The Mills County Crops and Livestock Subcommittee will sponsor a County Pecan Show on November 19 and 20, 1974. All commercial growers and homeowners are encouraged to enter pecans in this year's show. It makes no difference if you are a commercial grower with thousands of trees, or if you are a homeowner with only one tree in your back yard, you are still eligible to enter the show.

Two Accidents Investigated In Mills County

Thursday, October 31, at 8:05 p.m. the Highway U.S. 183 and the intersection of Business 84 was the scene of a three-vehicle accident.

A '73 Cadillac driven by Dolores Cox of Lometa and a '65 Chevrolet pickup driven by Larry Elliott of Goldthwaite were stopped for the red light. Gary Sutherland, driver of a 1969 Buick approaching the red light, ran into the back of the pickup which then collided with the rear end of the Cadillac.

CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTS NEEDED FROM FARMERS AND RANCHERS

During the last half of November and in December, some 75,000 farmers and ranchers will receive either a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates have always been of great importance to producers and are even more important in light of the supply-demand situation facing agriculture today. Data collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the state of Texas. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

City Council Takes Steps To Clear Water Problems

The Goldthwaite City Council, meeting in regular session last Monday night, discussed a water problem that has brought many complaints from city water users in the last few months.

The problem, mainly bad taste and odor, stems from silt piling up in the city's reservoirs near the Colorado River south of Goldthwaite.

Some remedies are already being undertaken by the city, with further and more complete solutions forthcoming, according to the council. One of the off-channel reservoirs will be completely drained to inspect erosion damage and to plan for complete clean-up.

In other council business, Mrs.

Ruth Dumas, representing the Retired Senior Volunteer Program of Mills County, asked the city for a \$300 grant from the city to help meet the needs of the organization. The council, upon hearing the merits of the group, unanimously voted to pay the amount.

Councilman Howard Campbell presented a report on the purchase of a bulldozer to be used at the sanitary land fill for the city. Several models were mentioned, with prices ranging from \$6 to \$15,000. City Manager Don Petty was instructed to look into the matter further before a decision is made.

The proposition of getting a barricade at the crossing of

Business U.S. 84 and the Santa Fe Railroad in downtown Goldthwaite was discussed and it was pointed out that this would be a joint venture between the Texas Highway Department and the Railroad, not the city and the Railroad. The city would have to share the cost at other intersections within the city.

The city did adopt a speed limit resolution to be submitted to Santa Fe. Upon hearing the different speed limits imposed on the railroad in other Texas towns in this area, the council passed a 40 miles per hour regulation at the crossing within the city limits of Goldthwaite.

The regular operations report on the utilities was given by CM Petty to the Council. Purchase of a new 1975 Chevrolet pickup from Saylor Chevrolet in Goldthwaite was offset for the month by the collection of the yearly taxes for the city. All operations of the city were in the black for the month of October.

A budget report for the first four months of the City's fiscal year was given by office manager Dale Allen. He reported that the city had spent 36.56 per cent of the budget and had collected about 39 per cent of the income expected when the 1974-75 budget was adopted. Both figures ideally should have been 33 per cent of the totals.

The Christmas lighting problem was discussed by the councilmen. The electrical problem is far from over, as was told by the council in a letter from Charles Herring, general manager of the Lower Colorado River Authority, the agency that the city purchases power from, and he urged the city to curtail as much as possible. The Council asked the people of Goldthwaite to keep Christmas lighting at a minimum to prevent possible shortages of electricity.

Light Voter Turnout Sees Demos Stagger Republicans

Voters in Mills County went to the polls in the general election Tuesday and re-elected Democrat W. R. "Bob" Poage for U. S. Representative of the 11th Congressional District.

Poage polled 728 votes to Republican Don Clements' 94. Independent Laurel N. Dunn polled only one vote in Mills County for this race.

Mills voters again re-elected Democrat Dolph Briscoe governor of Texas. Briscoe received 705 votes to Republican Jim Granberry's 129; 2 for Ramsey

Muniz; 10 for S. W. (Sam) McDonnell; and none for Sherry Smith.

Bill Hobby polled 723 votes for Lieutenant Governor, while his opponents Gaylord Marshall polled 111 and Dan Fein polled none.

John Hill received 756 votes for Attorney General, with his opponents Tom Cole receiving 78; and Pedro Vasquez none.

Lions Club Hears Airport Authorities

The Chief Airport Engineer of the Texas Aeronautics Commission was at the Goldthwaite Lions Club meeting Tuesday night, and presented some timely comments concerning an airport for Mills County.

The Commission will participate on a cost-share basis with the City and County to provide a paved, lighted runway for the use of the area if certain requirements are met.

W. O. Karpenko, a longtime aeronautics expert, said that the minimum requirements were that a 3100 feet long paved runway be constructed and that he gave some of the technical aspects of the proposition, grades, slopes etc.

In Karpenko's opinion, in order for an area to be competitive in this changing environment, an airport is a prime facility to have at our disposal. Many industries will use airports in their daily activities, he said.

A film on airports in general was viewed by the Lions following the question and answer period.

Ballots On Referendum Of Wool Promotion Mailed

Ballots will be mailed to all known wool and lamb producers in Mills County to enable them to vote in a national referendum on a proposed new agreement for the advertising and promotion of wool, according to Blake L. English, County Executive Director, Mills County ASCS Office.

The mail referendum being held Nov. 4 through 15 will enable producers to vote their approval or disapproval of a new agreement between USDA and the American Sheep Producers Council (ASPC) which provides for the USDA to withhold a part of any wool payments that might be made to producers to finance advertising and sales promotion programs by ASPC for wool and lamb. The withheld funds would also be used by ASPC to develop and disseminate information on product quality, production management and marketing improvement for wool and sheep.

Wool and lamb producers will be mailed an explanatory statement about the proposed new agreement along with the ballot. The new agreement is similar to one approved by producers in

1971. If approval is voted, payment deductions of up to 1-1/2 cents a pound on shorn wool and 7-1/2 cents a hundredweight on unshorn lambs would be made, the same as the maximum deduction rates for the 1966-72 period. Since no wool payments were made for 1973 marketings, there were no deductions for that year.

Blake English emphasized the neutrality of the U.S. Department of Agriculture on the proposal being submitted to wool and lamb producers. "Our sole interest is in conducting a fair and impartial referendum," he said.

Anyone may vote who has owned sheep 6 months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1973. Votes may be cast by individuals, corporations or partnerships. Any producer who is not already known to the county ASCS office is urged by Mr. English to come by or call in order to receive a ballot and explanatory material. The Mills County ASCS office is located at 1118 Fourth Street, Goldthwaite, Tex.

OJT Assistance Ready For Private Business

On-the-job training, or O.J.T., as it has been named, is now available in the form of financial reimbursement to private businesses that will train a new employee in the skills necessary for his job. This program has been contracted between the Texas Employment Commission of Killean and Central Texas Council of Governments. Special funds will be set aside for each county in the CTCOG region with the purpose to be used specifically for O.J.T. An individual contract between T.E.C. and the private business will be worked out based on the costs incurred by the employer in the process of teaching the new employee the mechanics of his job. When the total expenses have been determined, a contractual payment will be arranged to be made to the employer to cover these costs over a predetermined

amount of time. Mr. Bob Wiese is the Texas Employment Commission representative that will negotiate the arrangements for the private businesses in Mills County.

In order to receive assistance for O.J.T. the employer can contact the Mills County Office and indicate their interest in the program. Efforts will be made to assist the employer in working out his arrangement. The purpose of this program is dual; it can help those unskilled persons learn a trade or job skill, while at the same time assisting the employer obtain help for his business, trained specifically for that position. This program is made to serve disadvantaged persons become gainfully employed and to assist the business community as a whole.

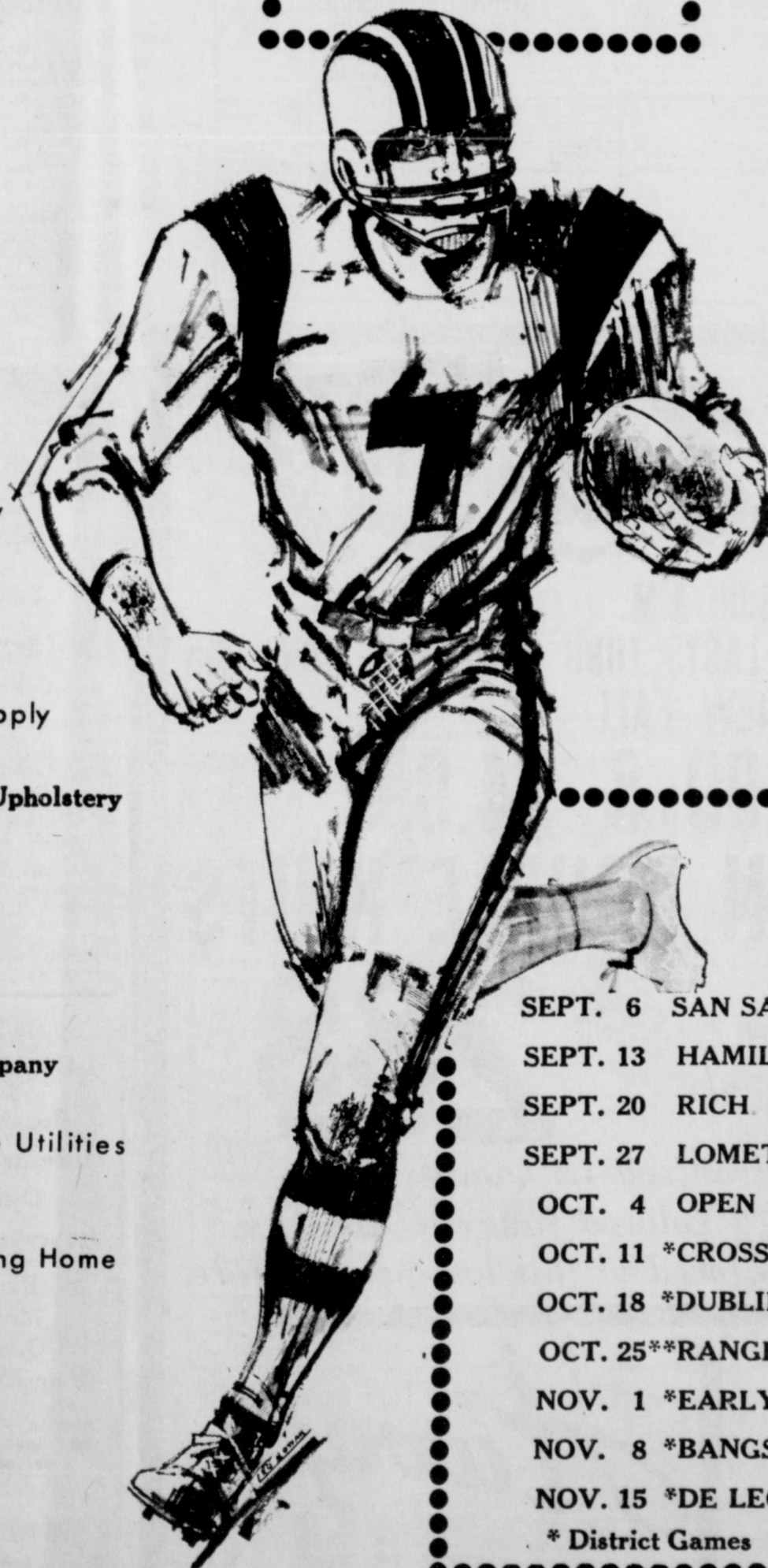

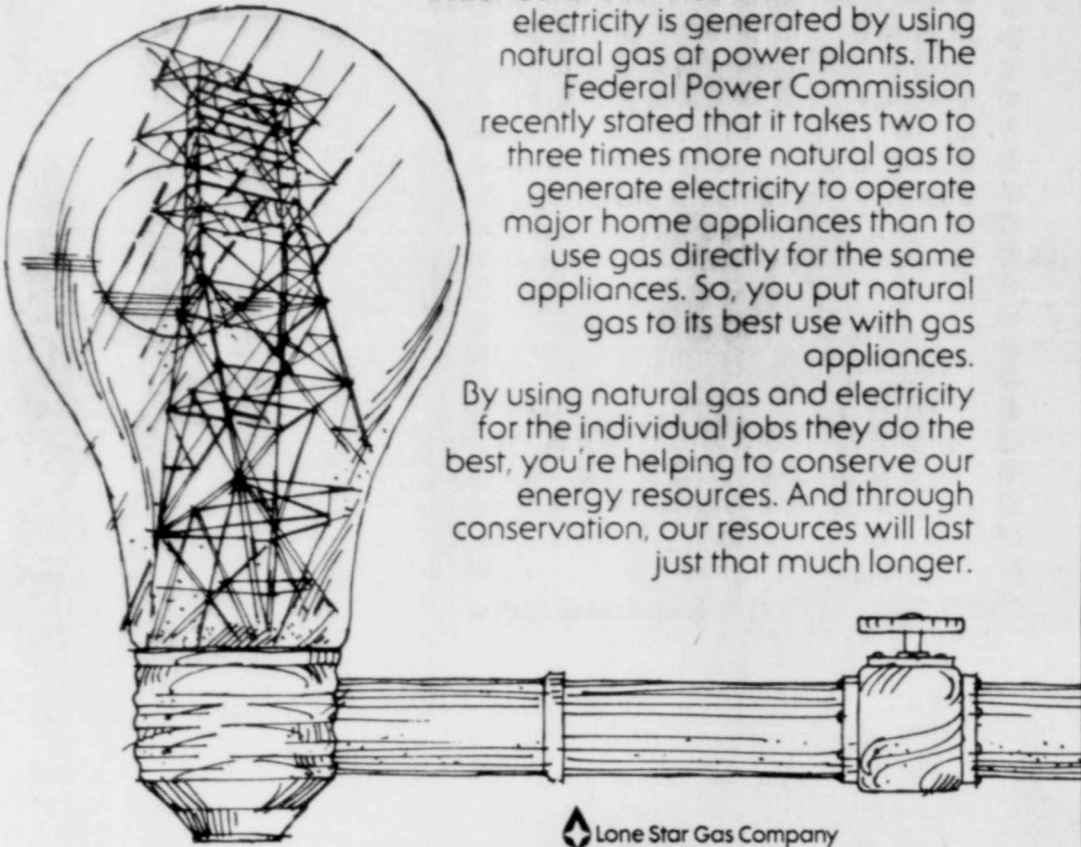
