The Mills County Bi-Centennial Committee met last Thursday night to further de-velop ideas and plans for the proposed 1976 Bi-Centennial Year Celebration Year Celebration.

General Chairman Herbert Faulkner presided at the meet-ing, attended by about 20 committee members.

The main item on the agenda was the listing of projects by each of the three divisions of the celebration - Festival, Heritage and Horizons.

Council Tables Raises; Calls '75 City Election

meeting in regular session last Monday night, nixed pay raises for most City employees.

City Manager Don Petty brought up the matter, saying that in previous years the month of February was the time that pay raises were considered. He presented an outline of an across-the-board 5 percent pay raise for all city employees except himself and the night

Councilman Howard Camp bell made a motion to table all raise propositions except Rita Pafford, office worker, until further meetings. The motion was seconded by Couneilman Jim Smith

The Council expressed concern that many complaints have been lodged with them about the work not being done by City employees. It was the consensus that the pay raise situation would be looked on more favorably if the employees attitude and work habits were to improve. City Manager Petty was instructed by Mayor Ray Duren to call a meeting of City employees and take care of this situation, as it is not the council's duty to handle matters of

CITY ELECTION The annual City Election was called for April 5, 1975, at the City Utilities building.

Two councilmen, Ancle Morgan and Donald Padgett, will be up for re-election and Mayor Duren will also. However, Duren and Padgett both expressed their desire not to be on the ballot for 1975.

The property now operated by Mills County Lumber and Supply, facing Highway 84 in Goldthwaite, was brought into the city limits by the Council. Wendell Tucker was at the meeting to present the annex-

ation ordinance to the Council The property contains about 3.17 acres at the intersection of the Old Priddy Road and Highway 84.

Fairlon Heights No. 2 was okayed by the Council as a bona fide addition to the city. The property, owned by Jin Smith, is already in the city limits. The addition, located immediately south of Proctor Drive (Fairlon No. 1), has 23 building lots. Representatives from Gener-

al Telephone were scheduled to be at the meeting, but failed to show. The Council reviewed recent phone company policies in preparation for a future visit. The communications utility has not been paying pole rental fees on the annual basis as set up originally. Service begin in 1968 and only one payment, in 1971, has been made. The city rents General Telephone usage of its poles for the telephone lines to be affixed. The Council als expressed concern for the fact that the company may try to remove the resident telephone serviceman from Goldthwaite. This would be a situation that Council.

Wendell Tucker, speaking in behalf of the Little League program for Mills County, said that the City's help is needed in replacing the lights at the Little League Park in Goldthwaite. In the past, the LL Association has bought the bulbs and the City has installed them. The Council voted to meter

the field and that the charges for the electricity would have to be met. In recent years, the Council pointed out, electricity cost has increased so drastically that no free electricity can be given. The motion, made by Councilman Ancle Morgan and seconded by Councilman Loy Long, passed

unanimously. The Council asked purchasing agent Dale Allen to procure bids for a new truck for the electric department. A one-ton truck is needed. Bids will be gotten from Saylor Chevrolet

and Landrum Ford. The City Manager has received three applications for the new position of water department trainee. No decision was made on the applicants, in hopes of getting several more applications in the near

LIBRARY At the last meeting of the

Court, the salary paid by the County to Librarian Mae Featherston was raised \$10 per month. The City and County have been sharing the salary on a 50-50 basis. The City unanimously voted to match the amount paid by the County. The librarian's salary is now \$100 per month. Mayor Duren commented that the library program is not used enough by local citizens and that it is certainly a valuable asset to

the county. Ronnie Rush was present at the meeting to ask the City to prepare the street where he resides, Horton Street, for the building of a curb. Rush point ed out that additional dirt needs to be hauled in so that proper drainage can be attained. Dale Allen pointed out that the City needs to decide whether to move water to Hanna Valley Road or both ways on the street. The matter was turned over to CM Petty for his immediate attention as soon as weather per-
