March 5th Deadline For Alderman, Trustee Filing

The filing deadline for school and city elections is March 5 and those wishing to get on the official ballots for the different offices have to file on or before that date.

The City of Goldthwaite will elect a Mayor and two aldermen. Persons wishing to file for any of these offices should contact City Secretary Glynn Collier.

In school elections across the county, filing should be made with the County Judge or with the superintendents of the respective schools.

Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy will elect two school trustees for a regular three year term each.

Two trustees for a regular two year term, a County trustee at large and Precinct 3 trustee will be elected on the County School Board.

The elections will be held April 5th with the City of Goldthwaite voting to be carried on in the City Utilities office. School district trustee elections voting will be in the respective school buildings with the exception of Goldthwaite, which will hold the election in the Commissioners' Courtroom of the Mills County Courthouse.

Man Arrested Here Monday

A Fort Hood soldier was arrested here Tuesday afternoon for carrying a prohibitive weapon. The soldier, Lee Columbus Bennett, Jr. of Bakersfield, California, was allegedly displaying a "Bowie knife" with a blade over the allowable 5 1/2 inch maximum in length in McLean's Cafe in downtown Goldthwaite.

As of press time Bennett's bond and charge arrangements had not been officially completed.

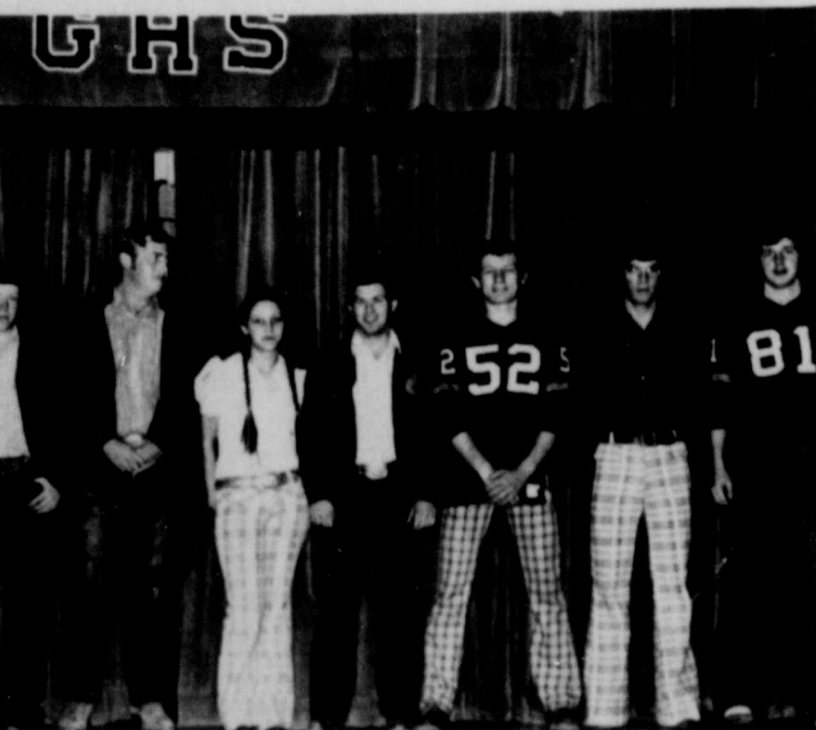

The consolation game with Mullin was played Saturday afternoon and the GJHS boys defeated Mullin 45-38. Jett Johnson again led the scoring with

16 points; Owen Hall had 10; Jim Smith and Mike Connally had 6 each; and Brian Lawrence, Dean Humphries and Stephen Coronado had 2 each.

Rev. M. O. Childress was born near Atlanta, Ga. on October 22, 1883, the son of William Andrew and Missouri A. Childress. No church to join, he was en-

After leaving home, he went to Denton Normal School. After obtaining a second grade certificate he taught school for one year - then back to college again, repeating teaching and college until he finished Denton Normal. After teaching for five years in the public schools, he left Texas in 1914 and went to Pasadena, Calif. Here he entered the Breesee College and graduated in June of 1917. During this time at Pasadena College he met Miss Effie McConnell who was a music teacher at the college.

On October 9, 1917, they were married and came back to Texas. There was a school vacancy, the teacher being called to the army, and Mr. Childress finished the school session. In May of 1918 Mr. Childress and wife went to Avant, Okla. and he became pastor of the Avant church in the Methodist Conference. That fall at the Okla. Methodist Conference session he was admitted on trial and was ordained Deacon in 1920 and ordained Elder in 1922. Mr. Childress and wife spent 38 years as pastor in the Methodist Church.
Retiring at the age of 72, per conference requirement, Mr. Childress had many good profitable years in the ministry. He had many good revivals and many received into the church. He likes to speak of the one most profitable which was four years at the Webb City Church (1938-42). The first year at Easter time, with Bro. Denison as the Evangelist - we had a

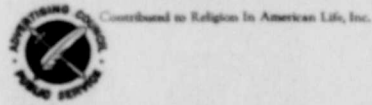

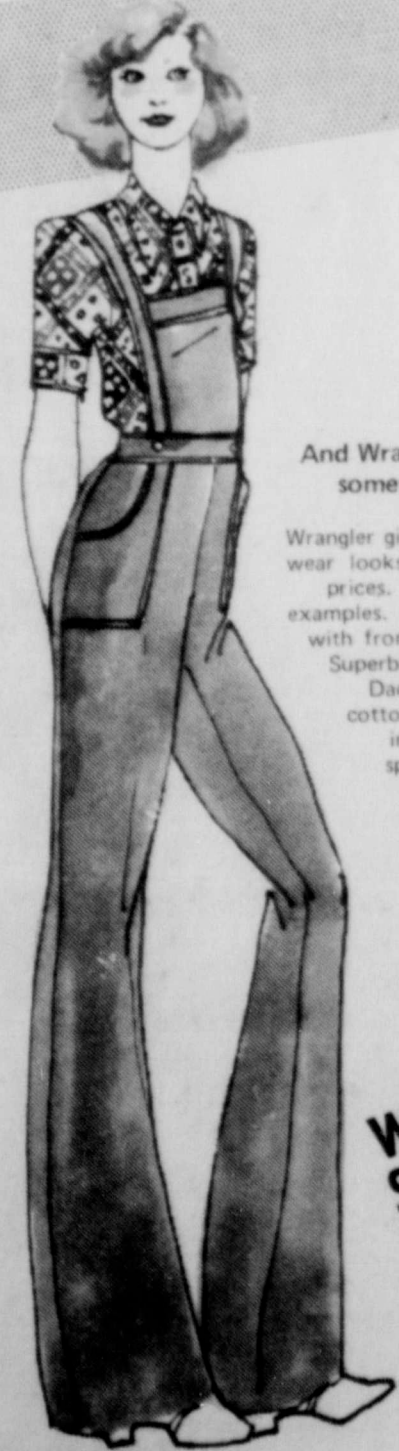
The girls ended their season with an outstanding record of 13 wins and 2 losses.

Book About "Koen" Clan Published In Austin

THE GLORY TRAIL
By O. V. Koen

Mr. Otis Vaughn of Austin, a native of the Mount Olive community of Mills County, had a book published in December of 1974. The book, "The Glory Trail - Koen and Kin from Coast to Coast," is a genealogical and historical study of the author's family. He has charted a direct line from a remote ancestor, Garret Koen, the first Koen in his line found in America, to his own grandchildren. This is eleven generations, well over three hundred years.

Mr. Koen calls his book a story about people. He says that it is a study of land, deeds, wills, abstracts, taxes, wars, migration, religion, hardship, struggle and hope.

The book is much more than a chronicle of vital statistics and biographical facts of his ancestors and their progeny. It is history and adventure, danger and triumph as told by the lives of the people who developed our country. Only a person who has done serious genealogical research can appreciate the amount of work and time that went into gathering, charting, documenting and compiling the material for this book. But the final product, the book, is a credit to all that went into it. Every fact related and every person mentioned is fully documented with footnotes and references. The pedigree charts are easy to follow making it easy to find where any person mentioned fits into the family line. Also the story has cohesion and coherence so that progress and development can be seen from generation to generation.

To touch on a few points of high interest; one ancestor gave a plantation home in Louisiana as a wedding gift to his daughter that "is now on a tour of featured old homes." Another knitted sweaters and socks for soldiers in four wars. One relative in talking about the inaccuracies and inconsistencies in census records said, "Dad said census takers in those early days hardly ever got names and ages correct because they had to face so many man-eating dogs they would get down anything that seemed about right and get away as fast as they could."

One ancestor fought in the Confederate Army, joining at age 17. The battles and other engagements in which he was involved were listed without dwelling on the horrors and

miseries of war. He did say that "Clabe" Koen was one of 30 men to survive from his company of 164. "He never owned a slave; his father owned no slaves; and no record was found to indicate that his grandfather owned any slaves. Then how did he happen to join and fight for that tragic, lost cause?"

Mr. Koen passes the criterion for a real historian. He relates details in the lives of

people, tells how and where they lived and what they did and the reader can see what kind of people they were. No reader can possibly fail to know what kind of a man "Clabe" was. He joined because his Country was at War!

The author's grandmother was one of 17 children who survived the Mountain Meadows Massacre in Utah in 1857. This affair is covered in some

detail including communications exchanged between officials in Arkansas, Utah, Washington D. C., the army and the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the necessary diplomatic maneuvering in arranging for the release of the surviving children and their return to relatives in Arkansas.

Genealogical charts and biographical material of many families related to the Koens by marriage are included in the book. Some of these are: Cline, Couch, Bush, Bleeker, Qualls, Wicker, Harcastle, Holmes, Lawson, Calloway, McKemmy, Cox, Stillwell, Cooke, Weidenschuch, Huckabee, Hodge, Wilcox, Stewart, Black, Benningfield, Roberts, Harrison, Conway, Lindsey, Harris, Neal, Geeslin, etc. Many descendants of these families as well as the Koens are, today, a part of the good people of Mills County.
