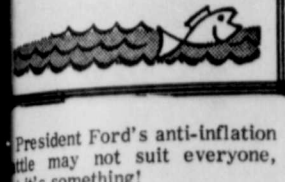

Business Garbage Rates To Increase

The Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session Monday night, and unanimously passed a new set of pricing and operation regulations for the garbage department operated by the City.

The new rates, for commercial users only, are based on the actual time that is required to serve each customer. Pickups have been previously timed and the new rates have been formulated using the figure of 5 cents per minute, with a minimum charge of \$2.00 per month.

If a business changes operations so as to affect the time required to pick up its garbage, then the rates will be adjusted accordingly.

Residential rates will remain the same as they have been in the past, and the council removed the Saturday pickup schedule for the downtown part of town.

Mayor Ray Duren reported on a letter received by him from Mayor Henry Campbell of Lampasas concerning the suits filed in LCRA vs. Coastal States Gas Co. The whole matter is very complicated, according to Duren, and suits and counter-suits by the companies and the intervention by Lo-Vaca gathering company, along with other legal acrobatics may force delays in the trial, now set for October 29. Mayor Campbell's letter also mentioned some recent happen-

ings concerning LCRA's selling of \$35,000,000 in bonds to Weeden & Co. of New York for a rate of 7.3218 per cent of interest. This appears to be a very high rate of interest, according to Campbell.

The regular operations report and the quarterly report by the treasurer were read and approved by the Council.

With the Lions Club and the Highway Department applying for a special railroad crossing barrier for the Business Hwy. 84 and the Santa Fe railroad, the city went on record as asking for a special barrier at the intersection of the railroad and Evans Street also.

Councilmen Jimmy Smith, Anle Morgan, Howard Campbell, Loy Long, and Mayor Duren were present at the meeting. Councilman Donald Padgett was absent. Also present were City Manager Don Petty, City Secretary Glynn Collier, and Dale Allen.

The Council meets the first Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the City Utilities building.

One of the first actions of the Retailer's new Board was to underwrite a series of informational television shows on consumer protection, recommended by Texas Attorney General's consumer protection division. The shows will be shown on educational television in the Goldthwaite area beginning in January.

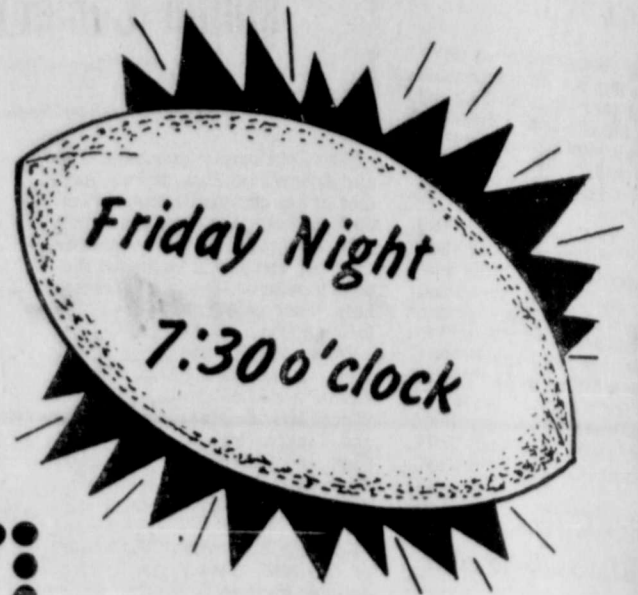

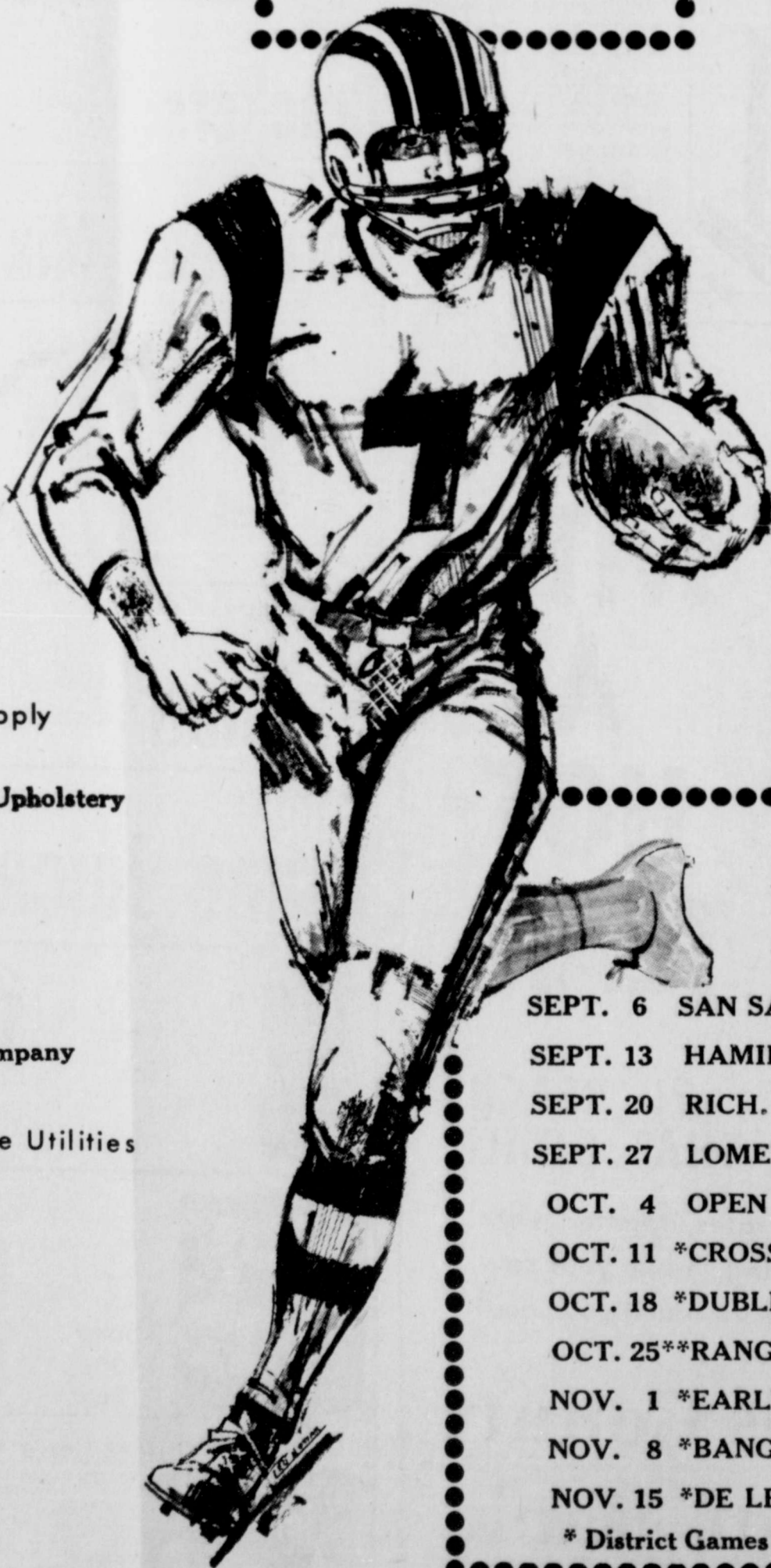

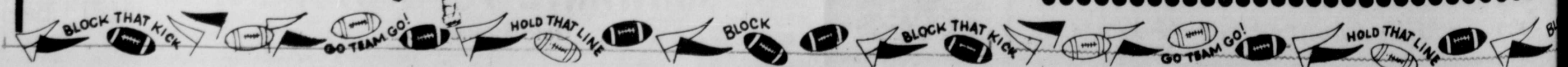
