Water Under The Bridge

... irrigation systems along the Colorado River have been criticized for a long time by water users of the City of Goldthwaite, as most of the city supply water comes from Texas' Colorado River.

... time has proven that the irrigation systems haven't "dried" the river. Indeed, the profits derived therefrom have been tremendous in the crops have resulted.

... in the case of the Leonard Bros. Farm, an irrigation system proved to be the lifeline for the citizens of Goldthwaite.

... beginning last Wednesday morning, Leonard's foreman, Bert Hoffman, began to pump water from Leonard's large hole in the city's source that had been dangerously low by heavy usage. City reservoirs off the river were almost empty.

... of Tuesday afternoon the hole was just 18 inches deep and capacity and the two large reservoirs were full, all due to the benevolent efforts of Leonard Bros. Farm and Elbert Haman.

... Leonard's big 6 inch pump filled the city's hole at the rate of about 2000 gallons a minute, and the city could pump only about 900 gallons a minute, thus accounting for the gain in water to the city.

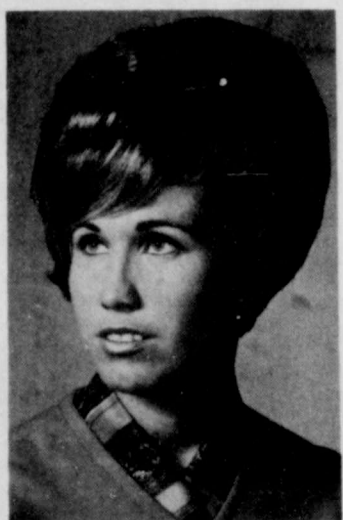

August 19th Marks Beginning Of Local School Classes

Goldthwaite Public Schools will open their doors on August 12th at 9 a. m. for the 1974-75 school year. The first week will be in-service week for teachers.

First day of classes for students will be Monday, August 19.

This will be a regular school day with buses running and lunches being served.

Registration for juniors and seniors will be on Wednesday, August 14th, and freshmen and sophomore registration will be

conducted Friday, August 16th. Time for each registration will appear in next week's issue of the paper.

Superintendent Gilbert Davis reminds parents that all students must have immunizations that are required by the State of Texas. Shots required by the state are: Diphtheria-Tetanus (three shots); Measles (one shot); and Rubella (one shot). The student must have

had one of these shots in the past ten years.

Davis also stated that students wishing to leave the school grounds to go home or elsewhere for lunch or for any other reason must have a written excuse from his parents or guardian. Students driving their own vehicles to school must also bring a written permit from their parents or guardian indicating that they may do so.

Good, balanced meals will be

served at the school cafeteria each day for the students. The menus will be checked by the Texas Education Agency.

Refreshments will be served during the day and everyone is urged to come browse through the library.

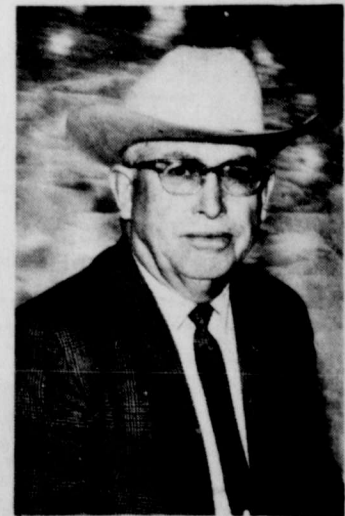
Judge Proclaims July 25-31 As Mills Co. Farm Safety Week

County Judge Cecil Egger has proclaimed the week of July 25-31, 1974, as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY in Mills County at the request of Floyd Daniel, Safety Chairman of Mills County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is joining efforts with other farm and ranch agencies within the county and many of its 209 counterpart FB's across the state.

In his proclamation, Judge Egger said "there are many practical, common-sense precautions that farm people can practice to prevent deaths and injuries." Some of the suggestions made by the Judge include: replace the faded Slow-Moving Vehicle emblems on farm equipment on public roads, use protective equipment at work, drive defensively, buy tractors with rollover protection, and follow good safe practices at home and recreation.

Like the cost-price crisis, farmers and ranchers have become increasingly concerned with a new phase of agricultural safety through regulatory requirements for their hired labor and the added cost of new equipment as a result of these regulatory requirements.

Reviewing the report of Fatal Farm Accidents in Texas for 1973, Farm Bureau President Bishop said, "We are concerned with more than just crop and livestock productivity alone." He expressed concern of the 214 fatal farm accidents which occurred in 123 different counties. "Of particular concern is the 59 deaths occurring to young people under 20 years of age and the 73 deaths occurring to the older group over 60 years of age," he explained. "Forty-two people died as a result of firearms accidents and there were 41 drownings - and only a small percentage of the total fatalities were involved in agriculture labor."

Alcoholism: A Discernible Pattern Bespeaks The Drift

2nd in a series

Since alcoholism, in the vast majority of instances, is a progressive disease during which glaring warning signals are set up by the problem drinker's be-

havior, any abuser of alcohol can personally measure his patterns and determine for himself whether or not he has become a victim of this killer disease. Once an alcoholic has accepted that fact and asked for help, he has a chance to recover.

This article describes some of the warning indications which point toward the fact that the problem drinker is making the transition into the state of an alcoholic. At any stage of alcoholism, even near-fatal conditions, arrest of the disease is possible.

Rare appearances of any of the "symptoms" do not mean definite alcoholism, but continued experiences with them almost always do. Probably the most shattering symptom of alcoholism is the "blackout". This prac-

tice of "pulling a blank" is not a mere "passing out" experience when the drinker folds up and sleeps it off, usually "like a slob". The latter is bad enough, but the blackout is capable of creating sheer terror. After a few drinks, the victim, without showing any or little obvious change in behavior, undergoes a total lapse of memory. The drinker in blackout is not outwardly drunk in the common sense of the term. He acts no different from others at a party, but he lives in a coma during a period of time. Sufferers often "come to" the next morning remembering nothing of the preceding evening and may not even know how they got home. Stories are common of those who rush out to hunt for their cars, to learn if they show crash signs.

Weird stories are common of businessmen who have operated successfully for as long as six weeks without later knowing what had been done. If a drinker experiences blackouts, he should know he is courting disaster. Sneaking drinks is a common behavior of those progressing into alcoholism. This person is clever in his manner of getting refills without being obvious, parking extra drinks for quick pick-ups or helping the host to mix and serve so that he can sneak extras. When this type of drinking becomes obvious to his friends and associates, the sneak drinker feels a drop in acceptance by the group and frequently is impelled to get a head start on every party or social gathering by having several drinks

before showing up among others. By arriving with a heavy liquor breath, the drinker invariably attracts suspicion, and he often is gradually eliminated from guest lists. This inevitably directs him toward isolation drinking.

Highly significant of the progression of alcoholism is the move to gulping drinks. Sipping and leisurely consumption no longer satisfies because such styles cannot give an immediate and potent reward. The imbiber now feels he NEEDS to drink. The quicker it goes down the better. The glow of partial intoxication, with its release from the increasingly painful realities of life, is best achieved by quickly downing liquor, as opposed to the socially approved habit of sipping, which becomes laborious.

These, and other warning signs, worry the drinker, and he

becomes constantly reminded that he has developed a problem. He knows he is drinking differently than other people, and the fact embarrasses him and creates feelings of guilt.

He artfully dodges discussions about drinking patterns, even preferences in drinks, for fear his own drinking habits will come into the conversation. He becomes aware friends recognize his problem, are concerned and often discuss it among themselves. But he doesn't want them talking to him about it.

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From the County Agent

Summer is a busy time for everyone, including that ever present population of insects. This time of year both homeowners and commercial fruit and nut producers are faced with a continual problem of insect and disease infestations in their plant life.

Webworms are increasing in numbers in some areas and we have had several contacts recently concerning webworms in pecan trees. The webs produced by the webworm are familiar to everyone. The adult of the webworm is a white moth which may have black or brown spots on the forewings. The wingspan

is usually about 1 inch in the adult moth. The larvae, which is actually the webworm, is pale yellow, spotted with black. They attain a length of 1 inch when full grown and are covered with long black and white hairs.

The insect overwinters as a pupa in a lightly woven cocoon on soil or under bark. In spring, adults emerge and lay masses of greenish white eggs on the leaves. Caterpillars hatching from the eggs feed on leaves in colonies under webs they construct. After feeding for a month to six weeks, larvae crawl down the tree and pupate in loose cocoons in debris, under bark or

in loose soil. Adults appear during summer and deposit eggs for the second generation. Larvae of this generation feed extensively until fall, crawl down the tree and pupate for the winter.

Light infestations on a few trees can be eliminated by pruning out affected branches and burning them. If this control method is not practical, chemical control using Sevin is recommended by many producers as being very effective.

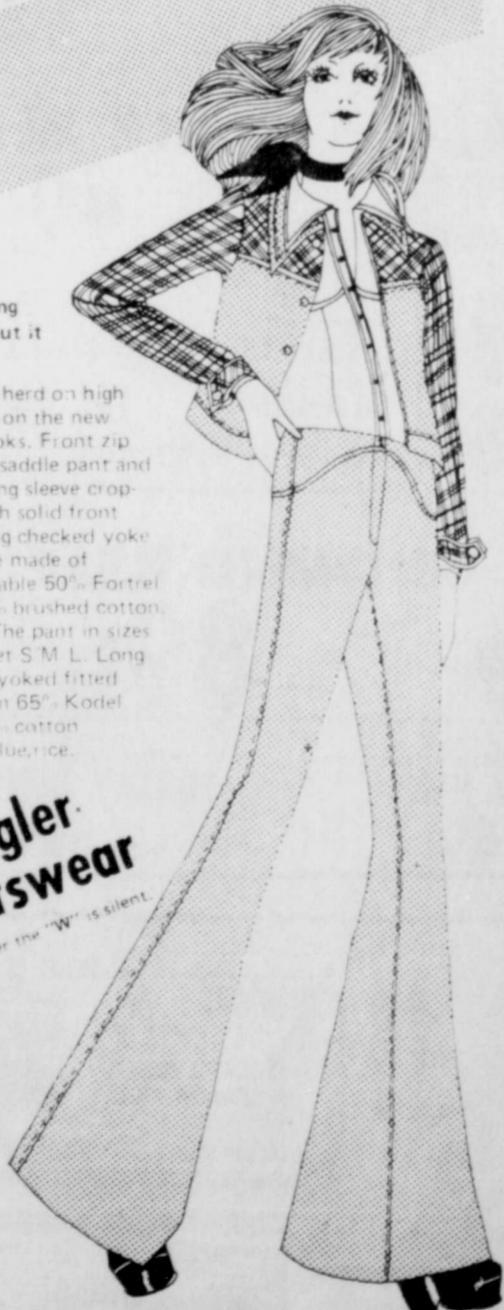

HERE'S ONE KIND OF FREEZE YOU NEEDN'T WORRY ABOUT

So you've listened to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's alerts about retail beef specials, and stocked up your freezer at bargain prices. Now you get to enjoy your savings.

Generally, it is easiest to thaw meat before cooking it. However, situations come about when you can't do that. The most obvious answer is to go ahead and cook the beef frozen, which is not difficult at all, if you follow a couple of simple pointers.

The most important thing to remember is that obviously you must allow more time for frozen meat to cook. Since the heat must first thaw out the meat before it even begins to cook

it. How much more time depends on the size, shape, and thickness. How much more time depends on the size, shape, and thickness of the meat. A good general idea is to allow one-third to roasts, thick frozen steaks, allow about the same cooking time as for defrosted cuts.

If you are broiling frozen cuts, be sure to keep the meat further from the heat source so that the meat doesn't get overly brown

before the inside is cooked. If you prefer not to leave meat out to thaw, it can be safely defrosted in the refrigerator, and then cooked as fresh meat.

Frozen meat combination dishes are best when reheated without thawing first. If they are in a watertight container they can be partially thawed by immersion in lukewarm water for a few minutes just long enough to make it easy to remove the food from the container.

Complete thawing of meat combination dishes at room temperature may permit growth of dangerous bacteria, and is not recommended for commercial or

home-prepared food of this type. So, don't let the fact that you have nothing thawed for dinner keep your family from enjoying the pleasures of beef eating. Keep looking for those special

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
