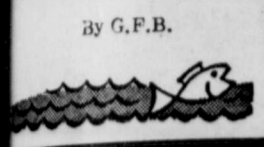

- 13. A pair of silver spurs to wear to barbecues.
- 14. A rubber cushion to sit on for hours at the auction ring every Thursday.
- 15. A second-hand car for going out to feed the cows, whenever your son-in-law borrows your pickup.
- 16. A good pocket knife, suitable for whittling to pass away the time at the auction ring.
- 17. A good wife who won't get upset when you walk across the living room carpet with manure on your boots.
- 18. A good wife who will believe you when you come in at 11 p. m. saying I've been fixing the fence.
- 19. A good wife with a full-time job.

Eagles Fly By Coyotes 34-6; Travel To Lometa Friday

The Goldthwaite Eagles, following a slow and clumsy first half, got with it in the third period last Friday night and scored three times in seven minutes. The Eagles were victorious over the Richland Springs Coyotes 34-6.

The win gives the Eagles a 2-1 mark for the 1974 season, and will face the winless Lometa Hornets this Friday night in Lometa. The Hornets lost to Santa Anna 24-7 last week. Eagle scoring was begun in the first quarter, resulting in the first time the Eagles had possession of the football. Fine runs by speedy halfback Guenaro Siller and the touchdown jump by Byron Landrum of 12 yards capped the drive. The Eagles drove for 72 yards in eleven plays for the score, all of it

on the ground. Terry McLean added the point after.

With only 1:49 to go in the first half, Landrum again scored, this time from five yards out, on a pitch out to the left side. This drive covered 80 yards, again all of it was on the ground. McLean's kick this time went wide of the mark.

The Eagles suffered a rash of penalties in the second quarter and had to suffer the only score of the evening against them with 1:12 to go. The score resulted in a 38-yard pass and run combination from Coyote quarterback Robert Burlison to end Glen Pitts. A pass try for the extra point failed.

The Eagles came back strong in the second half, amassing seven first downs in the third quarter. Yardage totaled 119 on

the ground and 31 through the air lanes.

The three touchdowns mentioned in the third period came as a result of near perfect blocking assignments by the Eagles offensive line. Johnny Truitt and Ali Siller were particularly effective as blockers for Eagle runners.

It was Landrum again for the first of the tallies, taking a Ray Frazier pitch and scampering 34 yards for a score. It was the first time the Eagles had the ball in the second half. Siller took a quick pitch in for the two points, making the score 21-6.

Johnny Truitt recovered a Coyote fumble on the ensuing kickoff and the Eagles were off and running again, this time from the Richland Springs 27 yard

line. On the first play of this drive, Landrum blasted around left end for 22 yards.

Siller carried the bacon home on the next play, going over right tackle. Only 30 seconds had elapsed on the clock since the last marker was registered for the Eagles. McLean's kick split the uprights for the extra point, making it 28-6 in favor of the Eagles.

The final marker of the evening came as Landrum went on the rampage again. He struck paydirt following a nifty 31 yard run following a screen pass reception from Frazier. Ali Siller managed the break-away block. Kick try for the point after failed.

The threatening rains did not hamper play until the late seconds of the game, and play throughout was not harmed by a wet field or a slippery ball.

"Goldthwaite started off a little weak in the game Friday night, but perked up after half-time," commented Head Coach Gene Audridge. "They executed fine playing in the third period."

"During the game Byron Landrum rushed for 142 yards on ten carries, with Guenaro Siller pulling through the game with a total of 112 yards rushing," continued Coach Audridge.

"We haven't had any serious injuries on the team so far this year. David Miller was plagued with a bruised shoulder this past week and was not used in the Richland Springs game, but the injury isn't anything major."

On the upcoming Lometa-Goldthwaite game Coach Audridge had this comment, "Lometa stands with no wins and three losses for the season, but they have exhibited good, tough ball playing against their contenders."

Tuesday Night Meeting

Bicentennial Should Involve All Texans

The three-year birthday party and thanksgiving commemorating the 200th anniversary of our nation's freedom is a great opportunity for every community in West Texas to sell their historic, cultural, recreational and educational attractions.

Neither the state nor national Bicentennial Commission suggest set plans for the observance but encourage local communities to "do their own thing." However, recognition and nationwide publicity are given local activi-

ties. Over 3,000 localities in 50 states already have under way grass-roots affairs involving a wide range of citizens in a variety of activities.

A general open meeting of all committee members and other interested persons will be held at 7:30 Tuesday, October 1, at the high school auditorium. Local Bicentennial leaders emphasize the importance of this occasion and urge any and all persons to attend.

Mrs. Gene Brownrigg, executive officer for the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas, will be on hand to discuss the possibilities for an observance for Mills County. She is highly respected as a speaker and has delivered many lectures and led many discussions on the Bicentennial proposal.

Goldthwaite coordinators feel honored to have Mrs. Brownrigg come and speak here.

Programs during this bicentennial of American Revolution should not only recall our nation's heritage, but the historical and cultural legacy of each community. The story and development of Texas through the lives of pioneers, together with the history of the establishment of early communities, ranches, farms, businesses, education, civic, cultural, and religious institutions, are an integral part of the bicentennial.

Texas museums should highlight the pioneers' protective stewardship of the legacy established and handed down by our

nation's founding fathers. The background, circumstances, trials and tribulations of the Texas frontiersmen were similar in many respects to those of the colonial and revolutionary periods in American history. Reminders of the sacrifices of those who established our country's freedoms and of those of succeeding generations who protected them will be a desirable commemoration of the bicentennial.

Historic homes should be opened, historical tours arranged, significant documents displayed, and a sustained drive undertaken to make at least 2,500 additional Texas historic sites.

Tourism, Texas' greatest opportunity for economic expansion, is part of the bicentennial. Authorities estimate that 30 million foreign visitors and 50 million Americans will travel to Bicentennial events and related historic sites. We should be organized in Texas in order to get more than our share of these visitors and dollars. The leadership of Texas has never understood nor appreciated the per-meating prosperity of the tourist dollar nor the economic potential available from increased travel.

In some communities, festivities which are held annually will be expanded with a bicentennial theme, such as the Comal County Fair and Westfest in New Braunfels.

Fiddler fests in Gatesville and three other cities will be expanded, as will the World's Largest Fish Fry at Borger.

Smithville plans an original production about the history of the MKT Railroad. Other rail-oriented towns will have similar observances.

Texas bicentennial officials are generally pleased with the effort of communities in the state.

From the County Agent

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Everyone is feeling the pressure of the economic situation in regard to beef cattle production these days and in light of present conditions, producers must take every advantage to minimize production costs. Economic returns from the beef cattle industry depend largely on the percent of calf crop and the weaning weight of calves sold. Calf crop percentage is generally considered as the number of calves weaning age of 7 months, divided by the number of cows in the breeding season.

The art and science of beef cattle palpation or pregnancy testing is a very important tool in the management facet of production today. Skill in the science of palpation comes through training and practice. The palpation itself takes only a few seconds but can be used to eliminate unnecessary economics loss suffered in keeping open heifers and cows. Veterinarians and many present day beef cattle producers are skilled in the art of palpation and are able to use this procedure as an effective management tool.

Producers are encouraged to visit with their local veterinarian

concerning the practice. At various times in the year, palpation clinics are held which offer producers the opportunity to learn the skill. Any producer who is interested in such a school should contact the County Agent's Office, and we will attempt to obtain locations and dates of such schools.

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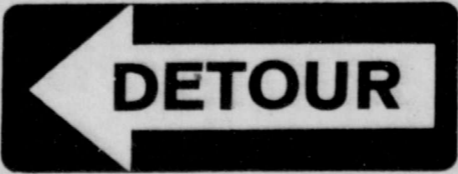

Sheep Producers Referendum On Promotion Is November 4-15

Attention Landowners With Available Hunting Leases

Due to the upcoming deer hunting season, Mills County is still receiving a large volume of mail inquiring about possible hunting leases that might be available.

The response from landowners in the area has not been able to match the number of inquiries so far. The interested parties are from the Dallas - Ft. Worth area in part, and others are from Waco, Tyler, and Austin. Most are interested in week-end hunting. If there are any landowners that would like to contact these hunters before deer season, the addresses will be available through the Mills County Office, Central Texas Council of Governments. At a very critical period in its history, the sheep industry will decide whether or not to continue promotion of its products, lamb and wool and the industry itself, in a nationwide referendum called by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture for the period of November 4 - 15.

A special referendum committee has been formed under the sponsorship of the National Woolgrowers Association (NWGA) and the National Lamb Feeders Association (NLFA) to inform sheepmen throughout the country of what is at stake in the voting on promotion being conducted by the American Sheep Producers Council (ASPC), headquartered in Denver, Colorado. The committee is called the Sheep Producer/Lamb Feeder Referendum

Committee with headquarters in Salt Lake City.

Ballots will be mailed to all sheep producers in the United States through the county or state ASCS offices before the two-week voting period. All producers and feeders of lambs are eligible to vote if they have owned sheep or lambs six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1973.

All ballots must be returned to the local ASCS office or mailed in and postmarked no later than November 15. The promotion program can be continued through 1977 if two-thirds of the total number of producers voting or two-thirds of the total volume of production represented in the referendum approve the program.

The promotion program was originated in 1955 by sheep industry leaders to make the consumer aware of lamb and wool. Authorized under Section 708 of the National Wool Act, this self-help program has been the pattern for many other agricultural commodity programs. Now more than 1200 agricultural commodities are promoted in the highly competitive market of food and fiber.

Co-chairmen of the Referendum Committee are Harold Josendal, Casper, Wyoming, and Roger A. Harris, Waukesha, Wisconsin. Other members of the Committee include R. K. "Bill" Siddoway, president of NWGA; Laird Noh, president of the NLFA; Mrs. Donna Furlong, president of the Women's Aux-

iliary to the NWGA; Edwin E. Marsh, NWGA executive secretary and Vern F. Newbold, NWGA assistant secretary.

After a meeting in Salt Lake City, August 30, Josendal, who will represent the West on the committee, urged all sheep producers and lamb feeders to exercise their right to vote in the referendum. He noted that "promotion is a vital part of any business." He went on to say, "The sheep industry has a great need for an active promotion program and this can best be carried on by the American Sheep Producers Council."

Mr. Harris, who will work for a favorable referendum vote in the East noted that "The ASPC's advertising and promo-

tion programs have kept the two principal products of the industry, lamb and wool, before the public since 1954 with worthwhile campaigns." He added that "the Council has developed a new approach to promotion of lamb and wool which will be based on public relations, merchandising and education." He said the highlights of the public relations program will revolve around an image-building approach designed to present a clear and accurate picture of the sheep industry in America as a reputable, profitable and socially significant industry.

The sheep industry is in the throes of change, and to lose its place in the market would make a comeback of the world's oldest livestock enterprise near

impossible, according to some sheep industry spokesmen.

Most observers feel that the sheep industry is making the turn-around to growth and more stable markets, but loss of the promotion arm would make it extremely difficult to maintain any share of the market. The ASPC also operates the Sheep Industry Development Program (SID) which publishes new information on sheep production and marketing.

The self-help program is made possible by a deduction from incentive payments, which includes 1 1/2 cents for each pound of shorn wool and 7 1/2 cents for each 100 pounds of unshorn lamb. All producers contribute to promotion in relation to the size of their sheep operation.

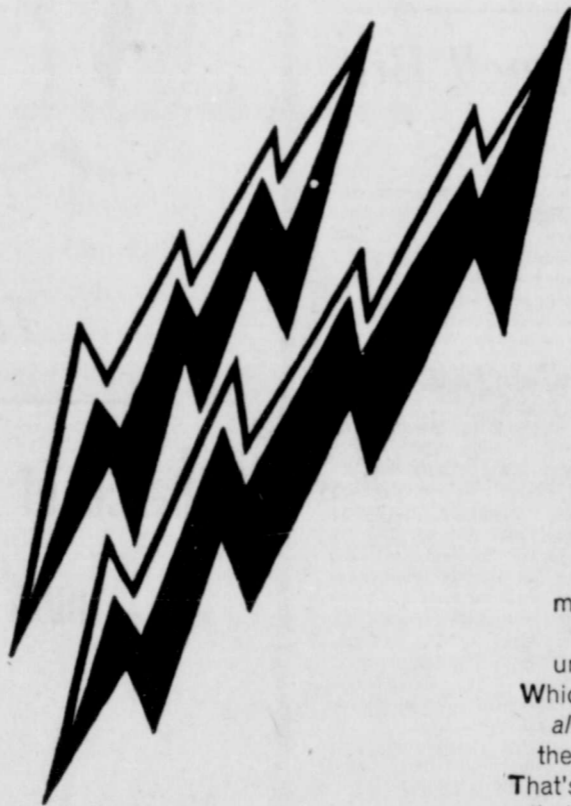

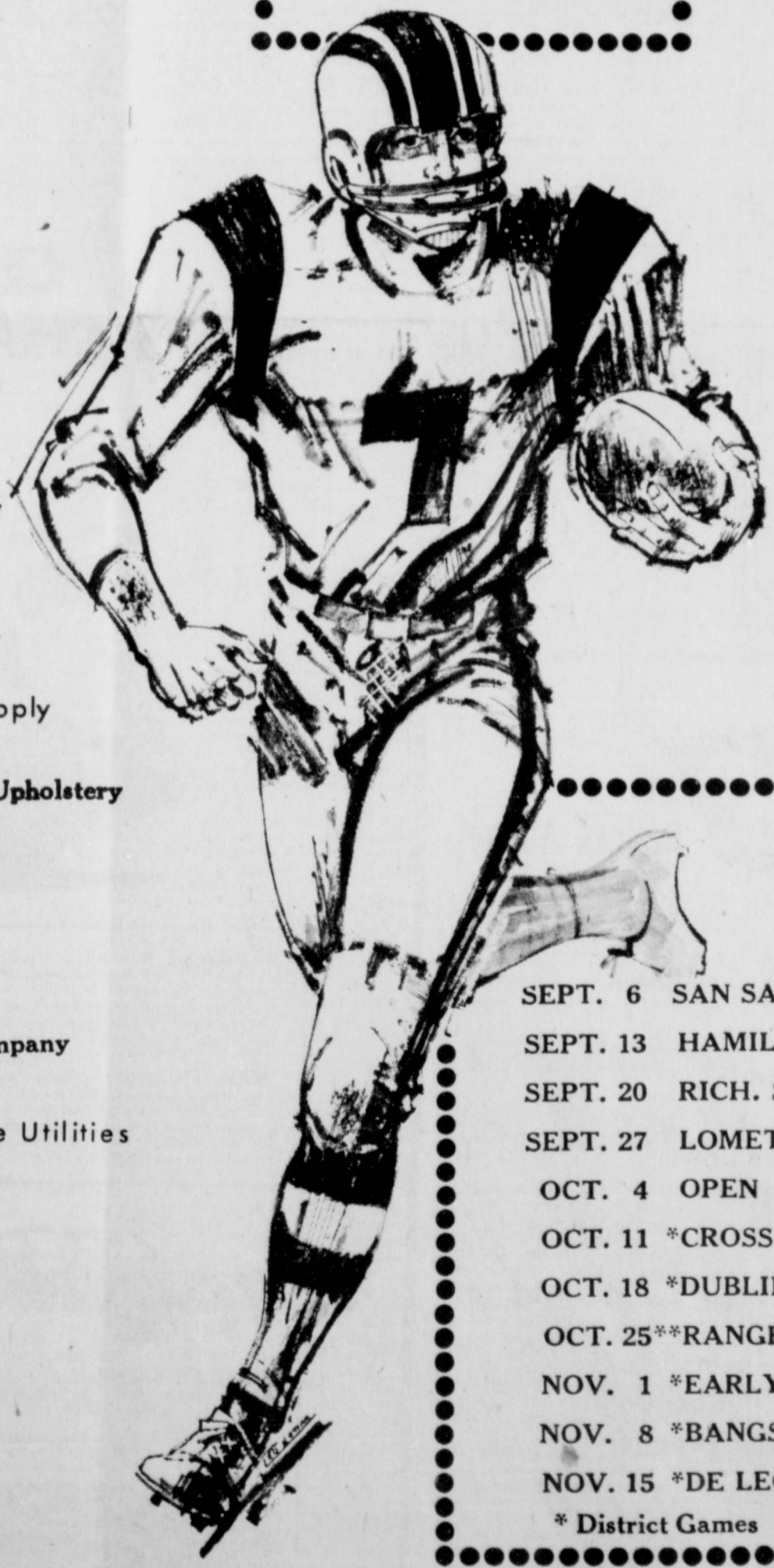

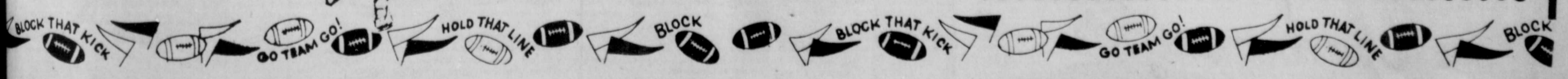
