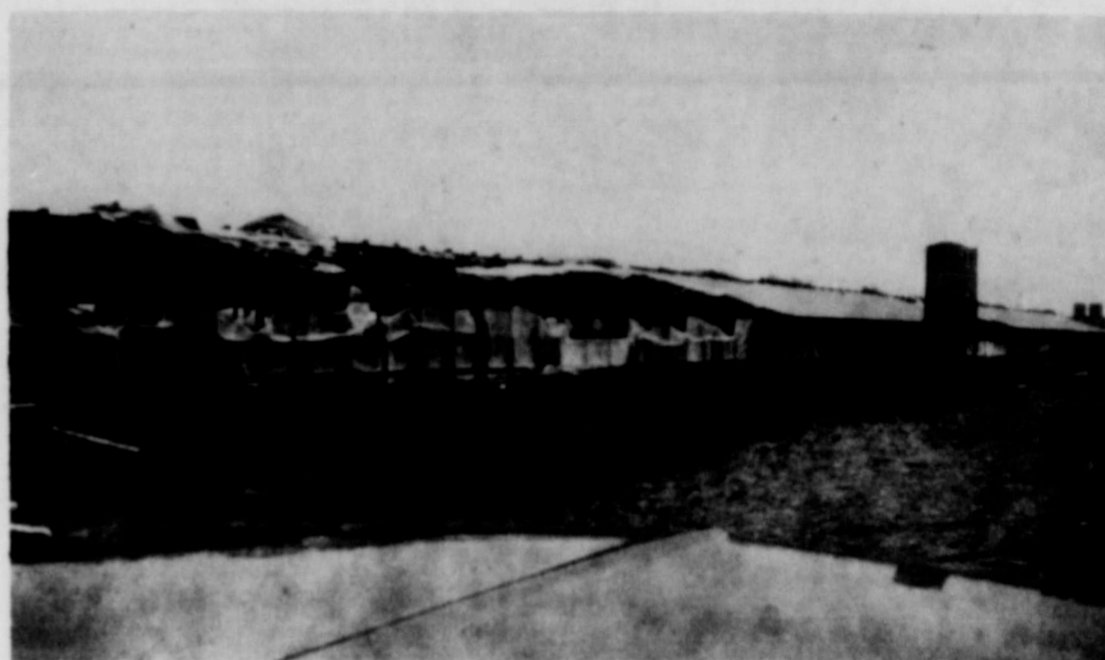
## Upcoming Relays Occupies Lions Business Meet

An attempted burglary was foiled last Tuesday night in Goldthwaite, as burglars were apparently scared off by patrolling nightwatchman and sheriff's officers.

A man was seen in the alley behind R. G. Kelly TV about 12:30 a.m. last Wednesday, and

by the time sheriff's officers got to the scene, the culprit had fled the area.

Sheriff H. G. Brooks said that at this time he did not know that a burglary was in progress. However, upon opening his store on Wednesday morning, Floyd Spradley of Spradley Furniture on Fisher Street found furniture lined up ready to be loaded at his back door. The door had been forced open during the night.

The area at the rear of the store where upholstery work is done had been swept by the burglars in preparation for driving a truck in and loading up so no one could see the illegal activity, according to Brooks.

# G'waite Civic Beautification Possible Through Cooperation

In 1953, the City Council met with the local clubs of our town, LIONS CLUB, AMERICAN LEGION, VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS, ART AND CIVIC CLUB, TUESDAY STUDY CLUB, SELF CULTURE CLUB, and THE GARDEN CLUB, to agree on a location for a new park and swimming pool. The site, 13 acres located on the south side of town and bounded on two sides by State Highway 16 and U.S. Highway 183, was chosen.

In 1885, this land was under water as it was a storage of water for the Santa Fe Railroad. It was kept full by a spring which later went dry. Willow trees and other shrubs grew up, covering the location.

There first began an effort by the LIONS CLUB to clean up and beautify the area. Driveways were graded and picnic tables were placed in shaded

area. In 1954, the City of Goldthwaite constructed a swimming pool on the northwest side of the area at a cost of \$14,767. An entrance was paved through all of the park area.

In 1959 the Goldthwaite Garden Club took the park as their project and still includes it as such. A landscape artist was employed and they presented an overall plan which was carried out to the fullest in 1970.

One and a half acres of land on the south side of the park was deeded by the City of Goldthwaite to the local American Legion. They constructed a banquet hall type building, 36 X 70 ft. in size, with restrooms and kitchens. This facility is used much by family reunions, parties, banquets, business meetings, and others.

A full time keeper has been employed by the park com-

mittee. Mr. W. P. Duren is Chairman of park finances and money is contributed by interested citizens to pay for maintenance.

The City's street lighting system was extended to the park and lights and receptacles were installed.

The Garden Club made entrance signs, naming the park "Mills County Park" so that all would share using the facility.

Shrubs, trees, rose bushes, iris and other flowers were planted. Flower beds were constructed at the swimming pool and honey suckle was planted. Play ground equipment and tables have been donated by the clubs of the town. The Garden Club added thirty six feet of new tables in 1970 for family reunions and barbecues.

Girl Scout day camps and local Boy Scouts as well as

Scouts from other towns spend weekends in our park. Rest room facilities were installed at a cost of \$2,166.07.

An outdoor theater has been added for Easter Sunrise Services and other activities of our town.

Water for the swimming pool and shrubs is supplied from an old railroad well hand dug in 1906 which is 20 feet across and 50 feet deep. The City has installed an electric pump which distributes the water to the different areas.

Two permanent steel trash can holders with containers have been installed. Bird houses were installed by Junior Garden Club members.

Talent shows, bake sales, Easter parades, etc. have been held to help with finances. A portion of expense has been made from awards on our press and scrap book. The book was

kept by Mrs. W. P. Duren. A total of \$1,535 has been won from Sears awards and \$125 has been won from Readers Digest awards, for a total of \$1,660 from both organizations.

A total of over \$53,000 has been spent to good advantage on the Mills County Park. This is what one small town has done with everyone working together. A beautiful park and a scenic rest area has been made for travelers, as well as for local townspeople.
