Farm Bureau Joins **Agricultural Effort**

Mills County Farm Bureau has oined an all-out, statewide effort to increase consumption of meat, poultry and dairy products during the holiday season, ac-cording to Bill Bishop of Goldthwaite, president.

The organization will promote the giving of certificates for these products as holiday gifts, he said. "We think this is a positive appraoch in assisting those commodities which are in serious trouble," he explained.
The local FB leader said there

are two ways this can be done conveniently: (1) Through buying gift certificates (redeemable in those commodities) at grocery stores.

"We are providing gift certificates to stores which do not

have their own, along with color-ful gift envelopes," he said.

(2) Through giving a check or money order. Farm Bureau will provide an attractive message card (explaining the gift idea) along with a nice gift envelope The County Farm Bureau office at Goldthwaite in Mills County has a supply of both items, free of charge.

Farm Bureau is also providing the necessary supplies (certificates, window posters, etc.), and will publicize the promotion through advertising and publicity releases. Committees are already busy on these projects, he said.

The Texas Farm Bureau is helping to coordinate the effort on a statewide basis along with many other agricultural groups. The Texas Department of Agriculture has committed its TAP (Texas Agricultural Products) program to the promotion. The Texas Retail Grocers Association and large food chains are also participating.

State Farm Bureaus in several other states are carrying on similar promotions, Bishop said. "This can truly be an effective campaign if we all work at it,"

The station wagon, traveling south on 183, apparently failed to yield right of way at the red light, thereby colliding with the Kerby vehicle which was headed east on Business 84. No injuries were received in the accident.

Damage sustained by the station wagon was estimated as minor, while heavy damage was estimated on the right front fend-

The truck, which was loaded with \$18,000 worth of peanuts, skidded across the road overturned. CTCOG Passes Resolutions Relating To Gatesville School

The uncertain future of the Gatesville School for Boys and the Mountain View Unit dominated action taken by the executive committee of the Central Texas Council of Governments

Thursday. The CTCOG committee passed three resolutions related to Gatesville state facilities; two of which focus on the school's future use in the event it is closed by court order.

One resolution calls for the Gatesville School to be used either by the Texas Department of Corrections or for a \$11 million federal youth rehabi-litation center which the Federal Bureau of Prisons has proposed be located in Texas.

Another resolution authorizes a fesibility study on facilities at Gatesville to determine their "best use" if the reformatory is closed. The resolution also states the study should deter-mine if the facilities could be used for a regional jail, a facil-ity for adult offenders or the location for a juvenile offenders

program.
The CTCOG committee passed a third resolution requested by Mills County officials and Del Barnett, director of New Horirons Ranch Inc. at Goldthwaite, requesting that the Legislature better utilize existing facilities which care for the emotionally deprived delinquent and neglected youths.

Barnett told the committee that Texas does not provide funds for such care and warned that if the Gatesville facilities are closed, there will be a greater need for juvenile residential treatment programs in all sections of the state.



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Assc. Mr. Clements pointed out that there are two kinds of law statutory law, that which is legislated, and common law, that which is rendered by the courts through the opinion of the judge or jury. Mr. Clements reports that common law is like putty in a crack, that which is not covered or provided for in statutory law is usually corrected through common law situations by the judge's interpretation of what the legislated law intended. In most instances Mr. Clements reported that jury decisions rather than judge's interpretations are the basis of most common

"Law is designed that justice be done in each particular case" was Mr. Clement's feelings of the definitions of law. However, he pointed out that justice depended upon which side you were on, what is good for the goose is not always good for the gander, thus giving rise for the need of common law.

Uncommon law is in very special instances when justice may best be served by re-evaluation of the facts of a case. Several cases were cited giving instances when the uncommon law was applied. Mr. Clements delivered a most interesting program, after which be answered questions from the floor.

Although the turkey roamed over Texas and Mexico long before Columbus came to our shores, the All-American bird is looking its best this year. Turkeys are plentiful, and to top it off, the price is right. Of course, at any price turkey is an excellent buy nutritionwise. But now turkeys are a double

Nutrition is presently the name of the game and turkey wins this game hands down. Turkey is highest in protein and lowest in fats of all our common meats. It is also a meat that is high in riboflavin and niacin - - two of the more important B vitamins.

Turkey is common fare for holiday meals but really deserves more use by most families on a year-round basis. Size should not be a deterrent, as the raw frozen turkey may be divided, wrapped and refrozen for delicious meals. A publication,
"Freezing Poultry for Home
Use," provides helpful hints and
is available from the Mills County Extension Office.

Turkey also works well when the cooked meat is refrozen for later use.

Some families serve turkey for an evening or Sunday din-ner and then debone and freeze the remaining turkey for later - - saving just enough for cold turkey a day or so later. No matter how you cut it, turkey is usually one of the better protein values. Have you ever compared the foods you buy on the cost of the protein

they are supplying to your menu?
Just use the protein content and
price per pound for any food.
Turkey meat is naturally low in fat. One would expect to find 125-150 calories in a serving. Of course, if the serving were

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just white meat, it would be less. Self-basting turkeys are a little higher in calories due to the added basting sauce. But the calorie count is still low when compared with cestnut and sausage stuffing or grayy made. sausage stuffing or gravy made

from pan drippings.

One of the biggest secrets in roasting turkey is keeping the meat moist. Since the birds are so young when processed for market, the naturally low-calorie meat has little fat. Keeping this meat moist requires more care than for meats having more fat. You can conserve moisture by covering the bird in a roasting pan, placing it in a special plas-tic bag, or 'tenting' it with foil and cooking at 352F. The turkey is cooked when a meat ther-mometer placed in the center of the thickest portion of the meat registers 180 degrees F.

Recommendations for after Thanksgiving Dinner: 1. If turkey is stuffed, remove dresssing immediately. Bacteria

grow quickly in the warm cavity. It is even better if you don't stuff the turkey at all or don't eat the stuffing. 2. Debone the turkey within

24 hours. 3. Refrigerate turkey and dressing immediately after the

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

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

AUSTIN—Legislative Buget Board heard warning that spending demands are cost of school finance for mula revision are fast eating up an anticipated \$1.4 billio surplus.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby sai talk of tax cuts is "prema ture" until the board com pletes its spending recom mendations next month.

LBB sides echoed earlier words of caution that spending all the fat surplus in sight would mean a record tax bill of \$1.5 billion in 1977.

They also calculated that state government agencies already have requested more than \$1.7 billion in increased general revenue appropriations for the coming fiscal period. That is 80.3 per cent over the current level—and \$300 million more than the anticipated surplus at the end of the next biennium.

Cost of overhauling the school finance formula — priority goal of the 1975 Legislature—was estimated at from \$570 million to \$873 million during 1976-77.

LBB figured it has recommended \$362 million in genil revenue increases for the agencies. More agencies will have their appropriations requests reviewed and acted on December 9.

The Mental Health and Mental Retardation Department would receive under board recommendations \$68.4 million in general revenue—an increase of \$227.3 million, but far short of the \$913.6 million requested.
