Approximately 500 Attend Schools Visitation Night

Thursday night a large, enthusiastic crowd of parents and interested patrons turned out for the Public Schools Week special open house.

high school auditorium sponsored by the Mills County Young Homemakers. According to officials of the school approximately five hundred adults attended the program.

Cash prizes of \$10 each were awarded to second and eighth grades for having the largest percentage of parents present.

Immediately following the American Heritage Program, parents visited the various classes of the schools to view work produced by the students. They also became familiar with teaching equipment now being used in the class rooms.

Supt. Gilbert Davis expressed his appreciation to all who showed their concern and interest in the local schools by attending this special visitation night.

Bishop Mileng Speaker At Zion Luthern Church March 16

Bishop Stahl Mileng will be at the Zion Lutheran Church, Priddy, for the 10:30 worship service on March 16. Friends and neighbors are invited to come and hear this able leader of his Church tell of the work of Christian Churches in his homeland.

Bishop Mileng is the fourth son of the late Pastor Mileng of Karkar Island, Madang District of Papua-New Guinea. He attended the elementary school on Karkar Island and later went to the District Church School. His studies began in the Gedege language followed by his learning the Kate (Kawtay) language of the Finsehafen district. He also began his study of the English language at this time.

His ministry has been both that of a teacher and lay evangelist serving in different capacities for the Church.

Mr. Mileng has traveled abroad representing his church for different conferences and conventions in the South Pacific area including Australia. He has also represented his Church in Europe and the U.S.A. He attended the Lutheran World Federation Assembly in Helsinki in 1963. His last visit

to the U.S.A. was in 1970 at which time he also attended the LWF meetings at Evian, France.

Bishop Mileng was a young lad when Pastor Mild of Priddy was missionary on Karkar Island. The Mileng family lived on the same station as did the Milds. It is a happy reunion for us to meet again.

Farmer's Market Given Approval By Comm. Court

The Mills County Commissioners Court approved Monday the formation of a Mills County Farmers' Market where local gardeners and farmers could sell their produce. The market, tentatively to be set up at the Mills County Park area, is sponsored by the Family Living Committee of Mills County, with the Extension Agents as advisors. The market would be open to anyone in Mills County who would want to sell fresh produce grown here. Judy Beavers, County Extension Agent, presented the proposal to the court.

In other action, the commissioners raised the rate paid for mileage to the sheriff's department vehicles. The present rate of 12 cents per mile was unanimously raised to 16 cents.

The commissioners voted to purchase a new radar system for the Department of Public Safety vehicles in Mills County. Also, the court okayed the purchase of a hand-held walkie talkie for the Highway Patrol's use.

SPECIAL ELECTION

A special constitutional amendment election will be held on April 22 in Texas, and the election was set here by the

commissioners court. The election will consider two propositions - the revision of public employee retirement systems and a pay raise for the Legislature from \$400 to \$600 per month and a raise in the per diem pay.

The commissioners voted to hold the election in only one box, the courthouse. All county residents will cast their ballots there.

In other business, the court voted to leave the tax rate charged for personal property the same as last year. The rate is \$35 for cattle, \$4 for sheep and goats, \$40 for horses, \$3 for hogs, and a range of \$50 to \$700 for cars.

The sessions of the county court of law were set as in previous years. The court will be in session sometime in the months of March, June, September and December. County Judge Herbert Faulkner presides in County Court.

Two Persons Injured In Accident Here Sunday

Sunday, March 9th, at 3:05 p.m. U.S. 183 and the intersection of Texas 16 here in Goldthwaite was the scene of a two-vehicle accident.

Marla Henry of Goldthwaite, driver of a 1960 Chevrolet station wagon, was in collision with a 1972 Chevrolet driven by Albert Hernandez of Brownwood.

Karla Henry, passenger in the station wagon, was taken to Childress Hospital for treatment of injuries. Irma Hernandez, passenger in the second vehicle, was taken to Childress Hospital for treatment of injuries and later transferred to Brownwood Community Hospital. The injured were transported by Wilkins Ambulance.

Both vehicles sustained major damage. Local law enforcement officers investigated.

Saturday morning local law enforcement officers apprehended a stolen vehicle from Brownwood near Goldthwaite. The driver of the vehicle was seized and released to Brownwood authorities.

Elementary School To Get Forced Air Heaters

The Goldthwaite Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday night and voted to install 12 new forced air type heaters in the elementary school.

The elementary now uses the radiator type of heating, and the new ones will be much more efficient in the use of gas and will also heat the rooms more evenly and prevent hot spots.

A & A Paint and Supply of Goldthwaite was awarded the job for the installation of the heaters, at a cost of \$3445 for thirteen in the elementary and with the addition of two in the high school area at proportionate cost.

Superintendent Gilbert Davis reported that there was cause for much concern in the local fund assignment allocation by the State Board of Education. A wrong figure was sent in to

the State Board and the board is reluctant to accept any amendments to the statement, Davis said. The local fund assignment is the amount GISED must pay for the school operation. It is usually based on an 80-20 percent basis. The past year the county's part of the total was about \$80,000 and the State Board raised that figure to about \$176,000.

Davis said a committee of superintendents from Mills County and the County Judge went to Austin last Friday and met with the board to plead their case, but the board would only drop the amount to \$104,000. The matter is not settled yet, Davis added, and the group plans another confrontation with the State Board soon.

If the decision was left as it was, county tax payers would have to pay over twice as much for taxes.

In other board matters, president Dale Allen gave another report on the football field lighting situation. Allen has been investigating the new quartz lighting system which greatly increases the efficiency of the lights. About 32 lights are needed to complete the job. Further study is planned before any decision is made on the proposition.

Superintendent Davis reported that local district taxes have been collected and are about 94 per cent complete, with \$134,104.32 being collected to date. About \$6,000 is outstanding as delinquent.

The school sold a 1967 model bus to the Texas School Bus Sales Center in Austin for \$1708.88. This was the high bid on the bus. Other bidders were Cross Plains Independent School District, Second Baptist Church of Pasadena, Texas Auto Parts in Abilene, Brazos Bus Services of Clute, J. T. Jones, and the First Baptist Church of Meridian.

The board unanimously voted to purchase materials for a Free Enterprise course to be taught in conjunction with High School Economics taught by Mrs. Hoyett Cockrell. It is a required part of the curriculum as of 1975-76.

Supt. Davis reported that the school's average daily attendance figures are lagging a little with sickness and absenteeism. "The district is in danger of losing the services of another teacher if a level of 421 students in ADA is not maintained. At present a level of 422.61 is being maintained. Parents should see to it that their children are in school if at all possible so this figure will remain over the minimum.

Elementary principal T. J. Williams and High School counterpart George Michael were instructed by the board to tell teachers and staff members about the wonderful job they did in association with Public Schools Week here. All the classrooms were visited by parents and interested persons last Thursday night during an open house program.

In final action the board congratulated trustee W. G. "Bill" Bishop on his completing 15 years on the Goldthwaite Board. He is not seeking re-election this year. Supt. Davis pointed out that Mr. Bishop has been very effective in his representation and that he has always done an exemplary job as trustee.

Water Under The Bridge

Mills County's greatest resource, our Senior Citizens, will stage their annual fair May 7th this year.

This annual event is the highlight of many months of planning and preparation by many of the senior citizens of our little county. The efforts of these individuals should be congratulated by others at least for their attendance at the fair when it rolls around.

As I have said before, the only category that Mills County continually excels in is that of persons over the age of 65, and that is not to be sneered at. There is great opportunity herein and the responsibility to the rest of us is also a great challenge.

A group of Coryell County individuals are violently protesting the expansion program of Fort Hood. Seems that both sides have their good and bad points, as is usually the case. Probably will be decided in court with the outcome probably obvious. When bureaucracy starts to roll, sometimes all you have time to do is get out of the way.

And what fair value can you place on land? It's like placing a monetary value in the hands of a piano player. How many songs are left to be played? How many notes to be heard?

Goldthwaite lost out in the bidding for a large railroad repair shop. Original estimates were that it would employ about 40 skilled men and require about 30 acres of land for the complex of buildings and railroad sidings. Vicki Holm, secretary of the Council of Governments here, says the bid went to a town in Oklahoma.

The plant would have required an expenditure of at least \$1,000,000 from local sources, but ownership by the Goldthwaite Industrial Foundation. What's that about spilled milk?

Maybe there is something to this idea of evolution - of people ascending from lower animals evidence mostly being against such people.

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From The County Agent -

Many deaths of newborn calves can be prevented if the cattlemen is present during calving. Studies show that two-thirds of the calf deaths that occur within 48 hours of calving can be prevented by a veterinarian's actions before and after calving. Of course, a limited breeding season will help so the cattlemen will know to within a few days when the calving season will begin and end.

We recommend watching cows for certain signs which may signal calving time. We advise checking cows every four hours during the calving season.

Calving is generally in three stages: first, the cow's uterus begins to have contractions, and the cow may isolate herself from the herd; next, a water bag of fetal membranes appears; and finally the calf is born.

If a cow hasn't delivered by two hours after the water bag appears, have her checked by a veterinarian.

Check the size of the calf in relation to the pelvic opening and whether the position of the calf in the birth canal is normal. If the position and size appear normal, you can

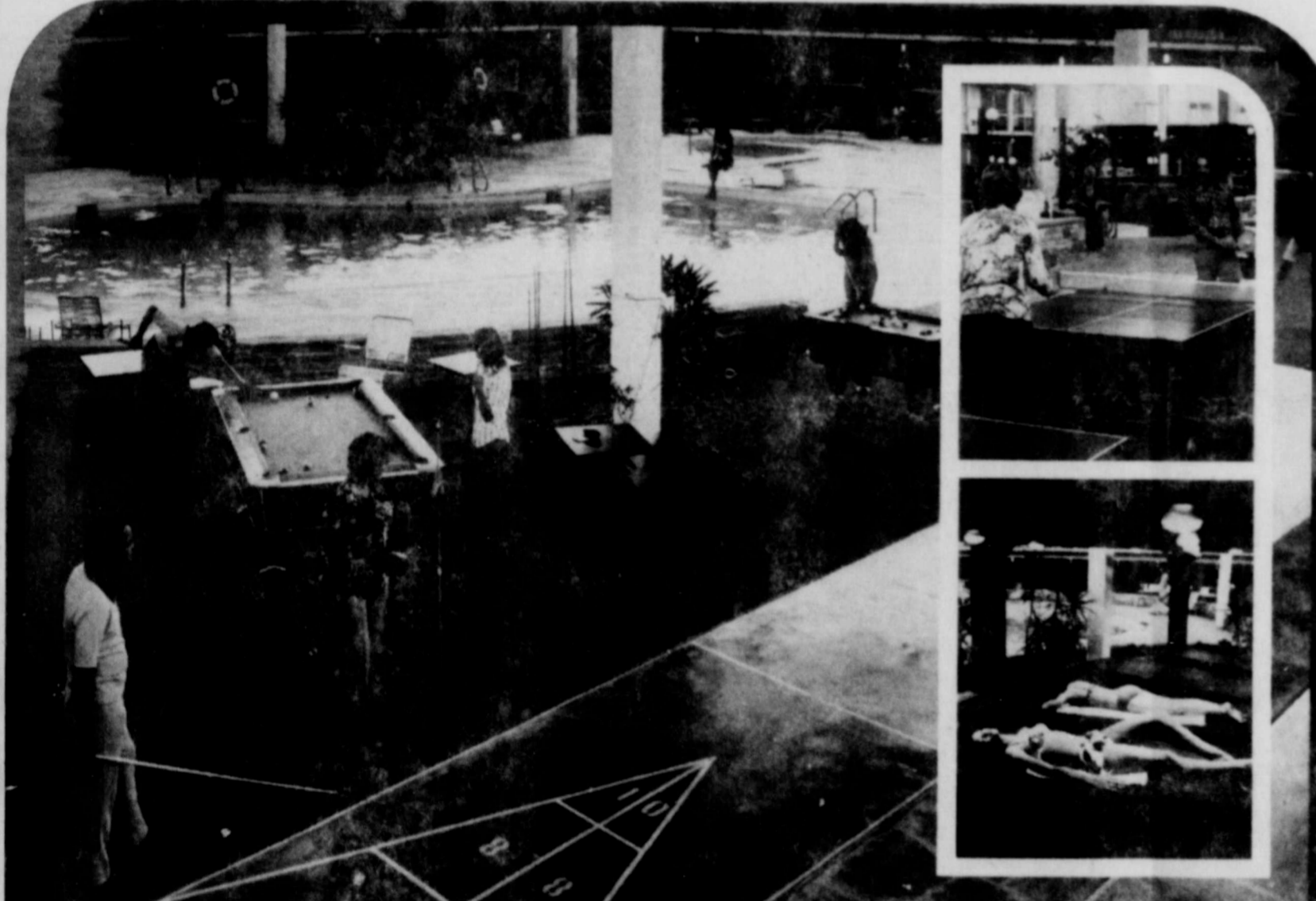

(Editor's Note) The following article was written by Mrs. Jean Thompson for the Independent Cattlemen's Association. It describes the feelings of the I. C. A. and deals with a subject which should be given serious thought. It is substantially backed up by numerous references. Due to its length, the entire article could not be printed; therefore, we are printing portions of the article which we hope will best sum up the feelings of the I. C. A.

WILL YOUR CHILD BE HUNGRY IN 1985?

Food is like sleep - not much reason to think about it as long as one has had enough. Only lack really stimulates thought about it. The American people have grown so accustomed to abundant supplies of food they no longer think about the source of it or wonder if there will be adequate amounts next year.
They have bought more luxuries, comforts, and conveniences than any other people in the world because until recently only around 16 percent of their disposable income was required to buy food while other nationalities had to spend 40 to 80 percent of their income just to eat. Can there be any doubt that much of our nation's affluence has been made possible by American agriculture? It is ironic, indeed, that people enjoying such multitudinous benefits from it will allow irresponsible political interference and economic juggernauts

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Hungry Children In 1985?

To threaten the survival of our agricultural businesses. For 200 years, America's family farms and ranches have been "the goose that lays the golden egg", and now only an informed and concerned public can save this goose.
Union wages, government salaries, and prices of all other products automatically rise to offset cost of living increases and inflated production costs, but when farm prices increase, loud bowls of indignation sweep the nation. Apparently, few few Americans realize the goose that lays their golden egg can be starved to death.
Publicity on the world food situation during the World Food Conference produced a most curious reaction of an outcry for governmental controls over land and food production. Every governmental control affecting food production in the United States has achieved only disruption of food production. And if any amount of bureaucratic control could produce food, Russia wouldn't be buying it from us. She has absolute bureaucratic control and has had our agricultural technology since World War II. She has certainly proven her mechanization capacity and yet, with 50 percent of her working class growing food, she cannot produce enough to keep her own people fed. China has 80 percent of her population working in agriculture and last year had to conscript more from the cities into the fields. Shouldn't that be sufficient evidence that no kind of any amount of bureaucratic controls can insure adequate food supplies?

What is the explanation for the amazing productivity of American agriculture which so far exceeds other nation's food production with so few food producers? What does the American farmer and rancher have that the Russians do not have? Only freedom and incentive for motivation. Both of these are being endangered.
America's food producers come to grips with the gut issues of environmentalism. 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It is somewhat startling to hear the theoretical environmentalists spouting rhetoric as though the environment had just been discovered. Apparently, some of them didn't know it was here until they found it in a book. Let's hope and pray these ardent people "discover" food because there is often a wide chasm between theoretical facts and practical facts.
For example of this, consider the furor raised over the possibility of the coyote becoming extinct. Had he been asked, the most illiterate old sheep herder could have told anybody the possibility of rats becoming extinct in the cities was more probable than the wily coyote disappearing from the open range. And, doubtless, he would have posed some most logical questions about body lice, cockroaches, and

Looking at what has been done to the beef producers, other food producers who will be next. There is a way of knowing what way theory of fallacy will be experimentally imposed on them.

There is macabre irony in President Ford's telling producers to grow all they can. That's what the President has done for two years ago.

Food producers cannot be a hungry world alone. Responsible governmental action insure marketing and distribution systems equitable to our farmers and ranchers is essential, too. Without these, asking them to risk over-production growing all they can is asking them to produce their own destruction and destroy America's source of food at the same time.
It is incredible that this situation can exist in a world where 700 million people are already facing starvation in the world population is increasing at the rate of 70 million per year. The millennial growing weather the world has enjoyed for thirty years is ended and wide spread droughts have devastated vast areas that had been productive. Yet our government continues to play games with the most highly productive food producers of the world has ever known.

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malaria - carrying mosquito being part of the ecology, too. The sensational emotionalism generated around the coyote completely obscured practical considerations and bureaucratic controls were instituted to protect the coyote. Fifty years of predator control work were wiped out. The coyotes are so prolific and destructive that now, three years later, there are 92 separate studies in progress trying to find some way to keep them from over coming the west. Packs of coyotes are voraciously consuming food needed for hungry children and have cost the consumers hundreds of millions of dollars in red meat. It would indeed, be interesting to know what the total cost to the consumers has been for this one bureaucratic blunder.

When famine is stalking the world, bureaucratic mistakes disrupting food production can well cost the consumer a much dearer price in the future - one most Americans have never known - hunger.

Isn't it time for consumers to stand up and demand that all bureaucratic interference and legislation affecting food PROVEN OUT IN PRACTICE ON GOVERNMENT LAND AND THE TOTAL COST OF EACH ONE BE MADE KNOWN TO THE AMERICAN PUBLIC BEFORE IT IS IMPOSED ON OUR FOOD PRODUCTION, PROCESSING OR DISTRIBUTION SYSTEMS? There is macabre irony in President Ford's telling producers to grow all they can. That's what the President has done for two years ago.

Last week Goldthwaite's high school boys placed sixth in the Bangs track meet with a total of 47 1/2 points.

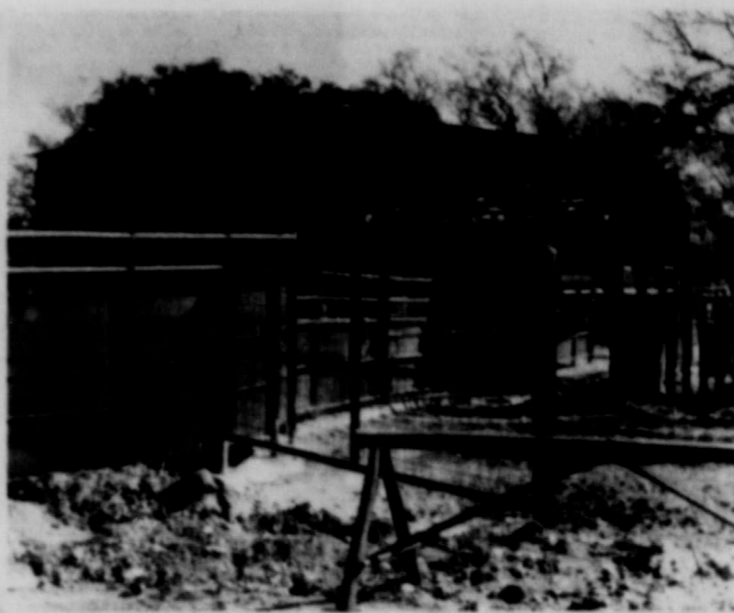
The local sprint relay team composed of Tommy Collier, Mick Simon, Guenaro Siller and Byron Landrum placed third in the meet with a time of 45.7.

Jim McCoy Brings New Bull Test Center To Mills County

The first test of the Mills County Bull Testing Center will get underway Saturday, March 15, with weighing all day. Jim McCoy of Goldthwaite will head the test which will be held at his ranch in facilities which have taken a year to build. McCoy designed the modern and easy operating structure and built most of the facilities himself. Southwestern Construction Company of San Angelo finished the building.

The all-steel, pipe and cable facility was built to accommodate 280 bulls each test. McCoy traveled around looking at bull testing stations for two years and came up with his own design and materials to build his. The entire system is set up for a quick, freeflow operation circuit with first class and popular equipment being used.

The ration for the test was developed by a research scientist for Moorman Feed Co. The feed has been used on several other occasions and has proven to be very successful. McCoy notes that the ration is a growing element, not fattening.

The bulls will run for 140 days on the test and will be ear tagged and weighed Saturday when they arrive at the test center.

Jim Wells, president of the Texas Char-Swiss Association and agriculture teacher at Goldthwaite, will be assisting McCoy during the test which will close August 2nd with the final weighing.

The bulls will be weighed every 30 days by Mills County Extension Agent Danny Long of Goldthwaite.
