Elderly Goldthwaite Couple Killed In Car-Train Collision

Mills County recorded its first traffic fatality of 1974 last Wednesday when Mr. and Mrs. Marvin King Collier of Goldthwaite were fatally injured when the vehicle they were driving struck a passing Santa Fe train at the intersection of the tracks and U. S. 84 in downtown Goldthwaite.

Investigating officers stated the time of the collision at 12:15 p. m.

The Colliers were killed instantly when their 1958 Chevrolet sedan struck the engine of the train about in the center. The impact spun the car around so violently that the couple was apparently thrown out the right front door of the car and into the train. The car was thrown about 60 feet from the point of impact. They were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace E. H. Thorne.

Officers could only guess that the Colliers did not see the warning lights and failed to yield to the train.

Funeral services for Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Collier of Goldthwaite were conducted Friday, September 27, 1974, at 2 p. m. in the Goldthwaite Church of Christ with Minister Joe Wood-

rum officiating. Burial was in the Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery. Arrangements were under the direction of Wilkins Funeral Home.

Mrs. Collier, a member of the Church of Christ, was born August 26, 1897, in Belton, Texas to J. C. McMurray and Bella Mae Wiseman.

Mr. Collier, also a member of the Church of Christ, was born in Center City, Texas, June 1, 1894, to Isaac Groves Collier and Elizabeth Ann Phillips.

The couple married November 6, 1920, in Goldthwaite. They had recently moved to Goldthwaite from Center City.

They are survived by two sons, Ray D. Collier of Lubbock; Roy A. Collier of Keller; one daughter, Mrs. Gus (Viola) Roberts, Arlington; and one granddaughter, Jan Collier of Lubbock.

Mrs. Collier is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Irene Jordan, Austin; three brothers, Johnnie McMurray, Brownwood; Ralph McMurray, Hobbs, New Mexico; and Fred McMurray, Salinas, California.

Mr. Collier is also survived by one brother, H. R. Collier, Center City; three sisters, Mrs.

L. B. Covington, Mrs. Virdeen, and Mrs. W. R. Blackburn, all of Goldthwaite.

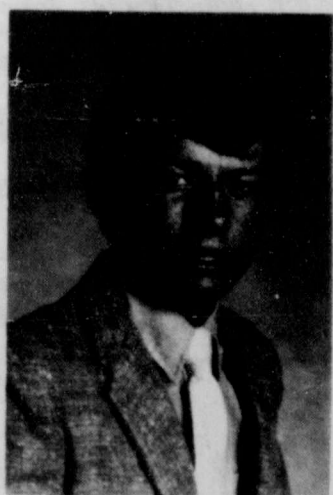

The Swine Industry, like most other livestock producing industries is feeling the pressure of present day events and economic situations. Like all other production areas, the swine producing industry must take every economic advantage to insure successful production. One way is to take full advantage of breeding systems, particularly crossbreeding systems. There are three primary crossbreeding systems in use today. These include a single cross, which is simply crossing two different breeds, the two breed rotational crossbreeding system in which boars of two different breeds are used in alternate generations with crossbred gilts. These crossbred gilts and sows are always mated to a boar of the breed farthest away in their pedigree, and finally there is the three breed rotational cross. This is probably the most widely used system of the three. In this system, boars of three breeds are used in succession on each generation of crossbred gilts.

All these systems are attempts to increase hybrids in swine production and thereby increase returns to managements, labor and capital.

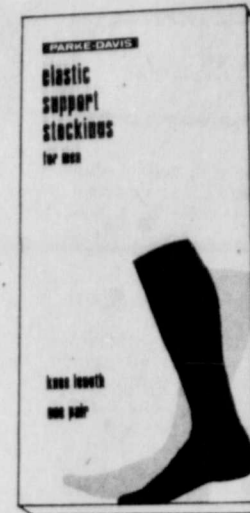



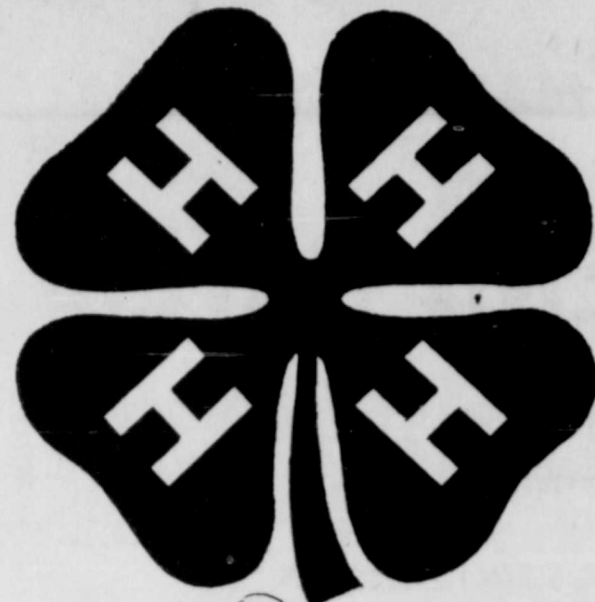

Extension Highlights

Split peas cook faster than whole peas. Boiled gently, they retain their shape until cooked through. More cooking will cause the peas to disintegrate, forming a soup or puree.

Split peas have a mild but distinctive flavor and an ability to combine well with many foods. They are a good vegetable to accompany a meat entree. To make 2 1/2 cups of cooked split peas (6 servings), begin with 1 cup dry split peas, 2 cups water, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Wash and

drain the split peas. Put the split peas and water in a pan, bring to boiling, and boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat, cover, and let soak 1/2 hour. Then add salt and bring to boiling. Cover and boil gently about 20 minutes until tender. Do not stir.

Casseroles are one good way to feature the split peas' versatility in teaming with other foods.

Top-Of-Stove Casserole
1 small onion
1 lb. ground beef
2 cups cooked or canned tomatoes
1/2 cup uncooked rice
1/2 cup water
1 tablespoon sugar
2 1/2 cups cooked split peas

Salt and pepper, as you like
Chop onion. Put ground beef and onion in a pan. Cook until meat is browned. Drain off fat. Add tomatoes, rice, water and sugar. Cover and boil gently about 25 minutes until rice is tender. Add split peas, salt, and pepper. Heat slowly until hot. Makes six one-cup servings.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—Texas governmental units need to spend \$852 million over the next five years to improve transportation systems, according to a Texas Mass Transportation Commission staff estimate.

A TMTCC preliminary development plan proposes \$566 million worth of rail system improvements and construction and \$286 million for bus systems.

The state, the report con-

cluded, must come up with ideas for moving an increasing number of travelers among major cities by rail, new expressways paralleling existing ones or other means.

If travel increases as fast as expected, according to one authority, traffic on Interstate 35 between San Antonio and Dallas may be as congested by the year 2,000 as it is on the Gulf Freeway in the Houston area.

Cost of developing mail passenger facilities presents a generally unhappy picture. Railroads, according to TMTCC Director Russell Cummings, are not enthusiastic about starting up new passenger service or turning their tracks over to any agency for passenger hauling in conflict with their freight business.

Only 18 cities in the state still maintain transit systems, as compared with 37 such systems 20 years ago, TMTCC was informed. But use of transit systems is expected to increase three-fold by 1990. Buses are projected to handle 75 per cent of the future load, rail systems 18 per cent and "specialized systems" seven per cent.

LEASES TAKE UP—Cash bonus payments totalling more than \$7.8 million reached the state Permanent University Fund from a recent oil and gas lease auction on University of Texas-owned lands.

More than 123,540 acres were leased for oil and gas exploration. With deposits of the cash bonus payments the Permanent University Fund increased to \$676,332,143.

Biggest areas of interest were Loving and Ward counties.

Superior Oil Company paid the largest cash bonus—\$810,000 for a 640-acre tract in Ward County. Chalfant, Magee and Hansen were successful bidders on a 320-acre tract in Ward and Loving counties with a \$435,000 cash bonus.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, chairman of the Board for Lease of University Lands, said increased demands for energy are being reflected in all public land lease sales.

INDUSTRIES INCREASE—Thirty-one new industries with a combined annual output of over \$8 million located in Texas during August.

Total economic impact of

the 31 firms was estimated by Texas Industrial Commission and the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research at more than \$129 million a year.

The 31 new industries are expected to generate \$7.7 million a year in federal taxes, \$560,943 in local taxes and \$502,943 in state taxes, and to create 1,743 new jobs with a spinoff of another 2,243.

The industries located in Alice, Amarillo, Athens, Austin, Fort Arthur, Brownsville, Center, Coletto Creek, Channelview, Del Rio, Diboll, Freeport, Houston, La Porte, Laredo, Longview, Lufkin, Madisonville, Mineral Wells, Mount Pleasant, Rocksprings, Texarkana, Wharton, Weatherford and Wichita Falls.

DPS LOOKED OVER—A Senate sub-committee began its hearings on rights to personal privacy and Department of Public Safety surveillance activities involving private citizens.

DFS Chief Col. Wilson Speir agreed the legislature should furnish guidelines, but he warned against restraints so strict as to interfere with law enforcement efforts.

ENROLLMENT UP—State-wide enrollment at Texas colleges and universities is up about five and a half per cent above 1975, far above the national projection of a 1.3 per cent nationwide increase.

Preliminary tabulation shows total enrollment of 549,830 students at Texas public, private, junior and senior institutions. This is 28,300 more than the fall semester of 1973. Two hundred and seventy five thousand of the students are attending public senior colleges, 201,400 at public community colleges.

Even the private institutions in Texas are growing. Their total enrollment of 70,800 represents a 1.4 per cent increase over the 1973 headcount. About 10 of the 37 more than experience some decline in enrollments.

AG OPINIONS—Voters who participate in party primary elections are not eligible to sign applications of independent candidates where nominations for the office sought are made in primaries, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

• State employees who leave their jobs before completing six months' service are eligible for no accrued vacation time.

• State licensing of private child care facilities does not sufficiently implicate the state in the policies of the institutions to make their discriminatory practices a "state action" for constitutional protection purposes.

• Receipt of guaranteed annual wage payments does not render an individual out of work ineligible for state unemployment compensation.

• When an employee given a merit pay raise is promoted, funds become available for merit raises to others in the agency.

• Director of the Division of Parole Supervision is not the executive head of a state agency, and the Board of Pardons and Paroles is legally responsible for his conduct.

• County clerks have no authority to issue certified copies of letters testamentary.

APPOINTMENTS—Dr. Lorene Rogers was named acting president of The University of Texas, Austin, after Dr. Stephen Spurr was fired.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe appointed Ronald Lee Wilson of Texas City to be 212th district attorney for Galveston County, succeeding Jules Damiani who became district judge.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Court of Criminal Appeals unanimously upheld 1972 convictions of former House Speaker Gus Mutscher, former State Rep. Tommy Shannon and Rush McGinty for conspiring to accept a bribe in the famous Sharpstown case. All received five-year probated sentences.

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Tree Litter

From time to time, when the west wind blew, twigs and leaves from Fred Miller's poplar tree would flutter down into a neighbor's back yard. Resentful, the neighbor finally took the matter into the courtroom.

"It is up to Miller to keep his litter out of my yard," he told the judge. "If there is no other way, then let him cut the tree down."



But the court refused to mix in. Noting that the tree was located entirely on Miller's land, the court said he could not be blamed for the natural process of shedding.

Generally speaking, the law will not interfere with natural growth

on private property. Thus, another man was held entitled to maintain four large maple trees on his land even though they kept a neighbor's house in the shade. The court said his freedom to use his own property outweighed the indirect annoyance to the neighbor.

On the other hand, the neighbor may have a valid complaint when the injury he suffers is more substantial. Thus, when branches actually spread across the property line, most courts give the neighbor the right to chop them off at the boundary.

Furthermore, a neighbor usually has grounds for suit if a tree threatens his safety. Another case involved a badly decayed elm, standing near a back yard fence. The next door neighbor, fearful of an impending accident, warned the tree's owner of the danger—to no avail.

One morning, during a storm, a heavy bough split off and fell across the fence, smiting the neighbor on the shoulder. Under these circumstances, the owner of the tree was held responsible for the neighbor's mishap.

The court said he had no more right to keep a dangerous tree on his property than to keep a dangerous building.

Take a second look at that pasture where the grass always seems taller and greener. That man must be doing a good job of management - so what! So you live in town and that doesn't concern you - or does it!

You like the smell of clean air, like right after a rain. You like clean water in your home. You like a good clean lake or pond when you go fishing, water skiing or swimming. Yep, you're right. That place with the tall grass will contribute nothing to the pollution problem, nor will the one with short grass - usually. Believe it or not, there are several thousand acres of grassland grazed so short that water and even wind erosion are taking place. You thought that blowing dust and haze all came from cropland, but it didn't!

Maybe you like a nice juicy steak, too. Sure, overgrazed pastures and properly grazed pastures both produce beef but let's say the properly grazed pasture produces only 50 pounds more beef per acre (and it will beat that considerably) than the overgrazed pasture. And let's say that 10,000 of the 25,000 acres of 'mproved grass in the county are overgrazed. The beef production for the county could be increased by 500,000 pounds each year just by proper management - and that's just for one county. If there is a larger supply of beef, how do you think that will affect the price you have to pay for it?

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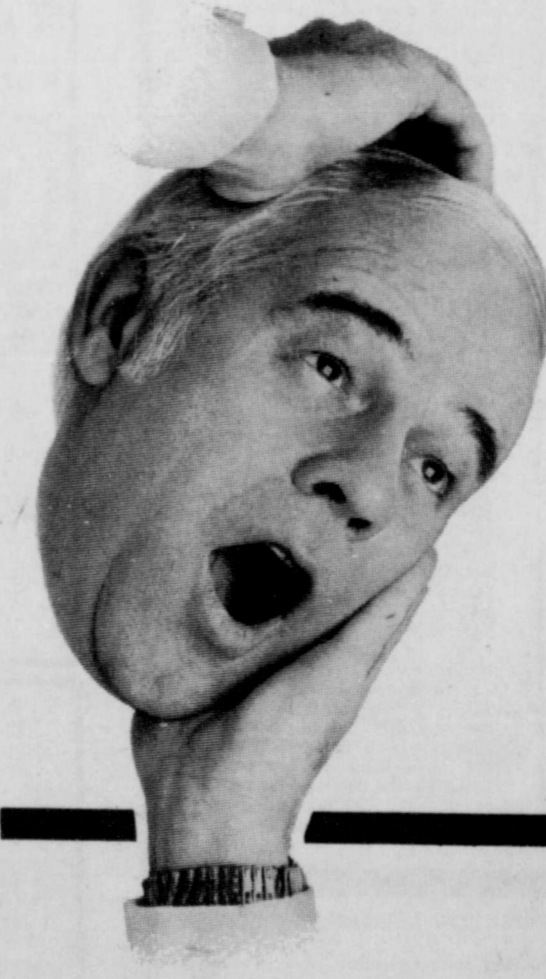
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
