## Mills County Commissioners Court Organizes Board Of Equalization

Mills County Commissioners Court, at its regular meeting Monday, appointed a Board of Equalization. Appointed were Bill Bishop, Precinct 1; Howard Hoover, Precinct 2; Mott Ethridge, Precinct 3; and Billy Hale, Precinct 4. This group will be responsible

for equalizing present inequities in the county tax roll and will raise the minimum evaluation of land from \$5 to \$10.

"The commissioners court feels that the equalization is possible by a committee appointed with members from all over the county and that fair adjustments can be made."

"In many cases," said County Judge Cecil Egger, "tax rates will be lowered following evaluation."

The Board of Equalization will begin meeting next Monday at 9 a. m. at the Commissioners Courtroom in the courthouse.

This meeting is open to the public and the Commissioners urge tax payers to be present to voice their opinion.

Judge Egger commented that the Priddy and Star school districts must be raised in order to meet financial needs. These school districts still use the county tax roll as a basis for their collections.

### Fishing Regulations

It is that time of the year again when the fishing "fever" hits Mills County.

Local Game Warden, Bennie Schriver, reminds everyone in the Colorado - Pecan River area to obey all fishing regulations.

Only two trotlines per person with a maximum of 50 hooks per line spaced 36 in. apart are allowed. The person setting out the trotline should also have his name, address and the date the line was set out attached to it. The trotline would be redated every ninety days.

All boats operated on the river must have one U.S. Coast Guard approved life preserver (cushion or vest type) aboard for each person in the boat.

## City Employees Change To Hourly Pay Basis

Goldthwaite City Council, meeting in regular session last week, unanimously voted to change from a salary to a "pay by the hour" method of handling the payroll. The change comes as a result of recent changes in the state and local laws. The city's payroll now hits approximately \$6725 per month and all employees will be changed to the hour pay basis.

Other provisions of the new law require strict reporting for all hours missed. Sick leave provisions for local employees were tabled until the next meeting. Vacations, however, were discussed and employees will be given five days after twelve mos. employment and one day for each additional year worked with a maximum of twenty days vaca-

tion. City Manager Don Petty presented an up-to-date report on the electrical situation and said that a wholesale rate increase would possibly be forthcoming to finance a power plant. LCRA will build a new plant to handle some of the overload. New Councilman Howard Campbell presented a report due to numerous complaints received

from citizens on the loose dog problem. It was the decision of the council that severe action will be taken if persons do not vaccinate and license their dog. Several reports of destruction to livestock and property have been received recently. CM Petty was requested to clean up the premises of the


old city dump so that the property could be sold as soon as possible. Present at the meeting were councilmen Howard Campbell, Loy Long, Donald Padgett, Jimmy Smith and Ancle Morgan, Mayor Ray Duren, City Secretary Glynn Collier, Dale Allen and Eagle Editor Frank Bridges.

## Extension Highlights

Eggs are mighty magical marvels. And right now eggs are coming to market in profusion according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Beneath those fragile shells is

a powerhouse of goodness; a built-in inherent quality of being flavorfully superb served "as is", regardless of the cooking method used - plus the ability to do lots of exciting things for other foods in a subtle, magical way.

One special power eggs possess is the ability to thicken - a quality that wise cooks use to prepare tasty custards, puddings, pie fillings, salad dressings, sauces, and soups. Eggs that are gently heated quickly set, thicken, firm-up, or coagulate - whichever term you prefer - as when you poach an egg. An egg, when slightly beaten and combined with other ingredients and gently heated, will thicken the mixture into a tasty "oneness".

Eggs added directly to any heated liquid or mixture may set before being thoroughly dispersed. Therefore, for full-bodied consistency and velvety smooth finished products, it is best to slowly add some of the "heated" ingredient to the beaten egg. Then quickly stir the egg into the remaining hot mixture.

Careful temperature control is needed when eggs are used to thicken a liquid mixture such as a custard. Temperatures that are too high, or overcooking, will cause the egg protein to shrink and separate from the liquid.

To prevent overheating during surface cooking, use a double boiler and keep the water just below boiling. For oven cooking, set the baking dish in a pan of hot water in a moderate oven. Remove egg mixtures from the heat promptly when done.

In sauces, puddings, and fillings, a starchy thickening agent - flour, cornstarch, or tapioca - is often used in combination with eggs. Because starch needs longer cooking than eggs first combine the starch with the liquid and cook thoroughly before adding eggs.

Two egg yolks or two egg whites have the same thickening power as one whole egg.

**CORN PUDDING**  
1 tbsp butter or margerine  
1 tbsp flour  
1 cup scalded milk  
1 tsp salt  
one eighth tsp pepper  
1 tsp sugar  
16 oz can cream-style corn  
4 eggs, slightly beaten  
Preheat oven to 375 (moderate). Grease a 1 qt. casserole. Melt butter or margerine and blend in flour. Add milk, salt, pepper, and sugar. Add corn and heat slightly. Blend eggs into warm milk mixture. Pour into casserole, place casserole in a pan of hot water, and bake 1 hour or until set. Pudding is done when the tip of a table knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Makes 6 servings, about two-thirds cup each, about 165 calories each.

For fewer calories, use a 10 oz package of frozen whole kernel corn in place of the cream-style corn. About 140 calories per serving.

Serve with hot or cold sliced roast beef, green snap beans, and French bread. Have fruit gelatin and pound cake for dessert.

## Congressman Poage Thanks Voters- Not Involved With Hearne Check

To My Friends of the 11th Congressional District:  
For the 20th time I am privileged to thank you for your loyal support which has enabled me to represent you so long. For this support and confidence I have always been appreciative. You have honored me. I hope that I can serve you creditably.

In view of the effort of my recent opponent to insinuate that I was connected with the unhappy situation involving City of Hearne finances, I am especially grateful to the friends (more than 80 percent of the voters) who have reaffirmed their confidence in me. Your confidence means much more to me than votes in an election. It means the maintenance of the respect for which I have worked my entire life. Naturally I have resented the slurs and suggestions (never quite emerging as clear cut charges) that have been directed against me. I felt they should be answered but I did not want anyone to feel that I was discussing these charges from a political angle. The election is now over, and I hope I can speak without being misunderstood.

The newspapers and other media have, of course, given substantial publicity to these charges. This was but proper news reporting, and I have no criticism or resentment. The media has tried to be fair. I only hope they will consider the statements of all of the responsible officials who had any connection with this transaction to be as important and as newsworthy as the statement of the bookkeeper in the Hearne City Office who stated that while she had no personal knowledge, she had been told that the check in question had gone to a Congressman. I believe that in the present state of the record, this is the only shred of evidence that in any way attempts to connect me with this unfortunate situation. Let me, therefore, outline the events and the public statements of those who might know if I were connected.

On February 28th, a representative of TV Station KTRA in Houston called my Washington office and reported that he had learned there had been a check for \$12,000 issued to a non-existent engineering company by the City of Hearne sometime in 1971, that there was no supporting documentation and that it was reported that this money had gone to me or to my campaign account.

The gentleman from the TV station came to Washington and interviewed me the next day, March 1st. He played a tape on which a bookkeeper in the City Office at Hearne stated that she had made out such a check and given it to a member of the City Council. She said that she... "had been told" ... that the check had gone to a Congressman and that Congressman was W. R. Poage. She did not claim to have any personal knowledge to this effect. The tape also contained an interview with the then Mayor of Hearne, who refused to answer questions and stated that he "took the fifth."

The TV representative advised that after the recorded interview was completed, the Mayor said he "supposed" the money had gone to Congressman Poage because Hearne needed a lot of Federal help and Poage had gotten it for them.

When I was apprised of the charges, I contacted the Department of Justice, on March 2nd, and asked that the FBI make a complete investigation. Receipt of my request was acknowledged by letter of March 5th. I understand this investigation has been completed and a report is now moving through the various review points. Indeed, on April 18th, the "Cameron Herald" stated... "an agent of the FBI told the 'Herald' that his office... had determined that there is no federal violation in this case." This statement means that the FBI found no involvement on my part because were a Congressman involved, there would be a federal violation.

I trust this report will be made public in the near future, but I don't believe it is necessary to await the report in view of the statements of the parties who have personal knowledge of the case.

On March 5th, the MAYOR repudiated the statement made by the bookkeeper and voluntarily sent me a wire stating that he had just been released from the hospital for a third heart attack and that while he was somewhat confused, the statement attributed to the bookkeeper was inaccurate. This was followed by a letter in which he denied that he told the bookkeeper that any money went to me and in which he expressed his apologies. The "Bryan Eagle" had, on March 2nd, quoted the Mayor as stating, "As far as I know, he (Poage) never received a nickle of the money."

The CITY COUNCILMAN, who allegedly took the check from the bookkeeper and deposited it in a Bryan bank, is quoted by the "Cameron Herald" of March 21st as saying, "... I don't think any of it went to Congressman Poage."

A few days later, an ATTORNEY in Hearne, who had returned the \$12,000 for a client whose name he was not privileged to divulge, indicated that he knew I did not get the money but, because of the confidential relationship with his client, he could not state who did get it. The "Temple Telegram", on March 22nd, quoted this attorney, who is possibly the only person who knows who got the money, as stating, "I think the investigation shows that none of the money was given to Bob Poage."

On March 28th, the local judicial process resulted in a number of indictments at Franklin. After hearing the Grand Jury proceedings, the DISTRICT ATTORNEY is quoted in the "Killen Herald" of March 21st as stating, "There is no evidence to connect U. S. Representative W. R. (Bob) Poage of Waco with the \$12,000 taken from Hearne city funds."

Naturally, after 50 years of public service without a charge of dishonesty, this sort of thing is distressing, especially so since it is of such a nature that any irresponsible publicity seeker can make a charge; but I cannot refute the charge except to state my innocence. If the church in your community were burned tomorrow night and someone said he "heard" that you burned it, how would you prove you did not do so? I cannot say what happened at Hearne, because I know as little as you do about the check. I have furnished all the information requested by the authorities, and I am pleased that every party to this transaction, who might have personal knowledge of the truth or falsity of the charges, has stated that he knows of no connection on my part.

I am not a rich man in worldly goods, but throughout my entire life I have been rich in a good reputation and loyal friends, and I don't intend to allow anyone to take these from me, whether his acts are for political gain or simply for publicity. I have confidence in the people of Central Texas, and I intend to give them all the facts that they may judge this thing for themselves.

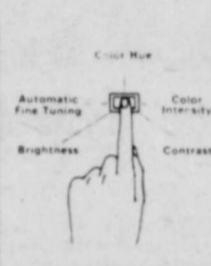

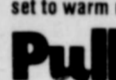

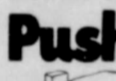

## Tractor Short Course Scheduled Here June 3-6

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held June 3-6 under the sponsorship of the Goldthwaite High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Gilbert Davis, Superintendent and Mr. Jim Wells, teacher of vocational agriculture.

The short course is being sponsored by the vocational agriculture department of Goldthwaite High School. Mr. Norman K. Waggoner, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instruction. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University. Arrangements for the adult education short course in tractor maintenance and in other fields are made through Mr. Wells' office.

# Our Mills County Teachers Retire

My life began for Katie Hill, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Hill, November 3, 1907, in Goldthwaite. The next year they moved home a few miles from Goldthwaite. My earliest memories of my home in the South Mills Community. My first teacher was Mr. Roy Simpson. He bought my books at Goldthwaite. My first school was one large room with a big cast iron stove and the pupils ranged in ages from seven to grown boys and girls. I skipped the second grade. I usually had a new teacher each year. The year I was in the first grade we had no school. For Christmas I went to Goldthwaite. From then on until my graduation in May, 1925, I was at Goldthwaite School.

When school began the following year, I was at Mullin teaching fourth grade. As the years passed I became third, second, and finally first grade teacher. I have taught many children of the boys and girls whom I taught in earlier years at Mullin and at Ridge. While at Mullin I earned my degree from Howard Payne.

As I finish my thirty-nine years of teaching in Texas I will say that if I had it all to do over I would still choose teaching. I believe I would choose the very same children as students for I have loved them all. I hope that as I helped them learn their lessons the state of Texas set up. I taught them much more than I felt was important.

I have taught the last twenty-eight years at Mullin.
