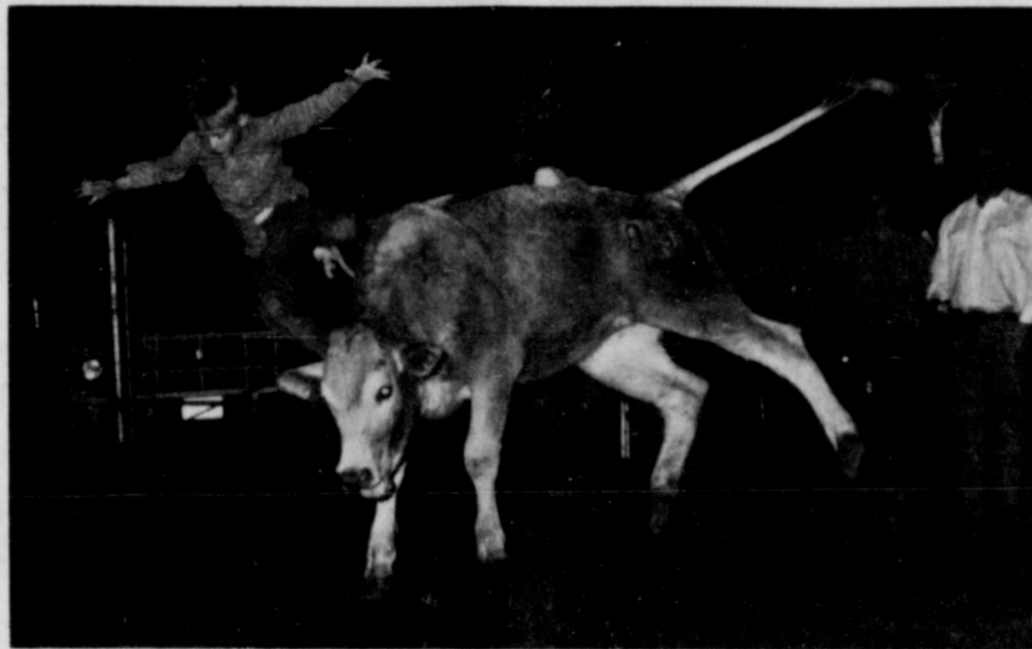
Officials of the school urge parents to have health records and birth certificates available.

The school-sponsored kindergarten has been planned to run half a day for the entire 1974-75 school year. The kindergarten classes will begin at the opening of the school year.

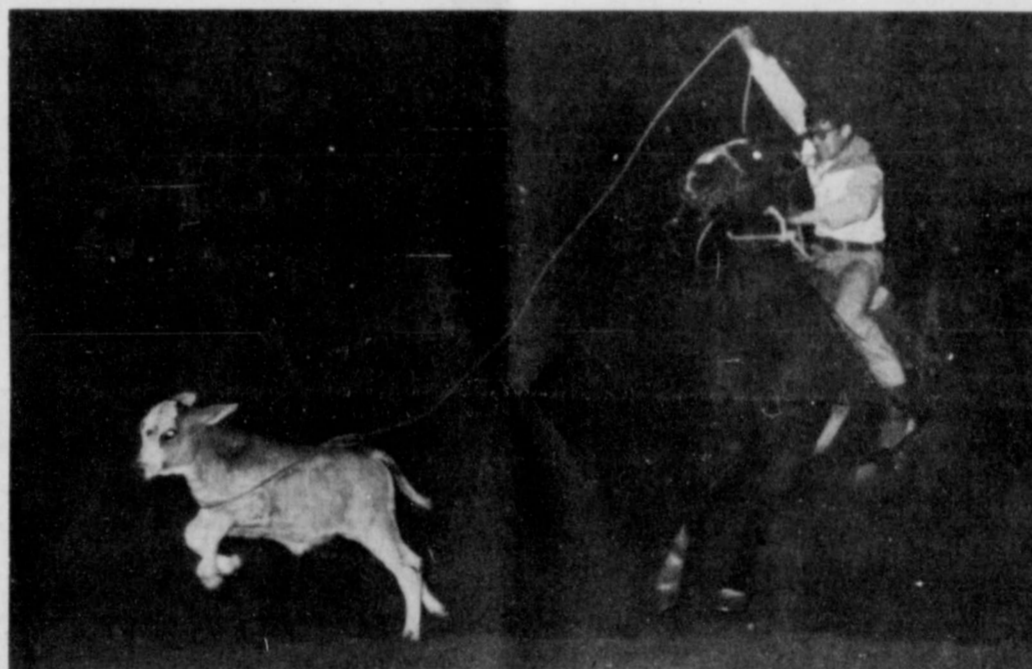
Associated With Lloyd Laughlin

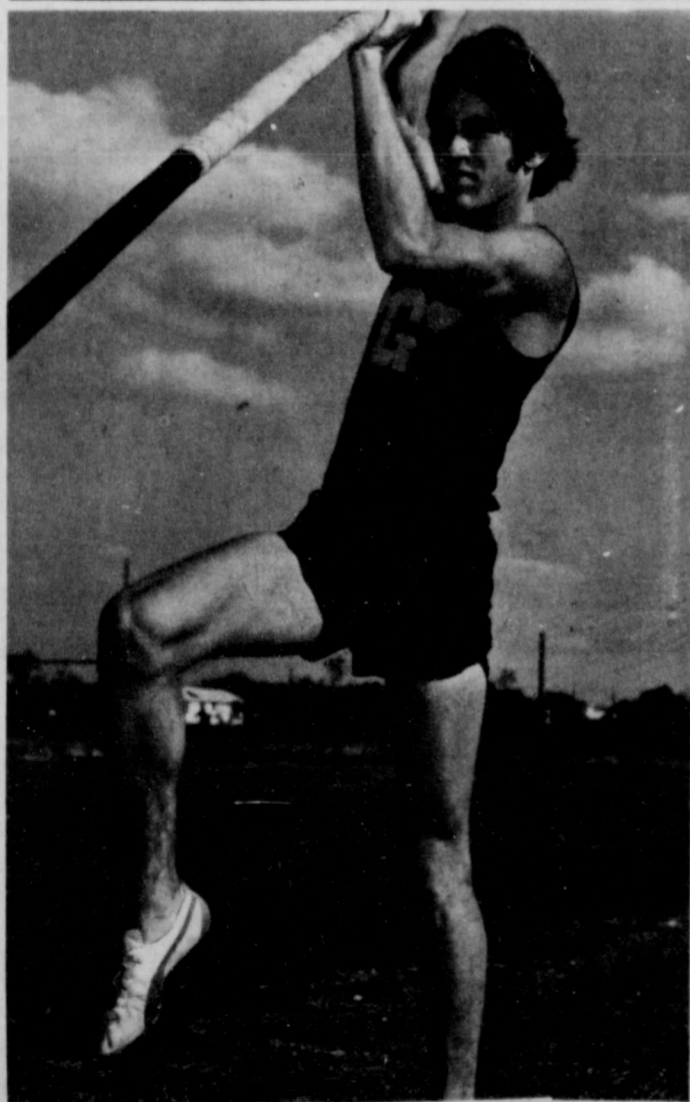

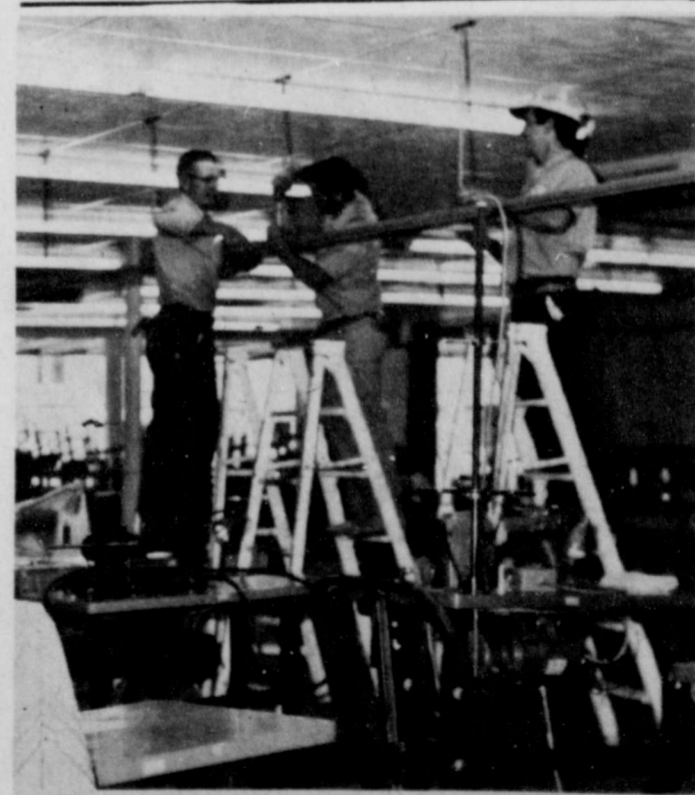


Bound For State

WHITE BREAD WITH VARIATIONS

2 pkgs. active dry yeast
1 c. warm water (105 - 115 degrees F.)
6 to 6 1/2 cups flour
Combine milk, sugar, shortening and salt; cool to luke warm. Soften yeast in warm water. Add softened yeast and 2 cups of flour to milk mixture; beat well. Add flour as needed to make a stiff dough. Turn dough onto lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl; turn once to grease top of dough. Cover and let rise in warm place until double in size. Punch down. Turn onto lightly floured board. Divide into

To the Editor Goldthwaite Eagle Goldthwaite, Texas

Dear Sir:

One of the fine things about living in a small community is how the citizens "arise for the occasion" especially during an emergency. Once in a while, late at night (and it seems to be always late at night) we have to call someone in to donate a unit of blood. When we do, it is usually a life saving matter. I do not believe that I have ever been turned down yet. And what a great feeling this gives us when in a few weeks we see our neighbor or friend and we say "There goes old Joe with some of my blood in his veins" and then a few jokes always follow.

For some reason the feeling is just not the same when the mobile unit comes to town and some person we do not know from some town we're not sure of draws our hard made blood and puts it in a cold box and takes it off somewhere and puts it in a big ice box with lots of other blood from communities like Brownwood, Coleman, Santa Anna. This feeling is not nearly as dramatic. However, the feeling should be even more so when we understand what happens to our blood and how a community blood program works.

To start with, our unit of blood is checked, then checked again and then checked one more time to make sure it is safe to use. Some of the machines used cost thousands of dollars.

Another interesting thing is the fact that all blood is not alike. There are 8 main different types. Let's say that you have AB Negative blood which is the rarest of all. I know of only one person in this community with this type. Say you come into the hospital and need surgery and the doctor wants two units of blood ready in case you need it, which is a very common situation. Now, we go to this big community ice box, reach back at the back and take two units of AG Neg. off the shelf. You do fine in the surgery and the blood is not used, so back to the shelf it goes to be available for someone else in some other community.

Unfortunately human blood will only keep for 21 days. In a community blood program, blood becomes world travelers. Our unit of blood may go to someone needing 10 units in San Antonio, or as the case has been, blood from Austin may come to Goldthwaite for someone with a bleeding ulcer. Very little blood is ever thrown away. A community blood program is a true carry-over from the days when barn raisings were held. How could we ever put a heavy beam in place without the help of our neighbors? I hope that all that can will take an active part in this very worthwhile lifesaving program.

The Dallas News, saw a good story about your city last Sunday. It brought back many fond memories to me.

My grandfather's farm is now the Cockrell Nursery, having changed from the name Brooks to Cockrell years ago. It is this side of the Colorado River bridge. Over on the San Saba side was my other grandparent's farm, the Walkers (S. G. and J. M.). Both farms were fertile and river-fed. I was born at the Brooks Farm, now Cockrell's Nursery, almost sixty-five years ago.

Many times I traveled by wagon to Goldthwaite to get our groceries, and other provisions. One day as we neared town, not far from Trent's ranch, a large rattlesnake crawled across the road and in front of our team!

Do you still preserve the water trough at the Court House square? It should remain for always as a historical landmark. Our team would be watered, and then my grandfather and I would set out to find hoop cheese, crackers, ripe bananas, peppermint candy,
