Van Arrives For Mills County Senior Citizens

of the county will now have access to the transportation van provided for Mills County. The van arrived in the county on Wednesday of last week, delivered by Coleman Young of the Central Texas Council of Governments. The van is made available through funding by the Green Thumb Program in contract with the Governor's Committee on the Aging, Mr. Young, Regional Director of the Office on Aging, made delivery of three vans throughout the region. Lampasas and Milam Counties also received one of the vans.

The local groups sponsoring the van include the County Commissioners, the Ministerial Alliance, and the Hill Country Community Action Agency. Through their participation, the van will be provided at no cash cost to the county, allowing their

ASCS Issues Annual Report Of Conservation Practices

The Mills County ASCS Office offered cost share assistance conservation practices 1974. A total of about \$85,000 in federal funds was used on a match basis, with county farmers and ranchers furnishing half the cost on needed conservation practices.

The two programs were an nounced in March of 1974, and because of predominantly dry weather were not used as extensively in grass seeding sodding as prior years.

The Rural Environmental As sistance Program, 1973 REAP, provided \$73,000 in cost shares for a wide range of conservation practices on 170 farms, Participation of approximately 25 percent of all Mills County farms was evidenced. The fol lowing practices were used:

Permanent vegetative cover (coastal, klein grass, etc.) no. practices, 25; cost-shares, \$4268; acreage, 682. Cross fences for improve-

ment of permanent pastures no. practices, 19; cost-shares, \$9845; acreage, 1834 ac-served. Wells & pipelines for im-provement of permanent pastures - no. practices, 35; costshares, 13,322; acreage, 3220 ac-served.

Dams, pits & ponds - no. practices, 33; cost-shares, \$13,993; acreage, 5160 acserved Brush control - no. practices,

74; cost-shares, \$31,121; acreage, 4985 acres. Animal waste retention structures - no. practices, 1;

cost-shares, \$673; acreage, 200 ac-served. In addition, \$2486 were transferred to soil conservation ser-

vice to help provide necessary technical services. The Rural Environmental

Conservation Program, 1974 RECP, provided \$13,000 in cost shares used primarily for construction of tanks. Only two practices were used by county farmers and ranchers. Twentysix farms, roughly 3 percent of the farms of the county, participated in this program. The practices used were:

Establishing permanent grass - Klein - no. practices, ; cost-shares, \$760; acres, 96. Constructing water reservoirs - no. practices, 26; costshares, \$12,096; acres, 2300

In addition, \$668 were transferred to soil conservation service to help provide necessary technical services

In summary, the major impetus of the two programs went toward establishing or replacing livestock water facilities which had failed or were lacking due to drouth. Livestock water facilities are used primarily to improve permanent pastures through better distribution of grazing.

To date, no funds have been released for a 1975 conservation program.



From The County Agent-

If you're considering fall delivery of fertilizer, be sure you have a good place to store it or can safely and efficiently use it on the land.

In general, crops will derive as much or more benefit from an application just prior to planting than from a fall appli-

In the past, fertilizers have been so abundant and cheap that a slight loss in efficiency due to time of application and rate used was not of as much concern as under today's con-

Even though the price of tertilizer is at an all-time high, it may go higher. Nitrogen is made from natural gas which is predicted to be critically short this winter. By ordering and buying early, you may be able to get the grades and mixtures you want rather than having to accept what your dealer has on hand next spring.

Fall purchase and storage of fertilizer will insure your crops of an adequate supply next spring. You will also be doing the fertilizer industry a favor by supplying storage and by allowing greater production this

Store fertilizer in a dryplace in bags or bulk. Keep fertilizer off earthen floors or concrete and provide protection from rain but allow for good air circulation.

Put plastic down on concrete before piling fertilizer, either bagged or bulk. A layer of lime, sand or similar material under fertilizer may allow easier and more complete removal with less loss.

Most fertilizers may be stored in bulk, even the more materials m nitrate and urea. A tight plastic cover will help, but these will likely form their own crust which protects the material underneath. Your dealer can best advise you on the mixture that stores well. Those to avoid are the high nitrogen mixed grades, but the formulation makes a difference.


