Josh Kerby, Mike Read, J.T. and Stacy Roach, Christen Stowers and Janie Sudderth.

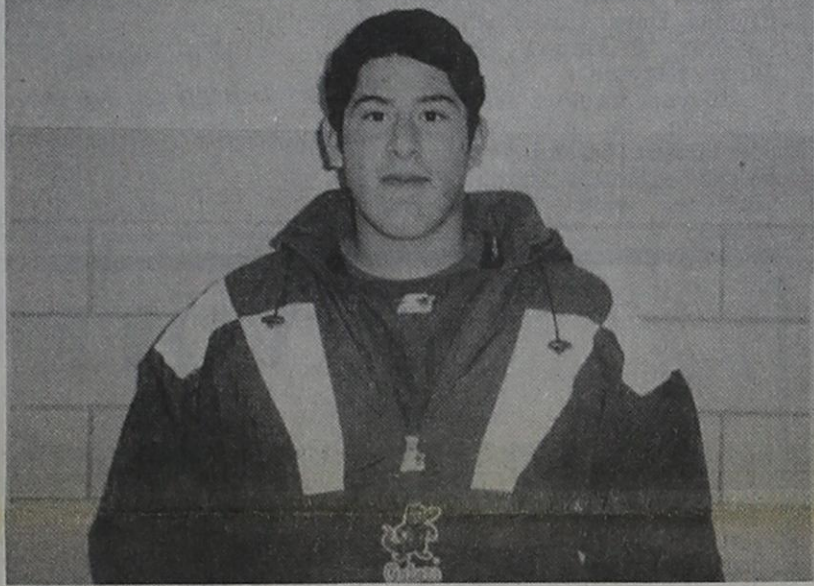

Mustangs Roll On Toward District, Beat Hart 14-12

Recovering from a rough loss to Lockney, the Bovina Mustangs rallied to defeat Hart 14-12 in what Coach Bobby Ortiz had termed a "super bowl" game.

"We have two more super bowls to play if we are going to get to the playoffs", said Ortiz as he worked on a game plan for Friday night's game against Olton in which the Harris Ratings made Bovina a 25-point favorite.

The surprising 6-2 Mustangs squeaked by Hart 14-12 in an uneven winning effort last Friday night. Hart had 15 first downs, Bovina had 7. Hart had 320 rushing yards, Bovina had 183. Hart had 335 total yards, Bovina had 236.

But, the tenacious Mustangs caused four turnovers and most important was the final score, Bovina 14- Hart 12.

Hart led at halftime 6-0. In the third quarter, Luke Steelman took a 6-yard scoring pass from Tony

Beauchamp but the kick failed and the score was knotted at 6-6.

Junior tailback Albert Larrea scored on a 35 yard run, still in the third quarter. A two-point conversion pass from Beauchamp to Francisco Nieto was successful giving Bovina a 14-6 lead.

The Mustangs held on as Hart scored once in the fourth quarter and missed the extra point conversion for a final of 14-12 favor of the Mustangs.

Larrea ended the game with 8 carries for 46 yards. Robert Perez had 70 yards on 8 carries, Joe Villarreal 42 yards on 11 carries, and Beauchamp pitched in 25 yards on 4 carries.

Beauchamp was 4 out of 9 passing for 43 yards and one touchdown.

The Mustangs tangle with Olton on Friday, November 1, and end the season at Highland Park (Amarillo) on November 8, headed for a playoff round.

A win over Olton would make the Highland Park contest a deciding game for the second district playoff berth. Unless Hart loses. We will keep you posted.

Special Election To Be Held

The Bovina ISD Board of Trustees has called for a special election on January 18, 1997, to fill a vacancy on the school board. The election will fill a position for a term that extends until May, 1998.

The first date to file an application for a place on the ballot will be November 4, 1996. December 4 will be the filing deadline. Anyone interested in filing an application may do so at the superintendent's office at 500 Halsell Street.

Current members of the Board of Trustees are Bob Owen, Ricky Jamerson, Mike Beauchamp, Joe Steelman, Susan Kerby, and Justin Brozek.

Large Turn-Out Expected Tues.

There are 4337 registered voters in Parmer County. Bonnie Warren, county clerk, expects this election to bring a large percentage of them to the polls.

The 459 voters that had cast their early ballots by Wednesday set the tone for the 1996 election. A total of 542 early votes were counted in 1992, the last presidential election year.

During the last general election in 1992, Warren said, "We had a real good turn out percentage-wise and we expect the same this year. There is a lot of interest in this election."

The presidential election, as well as congressional, local, state and district elections have fueled the fire of election turn-out.

On the regional level Hollis Cain's effort to oust long-time incumbent Pete Laney has brought about questions in voters' minds.

Locally, the tax assessor's race between incumbent Doris Herrington and challenger Teresa Ancira has generated considerable interest.

A write-in effort by Ed

Corn and D.H. Foster against Lowell Primrose and Jerry Davis for county commissioner, precinct 3 has been interesting to watch develop.

These races are expected to make Parmer County's totals somewhat larger than average.

As of 5 pm Thursday, 50 early Bovina voters cast their ballots in precinct 201.

263 early Friona voters had cast ballots in precincts 101, 202 and 402.

Nine polling places will be open Tuesday, November 5 from 7 am-7 pm. They are as follows: (Precinct number listed first.)

101--Calvary Baptist Church, Friona; 201--Bovina EMS Building; 202--Friona Community Center; 203--Rhea Community Center; 301--Farwell Community Center; 302--Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church; 303--Bovina Ridgelea School; 401--Lazbuddie School; 402--Friona Fire Station.

Registered voters have the obligation to elect our county, state and federal leaders. If you don't vote, your voice will not be heard.

Bovina Lions Offer Flags For Holidays

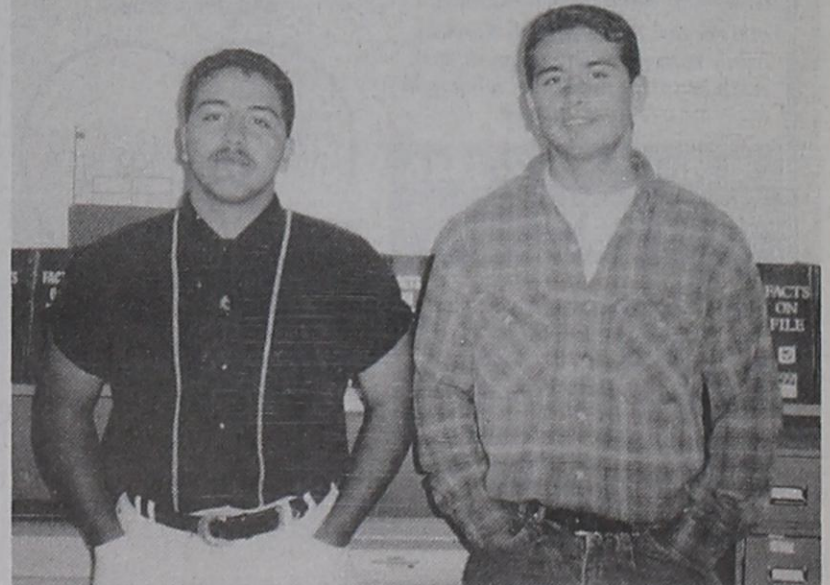

The front desk ladies dressed up in Halloween costumes last Thursday to cheer patients up on their way back to be stuck and prodded with needles and things.

The most amazing thing I heard was that Halloween is now the second highest "holiday" in terms of consumer spending. I can believe it. Did you check out the prices on a medium sized bag of miniature Snickers?

So how do we get rid of all trick-or-treaters over third grade age? Let's ask big government to help.

Billy Jeff and Algoré want to help us with every aspect of our daily lives anyway. We are too stupid to make it on our own.

Here is how he is going to "help us" fight teenage drug abuse. Big government proposes to require all teenagers to take a drug test before they can get a drivers license.

Billy Jeff said he hoped "the 90 per cent of teenagers that are drug free" would participate willingly in such a program "to help catch the teens who do use drugs."

As usual I have a few questions. For instance, who is going to pay for the drug test. They do cost money and no doubt the companies who manufacture the drug testing kits are overjoyed with the prospect of selling millions of kits.

What if a teen takes the drug test and fails? Do they get a chance to re-apply later or do they do without a drivers license the rest of their lives?

Billy Jeff said in a memo that he "believes the lure of a drivers license is so compelling for most young people that it can be used to effect their behavior".

Let me simplify that statement: "Billy Jeff's Big Government wants to legislate your teenager's behavior because you are too ineffective and stupid as a parent and you need some help".

The supply and demand of drugs in the U. S. is not caused by teenagers and messing with their driver's licenses is absolutely not going to solve anything. I am surprised that more people are not yelling about it. It is not fair to teenagers. Period. They have rights too.

There is not enough room in this column to list Billy Jeff's Big Government intrusions. But let's try a couple.

The IRS has 480 different tax forms and another 280 forms to explain how to fill out the first 480.

The IRS budget has grown from \$300 million in 1955 to \$10 billion today, a 3,200 per cent increase.

IRS employees have been caught snooping on the tax returns of their neighbors.

The IRS has \$200 billion worth of mistakes on its books, according to the GAO.

During the primary campaigns, candidates like Steve Forbes wanted a flat tax system so simple you could put your tax return on the back of a post card.

Do you think anyone in or near the IRS, including tax attorneys and accountants, want that system? No way.
