### Job Bank Now Available


Those persons seeking employment will now have the assistance of a job referral bank for the region. This program, the Job Information Service, will be provided by the Mills County Office of the Central Texas Council of Governments. This office will be in daily contact with other area offices concerning job openings in the region. They are also receiving packets on job openings in Dallas, Ft. Worth, Waco, Brownwood, Lampasas, Belton, Temple, Cameron, Copperas Cove, San Saba and Hamilton. These openings are in many fields, both skilled labor and professional positions and un-skilled jobs, requiring no pre-

experience, some with training on the job. For those people looking for a particular area of work that is not available in this county and are considering either commuting or moving to a different area, this will give them an opportunity to

view openings that are as current as possible. The J.I.S. program is oper-ated through the Central Texas Council of Governments with the hope that it will be of service to those seeking employment. In cooperation with this program, any local businesses seeking placement in a particular posi-

tion in their operation can list this opening with the Mills Co. Office and it will be recorded in the region along with the job openings from the other towns. Skilled positions requiring certain background and training can be viewed by all persons in the area, creating a broader scope

of possible applicants. Any persons interested in the Job Information Service or any other employment programs sponsored by the CTCOG, can contact the Mills County Office at 648-2622. They will be glad to answer any questions and help in any manner for both the employer and employee.

# Mills County Farmers & Ranchers **Eligible For Emergency Loans**

Farmers and ranchers in Mills County who sustained production losses as a result of damages and losses caused by prolonged drouth from Jul / 26, 1973 through August 22, 1974 may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration. The emergency became available for Mills County effective October 4, 1974.

Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 209 South Greenleaf in Brownwood before close of business December 2, 1974 for physical losses and July 7, 1975 for production loss-

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law enacted January 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Loans based on qualifying pro-duction losses may include funds

to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment

ability. No land loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is 5 percent and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate.

The fall screwworm buildup arrived in September with 1,098 laboratory confirmed cases in Texas livestock, including one case in Mills County. The biggest share of these were in the hill country and West Texas.
