 monthly or \$3960 yearly. Has no law enforcement authority. City has 15 employees in all departments. City Proposed Tax Raise of 70 percent to have local law enforcement. Federal grant money available from Criminal Justice Council of Central Texas Council of Governments of which the city is a member.

Study the above survey, discuss it with your neighbors, talk to your councilmen about it, ask the other peace officers here if Goldthwaite needs this additional expense to provide additional protection of citizens and property. Please recognize that each level of law enforcement, be it city, county, state, or federal,

plays its own role toward a common goal, safety of persons and property; and crime prevention. In these troubled times we live. Arrive at your opinion and go to the polls April 6 and voice your opinion by voting, The American way of Freedom.

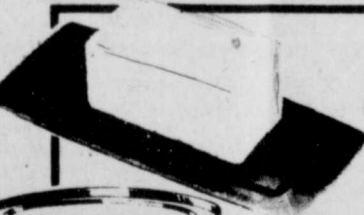

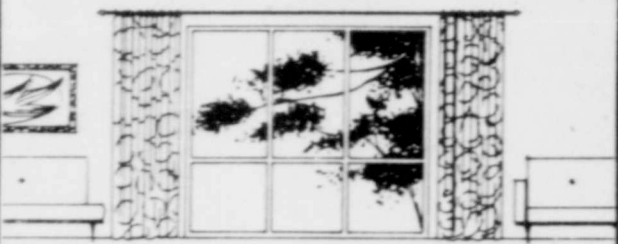

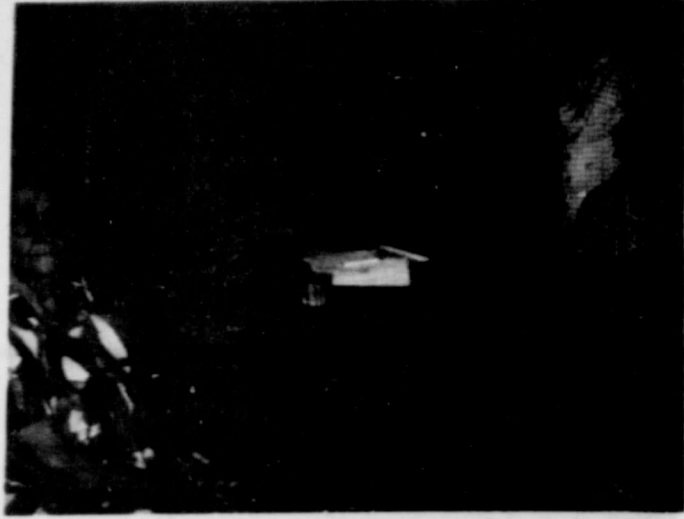

Extension Highlights

Green with envy? Envious because that neighbor down the street from you seems to have all the luck with his lawn? His is green, green, green, and yours - well, a shameful, sickly, undernourished bleached char-
trouse.

If this sounds like your lawn, do something about it this year! Sure, it will take a little work, a little fertilizer, and water. But remember that your lawn is the single most important element of your landscape. Your lawn can tell people a lot about you. It is a public advertisement of the kind of homeowner you are.

There is nothing more attractive than to look down a residential street and see an unbroken chain of deep green, well-cared-for lawns. On the other hand, the unkempt lawn sticks out like "a sore thumb."

Here are a few tips which will go a long way toward creating and maintaining a beautiful lawn:

1. Fertilizer - Apply a balanced (complete) fertilizer in the spring as the grass begins to grow and again in the early fall. A complete fertilizer is one that contains nitrogen, phosphorous, and potassium. Examples are 10-5-5, 12-8-6 or 10-10-10.

During the summer an application of nitrogen every five or six weeks will keep the lawn green and growing. A well-fertilized lawn is better able to withstand dry weather conditions than grass that is hungry.

Nitrogen is a key fertilizer element in turf production. If deficient, plant growth will be stunted and pale. Lack of phosphorous will retard growth and produce a weak root system. Shortages of potassium will

likewise inhibit plant growth and vigor.

2. Watering - There is so much inadequate, superficial watering of lawns it's nearly a crime. Water thoroughly when you do water. Moisture should penetrate to a depth of eight inches or more if the depth of your soil permits. Water only as fast as the soil will take it in. Light, frequent, shallow waterings are probably the cause of more poor lawns and unhealthy turf than any other single factor. If you thoroughly soak the soil when you do water, it is not necessary to water the lawn more often than once every 8 to 10 days.

3. Mowing - The lawn should be mowed often enough so that no more than one-inch of the leaf tip is removed at any one clipping. Proper mowing requires a sharp, well-adjusted mower. Your mower should be sharp enough to cut the tips of the leaves without crushing or bruising them.

Bermuda lawns should be mowed at a height of from 1 to 1½ inches and St. Augustine grass about 2 inches. The fine-leaved, hybrid bermuda grasses prefer from ½ to ¾ inch.

Remember, always collect your clippings when you mow.

Lawn care is not always as simple as 1-2-3: Fertilizing, Watering and Mowing. But if these three practices are carefully followed, your lawn can be a "beauty spot" of green.
