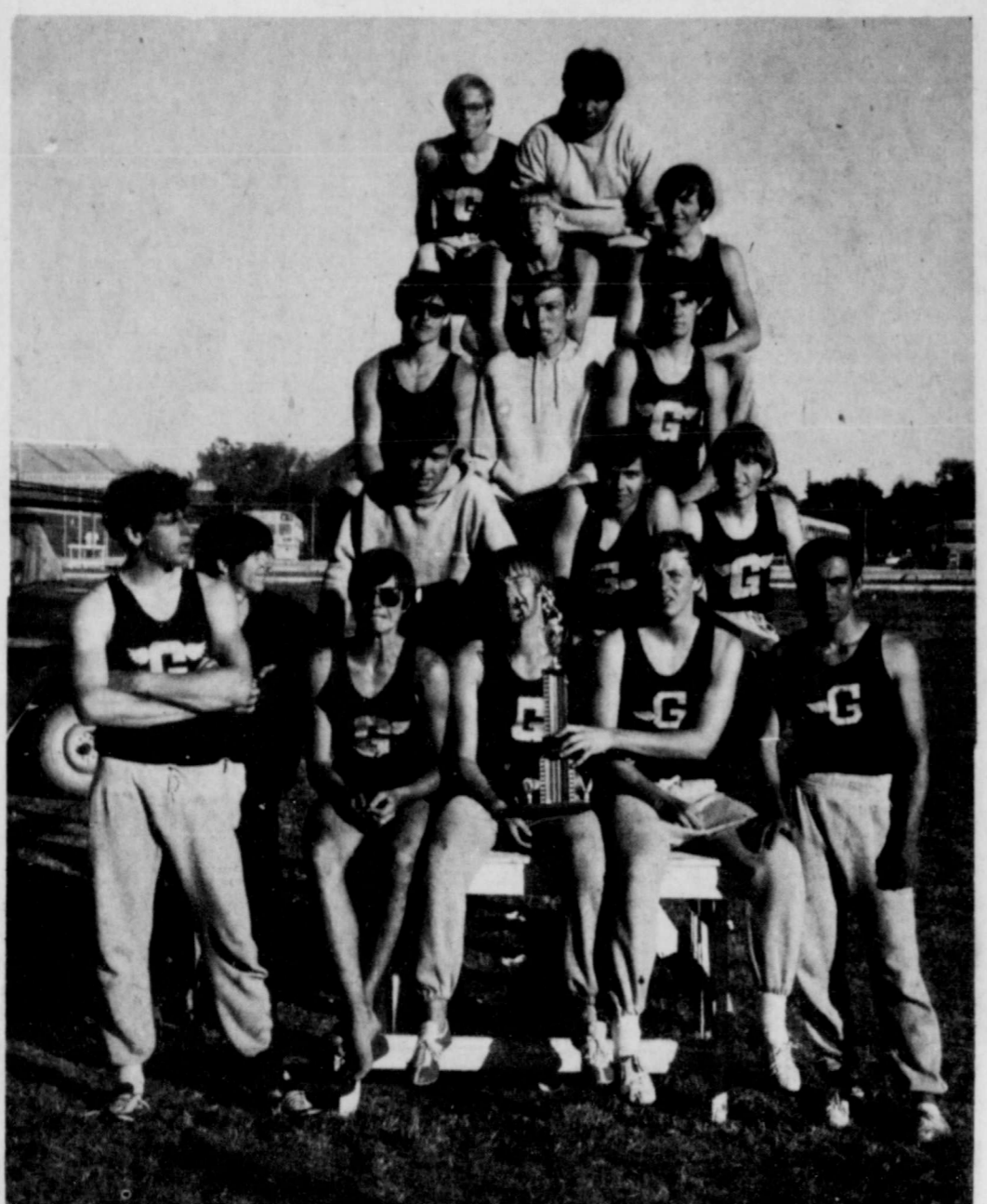

Mr. Poage is an experienced, calling and successful congressman. His efforts on the behalf of American agriculture will mainly go down in the books as a giant step forward.

Large Turnout Elects Council; Nixes Local Law Enforcement Referendum

Goldthwaite city voters went to the polls Saturday to decide the contest of three councilmen posts and to vote for or against law enforcement referendum.

Incumbent Jimmy Smith polled 262 votes to get re-elected. Also elected to the council were Loy Long, 295 votes and Howard Campbell, 201.

Challengers Dorman Lemke posted 195 votes and R. E. "Bobby" Johnson received 63 votes.

Paul Henderson received two votes and G. C. Head polled one as write-in candidates in the election.

City voters also downed the law enforcement referendum for establishing a local police department by a vote of 227 against and 124 for.

Record Number Of Voters Cast Ballots In 1974 County School Trustee Elections

Three new faces will be appearing at the Goldthwaite school board meetings following the school trustee election held this past Saturday.

Hubert Berry, James Reese and Don Humphries were elected to the local board. Berry polled 297 votes; Reese, 277; and Humphries, 275. They were elected to serve three-year terms each.

Milton Schwartz was re-elected by a total of 246 votes. He will be serving in the two-year term on the board.

Other candidates and number of votes they received were Clarence Miller, 224; Kenneth Roberts, 73; Mrs. Ronnie Davis, 59.

Write-in candidates and their votes were Gerald Head and Don Geeslin, one vote each; Dr. Douglas Dennis, 3; and J. C. Wesson, 4.

MULLIN

Lewis Sims, Bill Lindsey and Dennis Shelton were all re-elected to their posts on the Mullin School Board. Sims polled 49 votes; Lindsey, 42; and Shelton, 45.

Ralph Hasley polled 48 votes for the unexpired two-year term on the board.

Write-in candidates and votes they received were Wallace Hickman, 8; Roger Sanders and Randy Wilson, two votes each; and Richard Shelton, 1.

STAR

Darrell Head was re-elected by the voters of the Star School District to serve on the board. He received 85 votes.

Sammie Harper and Russell T. Boyd were also elected to serve on the board. Harper received 82 votes while Boyd received 70.

Other candidates and votes they polled were Billy McNewton, 78; R. B. Jones, 62; and Billy Streator, 59.

Write-in candidates Glen Gilbreath received two votes and Martha Becker, one.

The three candidates elected to serve for three-year terms on the Priddy School Board were Victor Limmer, 41 votes; James Wells, 39; and Paul Kunkel, 36.

Varsity, Junior High Track Teams Place Second

Goldthwaite's varsity and junior high track teams placed second at the District meet held at Baylor Track in Waco last week. The varsity team racked up a total of 115 points to come in second behind first place winner China Springs who scored a total of 131 and a third points. Other placings were Glen Rose 3rd, 105 and a third; Valley Mills 4th, 75 and a third; Hico 5th, 39; Dublin, 6th, 22.

Mike Simon placed first in the 100 yard run with Larry Elliott placing fifth. Simon also placed first in the 220 with Elliott coming in 5th and Mick Simon placing 6th.

In the 440 run Guenaro Siller won first and Byron Landrum placed 3rd. Dale Page won the 880 yard run.

In the mile run Thomas Hall placed second.

The local 440 relay team composed of Mick and Mike Simon, Elliott and Siller took first place at the meet.

The mile relay team (Landrum, Page, Lee Browning and Siller) took second place.

Elliott placed fifth in the discus and Terry McLean took fifth in the long jump.

Landrum took first in the pole vault event with David Miller coming in fourth and Steve Gist fifth.

Goldthwaite's Junior varsity team scored only 36 points in the District meet. Other teams and their scores were Dublin 121; Hico 99; Valley Mills 87; Glen Rose 79; and China Springs 38.

Tim Spradley took second place in the high hurdles and placed fourth in the high jump.

Randy Dumas came in third in the 100 yard run and won first in the 220 event.

The local 440 relay team composed of Dumas, Eddie Martinez, Spradley and Mark Lawrence took fifth in the District meet.

Other teams and their scores in the Junior High meet were China Springs 1st, 138; Valley Mills 3rd, 90; Hico 4th, 71; Dublin 5th, 52; and Glen Rose 6th, 40.

Arturo Siller, Rodney Scott, Tommy Collier and Mike Lee, the local 440 relay team, took first place in the meet.

In the 440 yard dash Siller took second place and Randy White came in third.

Collier placed first in the 100 dash and Scott took seventh place.

In the 220 dash event Collier took second while Lee placed fifth.

Winners from here in the 100 low hurdles were Mike Connolly fourth place and Jett Johnson, 6th. Charlie Davis took sixth in the 1320 run.

The junior high mile relay team (White, Stephen Coronado, Lee and Siller) took third place.

In the pole vault event Johnson won first with Lee placing third and Scott Senior making seventh place.

Lee placed second in the broad jump and Siller came in fourth.

Siller and Owen Hall tied for fifth place in the high jump event.

This concludes the year for the Junior High Track boys. They entered three meets, never finishing less than second place.

Admission to the rodeo will be adults \$1.00 and students 50 cents.



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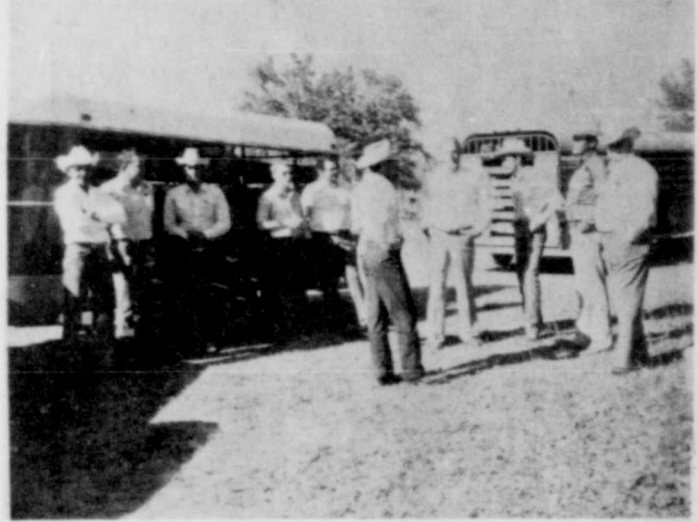
Jim McCoys Home Site Of Recent Char-Swiss Breeders Meeting

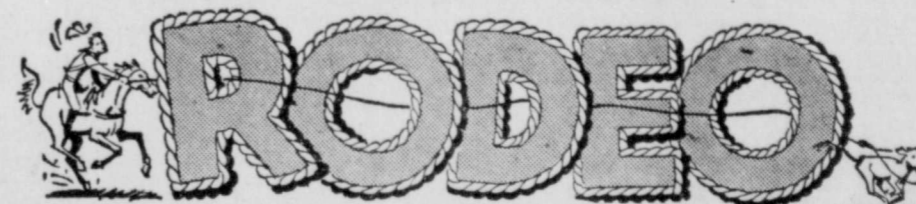

Pursuant to 55-308, Texas Water Code (Water Rights Adjudication Act, Section 5), the Texas Water Rights Commission further gives notice of the commencement of hearings to receive evidence concerning claims of water rights in the Pecan Bayou Watershed of the Colorado River Basin, consisting of portions of Mills, Brown, Comanche, Coleman, Callahan, Taylor, Eastland and Rannels Counties, Texas.

Parties are directed to file claims with the Commission by May 21, 1974, pursuant to 55-306 Texas Water Code, and thereafter to appear at 1:00 a. m. on Monday, June 24, 1974, at the Holiday Inn, Conference Room, 515 East Commerce Street, Brownwood, Texas, at which time the Texas Water Rights Commission, either as a Commission, or through its Hearings Examiners, will convene and commence hearings on all water rights claims, filed or asserted in accordance with 55-307, et seq., Texas Water Code, located in said Pecan Bayou Watershed.

You, or your authorized representative, are directed to first file claims by May 21, 1974 and thereafter to appear at the stated time, date, and place on Monday, June 24, 1974 and present such evidence as you desire the Commission to consider in determining the nature and extent of the claim or claims filed or asserted in your adjudication claim to use the water of the State above described.

The above claims and evidence from the above hearings will be the basis for the Commission's preliminary determination and failure to appear to present evidence will jeopardize the water rights asserted in the claim.

The initial hearing on Monday, June 24, 1974 in Brownwood, Texas will be to consider jurisdiction; immediately thereafter on this same day hearings to receive evidence in each case will then begin in Brownwood, Texas, at the Holiday Inn Conference Room, 515 East Commerce Street at 1:00 p. m., on Monday, June 24, 1974. What greater joy could we imagine? The death of death! Is not this incomprehensible? Indeed it is. The knowledge that death has died can be gained only through divine revelation. The death of death was accomplished through death itself; the death of the Son of God. By this death of the Son of God for the sins of man, death was defeated. Death as the end result of sin was ended. This is the Message of Good Friday or Easter. With all our death-talk, let the Church also talk about death; but let's say the right thing. What the world needs to hear is not the theologian who shouts from the headlines that God is dead. The world has enough darkness and bad news. On Good Friday, let the good news be sounded and proclaimed, the good news - without which all other news is meaningless - that God is alive and has clearly proved it at Calvary, where he brought death to death.
