Bountiful Deer Crop Confronts Mills County Deer Hunters In 1974

If the search for a deer lease is any indication of the success or failure of a deer season, then this is going to be a bountiful year for the hunter.

All landowners who have land to lease should have had it taken care of this year, if they ever will, according to area sources. The demand was great this year, with hunters answering the call

to hunt the fine Mills County animals from all areas of the state, and particularly the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

The deer crop itself should be a good match for the number of hunters. Excellent forage and an abundant acorn harvest should render the deer fat and numerous as the season opens Saturday at sun up.

An either sex deer season is again in effect for Mills County for the second year in a row. The limit here is two deer, either sex and antlerless deer by special tag only.

Turkey season in Mills County comes concurrently with deer season. Limit is two turkey gobblers or bearded hens, which have beards protruding through

the feathers. All turkeys must be tagged this year. Quail season opens on December 1st.

Land owners who lease their land for hunting are required to buy a license to lease and maintain a record of hunter's turkey, quail, deer and dove kills.

Deer season ends at sundown January 1, 1974.

Schriver reminds all hunters to be safety conscious and wear bright clothing when hunting to prevent any unnecessary accidents.

"Deer have heavy horns this year as a result of the abundant supply of acorns and pecans," Game Warden Benny R. Schriver said Wednesday morning. It should be a record year for trophy bucks, he added.

Schriver also reported that 1974 was a light year for pre-season violations. He said that recent heavy and publicized fines had some deterrent effect on the illegal hunting practices.

Accident Results In Death Of Star Woman

Mrs. Lenna Mildred Black of Star passed away Saturday, November 9th at 11:05 a.m. as the result of a two-vehicle accident which occurred near Star earlier that morning.

Mrs. Black, driver of a 1973 Buick, was headed east on U.S. 84 at the time of the accident. Jerry Covington of Rt. 2, Goldthwaite, was also headed east

on U.S. 84 in a 1970 Ford pickup owned by the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative. The pickup was attempting to pass the Buick when the driver of the car apparently turned into the path of the pickup.

Mrs. Black was taken to Childress Clinic and Hospital by Wilkins Ambulance where she received emergency treatment. She passed away while enroute to Austin for further medical treatment.

Covington was treated and released from Childress Clinic and Hospital. He suffered minor injuries.

The pickup received severe damage to the front, while the Buick was estimated to have damage to the left passenger side.

Local law enforcement officers investigated the accident.

Funeral services for Mrs. Black were conducted Sunday, November 10, 1974, at 2 p.m. in the Wilkins Funeral Chapel, with Minister Edwin Young officiating. Interment was in the Hursi Ranch Cemetery. Arrangements were under the direction of Wilkins Funeral Home.

Mrs. Black, a member of the Church of Christ, was born June 22, 1933 in Star, Texas to Roy Wall and Oleta Thompson Wall.

On September 14, 1950, in Ranger, Texas she was married to Harvey L. Black. They moved to Star in 1970 from Lometa.

Mrs. Black, operator of Joy's Beauty Shop for two years, is survived by her husband of Star; three sons, Rickey Lynn Black, Harvey L. Black, Jr. and Herbert Black, all of Star; one daughter, Mrs. Karen Sue Alexander, Austin; and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Wall of Star.

Quick Scoring Dragons To Much For Eagles

The Goldthwaite Eagles tied a come-back in the second half last week, but fell short to the Bangs Dragons by a 26-19 margin.

The Dragons, erupting for 20 points early in the game, saw the Eagles score to within seven points in the third period and again in the final stanza to give the Bangs team a real go for the money in the District 10-A contest.

The Eagles started to move late in the first half when an 18-yard aerial from quarterback Ray Frazier to end Tim Spradley put the first Eagle six-pointer on the board. Byron Landrum added the point after.

Goldthwaite pulled to within 20-13 in the third period when Guernaro Siller banged in from a yard out.

But Bangs came right back to make it a more comfortable 26-13 on Ron Young's TD from close range.

Goldthwaite's final score of the night came on Mike Simon's one-yard blast.

Bangs dominated the statistics with 24 first downs, 327 yards rushing and 73 passing to Goldthwaite's nine first downs, 17 rushing and 170 passing.

The loss left Goldthwaite 1-4

in district and 4-5 on the year. Bangs is 2-3 in district and 4-5 on the year.

Guernaro Siller, averaging over 100 yards per game rushing, was held to only 12 yards by the strong Bangs defense.

Friday night Goldthwaite will travel to DeLeon to take on a strong team who has already clinched the district crown.

Pecan Show November 19 & 20

The Mills County Pecan Show will be held here on November 19-20, 1974. Both homeowners and commercial growers are encouraged to attend. It makes no difference whether you have an orchard of a thousand trees or one tree in your back yard - you are still eligible to enter pecans in the show.

Processing of the entries will be done on November 19th. Judging will be done on the morning of the 20th. The display of entries will be open to the public at 2:00 p.m. on the afternoon of the 20th in the meeting room of the Mills County State Bank.

Both native and improved varieties may be shown. A sample entry will consist of 50 pecans of the same variety. The sample may come from more than one tree as long as the trees are of the same variety. Entry samples should be brought to the County Agent's office in the courthouse by November 15, 1974. Growers should bring the sample bag with the growers name and address written on the side.

We are asking that all samples be donated to the show and sold to help pay the cost of ribbons for the show.

We encourage all growers to enter this year's show. The more entries we have, the better the show will be.

Screwworm Infestations Relief To Come

Some relief from massive screwworm infestations in Texas Hill Country livestock is promised by cooler winter weather.

Technicians in the Screwworm Program laboratory identified 2,418 samples taken from Texas livestock as screwworms during October. This compares to 2,254 in October of 1973.

Hill Country counties recorded 1,004 cases of the live flesh eating parasite during October with 476 or 47 percent in cattle, 353 or 35 percent in sheep, and 54 or 5 percent in goats. Mills County recorded nine cases in October.

Independent Cattlemen Review Problems Facing Livestock Producers

The Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas recently conferred with Senator Lloyd Bentsen, a possible 1976 presidential contender and Congressman Bob Poage, influential Chairman of the House Agriculture

Committee in Washington, to discuss a meeting with the Texas Congressional Delegation regarding the problems facing the livestock producer in Texas and throughout the United States. T. A. Cunningham of Gollad,

President of the Association, said, "On Tuesday, December 3, we plan to meet with the Texas Congressional Delegation and discuss what can be done to save the farmers and ranch-

ers and protect the agriculture industry. If positive steps are not taken immediately, many farmers and ranchers will be forced to go out of business. The agricultural industry has been and will continue to be the backbone of the United States."

Although a relatively new organization, the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas already has a membership in excess of 60,000. Its purposes are to promote the marketing of livestock and to promote and protect the red meat industry. The Association is hopeful that through a large membership it will become strong enough to influence State and Federal policy makers. In addition, the Independent Cattlemen's Association plans to work very closely with all existing agricultural organizations to accomplish a common goal, that being to protect agriculture generally.

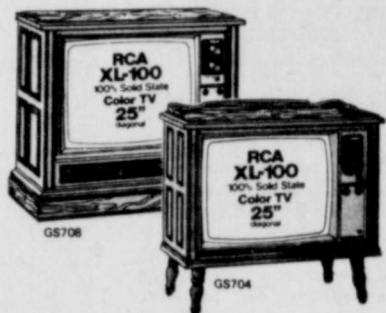

Postal Service Reiterates Unpaid Delivery

Postmaster Norman Duren today reminded customers that effective Sunday, November 17, the U. S. Postal Service intends to discontinue delivering mail on which there is no postage.

Postmaster Duren said the new policy was instituted because of the high costs being incurred by the Postal Service in its attempt to deliver such mail. Officials estimate that such costs total approximately \$18 million annually.

In announcing the new policy last month, Postmaster General E. T. Klassen said, "It is unfair to burden the vast majority of mailers with costs created by the few who mail without prepayment of postage."

After November 17, letters mailed without postage will be returned to sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered to the address as postage due mail as has been the custom. Postal officials will attempt to find the sender of unpaid mail and return it for a slight fee, if there is no return address.

"Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellation, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail," Postmaster Duren said.

Two Stolen Cars Recovered Here

Last week two stolen cars were recovered in Mills County. Tuesday, 5.6 miles east of Goldthwaite on a country road, a 1964 Chevrolet which had been stolen out of Louisiana was recovered by local law enforcement officers. Apparently the driver of the car had gone around a curve and lost control of the vehicle which was discovered turned upside down. The driver had abandoned the car.

A 1973 Chevrolet which was stolen out of Dallas was discovered fourteen miles south of Goldthwaite on U.S. 183 Wednesday. The automobile had been stolen out of Dallas on November 4th. Local law enforcement officers investigated.

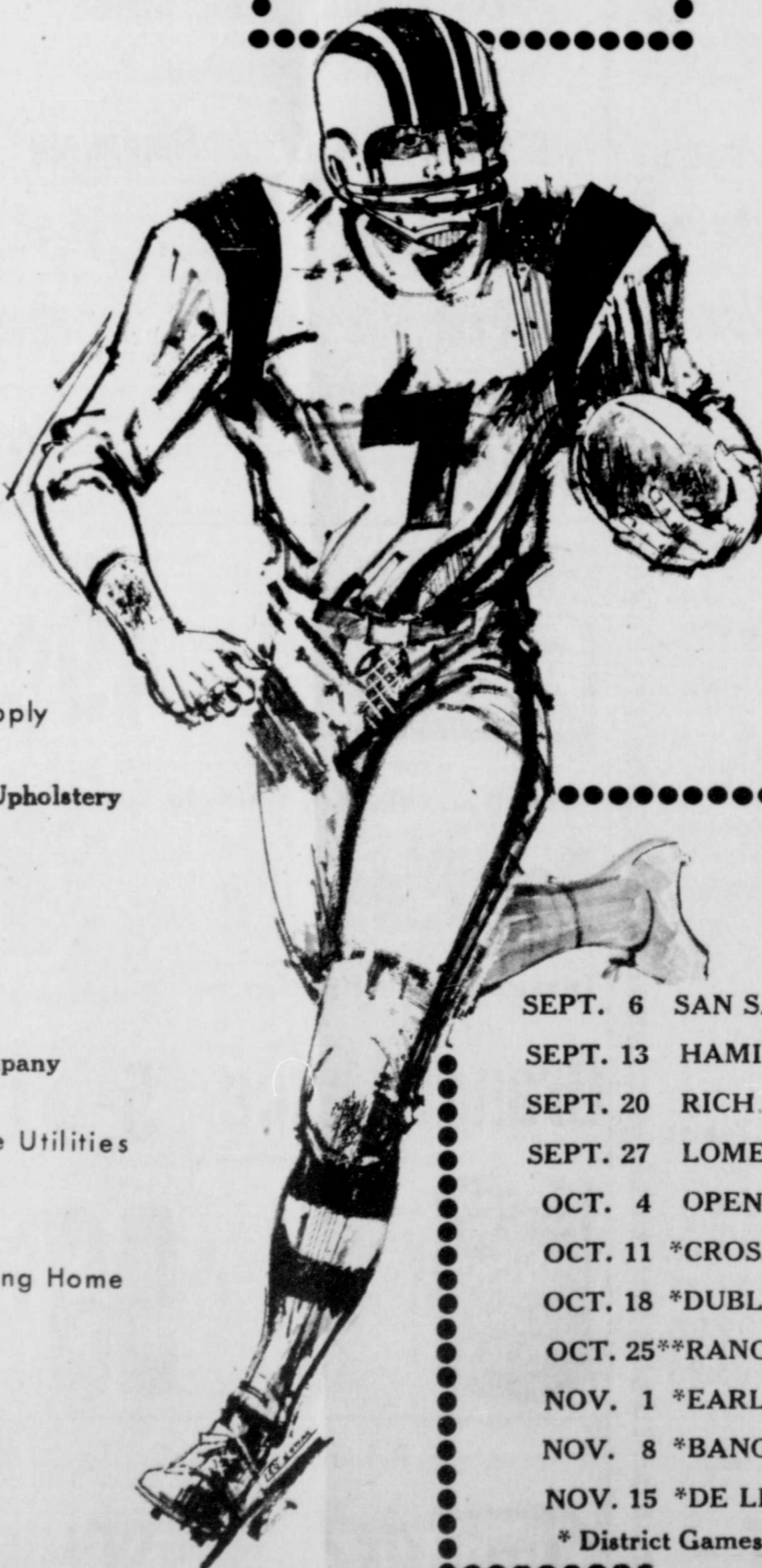

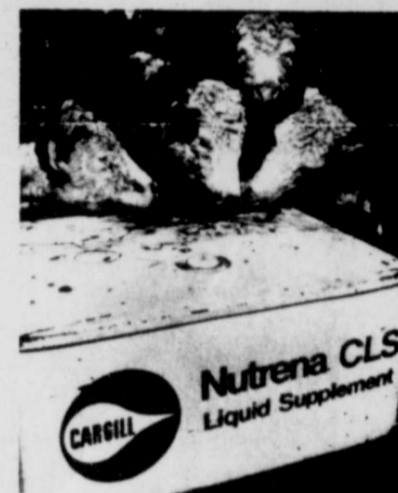

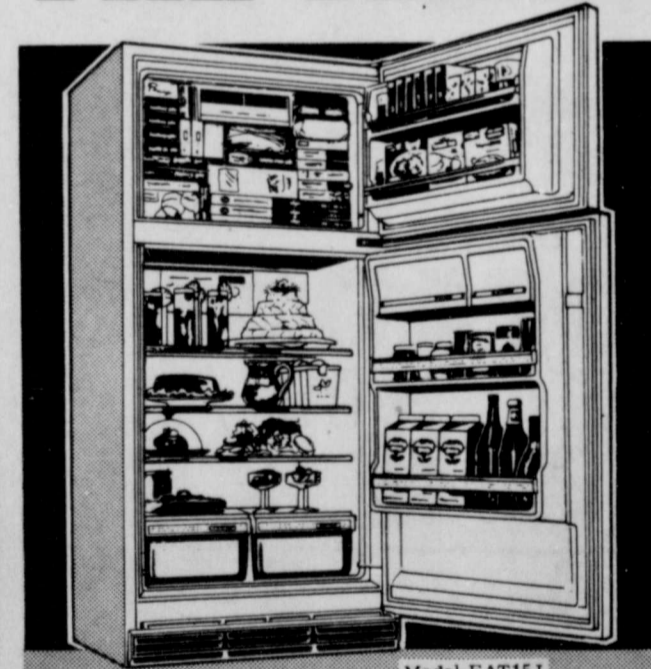
