A nice group of over forty people attended the ceremonies at the Commissioners' Court Room of the Mills County Courthouse.

Three Accidents Investigated In Mills County

Tuesday, December 31st, the intersection of Farm Road 218 and 573, 9.6 miles north of Mullin, was the scene of a two-vehicle accident.

A 1974 Ford pickup driven by Rodney Carlisle headed south on FM 573 was in collision with a 1972 GMC pickup driven by Robert Reich of Hamilton. The Reich vehicle was headed east on FM 218 at the time of the accident.

Both vehicles sustained moderate damage. No injuries were received.

Sunday, January 5, 1975 a one-vehicle accident occurred six miles west of Goldthwaite on Farm Road 574.

A 1963 Plymouth station wagon driven by Ronald Maxwell of Temple failed to negotiate a curve and overturned. The vehicle was going west at the time of the accident. The driver received no injuries.

Also Sunday at 2:35 p.m., seven-tenths of a mile north of here, the intersection of U.S. Highway 84 and 83 was the scene of a truck-car accident.

A 1974 Mack truck and trailer driven by James Fox of Austin going north on 83 was attempting to intersect Hwy 84 when it was in collision with a 1974 Chevrolet driven by Willard Gray of Brownwood.

The Gray vehicle was headed east on 84 at the time of the accident.

Gray was taken to Childress Clinic and Hospital by Wilkins ambulance where he received treatment for head lacerations. B. M. Ballard, passenger in the Gray vehicle, sustained slight injuries in the accident. Damage to the truck was estimated as light, while the car was estimated to have moderate damage.

County CTCOG Meets January 9

The Mills County Committee of the Central Texas Council of Governments will meet in the Commissioners' Courtroom on January 9, Thursday, at 4:00 p.m. Included in the agenda will be a discussion of the new Manpower programs for the Fiscal Year 1976, a report on the progress of the on-going programs, and discussions on county projects. All members are urged to attend and any interested individuals will be welcome to join in the discussion.

Sewer Line Extension For City May Be Slow Coming

The status of the long-awaited sewer line extension for the City of Goldthwaite was discussed at length at the regular session Monday night.

Darrell Johnson, representing Rady and Sons Engineering firm of Fort Worth told the council that verbal approval had been obtained from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) but written approval has been slow in coming. This approval is for the first report under step one of the grant program of which the cost is expected to reach over \$400,000. The federal government, if all facets are approved, will pay 75 percent of this cost. Johnson said, however, that the construction is probably still two years away because of the enormous amount of red tape and statistical data

that is needed by various federal agencies before the grant can be awarded.

This year, for example, 150 million dollars was allotted to be used by the State of Texas and following a priority number system Goldthwaite was way down the list. The City of Fort Worth received 78 million dollars in grants.

Dan Tyson and Johnny Head were present at the meeting and asked the City to give something more in the area of crime protection at night.

Tyson's D Bar T Western Wear and Head Electric were burglarized January 1st. Tyson asked if there was anything possible that could be done to get patrols into the alleys in downtown Goldthwaite at intervals during the night. Most all burglaries occurring in Goldth-

waite occur at alley entrances and late at night. Regular patrols would probably scare would-be burglars away Tyson said.

Later in the meeting the council unanimously voted, following a motion by Loy Long, to furnish nightwatchmen with a city vehicle to make their rounds and that they be instructed to irregularly patrol all alleys in downtown Goldthwaite in order to give better crime prevention.

Mayor Ray Duren presented a report on the proposed railroad crossing barriers for Goldthwaite. He said that the crossing of U.S. 84 and the Santa Fe Railroad has tentatively been approved and construction is probably forthcoming for the wooden barrier system.

City Manager Don Petty reported that a traffic survey for other intersections with the railroad showed that traffic was not heavy enough an any of these to warrant any kind of warning system. These type systems are very expensive and cannot be constructed on a casual basis.

The council passed a "junk" car ordinance specifying that any location other than regular body shop and garages with two or more junk vehicles located there would be subject to filing and penalties.

CM Petty gave the monthly operation report which showed a balance in the black for December. The City received the quarterly one percent city sales tax check for \$6,482.24. Also, the City collected over \$5,000 in city tax money for the month. Petty also said that he had received Monday a revenue sharing check for \$2,118. This money is for the second quarter of 1974 of the revenue sharing program.

Petty was authorized by the council to accept a new employee in the water department. Employees in this department require a lot of training and are licensed by the State.

Councilman Ancle Morgan made a motion to require all city pickups to be locked in the city community compound each day at closing time, and the usual practice of employees taking vehicles to and from work be stopped. Councilman Donald Padgett seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

In final council action, office manager Dale Allen is to be furnished gasoline when he uses his own vehicle for City business.

Two Local Businesses Burglarized Wednesday, Jan. 1st

The new year started off quickly as far as Mills County law enforcement officers were concerned.

Wednesday night, January 1, two Goldthwaite business firms were reportedly entered and burglarized of more than \$7,000 worth of merchandise.

Head Electric, located on Parker St., was entered by

the burglars using bolt cutters to gain entry into a back yard area and then breaking a window and entering the store.

The back door was easily opened from the inside and the thieves set about their work, loading six television sets, a large refrigerator, a kitchen range, washing machine, thirteen citizen band radio sets, and a number of car tape decks and radios.

The other burglary occurred at D Bar T Western Wear in which about \$3,000 worth of clothing and office machinery was stolen.

Entry was gained by using bolt cutters again on a barred door and then breaking through to the inside.

Mills County Sheriff Horace Brooks said late Tuesday that no leads were turning up, but he suspected when some of the merchandise is marketed that the suspects would be apprehended.

Cooksey was born in Mullin 29 years ago and has lived there all his life. He ran for this same office in 1946 and was in the run-off with the present sheriff, W. L. Mahan. Also in the race for Mills Co. sheriff is Gene Turbiville. He owns a stock farm in the Scallorn section and is 39 years old.
