## 1924 Class Golden Anniversary Proclaimed Successful

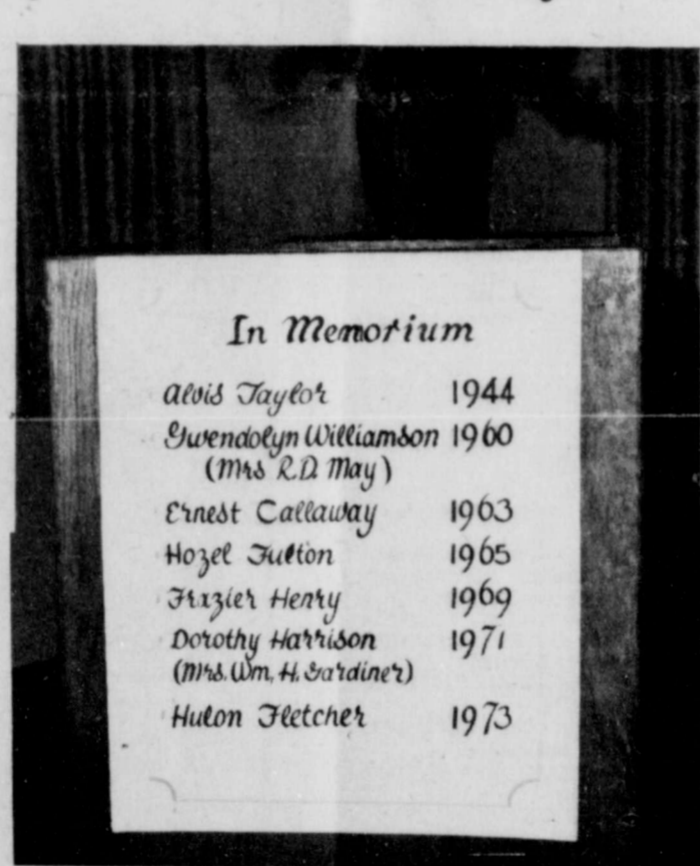

## CTCOG Forms Local Manpower Council

A group of Goldthwaite citizens met recently with staff members of the Central Texas Council of Governments to form a local advisory committee for CTCOG.

Purpose of the meeting which was held in the courtroom of the Mills County Courthouse was for the election of officers for the county committee, in addition to three representatives and one alternate to serve on the Central Texas Regional Manpower Planning Advisory Council.

Del Barnett was named chairman of the local committee. Vice-chairman is A. R. Whisenhunt, and Don Petty is secretary.

Advisory council members who will meet monthly with other councils in the seven-county area, are Tom Cody Graves, Blake English, Del Barnett and Clyde Codrum Jr., alternate.

According to a news release from CTCOG, responsibilities of the county committee include planning the goals, policies, and procedures, in addition to making recommendations to the Central Texas Regional Manpower Advisory Council.

An office manager will be hired to work in Mills County. Particulars of the job are listed under the employment section on the classified page in this issue.

## Mills County Park Committee Solicits Funds For Maintenance

Mills County Park annual maintenance fund drive is now underway, according to an announcement by W. P. Duren, park committee chairman.

Members of the park committee met in regular session Tuesday in the Mills County State Bank Community Room and outlined the drive for 1974.

Those present with Chairman Duren were Harold Yarborough, Houston Duren, Don Petty, Charles Conradt and Lewis Hudson.

Duren, who distributed a park fund report, explained the program for raising money needed for park maintenance each year. A total of \$455.38 is on hand in the park maintenance fund. Cash gifts during 1973 totaled \$1393.39, with expenditures totaling \$1318.20.

A general report of park operations, swimming pool operations, and manpower to run the park this year was discussed.

City Manager Don Petty was given the authority to secure necessary help to keep the park maintained.

An advertisement published in this week's Eagle further explains park operations.

The park committee hopes that interested persons will respond generously with their donations as they have in the past.

Committee members sincerely appreciate the past support given this worthwhile operation.

The honor roll of park maintenance fund boosters will be published in the Eagle starting next week.

## Tractor Maintenance Shortcourse Scheduled

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held June 3-6 under the sponsorship of the Goldthwaite High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Gilbert Davis, Superintendent and Mr. Jim Wells, teacher of vocational agriculture.

The short course is being sponsored by the vocational agriculture department of Goldthwaite High School.

Mr. Norman K. Waggoner, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instruction. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Arrangements for the adult education short course in tractor maintenance and in other fields are made through Mr. Wells' office.

The short course at Goldthwaite High is scheduled to begin June 3 at 7:00 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held June 4, 5, and 6.

During the dates the short course is in progress Mr. Waggoner will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction, according to Jim Wells.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Gilbert Davis, or the Teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. Jim Wells. An entry fee of \$3 will be charged. Tractor Maintenance Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

Interested persons should contact Jim Wells or Gilbert Davis at the school as soon as possible because a limited number can be enrolled in the short course.

## Comanche Co. Electric Receives \$863,000 Loan Application

The Comanche County Electric Cooperative has received word that a loan application for \$863,000 has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration. These funds are to be used to furnish service to an estimated 543 new service locations, to increase the capacity of individual services to 115 existing consumers, to increase the capacity of 20 miles of existing lines, and to purchase associated equipment for safer and more efficient operation of the electric distribution lines throughout the cooperative area.

The cooperative now serves 8,000 consumers on 3,570 miles of line. In addition to the rural residential, the Co-op serves over 1,000 irrigation systems,

650 oil well pumping and associated loads, and many other miscellaneous needs. This has a tremendous impact on the economy of the area, consisting of parts of 7 counties; Comanche, Brown, Mills, Eastland, Callahan, Stephens and Shackelford.

Like all other parts of the electric utility industry, the Co-op's costs continue to rise—for instance, poles are over double the cost of just a year ago, wire is more than double, and other equipment is up from 15 to 50 per cent.

The only increase to the cooperative's members has been the fuel cost adjustment passed on in the same amount as charged on their wholesale power bill. If prices continue to rise, however, an increase in the basic rate will be necessary.

The bride was given in marriage by her father, Rev. William Nichols of Richardson who performed the wedding ceremony.

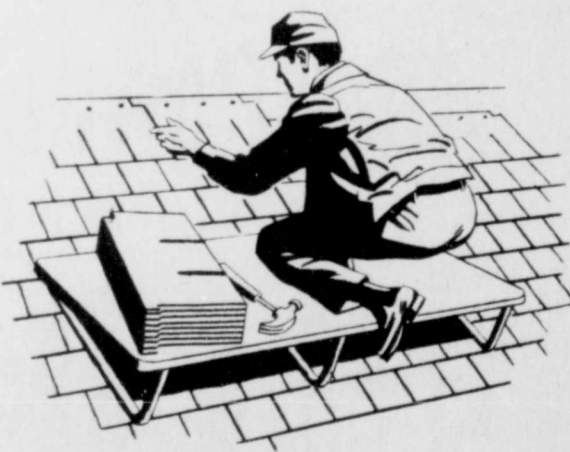

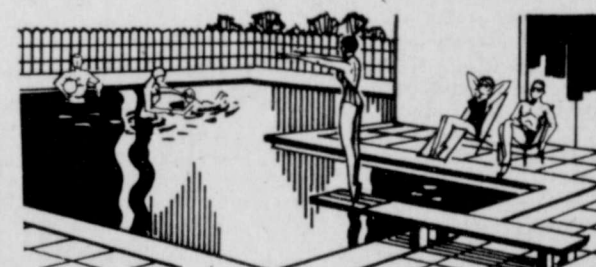

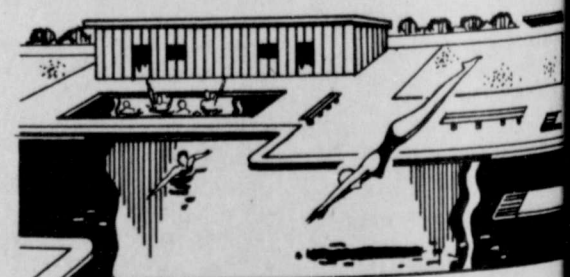

St. Richard  
Takes Sunday

Sunday, May 26th at 2:30 p.m. Grave Marker dedication to St. Richard S. Stokes will be held at the Lone Cove Cemetery. Stokes saved three people from drowning, July, 1911 at Ludwicks Mill, for which he was awarded a Carnegie Hero Medal plus one thousand dollars. The State Historical Survey Committee gave a grave marker for the act, and the local Unit of Comas County will make the dedication.

The crack drill team of the 1st Cav. Division of Ft. Hood will give an exhibition under command of Sgt. Major W. B. ... and Taps will be blown by a bugler dressed in Confederate Uniform.

Address of welcome will be given by County Judge Rucker Northon, and a detailed account of the rescue by Lactus M. Stephens, member of the County Committee, Mrs. Tenney Bullion is County Chairman.

Stokes served four years in the Confederacy, 1861 to 1865, and was in many major battles. After the war he moved to the Lone Cove Community, and passed away in Lometa, October 1920. Following this dedication, the Phantom Hill road marker will be dedicated on the Lometa-Saba Highway No. 190, 2 miles west of Lometa. This is the oldest road in this part of Texas and was used to supply troops at Ft. Phantom Hill near Abilene from Austin, 1846-1854. Each county this military road crossed will have a historical marker. The road ran approximately where Goldthwaite is now located. This dedication will be at approximately 4:30 p.m.

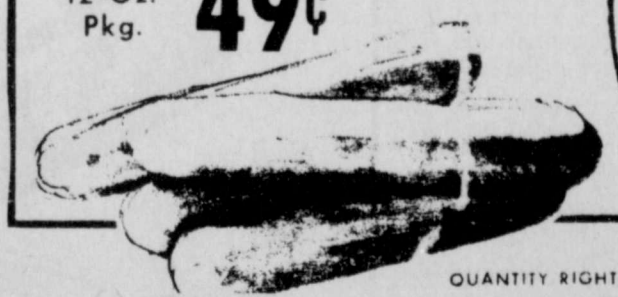

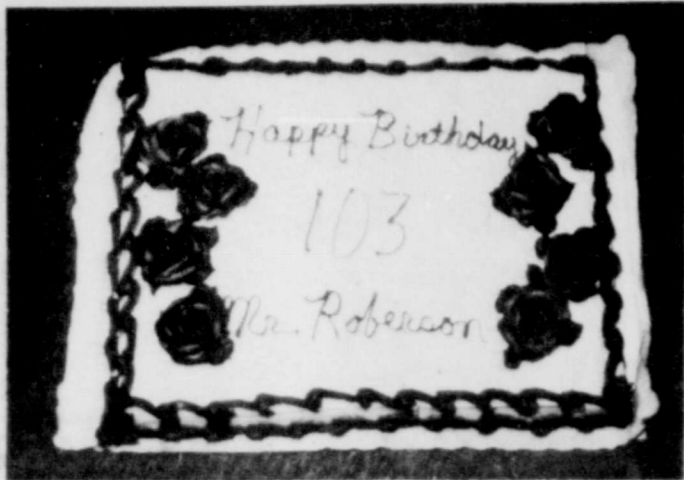

## From the County Agent

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Pecan producers should begin thinking about spray applications for control of the pecan nut casebearer within a very short time. Research is being conducted throughout the state in an effort to pin-point spray application dates. At present, it looks like the date for first applications for Mills County will be sometime between May 18-22, 1974. It is difficult to give a specific date as yet. We hope to have the date by the end of this week. Notification will be placed on the bulletin board as soon as it is determined.

Several chemicals are labeled for use on pecans in controlling the casebearer. We would suggest that homeowners use Sevin or golone, as most of the chemicals recommended are too toxic for the homeowner to use. Several of the chemicals recommended have grazing restrictions which should be carefully con-

sidered. The recommendation for Sevin is 2 lbs. of 80 percent WP per 100 gallons of water, other recommended chemicals include Guthion, Thiodan, Malathion, Toxophene, and golone.

Be sure to read and follow all label instructions when using these or any other chemicals.
