### Goldthwaite Branch

Two savings and loan associations have made application with the Savings and Loan Commissioner of Texas for branches to be located here in Goldthwaite.

A consolidated hearing will be held in Austin on March 3 of the matter.

The two firms, Southern Savings of Brownwood and Abilene Savings of Abilene, are seeking to do business in Mills County.

The applications will come up for review at 9:30 a.m. on March 3, at the Commissioner's office at 1010 Lavaca in Austin.

Southern Savings and Loan has Fisher and Fourth Streets in the vicinity of its proposed office here and Abilene Savings Association lists 1004 Fourth Street as the probable location of its offices in Goldthwaite.

The Eagle expects to publish more on the applications as information becomes available from the Commissioner and from the Associations.

## Commissioners Court Holds Session To Begin 1975

The first session of the 1975 Goldthwaite Commissioners Court met last Monday and Tuesday in the Commissioners Courtroom. The new county judge, Herbert Faulkner, presided and commissioners present were Lewis Watson, Burtel Roberts, Hawley Jernigan and Ray Lindsey.

The court heard from Bill Bishop and Jr. Horton, representing the Mills Co. Farm Bureau, concerning predator

control aid to be furnished by the county. The commissioners unanimously approved paying \$300 per month, to be matched by state funds, to procure the services of another trapper. The funds will be allocated for a six-month period. The private predator control program now employees Hammond Humphries as its trapper and he will be joined by the new man when hired.

The court agreed to co-sponsor, with the Hill Country Community Action Assn. and the Central Texas Council of Governments, a 12-passenger bus to be used by senior citizens of Mills County for transportation of any kind except to and from church. The bus will be especially used to take Senior Citizens to and from doctors' offices.

The court reappointed Dr. R. Glynn Hales as County Health Officer for a three-year period.

The court spent the majority of the two-day session discussing salaries for county officials and employees. All persons on the county payroll received some increase in salary and the county judge and county-district clerk were put on straight salary instead of the salary-plus-fee basis. From now on, all fees will be turned directly over to the county treasurer.

Justice of the Peace Court jurors will be paid three dollars per day instead of two dollars for services on JP juries.

## Industrial Development Project Planned By COG

The Goldthwaite Committee for Industrial Development met Tuesday afternoon and heard from representatives from the Central Texas Council of Governments on a proposed new project for the development of our area.

The cities of Goldthwaite, Gatesville, Hico, San Saba and Rockdale were the five towns who will be asked to participate in a cost-share project that is designed to run a minimum of six months.

COG will furnish an industrial development guide book, publish information, educate and train local members, prepare inventory of industrial sites, obtain prospects, prepare housing surveys, and handle community planning for industrial development in these communities.

A total budget of over \$14,000 has been planned with over \$9,000 to come from the five cities participating.

Goldthwaite's committee unanimously voted to pay its share, \$315 per month out of industrial foundation funds for the project.

The balance of the budget will come directly from COG monies.

The project was presented to the committee by Bob Neel, Director of Industrial Development Program; Charles Cass, Executive Director of COG; Billy Don Everitt, Manpower Director.

Committee members present were James Reese, Tom Duren, Warren Duren, Lee Roy Stacy, G. Frank Bridges and county COG office manager, Vicki Holcomb.

## Resolution Honors Cary Owens

The late Cary Davis Owens, a pioneer Mills County rancher and conservation leader, was honored by a Senate Resolution introduced by Sen. Chet Brooks of Houston and Sen. Grant Jones of Abilene this past week.

Owens, a prominent Mills Co. citizen who died at age 75 in July of 1974, was lauded in Senate Resolution 11 for his "numerous worthwhile community activities" and for being "a recognized authority in the fields of soil and water conservation and grazing management."

The Brooks-Jones resolution also cited Owens for his contributions to Center City Methodist Church.

Copies of the resolution were being prepared by the Texas Senate for the members of Mr. Owens' family; his sisters, Mrs. Lufa Owens Head and Mrs. Sadie Owens Head, both of Lometa, and his brother, Sherwood Owens, of Center City.

The Senate adjourned last Wednesday in memory of Mr. Owens.

**Production Cost Survey Includes Local Information**  
A comprehensive survey to determine costs of producing wheat, corn and other feed grains, cotton, soybeans, milk and selected commodities will include information from Mills County farmers.  
Charles E. Caudill, Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, said the national data collecting effort will get underway in late January. Mills Co. producers and those in other parts of the country will be personally contacted for information about their 1974 costs of production. Costs of labor, power and equipment, fertilizer and chemicals, storage, drying, and other similar outlays will be determined. All responses will be confidential and only State, regional, and national summaries will be issued.  
The survey will be conducted annually to identify production practices and establish current national average costs of producing farm commodities. The information will be of major usefulness in identifying and updating budgets for crop and livestock enterprises. The survey results will also provide production costs which may be used as determinants of target price or price support levels.

## From The County Agent-

Homeowners should be considering the practice of using dormant oil on their fruit & nut trees. On peaches and plums, the dormant oil emulsion should be used at the rate of 4 gallons of 97 percent oil emulsion per 100 gallons of water. The spray should be applied during dormant season prior to bud swelling. The rate is the same for apple and pear trees. The application should be made as buds begin to swell and when the temperature is between 50 - 85 degrees F. and no freeze is expected for at least 8 hours.

For pecan trees, the rate of application is 3 1/2 gallons of 97 percent oil emulsion mixed with 100 gallons of water.

For homeowners with only a few trees, the spray can be reduced according to label recommendations.

Care should be taken that dormant oil applications be made during the dormant season. Dormant oil applications are recommended for the control of scale, phylloxera, blister mites, red mites and rose aphids.

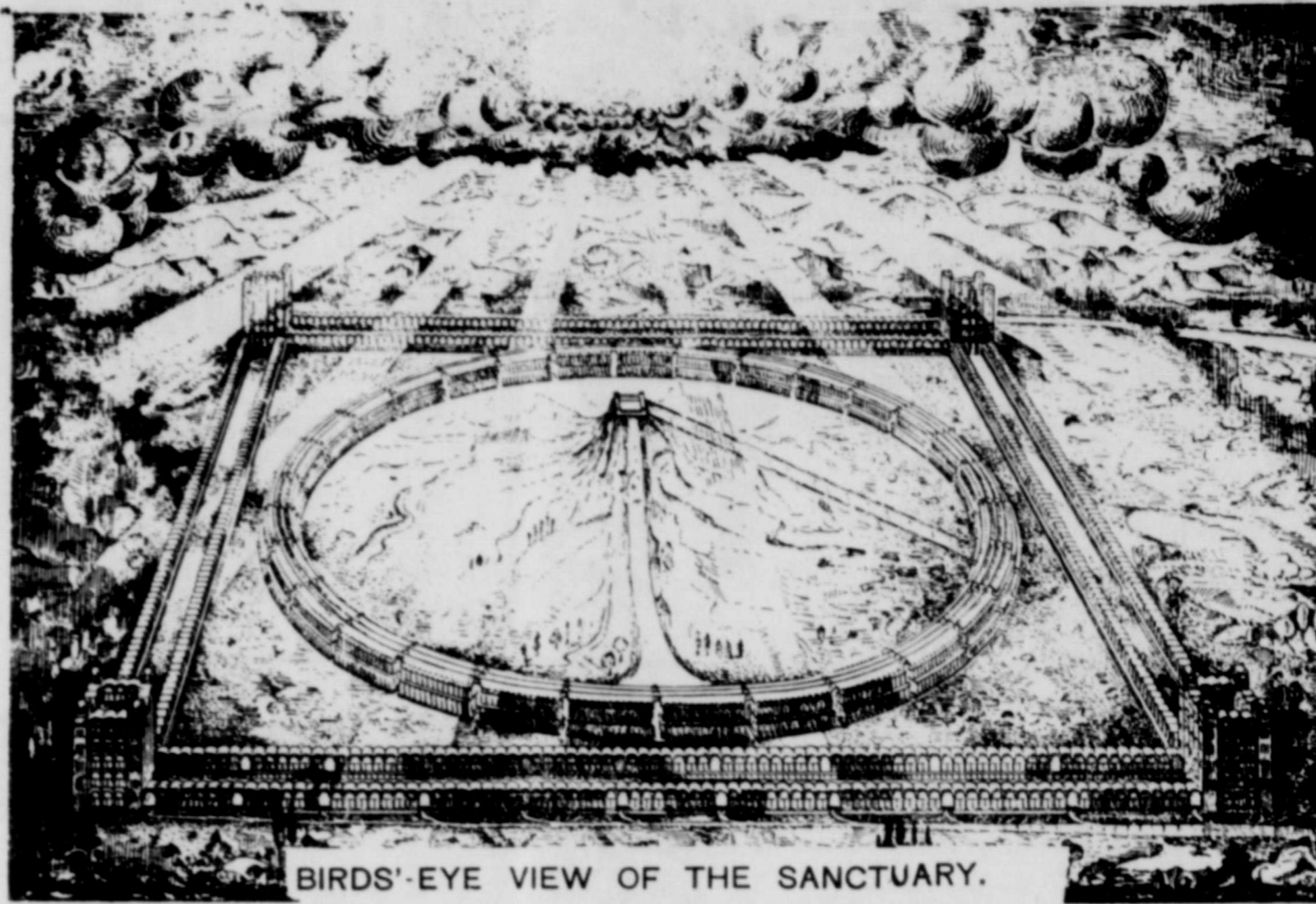

The Rock Springs oil well is said to be down about 1600 feet. The geologists expect it to be necessary to drill to a depth of 1700 feet and are confident of ultimate success in bringing in an oil field.
