



**County Trapner Program In Need Of Funds** 

The Mills County Program Building Committee is asking for the help of all farmers and ranch ers in Mills County to support the county trapper program. The program has funds sufficient to continue only through the month of November. If we are to continue to have the trapper e mi port of all farmers and ranchers. The Program Building Committee is asking for donations at the rate of 3c per acre of all land owned or leased. This donation entitles the farmer or rancher to the services of the trapper. We have received oral agreement that the government trappers will probably be allowed to continue using the M-44 devices until October 31, 1975. This is, unless the EPA puts a stop to We have also been informed that if we continue the trapper program, the State will provide 30 hours of flying time for a helicoptor in Mills County this winter. If we are unable to continue our trapper program, we will not get the free helicoptor flying time. No specific plans for the helicoptor have been made as yet, but we need to take advantage of this opportunity. If you have questions regarding the trapper program or if you wish to make a donation to the program, contact the County Agent's Office.

Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works. longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature

- Don't place curtains, furniture or other objects in front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
- Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help 2 heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss
- Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use.

Storm doors and windows are not customarily Ð used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.

Keep the opening and closing of doors to a œ minimum to reduce the loss of warm air.
