Revival Services Begin Sunday At Baptist Church

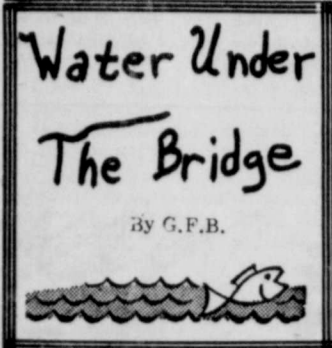

culture in Washington. After all these agencies have reviewed the applications, emergency loans would be made here. Farmers and ranchers who

have had losses due to disaster (drought) may be reimbursed up to the amount of actual loss in the form of a loan at 5 percent interest.

Re-payment time will vary from one to seven years, depending upon the paying ability of the borrower.

There is no forgiveness clause in this program as was the case last year. The FHS urges farmers and ranchers to make the initial request to the Commissioners Court and that the FHA is ready to respond accordingly to these desires. The Brown County Commissioners Court this week is ruling upon an application there. Coleman County already has approved. Coleman farmers and ranchers are not using the program, however, because the forgiveness clause has been lifted.

As an added attraction in this year's Rodeo, the Mills County

Steer Roping Club will hold a Jackpot Steer Roping during each night's performance.

This promises to be one of the best rodeos of the year, and we invite each and everyone of you to come out each night and enjoy the action.

Admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for school children. The rodeo will begin at 8:00 p. m. each night and a concession stand will be available.

Texas Water Rights Commission Takes Steps To Relieve Drought

The Texas Water Rights Commission has taken two steps this week to relieve the drought conditions along the Concho River and the Colorado between the confluence of the Concho and the San Saba Rivers.

Joe D. Carter, Commission

chairman, explained that the Commission has ordered the City of San Angelo and the San Angelo Water Supply Corp. to begin releasing water from their Twin Buttes Reservoir to flow down the Concho River which has ceased flowing below San Angelo.

The Commission has further ordered all irrigators on that section of the Colorado River between the Concho and the San Saba to cease irrigating immediately until further notice. That section of the Colorado borders Concho, Coleman, McCulloch, Brown, Mills and San Saba Counties.

The actions came following a hearing on complaints by domestic and livestock water users on the Concho and that portion of the Colorado River.

The order covers only irrigators on the Colorado River and not its tributaries and orders them to cease diversions until further notice.

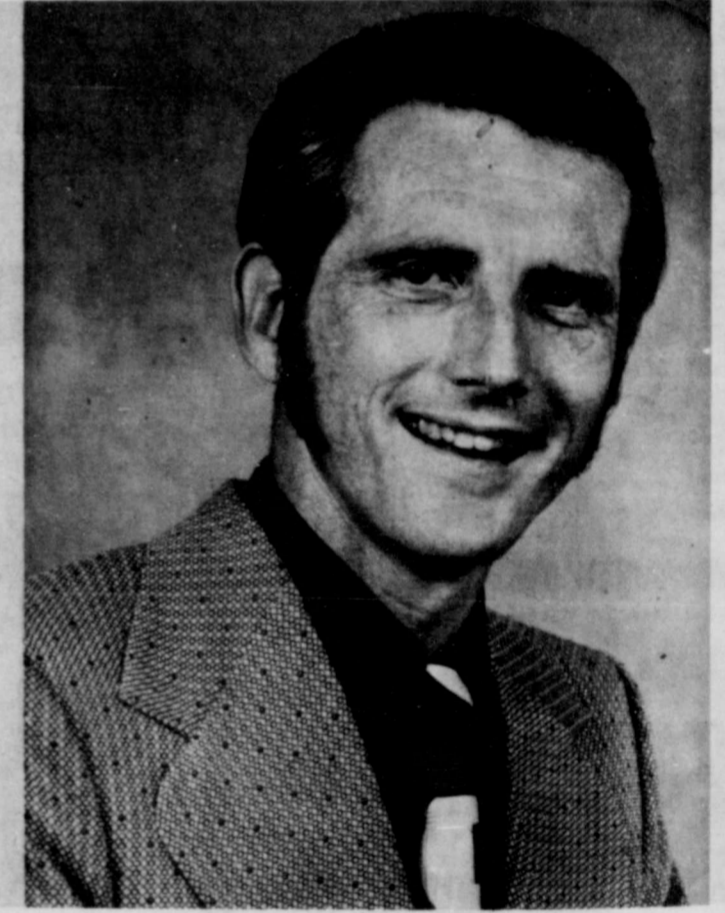

farmers and ranchers are re-
quired to be on the alert for
the weevil and his potential
of screwworms. One case
of screwworms has been con-

firmers had several calls dur-
ing the past week concerning the
weevil and his potential
to pecan crops. The
weevil is a late-season
pest of Texas pecans. In years
of severe infestations occur,
weevil ruins much of a pecan
crop. The following is a de-
scription of the weevil and some
of its habits and characteris-

The adult is a brownish weevil
about 1/2 inch long. The female
is about 1/4 inch longer than the male.
The female's snout is longer than
the male's somewhat shorter.
The weevil generally appears in
the fall and September, depend-
ing on weather conditions. After
the weevils have hardened, the
female chews a hole in the shell
and deposits her eggs in little
cells in the nuts. Creamy
larvae with reddish brown
heads and feed inside nuts
through the fall, attaining a length
of about three-fifths inch. At
the end of the larval burrow
the larva drops to the bottom
of the nut and constructs a cell about
1/2 inch in diameter and 1/2
inch deep. The larvae remain in the
larval stage until the following fall
when pupation occurs. The entire
life cycle requires 2-3 years,
of which is spent in the soil.
In some years, certain trees in an

orchard are more heavily infest-
ed than others, these trees can
be jarred to determine when to
apply insecticides. When three
or more weevils can be located
on a tree, it is time to begin
insecticide applications. This
determination is made by plac-
ing a large sheet under the tree
and jarring the limbs with a
padded pole. Weevils will drop
to the ground and remain motion-
less for a short period of time
when they may be counted.

Insecticide application recom-
mendations include - 2-3 lbs. of
80 percent WP Sevin per 100
gallons of water. (Do not apply
sevin after shuck split).

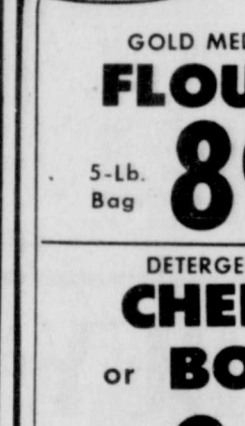

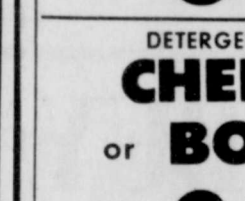

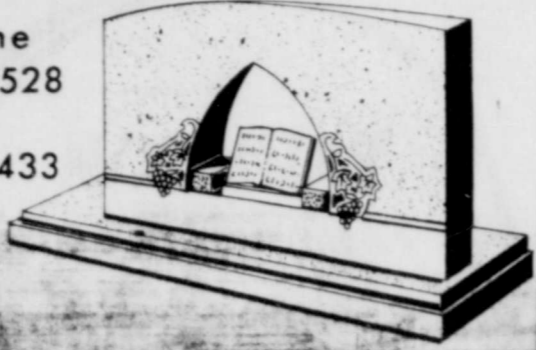

Alcoholism, A Neglected Problem

3rd in a series

The disease of alcoholism has been called the most neglected public health problem facing the nation today.

It is a killer illness that is attained in most cases through progression over a period of years. It is neglected because of ignorance. Most victims fight against admitting they are alcoholics.

Non-sufferers often do not recognize identifying signs of the progression. Too many citizens do not know that the alcoholic can be helped.

The most recent discussion pinpointed such warnings during the pre-alcoholism stage as black-outs, sneaking drinks, drinking before "wet" parties, gulping and avoidance of talk about drinking problems.

Other signs furnished by the Central Texas Council on Alcoholism (telephone 817-773-3722), are easily recognizable.

Solitary drinking is a potent indicator and occurs when drinking no longer is a social function for an individual. This does not cover the abuser of alcohol who frequents bars alone.

It focuses on the person who goes into seclusion, who leaves his house or his car in the street, who remains unresponsive in a state of intoxication for days or sometimes weeks. "Hiding out" to drink is the first drastic and dramatic example of the isolation urge. These lonely sessions fall always to provide the comfort and self-consolation the drinker thought he would find. He comes back to family, friends and co-workers embarrassed and ashamed. Yet, he continues to go back in search of that something, his hopes always new and fresh. This is but another manifestation of the tightening grip which alcohol is exerting upon him. But to the drinker in the pre-alcoholic stage he has a long way to go in the horrors of solitary guzzling. As the song said, "You ain't seen nothing yet". By the acute stage this kind of boozing is insufferable.

In the drinker's progression, the occasional blackout he used to shudder over, now descends to haunt him. They may happen three times in every ten drinking bouts. Concern mounts in the man because lost days and weeks create all sorts of problems in the person's social, business and domestic life. In fishing for clues to assure him that he did complete a task he has no recollection of even confronting, he always betrays his astounding confusion.

His business, social and family days may be numbered. He is tabbed as unreliable. Realization of this can send him to only

one situation - a lonely, living grave in isolation.

The pattern of progression toward acute and chronic alcoholism usually includes the beginning of daytime drinking. For a great many weeks and years, the heavy drinker refrains from starting before evening. He is determined to wait until he is through with his work - usually so that he can eagerly "get at his drinking" at a time when there will be no interference from the demands of conducting the details of his job.

It is the common boast of practically every alcoholic that drinking rarely, if ever, interfered with his work. He does shrug off the inefficiencies resulting from brutal hangovers. They also may have made him sometimes late, but he always reported in.

Once the individual is motivated toward the morning "jolt" to start the day, he is slipping from pre-alcoholism into the acute state, which will come under study in the next article of this series.

There are no time standards to help in identification of a drinking problem in the pre-alcoholism period. It may be only five or six months or that many years. Progression depends on the mental stability, physical stamina and spiritual resources of the individual as well as the degree of social responsibility which he has previously achieved.
