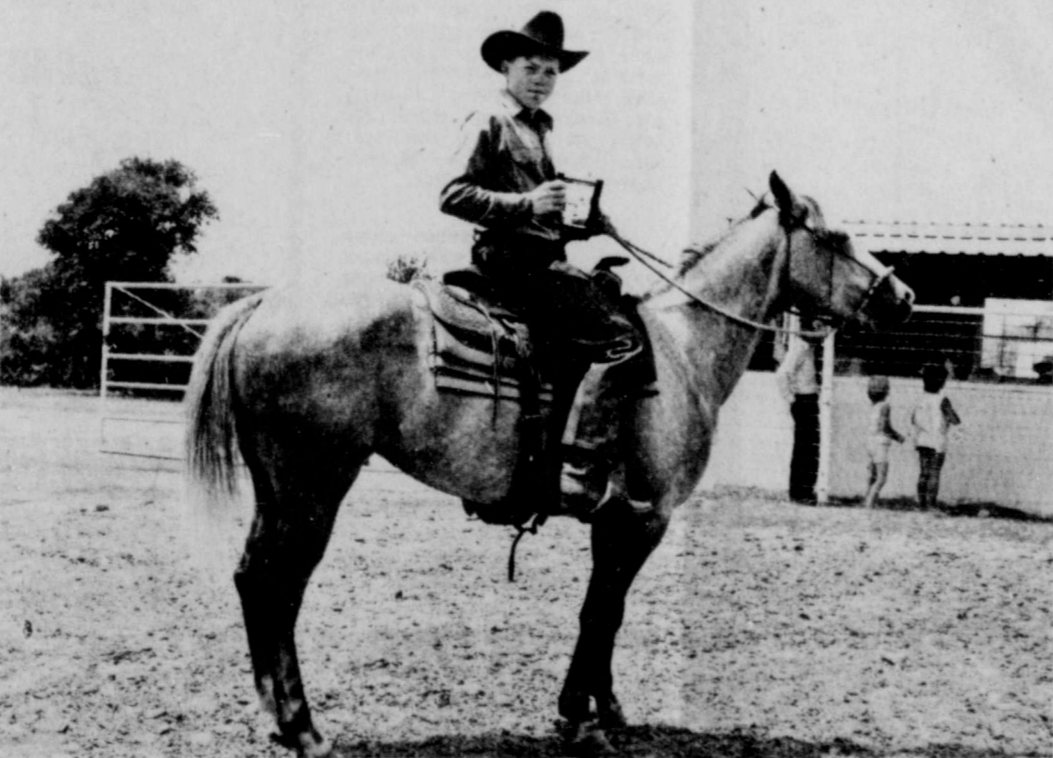

On Sunday, June 16, two miles north of Priddy on Texas 16 a two-vehicle accident occurred resulting in serious injury to one of the passengers.
 A 1969 GMC pickup driven by Brian Swiler of Priddy went out of control and ran off the right side of the roadway over a bar-ditch. Meier of Jamie Pstas of Gainsville, passenger, received only minor injuries. Heridget Meier, driver of Priddy and a passenger in the vehicle, received serious injuries. She was taken to address hospital by Wilkins ambulance. The pickup sustained no damage.

Sixteenth Annual Invitational Rodeo June 20, 21, & 22

Goldthwaite's sixteenth annual invitational rodeo, which is sponsored by the local FFA Chapter, opens tonight and will be staged Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, June 20, 21 and 22.
 Thursday afternoon (today) a big street parade will get underway at 5 o'clock. The parade will begin at the high school grounds. All schools invited to participate in the rodeo are urged to have as many horse-

back riders in the parade as possible.
 FFA Advisor and Vocational Agriculture Teacher Jim Wells and Jim McCoy, president of the Mills County Rodeo Association, promise three nights of exciting action for rodeo fans.
 Each night the performance will get underway at 8 p. m. in the T. A. Head Rodeo Arena north of the elementary school here.

Business firms and civic groups are invited to participate in the parade with floats and other suitable entries. The members of the FFA Chapter will appreciate the support of everyone taking part in order to help make this a successful rodeo.
 Events for the three nights include breakaway roping, calf riding, goat sacking, bull riding, wild horse race, calf roping, barrel races, and ribbon roping.
 Schools invited by Goldthwaite, the host for the three nights of rodeo action, are Brownwood, Lometa, Zephyr, San Saba, Gustine, Hamilton, Blanket, Comanche, Evant, Pottsville, Early, Bangs, Star, Priddy, Mullin, Richland Springs, Lampasas and Rochelle.

Ribbons will be presented to the first six places each night and trophies will be given to the three top teams. Overall winners in each event will be awarded individual trophies.

Boys and girls who are enrolled in the seventh grade and under are eligible for the grade school events.
 Contestants entering the high school events must have been enrolled in the 8th-12th grades inclusive during the 1973-74 school year.
 Participating schools are encouraged to have as many horseback riders as possible in the parade and in each night's grand entry.

15 Year Old Rudd Long Saves Life

A 15-year-old boy's instincts last week prevented an afternoon of fun in rain-swollen Mary's Creek in Benbrook from ending in tragedy for Clay Yandell, 10.

Clay was listed in fair condition at Peter Smith Hospital. He survived because 15-year-old Rudd Long was able to keep him alive under water until he was pulled from under a large section of concrete where his body was wedged in Mary's Creek.

Rudd said he saw the boy as he slipped and was swept under a large piece of broken concrete in the water. He managed to keep the boy alive by frequently going under water to blow him air, and by cupping his hands around the boy's mouth to divert the water. Other neighbors arrived to help and the boy was finally pulled from the water by the Benbrook Volunteer Fire Department.

Rudd is the son of Virginia Ruth and Dick Long; the grandson of Mrs. Curtis Long of the Heritage Nursing Home, and the late Mr. Long; and of the late Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Rudd, residents of Goldthwaite for many years. He is also the grandnephew of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Rudd, and of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Fox of Goldthwaite.

The City of Goldthwaite, in public auction last Saturday morning, sold 30 acres of land at \$355 per acre.
 The real estate, the former city dumping grounds, was sold to Lynn Elliott and Kellis Landrum who were the high bidders for the property.
 Immediate plans for the prop-

erty were not stated by the new owners.

The land became available for sale following the city's purchase of a tract of land west of Goldthwaite that has subsequently been made into a sanitary land fill.

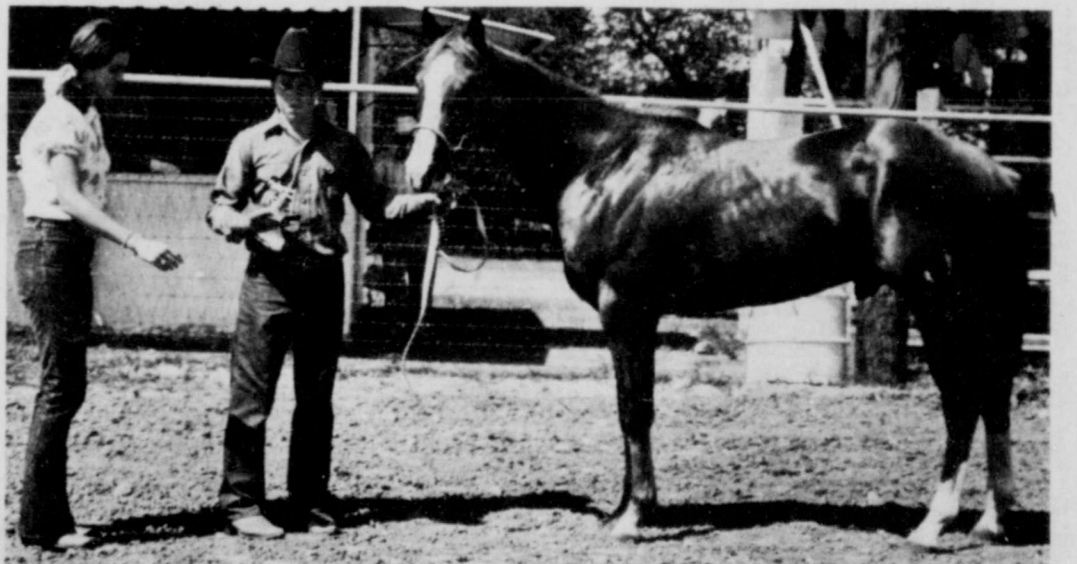
A large crowd attended the auction, held on the grounds of the Mills County Courthouse, but only two or three persons were actively bidding on the property according to City Manager Don Petty.

These figures result in a total of 37 accidents with no deaths and 21 injured in Mills County during 1974.

Extension Highlights

Using Glass Jars for Freezing Fruits & Vegetables

Fruits and vegetables can be frozen at home in glass containers. They can be reused, but be sure to examine the jars for nicks and cracks. Wash the jars in hot, soapy water, rinse and scald to be sure that they are sanitary. Invert the jars on a clean cloth to drain and cool.

Pack the jars to within 1/2 inch of the top, packing firmly, but not tightly. Place the lid on the jar with sealing composition next to the glass and screw the ring tightly. Canning jar lids may be used. Clear glass makes labeling unnecessary except for the date of freezing.

Freezing Corn-On-The-Cob

Do you like garden-fresh corn-on-the-cob in the middle of winter? Here is how to freeze it:

Selecting good quality corn is the first step. You can have no better corn come out of the freezer than that which you put in. Select those with plump, tender kernels, and then sweet milk. If the milk is thick and starchy, it is better to freeze the corn as cream-style.

Husk, silk, trim and wash the corn, sorting it according to size. Slow down or stop the action of enzymes. Until the corn is ready to pick, enzymes help it grow and mature; after that it causes loss of flavor and color. It takes on a musty, woody taste.

Heat small ears up to 1 1/2 inches in diameter for 7 minutes, medium size ears 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 inches in diameter for 9 minutes, and large ears over 1 1/2 inches in diameter for 11 minutes.

Cool the corn quickly in cold water and drain. Pack the ears into containers or wrap in moisture vapor proof material. Freeze immediately, and your family can look forward to summer goodness of the corn-on-the-cob in the middle of winter.

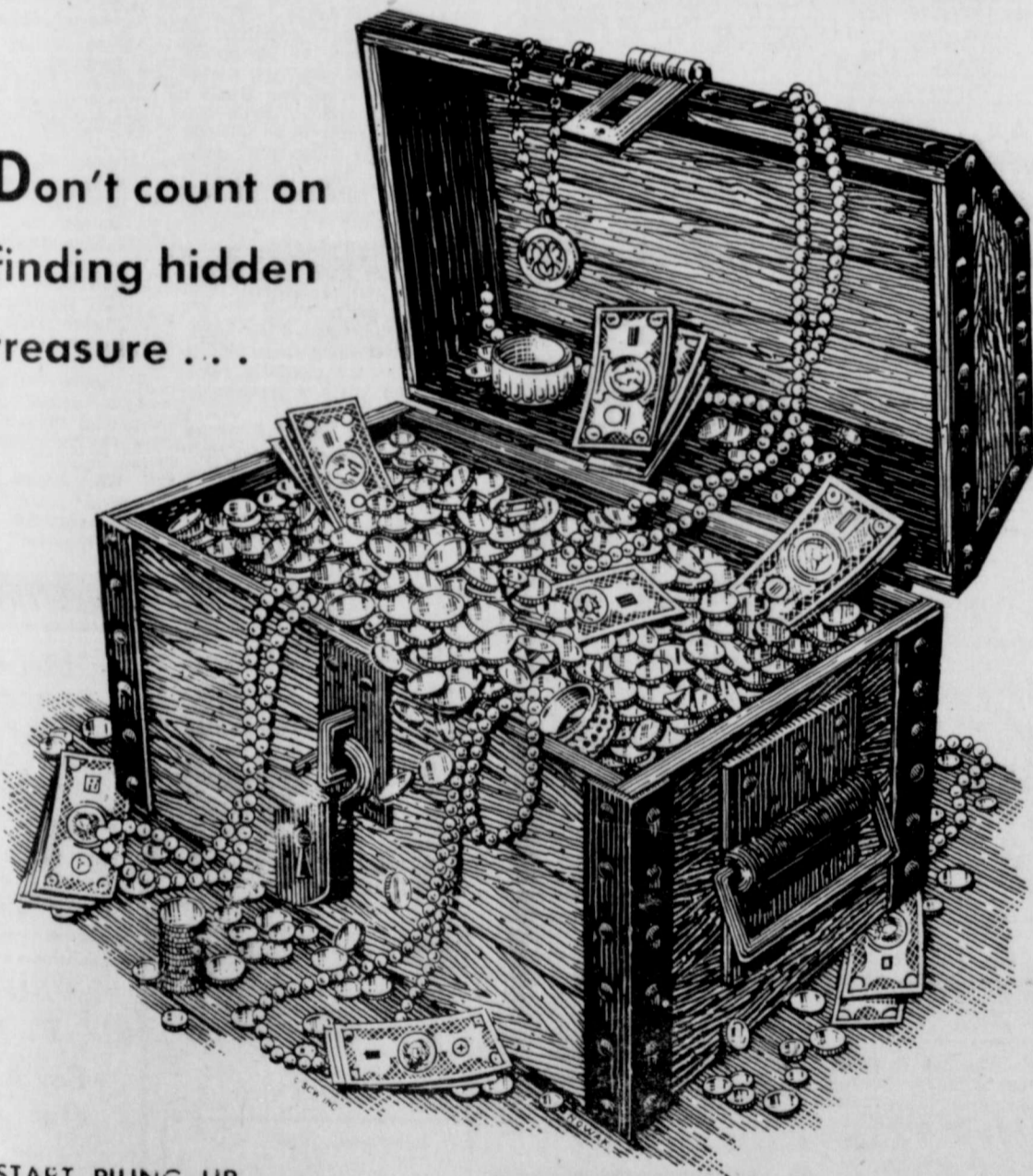

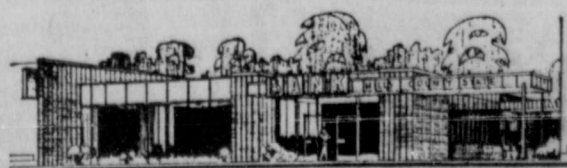

Plants infected with St. Augustine grass, a Mosaic virus, being reported in certain areas and increasing numbers.

The early disease infection leaves show a chlorotic mottling or mosaic pattern becomes progressively severe until a chlorotic necrosis is observed. In the later stages the grass becomes weakened, leaves and stems begin to die and invading weeds crowd out the St. Augustine grass.

This virus causes a mosaic effect and is diagnosed and distinguished from chlorotic diseases caused by nutritional deficiencies or green islands caused by other viruses.

Plants infected with the virus respond temporarily to insecticides and chemical nutrition, with macro and micro-elements (nutrient elements). However, the disease will not be long lasting and the mosaic symptoms remain. After infection, it usually takes about 3 years for the St. Augustine grass to be weakened to the extent areas die or become invaded by weeds.

Central Texas homeowners have a new weapon with which to battle (SAD) in their St. Augustine grass lawns. A new variety of Floratam, a new variety of Floratam that is resistant to the disease, is now available in the Fort Worth area. The new Floratam was developed jointly by Texas and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and released to commercial sod planters in 1972.

Thomas A. Lee, Jr., plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, stated that Floratam is also resistant to downy mildew and leaf spots; however, brown leaf spots still poses a problem. The grass is moderately coarse and fast growing and has a green color. It also has a root system than common St. Augustine. "Numerous observations have been established using this grass in Texas good results," states the pathologist.

Floratam can be used in establishing a new lawn or for replanting in established lawns by SAD. For best results the following suggestions are:

1. Interplanting, plant the Floratam in 18-inch centers. For sods or seed-beds, plant Floratam in 18 inch centers. Keep sods sprigs out of heat and dry conditions. After planting the grass thoroughly watered. Apply a fertilizer when the new grass begins to grow.

2. Purchase Floratam sods or sprigs from a reputable nursery since it is hard to distinguish from common St. Augustine grass.
